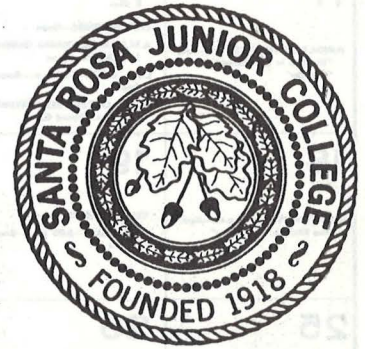



Meeting #2

- I. Call to Order
President Larry Gibson called the meeting to order at 7:50 p.m.

- V. Reports
Mr. Canevari reported that the school calenders, handbooks, and little black address books had arrived and that he would need some help, volunteers to pass out the materials when school started. And if anyone asks the little black address books are a gift from the Pacific Telephone Co.

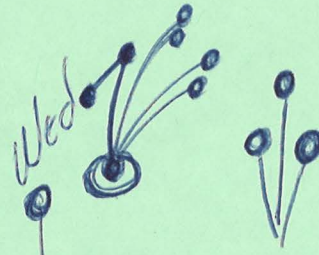

A daily college communication paper designed so that all campus associated persons may participate. Persons may submit statements and pictures at any of various entry receptacles on the campus. The standard deadline is 5:00 P.M. of the previous day of distribution. A special deadline (telephone call to the editor) is 7:00 P.M. Distribution is at 8:00 P.M. The paper shall be free.

II. Purpose of paper.

To perform a daily mass communication service for all members of the academic community. Freedom of expression will be afforded as much as possible under the limits of the censorship rules of this statement.

III. Faculty advisor.

The faculty advisor(s) shall provide inspiration and guidance to the organization of the paper in order that it may better fulfill its purpose. One faculty member shall exercise total control over the paper and be personally responsible for the content of the paper.

IV. Procedure of the paper.

1. Set up entry receptacles at various points of the campus.
 - a. Top of cigarette machine in coop.
 - b. On table beside south door in coop.
 - c. Inside English buildings.
 - d. Inside Administration building.
 1. At registrar
 2. At counselor's booth
 3. Inside student personnel office
 4. At switch board
 - e. In student activities office.
 - f. In lobby of auditorium.
 - g. On table of business buildings.
 - h. On table in engineering building.
 - i. On top of shelf at the Bookstore.
 - j. In library (in lobby and librarians' desk).
- All locations subject to change.
2. Set up silk screen signs at each of the entry receptacles.
3. Place entry forms at each receptacle. Pictures may also be submitted.
4. Pick up entries at 5:00 P.M.
5. Have paper typed at 7:00 P.M.
6. Have 1000 copies duplicated at 7:00 A.M. (subject to adjustments).
7. Distribute at 8:00 A.M.
 - a. 100 cps in English buildings.
 - b. 350 cps in coop.
 - c. 100 cps in Administration building.
 - d. 200 cps in auditorium.
 - e. 25 cps in student activities office.
 - f. 75 cps in library.
 - g. 50 cps in business building.
 - h. 50 cps in engineering building.
 - i. 50 cps at the Bookstore.

V. Editorial rights and responsibilities.

1. Definition of editor.

One person who:

- a. has final editing authority and responsibility;
- b. is responsible to the financier to produce a daily paper conforming to the provisions of this statement;
- c. is responsible to the financier to produce receipts of all expenses;
- d. shall obtain approval of responsible faculty member for all copy prior to distribution.

2. Editing rules (censureship)

- a. No copy purely for the sake of obscenity will be accepted.
 1. Any expression (four-letter or otherwise) or picture whose intended meaning is to solely disgust the reader. (To be determined by the editor)
 2. Any picture whose intended meaning is to arouse prurient interest and has no distinguishing aesthetic value. (To be determined by the editor).
- b. No unprovable accusations will be allowed. Proof of accusations will be acceptable to the editor within the limit of the libel laws.

3. Editor rights

- a. Editor may correct spelling and grammar, but not necessarily.
- b. Editor may omit duplications.
- c. Editor may control monopolization of entries by any individual or group.
- d. Editor may postpone publishing certain entries to allow for clarification or verification.
- e. Editor may position the entries as he sees fit.
- f. Editor may reduce size of pictures.
- g. Editor may omit entries due to lack of space. (to be determined according to the time of submission).

VI. Who may submit entries.

1. All students, faculty, administration and college employees are authorized to submit entries.
2. No off-campus individuals or groups shall have their entries accepted unless sponsored by an authorized person.
3. No paid advertising will be accepted under the provisions of this statement.
4. All communication shall have the personal name of the submitter affixed.

It was also discussed whether these constitutional amendments would be in effect this semester or next.


Ken Beyries proposed the creation of new offices which would be "more pertinent" for example a Commissioner of Employment like they have at Laney College.

- I. Call to Order
President Larry Gibson called the meeting to order at 3:15 p.m.
- II. Roll Call
Sophomore Representative Dave Smith was absent.
- III. Flag Salute
Larry Gibson led the flag salute.
- IV. Approval of Agenda
The agenda was approved as written.
- V. Approval of Minutes
The minutes were approved as written.
- VI. Reports
PRESIDENT: Larry Gibson reported that he is flying to Los Angeles for an Area 7 Executive Board meeting with Mr. Reagan this Thursday, Sept. 24.

Larry announced what students were going to the Hoberg Conference: Larry Gibson, Jim Burnside, Marker Karahadian, Rosa Mar, Gary Cia, Eileen Dougan, Rich Anders, Lawrence Jackson, Leslie Johnson, Ken Beyries, Larry Krogness, Dave Herrington, Larry Farrell, Ray Martinez, Victor Jones, Lonnie Russell, and Henry Porter.

Larry read off a list of Faculty Committees that required students to be on them and asked if anyone was interested in any committee to let him know soon.

Larry reported that he has written all the legislators of our district and asked them to send him their monthly report. Larry wants a committee of students to take charge of xeroxing these reports and passing them out to the students on campus.

Larry reported that the Environmental Project Committee will meet on Sept. 22. The purpose of this project is to expose the top ten polluters in the Sonoma County Area. The meeting will be in the Student Lounge and Dave Herrington is Larry's Co-chairman.

Larry Gibson entertained the motion to approve Ken Osborne for Publicity Commissioner. The motion was seconded and passed.

EXECUTIVE VICE-PRESIDENT: Jim Burnside reported that he had sent out notices to all the faculty concerning the SCIC meeting, Sept. 23.

Jim reported that the Soccer Team had started practice, but in order to play games on campus the team must have an accredited teacher; the team still does not have a teacher.

VICE-PRESIDENT: Marker Karahadian reported on his first ICC meeting which dealt mainly with administrative things. ICC postponed the election of an ICC Rep. to CSA until their next meeting, Sept. 22. SOPHOMORE REPRESENTATIVE: Eileen Dougan reported what committees she was on; the Mid-Day Series, Financial Aids, and the Environmental Committees.

MID-DAY SERIES REPRESENTATIVE: Dave Herrington reported that Robert Bly will be here Wednesday, Sept. 23.

OAK LEAF REPRESENTATIVE: Frank Lawler invited everyone to submit articles to the Oak Leaf for the insert page.

HEAD YELL LEADER: Sue Meyers asked about the possibility of getting a Rooters Bus for away games.

ACTIVITIES ADVISOR: Mr. Canevari said that it would quite easy to get a Rooters Bus that had not been too successful in the past.

Mr. Canevari reported that there are 8 students running for Freshman Representative.

He asked that everyone help Larry and volunteer to be on the committees that need student representation.

VII. Old Business

A. Steve Cabot's Communication Paper

Steve expressed thanks to Mr. Canevari for "understanding" his project.

Steve Cabot felt that CSA did not absolutely "trust" him. Steve proposed two suggestions to insure CSA: 1) Steve Cabot would sign a statement binding him to CSA and when he violated any terms, he would be expelled; and 2) Have Larry appoint a committee of co-editors and they would have equal responsibility as the editor.

Larry Gibson referred the money making request to ICC.



CLARIFICATION OF STUDENT CONDUCT GUIDELINES, DUE PROCESS, DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURES

IV B 2. Board of Review & IV B 3. Disciplinary Procedures

2. BOARD OF REVIEW

a. Composition

The Board of Review shall be composed of two teachers and one administrator appointed by the College Committee on Committees, the president of the Associated Students and one student who is not a member of the College Student Assembly but who is elected to the Board of Review membership each semester by the College Student Assembly.

b. Jurisdiction

The Board of Review shall review a disciplinary action of expulsion only upon written request of the student against whom the action has been taken. The findings of this review shall be communicated by the Board of Review Chairman to the College President in the form of a recommendation to uphold or lessen the disciplinary action taken by the Office of the Dean of Students. The Board of Review is not a court of law, but is a lay body whose sole function is to investigate, reach a conclusion, and make a recommendation(s).

c. Organization

- (1) The Board of Review shall elect its own chairman at the first meeting called each school year. He shall serve in that capacity for the entire school year unless he resigns or is replaced by a majority vote of the members of the Board of Review.
- (2) The Chairman shall determine the time and place of all meetings.
- (3) The Chairman has the obligation to maintain a responsible and orderly process during the meeting. He is vested with the right to adjourn the meeting at any time he feels orderly procedures are not being followed.
- (4) The Chairman shall determine whether to use a tape recording of the meeting and/or minutes taken by a college secretary. The record(s) shall be filed in the Office of the Dean of Students.

d. Procedures

- (1) It shall be the responsibility of the Office of the Dean of Students to submit to the Board of Review the Dean's Due Process and Disciplinary Procedures Summary, which includes charge(s), written statements, evidence, and disciplinary action.

2. BOARD OF REVIEW

d. Procedures

(1) continued

The Dean's Due Process and Disciplinary Procedures Summary shall be received and read by the members of the Board of Review in advance of the meeting and shall constitute the initial facts and findings in the case.

- (2) A meeting of the Board of Review shall be convened no earlier than twenty-four (24) hours (one school day) and generally no later than seven (7) school days following the filing of an appeal in the Office of the Dean of Students.
- (3) Meetings of the Board of Review shall be closed to everyone other than the Board of Review members, the student(s) charged, the representative of the Office of the Dean of Students or other college representative, the person(s) designated to record the minutes, and witnesses while they are presenting testimony.
- (4) The Office of the Dean of Students shall be asked first to make any further comments and answer questions regarding the Dean's Due Process and Disciplinary Procedures Summary. The Office of the Dean of Students may provide further evidence and witnesses.
- (5) The student shall appear in person to present evidence and witnesses. The student shall have an opportunity to question adverse witnesses.
- (6) Persons involved may be asked questions by the student, the Office of the Dean of Students, and any member of the Board of Review.
- (7) Written as well as oral evidence may be introduced by the student(s) and the Office of the Dean of Students.
- (8) All matters upon which the recommendation is based must be introduced into evidence at the meeting of the Board of Review.
- (9) The members of the Board of Review shall vote by open written ballot and the votes shall be recorded in the minutes by name.
- (10) The Chairman shall transmit the recommendation of the Board of Review to the student(s) and the President of the College that the:
 - (a) Charge(s) be dismissed.
 - (b) Disciplinary action be changed to lesser action.
 - (c) Disciplinary action be upheld.

2. BOARD OF REVIEW

d. Procedures continued

- (11) If the action recommended is expulsion, the Chairman of the Board of Review shall inform the student(s) he may appeal to the Board of Trustees with the right of legal counsel.
- (12) If the Board of Review is unable to meet or act, the student may appeal to the Board of Trustees.

3. DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURES

- a. Action on a charge(s) of misconduct by a student may be initiated by the president, dean of students, assistant dean of students, or another staff member designated by the president.
- b. Exercise of due process shall culminate in one of the following actions:
 - (1) Dismissal of the charge(s).
 - (2) Issuance of a Reprimand. A reprimand is a disciplinary action which:
 - (a) Is imposed for an infraction of published rules or regulations of the college.
 - (b) Places the student on notice that such continued conduct may result in more serious disciplinary action.
 - (c) Is filed in the Office of the Dean of Students.
 - (d) Is expunged from all records no later than one (1) year after the student's last semester of attendance.
 - (3) Placement on Disciplinary Probation. Probation is a disciplinary action which:
 - (a) Notifies the student his conduct has violated published rules and regulations of the college.
 - (b) Places the student on notice that such continued conduct may result in expulsion from the college.
 - (c) Is filed in the Office of the Dean of Students.
 - (d) Is expunged from all records no later than one (1) year from the student's last semester of attendance.
 - (4) Expulsion of the student. Expulsion is a disciplinary action which:
 - (a) Is invoked for conduct which is a violation of published rules and regulations of the college.
 - (b) Is taken by the Board of Trustees.

3. DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURES

b. (4) continued

- (c) Is recorded in the Office of the Dean of Students and on the student's official record.
- (d) Is communicated to the parents as well as the student if he is under twenty-one years of age.
- (e) Denies for the remainder of the semester the right of continued employment to the student or the privilege of entering any portion of the campus except through written appointment with the Office of the Dean of Students.
- (f) Upon the student's petition through the Office of the Dean of Students to the appropriate committee, he may be permitted to re-enroll no earlier than one year after the expulsion.
- (g) Upon the student's petition through the Office of the Dean of Students to the appropriate committee may be expunged from all records, such action to be taken no earlier than one year after the expulsion.

c. A student may be suspended, and this action:

- (1) Is imposed to deny a student the privilege of occupying or entering any portion of the campus for a period of time of not to exceed ten (10) successive school days.
- (2) Notifies the student an act of misconduct on his part, which may result in the imposition of a reprimand, disciplinary probation, or expulsion, demands the student's absence from the campus during the course of the investigation of the misconduct.
- (3) Notifies the student that his absence from the campus during the course of the investigation of misconduct is necessary in the opinion of an authorized officer of the college to remove an unacceptable threat to his well-being or of other students and/or the good order of the college community.

d. Each disciplinary action is:

- (1) Effective with its announcement to the student;
- (2) Confirmed in writing;
- (3) Subject to appeal to the Board of Review in the case of expulsion and to the Board of Trustees with the right of representation by counsel;
- (4) Recorded on the student's official college record and/or in the Office of the Dean of Students as indicated for each action;
- (5) Subject to being expunged from the records as indicated for each action.

STUDENT CONDUCT GUIDELINES

ADDITIONS RE: Ad Hoc Student Groups

(Add to Page 1) (I-C)

B. Inter-Club Council

A Body composed of representatives of the various student clubs.

C. Student Curriculum and Instruction Council

A Body composed of student representatives from the various departments on campus with the Associated Students' Vice President as chairman.

D. Clubs

Groups of students who share a common interest. Each club is required to have student officers, a faculty advisor, a representative at the Inter-Club Council (each week) and an Inter-Club Council approved constitution. (See V, E - 1 and 2)

E. Ad Hoc Student Committees and Informal Student Organizations

Groups of Students (or a group with students as part of its membership) who organize on a temporary basis (for a period of time not to exceed nine consecutive weeks during any one semester. (See V, E - 1, 2, and 3)

F. Advisors to Clubs, Ad Hoc Student Committees, Informal Student Organizations, and Individual Students

Whenever a Faculty member is designated as an Advisor, it will be his duty to inform the student or students of their responsibilities as outlined in the Student Conduct Guidelines. Beyond this, his duties are primarily advisory. An advisor cannot be held responsible for the actions of a student or students which are contrary to his advice and over whom he has no control.

It will be the responsibility of the student or students to keep their advisor fully informed and to seek out his assistance.

STUDENT CONDUCT GUIDELINES

ADDITIONS RE: Ad Hoc Student Groups

(Add to Page 8) (V - E)

E. Student Clubs, organizations, or groups of students

1. Any club, organization, or group of students is required to:
 - a. Have a faculty advisor
 - b. Have a constitution. (Ad Hoc groups excepted) approved by the Inter-Club Council.
 - c. Be a member of the Inter-Club Council and have a club representative present at each meeting of the I.C.C. (Ad Hoc groups excepted)
 - d. A group of students wishing recognized Ad Hoc status must apply in writing to the Inter-Club Council for recognition.
 - e. All Ad Hoc groups must re-apply each semester for recognition by the Inter-Club Council. There will be no carry-over of recognition of Ad Hoc groups from one semester to the next.
 - f. Any Ad Hoc group applying for recognition by the Inter-Club Council must register in writing the name of the group's faculty advisor, and the name of the group's student chairman.
 - g. All Ad Hoc groups will be required to follow the procedures outlined in Item X (Policy Statement on Speaker's Solicitation of Funds, and Dissemination of Information on Campus) as well as the Associated Student's Publicity Code.
 - h. Failure to comply with the above provisions may cause a club to be subject to disciplinary action by the Inter-Club Council. (under the I.C.C. code). Failure to comply with the above provisions may cause an organization or Ad Hoc group to lose its recognition by the Inter-Club Council. Further, failure to comply with the above provisions may result in charges of misconduct against individual students as outlined in part IV of this booklet.

B. Communication Paper

Steve Cabot reported that he had put out another copy of the Communication Paper with funds from clubs.

Steve Cabot read from the Board Of Turstees, Sept. 11, Minutes concerning advisors: "Whenever a Faculty member is designated as an Advisor, it will be his duty to inform the student or students of their responsibilities as outlined in the Student Conduct Guidelines. Beyond this, his duties are primarily advisory. An advisor cannot be held responsible for the actions of a student or students which are contrary to his advice and over whom he has no control."

Steve Cabot asked this body for \$295.00 to trial run his paper for 20 school days.

Gary Cia reported that he could get the \$295.00 from the Budget, but that we had a very "tight Budget" and that this was all the money we could afford to give Steve Cabot.

David Herrington "moved that CSA approve Mr. Cabot's request for \$295.00 for the Communication Paper with the stipulations that:

- 1) The money be allocated weekly;
- 2) All bills be received and paid by the Student Activities Office;

- 3) Mr. Cabot be reminded that this will be all the financial support CSA will give him; and
- 4) Mr. Cabot provide the CSA with a written affidavit that he accepts total responsibility for the communication paper."

The motion was seconded and passed.

A. Constitutional Amendments

Before discussion started Larry Gibson limited debate to three minutes, for both pro and con.

Ken Beyries "moved to condense the positions of Assemblies and Rallies Commissioner to one position." The motion was seconded and passed.

Ken Beyries "moved to combine the Hyde Park Open Forum and Mid-Day Series positions to one position." The motion was seconded and passed.

Ken Beyries "moved to remove Head Song Leader and Head Yell Leader from the College Student Assembly." The motion was seconded and passed. There was one abstention that of Head Song Leader Zandra Raphael.

Ken Beyries "moved to remove AWS from the College Student Assembly and put them as members of ICC." The motion was seconded. There was a roll call vote, the motion failed.

Discussion followed whether to make these amendments retroactive. Ken Beyries suggested that those members involved could resign. There was objection to this suggestion and discussion was dropped.

X. New Business

B. From the Floor

Ken Beyries claimed to be "turning into a professional ogre" reported that several students had reported to him that they objected to the hazing that was taking place on campus in relation to the clubs.

Ken Beyries read from the California Education Code, Section 10853: "No student, or other person in attendance at any public, private, parochial, or military school, college, or educational institution, shall conspire to engage in hazing, participate in hazing, or commit any act that injures, degrades, or disgraces, or tends to injure, degrade, or disgrace any fellow student or person attending the institution."

Chuck Katsis read Section 10853 from the Education Code; "Any person who participates in the in the hazing of another, or any corporation or association which knowingly permits hazing to be conducted by its members or by others subject to its direction or control, shall forfeit any entitlement to public funds, scholarships or awards which are enjoyed by him or by it and shall be deprived of any sanction or approval granted by any public educational institution or agency."

Mr. Zeek then warned that if CSA started to act against ICC or the clubs the clubs would act against CSA. And if it weren't for the clubs alot of work would not get done.

Debbie Cox "moved that CSA send a representative to ICC to advise the clubs on the requirements of the law referring to the hazing of students for initiation and other students not participating in the initiation." The motion was seconded and passed.

Larry Gibson appointed David Herrington and Debbie Cox to remind the clubs of the law.



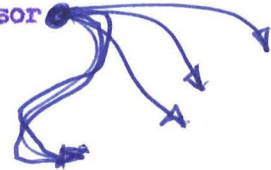

Larry Gibson reported that letters have been sent out to the Junior Colleges in California to see what type of Housing system they have and to see if we can set up something similar and better than what we have now.



COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES

These yearly exercises are held at 10:00 a.m. on the Saturday immediately following the conclusion of final examinations. It is impressive in its setting under the oak trees and each member of the staff participates in the academic procession. This is considered to be the last official duty of each instructor for the year if he has completed each of the other actions listed under Year End Requirements.

A traditional outdoor breakfast is held the morning of the exercises for the candidates for graduation and their husbands or wives. The candidates may also invite members of their families as their paid guests. The college invites as its guests individuals and organizational representatives who have rendered special services to the college. The faculty generally participates in this attractive event.

COMMITTEE, ASSIGNMENT TO

Important functions are performed by committees in establishing policy and organizing practice at the college. Committee structure and responsibilities are defined by the Clearing House Committee.

A Committee on Committees, appointed by the Clearing House Committee, is composed of three members of the Senate electorate, the president of the student body, a representative from C.S.E.A., and an administrator. Each spring it solicits College-Committee nominations from the Senate, Administration, and C.S.E.A. and publishes a list of committee appointments for the ensuing year. The student government makes its appointment to the College Committees as soon as feasible and notifies the Committee on Committees. In making appointments the Committee on Committees uses a policy and procedure manual developed over the years as well as the Committee Guidepost charts presented in the following pages.

New instructors are not usually appointed to committees in the first year of their service, but they are welcome to attend meetings of their choice.

B. Committee purposes and functions are under study by the Clearing House Committee, and those indicated hereafter are being reviewed during 1970-71. (The same, if any, appearing after the Committee indicates the permanent chairman, and the number of the total membership of the committee.

1. Administrative: (Dean of Students - 8 and one student)
 - a. To serve as a resource agency to administrative personnel for consultation and guidance on problems of policy or procedure.
 - b. To propose, initiate, refer to a staff member or committee, coordinate, and review such studies as will: (1) contribute to knowledge of the college, its students, and its community (2) provide a basis for revealing or resolving problems.
 - c. To receive and act on reports or recommendations from other committees.
2. Board of Review: (-- 3 and two students)
 - a. To serve as the proper board to which a student may appeal when dismissed by the office of the dean of students for disciplinary reasons.
 - b. To review all factors of a case only when asked to do so by the student in question.
 - c. To make recommendations to the president of the college, either sustaining, revising or reversing the decision of the dean of student's office.
3. Bulletin: (Registrar -- 5 and one student)
 - a. To review, revise, collect, organize and check for accuracy all material for the college bulletin.
4. Clearing House Committee: (-- 6 and two students and two classified employees)
 - a. To undertake an initial and continuing review of the College Committee structure with respect to purpose, procedures, membership, and authority, and to establish guidelines and make appropriate changes.
 - b. To appoint each spring a six-member Committee on Committees composed of three members from the Senate electorate, the president of the student body, a representative from C.S.E.A., and an administrator, which would solicit college-committee nominations from the Academic Senate, administration, and C.S.E.A., and publish a list of committee appointments. The student government shall make its recommendations to the college committees as soon as feasible and forward them to the Committee on Committees.
 - c. To serve as a clearing house for college-wide committees, and thus to:
 - (1) Identify the origin, destination of and authority for work carried out by committees; and,
 - (2) Establish the limits of review with respect to college agencies and set time limits for accomplishing work.

 - c. To make recommendations and referrals to the appropriate committee, department, individual, or other faculty group for consideration of action on instructional matters (both day and evening college) that relate to:
 - (1) Reading and writing assignments
 - (2) Testing
 - (3) Class size
 - (4) Grading standards
 - (5) Teacher load standards
 - d. To consider with the dean and the department head concerned any proposed additions to the evening college program which duplicate day school courses and are numbered 1 through 199.
 - e. To consider student and community requirements which might warrant organization and addition of courses or curricula.

- a. To select, schedule, and sponsor programs of special merit for students of the college.
 - b. To prepare a budget for approval by the Executive Council of the Associated Students and the Board of Trustees which jointly finance the series.

SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE
TRAFFIC AND PARKING REGULATIONS

SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE
TRAFFIC AND PARKING REGULATIONS

The Law Enforcement Department of the Santa Rosa Junior College is authorized by the College Administration to enforce parking and traffic regulations adopted by the Administration upon the review and recommendation of the Traffic Committee; to issue citations for parking and traffic violations; to maintain records of all police matters; to investigate traffic accidents and file reports with the College Dean of Business Services of any accident involving College property; and to cooperate with the College Administration in developing ways and means to improve traffic conditions on campus.

Authority to regulate traffic and parking on the Santa Rosa Junior College campus rests with the governing board of the Sonoma County Junior College District under the provisions of Section 21113 of the California Vehicle Code.

Section 21113 of the California Vehicle Code authorizes a public institution to make any special conditions and regulations necessary to control parking and traffic on the grounds.

Public Grounds

21113. (a) No person shall drive any vehicle or animal, nor shall any person stop, park, or leave standing any vehicle or animal, whether attended or unattended, upon the driveways, paths, or the grounds of any public school, state university, state college, state, county, hospital district, or municipal institution or building, or any educational institution exempted in whole or in part from taxation, except with the permission of, and upon and subject to such conditions and regulations as may be imposed by the governing board or office of the public school, state university, state college, state, county, hospital district, or municipal institution or building, or educational institution.

(b) Every governing board or officer shall erect or place appropriate signs giving notice of any special conditions or regulations that are imposed under this section and every board or officer shall also prepare and keep available at the principal administrative office of the board or officer, for examination by all interested persons, a written statement of all such special conditions and regulations adopted under this section.

(c) When any governing board or officer permits public traffic upon the driveways, paths, or grounds under their control then, in the absence of any special condition or regulations applicable to the traffic, all the provisions of this code relating to traffic upon the highways shall be applicable to the traffic upon the driveways, paths, or grounds.

Special Conditions of Traffic Control

100. Definitions of Words and Phrases. The words and phrases used in this statute shall have the meanings ascribed them in this section.

(1) Staff Parking Facility. Any lot, space, or area within the campus of the College designated by the administration for parking vehicles by members of the staff, faculty, physically handicapped students, and elected student officers of Santa Rosa Junior College and so designated by yellow parking lines or markings.

(2) Student Parking Facility. Any lot, space or area within the campus of the Santa Rosa Junior College that has been designated by the administration for parking and so designated by white parking lines or markings.

(3) Visitor Parking Facility. Any space or area within the campus of the Santa Rosa Junior College that has been designated by the administration for parking and is so designated by green parking lines or markings.

(4) Kent Hall Parking Facility. Parking is available for residents of Kent Hall in the immediate vicinity thereof. These reserved spaces are yellow in color and are labeled "Kent Hall."

(5) Park. To stand or leave standing any vehicle, whether occupied or not, otherwise than for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading of passengers.

(6) Visitor. A visitor is any person not enrolled as a student at the Santa Rosa Junior College or not employed by the Santa Rosa Junior College, who has legitimate business on campus.

(7) Motor Vehicle. Any motor-driven device in, upon, or by which any person or property may be transported upon a street or highway.

101. Traffic Signs. All regulatory traffic signs on the campus legally posted must be obeyed (stop signs, speed limit signs, parking signs, and other traffic signs).

102. Closing of Roads. Roads and parking areas on the campus are not public thoroughfares and may be closed or restricted at any time for the convenience of the College.

103. Right of Way. Pedestrians shall have the right of way over vehicles at all times.

104. Speed Limits. The maximum speed limit on campus of any vehicle shall be 15 miles per hour.

105. Acceleration. No person shall accelerate a motor vehicle on campus in excess of the acceleration needed for normal operation of said motor vehicle. Rear wheel frictional marks, excessive dust, or a loud noise from the tires shall be prima facie evidence of unlawful acceleration.

106. Exhaust Noise. No person shall accelerate his vehicle exhaust system to the degree that it will create a disturbance or cause a loud noise on campus.

107. Use of Campus Facilities. Use of parking facilities and campus roadways may be limited to those times when College activities are in progress.

108. Driving and Parking Vehicles. Driving and parking of vehicles is restricted to the paved parking lots and roadways only, unless otherwise provided for. All vehicles must park in a space provided for parking.

109. Motorcycle Parking. Motor bikes and scooters must be parked in the area provided for such vehicles just west of Doyle Center.

110. Visitor Parking. No person other than a visitor shall use the Visitor Parking facility.

111. Student Parking. All students, except as otherwise provided, shall park in a Student Parking facility.

112. Staff Parking. No person shall stop, park, or let stand any vehicle in a staff parking facility unless such vehicle is registered and has attached to it the proper parking permit for that parking space.

113. Saving Clause. Nothing herein shall be construed as exempting any person from operating a vehicle on campus in a manner prescribed by the Vehicle Code of California or the ordinances of the city of Santa Rosa.

114. Requests for Identification. Law Enforcement personnel are authorized to request satisfactory identification from persons operating motor vehicles on the campus, and no person shall refuse such reasonable request.

115. Cooperation with Campus Law Enforcement Officers. No person shall willfully refuse to comply with any lawful order of any Law Enforcement officer when such authorized persons are directing traffic or engaged in other activities concerning the enforcement of these regulations.

116. Special Vehicles Excepted. Exception to these regulations are made to special vehicles:

(a) Authorized emergency vehicles are accorded all the exemptions as enumerated in the California Vehicle Code (Section 165).

(b) School-owned service vehicles are subject to exemptions from regulations having to do with driving and parking in restricted areas.

117. Written Notices. In the case of a violation of the provisions of any of the sections of this statute with the exception of Sections 104, 105, and 106, it shall be the duty of the Law Enforcement personnel to issue, in writing, on an appropriate Santa Rosa Junior College form, a citation, which shall be attached to the vehicle. In the case of a violation of Section 104, 105, or 106, the Law Enforcement personnel shall submit a written report of the incident to the Dean of Students.

118. Registration of Vehicles. Any student, staff member, or faculty member, who at any time for any reason operates a motor vehicle on campus, must have, prior to parking, a valid parking permit displayed in a 7-inch square of the inside lower right-hand corner of the windshield. Any vehicle not having a windshield shall display a valid parking permit within close view upon the vehicle.

119. Student Registration. Students will make application for and receive their College parking permit at the time of registration for the new school year. New students entering College in the Spring semester will receive their parking permit at the time of registration. Duplicate stickers may be obtained from the Law Enforcement Office, Room 221, Baker Hall.

120. Issuing Parking Permits. Faculty, staff, and handicapped students will receive their parking permit from the office of the Dean of Business Services. Elected student officers will receive their parking permit from the Adviser of Student Activities.

121. Effective Period. Faculty, staff, and student vehicle registration will be effective for the college year.

122. Vehicle Registration. Vehicle registration stickers are non-transferable. A person may request a change in vehicle registration classification by making application at the Law Enforcement office. New stickers received at the time of registration should be placed on the vehicle, as explained in Section 117, and the old one removed.

123. Misrepresentation. Any person who at any time materially falsifies or makes false representation concerning vehicle registration or who fails to register his vehicle will be subject to review by the Office of the Dean of Students.

124. Holding-up of Grades. Diplomas, certificates, transcripts, and registration materials will not be issued to a student until all traffic violations to his record have been settled.

125. Registration Responsibility. The owner of the vehicle or the person to whom the College Vehicle Registration sticker has been issued shall be held responsible for all traffic tickets given to a particular vehicle regardless of who is driving or who has parked the vehicle.

126. Traffic Fines. Fines for parking violations are payable at the Law Enforcement Office, Room 221, Baker Hall. Fines will be levied at the rate of \$1.00 each for the first three tickets, \$2.00 each for the fourth and fifth tickets, and \$5.00 each for every ticket after the fifth ticket.

A student acquiring an excess of five tickets will be subject to dismissal from college.

RANDOM THOUGHTS CONCERNING STATUS OF A.W.S.

1. It seems that there is no other group on campus contributing as much volunteer time to serve our college. The members have been willing to assume and carry out any assigned task.
2. The argument that students don't know what the organization is can be attributed to that group of students' lack of interest and concern. Women students receive a membership card. New women students are asked to indicate if they are interested in participation and, if so, for what projects.

The name A.W.S. appears in Bear Facts and Oak Leaf quite often.
The Student Handbook tells what this organization is.
There are frequently posters on campus advertising activities.
3. All activities, with the exception of the Spring Formal, are free. If the college student doesn't participate it is not because of lack of opportunity.
4. Comment has been made about number of students attending meetings. There are many students who cannot attend but who are willing to help with projects. The attendance at functions need not be limited to active members, but rather these activities are provided for more than the officers and chairman.
5. A.W.S. members try to involve participation from clubs. Invitations are sent to have a representative attend A.W.S. meetings so that she may take back information and requests from A.W.S. and also in order for A.W.S. to hear of campus wide club activities. Clubs are asked to participate in all A.W.S. activities and representatives attend as A.W.S. guests (that is, without a fee).
6. The A.W.S. officers are elected by the voting female C.S.A. card holders. They are not appointive officers. If someone has a gripe, she may run for office.
7. There seems to be a criticism that A.W.S. does not represent the needs of the women students. There is no record of special requests having been made. If women students wish such involvement they should make their wishes known.
8. The money that is spent is not spent on social functions for active members of A.W.S. only. If one looks through the items listed under "expenses" it can be seen that these involve all women's organizations; many women students and faculty, as well, are striving to create interest in student activities among our own students and future students.
9. It would seem that there should be more effort put into creating interest in student government and more participation in student government, rather than discouraging present interest and participation. One hears student apathy kicked around all the time, yet the elimination of one of the least apathetic groups is being considered.

10. A.W.S. provides opportunities for students to assume rather important tasks of leadership. Our experience has been that they rise to the occasion to serve others and in the process develop both leadership ability and personal poise. This is an important part of the total education process.

11. Since A.W.S. strives to serve a larger group than just a single interest group and since many of the projects would have to be curtailed or dropped without C.S.A. support, it is felt A.W.S. should remain a part of C.S.A. It would be most difficult for a single, unsponsored group to provide these varied activities and services while raising the \$700 necessary. What alternatives will accomplish as effective a program?

Fashion Shows -- A.W.S. sponsors two fashion shows each year -- one before Christmas and one during the Spring. The fashion shows are free and all women students, faculty, high school seniors, and members of the community are invited to attend. This enables students from the college, high school students, and faculty members to get together informally and become better acquainted.

Woman of the Month -- Each month A.W.S. recognizes an outstanding woman student who has been nominated by faculty members and chosen by a committee consisting of faculty and students. The award of being chosen as a Woman of the Month is based on scholarship and service to the school and community.

Woman of the Year Banquet -- A Woman of the Year is chosen from among the Women of the Month and honored at this banquet at the end of the year. Faculty and students are invited to attend this function.

Cards and Letters to Servicemen -- At Christmas time and throughout the year the members of A.W.S. send cards and write letters to servicemen overseas.

Cards are sent to students who are known to be critically ill.

A.W.S. serves as guides for high school groups on campus, whenever groups come who want to see classes, etc.

College Night -- A.W.S. has helped in organization of these activities and served as guides, room assistants, refreshments, etc.

A.W.S. Serves at any banquet, dinner, or luncheon, when requested.

A.W.S. Served as hostesses for high school counselor conferences.

Helpers at S.R.J.C. Registration -- A.W.S. assisted when asked to donate time to cover the tables in the lobby during the five weeks of registration. Several hundred hours of volunteer time went into this project.

Graduation Breakfast -- Volunteer time is given by A.W.S. freshmen members to assist with serving the graduation breakfast and later to help with any details of graduation.

A. Wilson Riles Booth



RE: A Summary Report without Recommendation

A change in our present college calendar could take one of three directions if our goal is to complete the fall semester prior to the Christmas holidays; and allow for more instructional flexibility:

1. Adopt the quarter system.
2. Start the fall semester in August and end before the Christmas holidays. Conclude the spring semester in May.
3. Start a shortened fall term in September, followed by one or two intersessions and a shortened spring semester ending in June.

The committee has arbitrarily chosen to suggest for your consideration the latter method. A proposal for a calendar with an intersession might take any of the following forms:

(1) 13 - 3 - 3 - 13

Students would take 4 courses during the two long semesters and one each during the two three-week intersessions.

(2) 12 - 4 - 4 - 12

Same as above, except for one week difference in length of semester.

(3) 14 - 4 - 14

Under this system a single intersession of 4 weeks allows a student to take one course on a concentrated basis. (Also known as the 4-1-4 Plan, used by St. Mary's and under consideration by Sonoma State.)

(4) 3 - 3 - 3 - 3 - 3 - 3 - 3 - 3 - 3 - 3

This system envisions one course per three-week period for a full year of 30 weeks.

Any of these systems can be adapted to our present beginning and ending dates and to our existing summer session schedule. They could also be used concurrently with the existing semester system.

There are many considerations involved in a change of this kind. Several of them are noted below for your discussion and comment. The committee does not feel free to recommend a course of action, but is unanimous in its feeling that an institution should continually search for better and more flexible ways of educating our young people.

Considerations are:

- 1) The creation of an enrichment/immersion experience for students during the intersessions.
- 2) Allowance for lowering of teaching loads during fall and spring semesters from five to four sections if an instructor teaches one section in each of the intersessions.
- 3) The possibility of teaching in summer session as an alternative to teaching during the intersessions.
- 4) The facilitation of the transfer of students from our institution to colleges presently on the quarter system.
- 5) The feasibility of changing traditional instructional patterns to fit the intersession.
- 6) Equalizing and balancing of teacher loads and scheduling of classes.
- 7) The effect of a modified calendar on our A.D.A.
- 8) The availability of rooms and instructional materials during intersessions.
- 9) The implications for the Evening College.
- 10) Possible hardships that this calendar might impose upon the Registrar's office.
- 11) Question of student acceptance of a new calendar.
- 12) The possible danger of proliferation of course offerings.
- 13) The effect upon the student government and participation in extra-curricula activities, particularly during intersession periods.
- 14) Problems of instructors in revising courses to fit the shortened sessions.
- 15) Number and content of examinations under the new system.
- 16) Arranging special off-campus experiences, group tours, and special events.
- 17) Effect on student enrollments, including enrollments during summer months.
- 18) The athletic program, including consideration of eligibility regulations affecting inter-collegiate competition.
- 19) Purchase and distribution of textbooks.
- 20) Making the fullest use of faculty and staff.
- 21) Faculty opportunity for employment or study during the school year.
- 22) Ambiguity concerning equivalency of work done in any varied calendar period which might give rise to questions about salary adjustments of faculty members.
- 23) Recruitment of faculty.
- 24) Coordination with major holidays.
- 25) Student opportunities for employment and the effect of intersession on students who are employed.
- 26) Operation of the library.
- 27) Cost and efficiency of registration.
- 28) Maintenance problems.

- 29) Necessary modifications in food service procedures.
- 30) Effect upon dormitory operations.
- 31) Printing of catalogs, class schedules and other periodic material.
- 32) Committees, academic senate and other groups in relations to terms of office, eligibility, requirements and election procedures.
- 33) Student publications such as newspaper and yearbook.
- 34) Possible variations in cost entailed in making the changeover to any given calendar.
- 35) Administrative tasks not listed above?
- 36) Other side effects not listed above?

PROPOSAL FOR A "DOUBLE INTERSESSION" SCHEDULE

In order to eliminate the inflexibility of the present schedule the Schedule Committee submits the following proposal;

- 1) The Academic Year would be changed to consist of;
 - A) a 12-week Fall semester (starting the same date as now)
 - B) a 4-week "First Interession" during the month of January.
 - C) a 4-week "Second Interession" during the month of February.
 - D) a 12-week Spring Semester(ending the same date as now).
- 2) The full time semester load for students and instructors would be changed to 12 units (four rather than five three-unit courses). Since the shortened semester means that classes would have to meet 4 hours per week it is suggested that the MWF class period be changed to 1hr.20 min. and the TTh period be changed to 2 hours. Consideration should be given to allowing classes to meet on a combined schedule (ie. M/WanTh) to allow for greater flexibility.
- 3) During each Interession each student would take, and each instructor teach, only one course. That course would meet a sufficient number of hours during that month to fulfill its unit requirement.
- 4) This proposal would affect all courses and faculty members. If a faculty member did not wish to teach during Interession he would be given the option of teaching a summer course to meet his load requirement.

It should be pointed out that an instuctor during the year would be in class the same number of hours as at present, but these hours and classes would be arranged differently.

It is hoped that this proposal could be adopted for the 1970-71 Academic Year in which case the calender would be as follows;

Fall Semester	Sept.10.- Dec. 9
Fall Semester Finals	Dec. 8 - Dec. 15
First Interession	Jan. 4 - Jan. 29
1st Interession Finals	Jan. 30
Second Interession	Feb. 1 - Feb. 26
2nd Interession Finals	Feb. 27
Spring Semester	March 3 - June 2
Spring Semester Finals	June 3 - June 11

This calender begins and ends the academic year on the same dates as the currently established calender.

Students would register for the Interessions during late November, but 20% of 2nd Interession spaces would not be made available until late January to allow a student to follow an interest aroused by a 1st session class.

Academic Senate Approves Experimental '4-1-4' Plan

ROINER PARK — The Academic Senate of Sonoma State College went on record yesterday as favoring the implementation of the highly experimental "four-one-four program," starting in the academic year 1970-71. The new schedule has been used extensively on the East coast and is also in effect at Mills College here in California.

The "four-one-four program" means, in effect, that the academic year will be broken up into fall semester, ending before Christmas, in which full time students will be expected to take at least three or four classes, followed by a four week

term in January, in which students will take one or two intensive study courses. After the four-week period students will return to the regular spring semester and will again take three or four classes.

The present system has a fall and a spring semester, so actually no time will be added to the amount of time students spend in classroom work. The fall semester will be shortened somewhat, but that time will be made up in the shortened four-week term in which students will be expected to do intensive study in a chosen area.

Barring any "legal" problems that would prevent it from being implemented, the new schedule will go into effect next school year.

ALTERNATE "ALL INTERSESSION" SCHEDULE 3-3-3-3-3-3-3-3-3-3

Under this proposal the academic year would be divided into ten equal sessions, each seventeen instructional days long (about three weeks including weekends.) During each session the student would take one class and only one class; each instructor would teach one class, and only one class. During a session a typical three-unit would meet for a total of 51 hours, but the scheduling and length of meeting would be flexible. The calendar would be such that there would be four or five days between each session. Christmas vacation, the present semester break, and Easter break would also be between sessions. The academic year would begin and end as presently. It is hoped that a student would not have to register for his next class until the last week of his present class, thus allowing him to follow his interests throughout the year. If a student took a three-unit class each session he would emerge with 30 units at the end of the year.

DEAN

Nobody could be happier
about the changes than Dr.
Alan Pollock, the lay dean of
the college.

"Some of the demands and
requests of the students had
already been suggested by
the faculty, but we frankly
weren't moving fast
enough," Dr. Pollock ex-
plained. "If it hadn't been for
their pressure, none of this
would have happened so
quickly.

"Four years to an adminis-
trator is normally just
enough time to get his com-
mittees rolling to study some
new proposal. But to a col-
lege kid, it's his whole car-
eer."

STARTING POINT

The demand for extensive
changes dates back to little
more than a year ago with a
statement by Dan White-
hurst, 1969 student president,
in the college newspaper.

"I picture a college in
which the students are not
concerned with getting
grades or preparing for a
job, but are dedicated to con-
fronting the great issues of
mankind, unafraid to consid-

make certain reforms to
make them a reality."

Motivated by a genuine
concern for the quality and
relevance of their education,
a movement began among
the students that eventually
materialized as an organiza-
tion dedicated to change and
called Students for Progress-
ive Action Now (SPAN),
with some 100 students sign-
ing up.

On February 18, 1969,
SPAN issued a list of "de-
mands and requests" to the
administration. The list in-
cluded a call to break up the
academic year into more
meaningful units than semes-
ters, and a revision of aca-
demic requirements, grading
procedures, and house rules.

SPAN also demanded that
the school, which has served
only males since its found-
ing, be made co-educational.

By March, the campus was
alive with debate. The aca-
demic council met with
SPAN members and issued a
resolution endorsing the pro-
posals as "worthy of serious
consideration." Extra faculty
meetings were called, time-
tables for decisions set and
secret ballots taken.

HEADLINE

"Professors to Ponder Pro-
posals Proffered by Progress-
ive Pupils," the college
newspaper headlined.

Within 30 days, the faculty
had voted to throw out the
semester system and replace
it with what has become
known as the 4-1-4 calendar
and curriculum.

Utilized by several other lib-
eral arts colleges, including

University in New York, the
plan breaks up the academic
year into three parts. From
September to Christmas, stu-
dents concentrate on four
courses, rather than the
usual five, six or seven which
is considered a normal load
under the semester plan.

JANUARY

Four more courses are tak-
en from February to June.
But the key to the plan is the
month of January, when stu-
dents take only one course
for an entire month. And that
course centers almost wholly
around independent study.

Explained Pollock:

"After all, this concentra-
tion on one thing at a time is
the more usual pattern for
serious intellectual work. As
an example, a scientist or
scholar will pursue one
project to its completion be-
fore going on to something
else."

Pollock said the stated
aims of the college didn't
jibe with what was actually
done to achieve those aims.
The stated goals say a gradu-
ate should be prepared for
further education or a job
but, more important, lead a
young citizen into leading
thoughtful, intellectual lives,
he said.

CONCEPTION

"For this latter purpose,
formal education has never
been well conceived," he
said. "From kindergarten
through college undergradu-
ate years, teachers give as-
signments, then grade what's
turned in, and issue new as-
signments.

"When a young man grad-
uates from college, he has no
more teachers or assign-
ments, but he is expected,
somehow, to carry on.

"What we need is the oppo-
site of what we have. Today,
freshmen are put in the larg-
est classes with the least
direction and as they
progress to seniors they get
more and more attention.

"Instead, we should be pro-
gressively freeing the stu-
dent, putting in a lot of time
on freshmen and, as they
mature, freeing them more
and more for independent
study. Then when they grad-
uate, they will be able to
carry on."

Pollock says he sees the
4-1-4 plan as a start, "an en-
gine" for further curriculum
changes that will improve

study in later years.

"This is essentially
the philosophy of the
about," he said. "It is
just to do what you abso-
lutely have to stack up
many units; it is to become
curious, self-reliant stud-
ent who goes beyond mere
assignments.

"This is the kind of edu-
cation that is going to carry
man into his adult years
a lifetime of learning
discovery. And that's
kind of education we
trying to achieve."

SEMINAR

The new plan was imple-
mented this fall, along with
new "collegiate seminar"
which was also approved by
the faculty. The seminar was
a solution to the sensitive
question of requirements.

Did the mandating of new
requirements lead to a lot
of learning? Or did it tend
to create a feeling of "do-it-
time" to get a diploma?

Believing the latter might
be all too true, the faculty
devised the seminar as
core curriculum required for
all students — an on-going
four year course that will
confront them with some
of the major problems of civi-
lized man.

Each class centers around
a prescribed reading list
similar to the Great Books
curriculum the college has
been famous for for years.
But the seminars are not li-
ttered to these books, which
represent the most articulate
and original contributions to
our culture. But the tools of
the seminar have been en-
larged to include all sorts of
cultural phenomena: litera-
ture, graphic arts, film, and mu-
sic.

RIGHT

The students have always
the right to sit in on faculty
meetings, which, Pollock
chuckles, has had the effect
of speeding them up consid-
erably.

involving themselves in intensive study on a subject of their choice.

An even bigger test may come in the fall of 1971, the tentative date Dr. Pollock has now set for letting in some coeds.

The changes have not been rushed through without controversy, tensions and debate, but there has been little hostility and no violence, Pollock notes.

"Even this process of change through democratic action was a valuable educational experience," he concluded.



If you see your way clear to donate us the twenty percent of gross you normally collect, would it be necessary for us to contact Mr. Walcott for the money or would we obtain it from you?

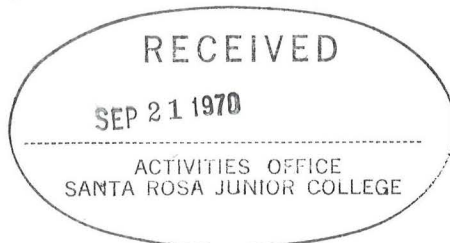

President Larry Gibson called the meeting to order at 3:16 p.m.

PRESIDENT: Larry Gibson introduced Rand Link the Activities Advisor for Sonoma State, who had come to observe our meeting.

Larry appointed Andy Duport to go to the Rotary Meeting Wednesday, Oct. 21.

Larry reported that he wanted to get a project to boycott Christmas commercially going. Marker Karahadian and Everett Branson are to take charge of this project, and Chuck Katsis was appointed to take Marker's place as chairman of the police convocation.

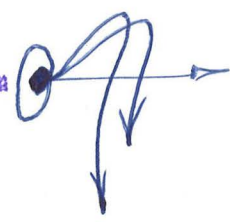

It was decided that the Board would not enforce, but would make decisions on the validity of tickets.


It was the general consensus that it was rather useless to even have a Judiciary Board if it could not enforce.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:20.

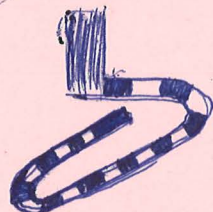

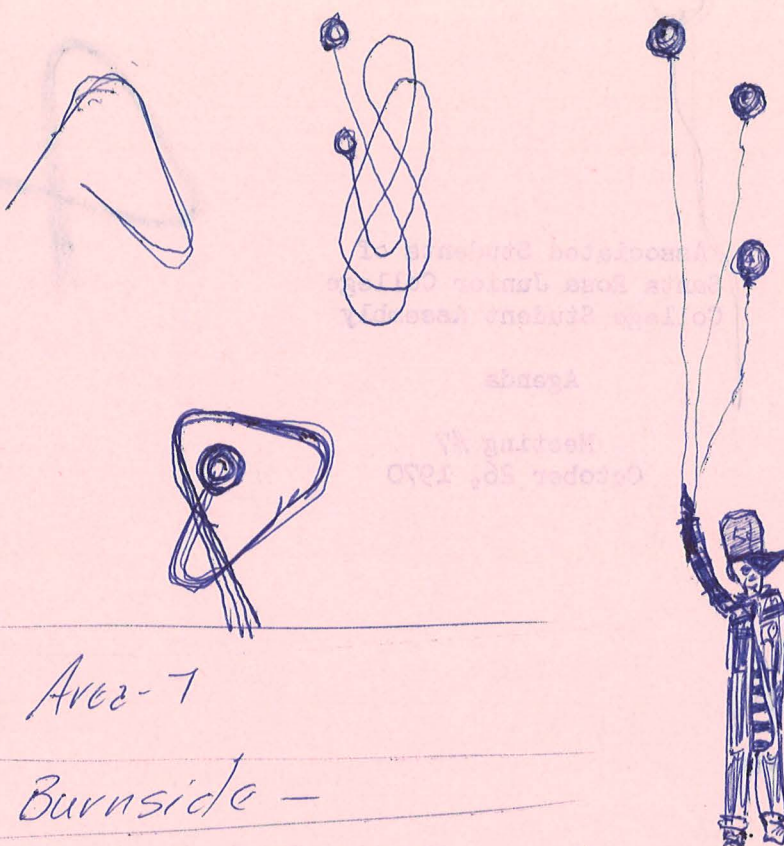

David Herrington "moved to table this matter to the Executive Cabinet meeting Wednesday." The motion was seconded by Marker Karahadian and passed.



Father of SRJC Sports Succumbs

A memorial fund has been established in the name of Dick Blewett, "father" of physical education and intercollegiate sports at Santa Rosa Junior College, who died Friday at his home near the 10th fairway at Oakmont.

Richard E. (Dick) Blewett, 69, was known throughout California for his work with young athletes and was the first chairman of the Northern California Track Coaches Association.

In addition to coaching and teaching some 40 years at SRJC, Mr. Blewett gained statewide recognition as secretary of the California Athletic Commission and Junior Rose Bowl Committee. He was also a member of the United States Track Coaches Association for high schools and junior colleges.

His track teams went to the national meets many times in the early '40s before they were discontinued, and in 1941 his team placed second in the nation, behind Sacramento.

Mr. Blewett came to Santa Rosa in 1928, after graduating from the University of California at Berkeley, to take charge of the new junior college's phys-

ical education and athletic programs.

His initial assignment was to organize the football team and his first call as head coach brought nine athletes out for fall practice, but after an appeal at a student assembly his squad reached 18 players.

The junior college that year (Continued on Page 6A, Col. 6)

was "housed" in the basement at Santa Rosa High School and had an enrollment of 185 students.

That was also the same year Mr. Blewett became the "father" of SRJC physical education, assuming full charge of the entire sports program.

He was born near where the Los Angeles Coliseum now stands.

While growing up in Los Angeles and attending Jefferson High School, Mr. Blewett compiled an impressive list of all-state records, including winning the state high-hurdle championship in 1921.

His forte was the punt and dropkick after touchdown and while playing for Andy Smith at the University of California he once made seven out of eight extra-point dropkicks against Nevada University.

He was captain of the freshman football team at Berkeley and played end for the varsity in 1925 and 1926, then as a senior played quarterback under Coach Nibs Price.

He also played baseball for the Bears and was the track squad's high hurdler and high jumper.

At Santa Rosa Junior College, he eventually brought in varsity sports coaches and in 1961 retired from his responsibility as athletic director to devote full time as head track coach and physical education instructor.

Lived in Oakmont

His home was at 369 Greenfield circle in Oakmont. His death Friday followed a short illness and a memorial fund has been established in his name by his friends in Santa Rosa and Sonoma County.

He is survived by his wife, Alice Blewett, Santa Rosa; his son, Richard L. Blewett, Seattle; his brothers James Blewett, Los Angeles; and John Blewett, Manhattan Beach; and his sister, Johanna Scott, Arcadia.

Services will begin at 9:15 a.m. tomorrow at Eggen & Lance Mortuary.

A Requiem Mass will be offered at 10 a.m. at Holy Spirit Catholic Church and interment will be at Calvary Catholic Cemetery. Recitation of the Rosary will be at 8 p.m. today at the funeral home.

Contributions to the Dick Blewett Memorial Fund in care of Robert Mastin, Department of Athletics at Santa Rosa Junior College are preferred by the family.



Mark congratulated Eileen Dougan and Peggy Christian for being selected as Women of the Month for September and October respectively. He also congratulated the new officers Executive Vice-President, Rosa Mar, Vice-President, David Herrington, Recording Secretary, Peggy Christian, Assistant Finance Commissioner, Rich Trenam, Freshman Rep to Executive Cabinet, Andy Duport and Freshman Rep., Pam Buford.
In Executive Cabinet, Wednesday, Betty Jones a professionally trained travel advisor is making her services available to students. The purpose is to find the least inexpensive and easiest way for students to travel. No money will be transacted. Advertisement will be throught the Bear Facts.
The Accreditation Team will be on campus November 3, 4, 5. They will be asking questions of the members of CSA and the Executive Cabinet. Please be cooperative.
David Jessa, Western States director of an organization called Frontlash '70 will be working in Santa Rosa to register under-privileged voters. He is making an investigation of funds as to wether right wing politics is financing the left wing radicals in

reference to the San Jose Riots when President Nixon was recently visiting. He also is condemning the violence. Mark will ask for CSA support on this matter next week.

Mark ended his report by urging everyone in Student government to stick together and not to criticize what is being done. No one likes to be shut down, so the tone of student government is going to be on this level.

EXECUTIVE VICE-PRESIDENT: Rosa Mar reported that there will be an SCIC meeting Wednesday, November 5, 1970 at 3:00 in the Board Room. The finalization of the Teacher Evaluation will be made. It will not be out in time for Pre-registration in December but will probably be out in January. The evaluation will cost about \$350. Everyone interested please attend. Rosa also added that she expected criticism, constructively or otherwise if she were not doing her job up to par.

VI. Old Business

A. COMMUNICATION PAPER: Mark received a request from Steve Cabot for funds from the Associated Students Budget to finance the Communication Paper for 10 days. The amount asked for is \$188.50. The reason the extension was being asked for was that the Board of Trustees will not meet until November 16, 1970 due to an out-of-town meeting. Cindy Scarborough will be giving the presentation to the Board.



SRJC Student Officers Resign

Student government at Santa Rosa Junior College has undergone a major change in officers with a series of resignations from apparently unrelated causes.

President Larry Gibson, who this semester was re-elected to the top student post, resigned Tuesday.

His resignation followed a stormy session of the student assembly at which James Burnside, executive vice-president, submitted his, followed by Lonnie Russell, assistant finance commissioner, and Ken Beyries, Hyde Park Open Forum commissioner. Mr. Burnside's stated reasons were a heavy schedule of studies and personal obligations that prevented him from doing justice to the elected post.

The appointed commissioners gave frustrations in attempts to get other students to take a serious interest in student self-government.

Mr. Gibson told The Press Democrat yesterday his resignation Tuesday was submitted to faculty advisor Eugene Canevari after he decided the present form of student government is ineffective and serves as a "buffer between the stu-

dents and those who actually work on problems and get things done."

The 20-year-old political science major said he was working with a group of other students to present a new constitution at the next election Dec. 9.

Meanwhile, Marker Karahadian, former vice-president, has succeeded Mr. Gibson as president.

He appointed David Herrington, former freshman representative, as vice-president.

Mr. Herrington was appointed Thursday. He resigned Friday.

Mr. Canevari said yesterday Rosa Mar is the new executive vice president, succeeding Mr. Burnside.

At least she was Thursday. Mr. Canevari was out of town Friday, he said.

COVERAGE.

- A. All registered student card-holders are included.
 - 1. Student card purchase required for 10 or more daytime units.
 - 2. Student with less than 10 units may purchase card if one day class is taken.
- B. All students are included as well as athletes at same rate.

LIMITATIONS.

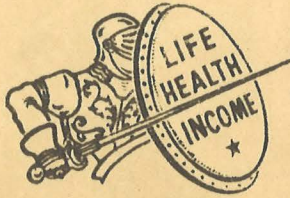

PART I. Accidental Death. If, as the result of such injuries, the Insured shall suffer loss of life within ninety days from date of such injury, the Company will pay \$1,500 in addition to any other indemnity payable under this Policy.

PART II. Medical Expense Benefits. If the Insured by reason of such injuries shall require the service of a legally qualified physician or surgeon (not a relative) within 26 weeks of the date of the accident, the Company will pay the actual expense personally incurred for any usual and normal treatment for medical services that are necessary and rendered within 52 weeks of the accident as follows: (1) The amount to be paid for necessary service of a legally qualified physician or surgeon shall be at the rate of \$6.00 per unit in accordance with the Medical, Surgical, and X-ray Procedural Index of the 1964 Relative Values Studies of the California Medical Association. Only one fee, the largest, will be paid for multiple surgical procedures performed through the same incision. Only the amount shown in the Relative Value Studies will be paid regardless of the number of physicians involved. For any operation or service not shown in the Surgical Procedural Index, the Company shall objectively determine the amount payable on the basis of an operation or service of equivalent gravity or severity; (2) the amount payable for the necessary services of Registered Nurses (R.N. and not a relative) shall not exceed \$420.00 for any one accident; (3) if there is no fracture, the amount payable shall not exceed \$10.00 (\$25.00 for skull) for necessary X-rays; (4) hospitalization due to injury must commence for surgical or medical reasons within 90 days of the accident and may not exceed 180 days for any one accident nor a maximum of \$40.00 per day for daily hospital room and board; (5) the maximum amount payable for special in-patient hospital services is \$200.00 and includes such fees as operating room, X-ray fees, laboratory, drugs, anesthetics, etc., but excludes nurses' and physicians' fees and personal items; (6) plastic or cosmetic surgery limited to a maximum of \$30.00; (7) the Company will pay up to a maximum of three office calls for chiropractic services as defined by statutes at the conversion factor stated in point (1) above; (8) ambulance fees are payable up to a maximum of \$30.00. However, in no event shall the amount payable under this PART II exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) in aggregate for any one accident over and above the first \$10 of such expense.

PART III. Dental Expense Benefits. If the Insured, by reason of such injuries, shall require treatment on or to the teeth, the liability hereunder shall be limited to the actual expense incurred up to fifty dollars (\$50.00) per injured tooth over and above the first \$10 of expense for such treatment actually accomplished within fifty-two (52) weeks of the accident on natural teeth.

PART IV. Athletic Team Air Travel. This Policy provides a maximum of \$1,500 Accidental Death under Part I, and in addition, a maximum of \$1,500 under Medical Expense Benefits, Part II, resulting from accidental bodily injuries to the Insured while being transported as a farepaying passenger on a regularly scheduled aircraft passenger carrier to or from school and the place of an athletic event.

PART V. Motor Vehicle Coverage. This Policy provides a maximum of \$1,500 Accidental Death Insurance under Part I, and in addition, a maximum of \$1,500 under Medical Expense Benefits, Part II, resulting from accidental bodily injuries to the Insured while being transported in a one-or more-wheeled motorized vehicle by or under the sponsorship or arrangement of the insured School or School District or an authorized student body organization thereof to or from School or other place of instruction or the place of a School-sponsored event.

PART VI. Interscholastic Athletics Coverage. This Policy provides a maximum of \$1,500 accidental death insurance under Part I, and in addition, a maximum of \$1,500 under Medical Expense Benefits, Part II (in accordance with Sections 31752 and 31755 of the California Education Code), resulting from accidental bodily injury to the Insured while participating in interscholastic athletics or practicing therefor (except tackle football).

PART VII. Hospital Outpatient Emergency Care. If the Insured by reason of such injuries shall require the services of the Hospital Outpatient Emergency Room the Company will pay for any one accident the actual expense personally incurred over and above the first \$10 of expense for all such services rendered up to a maximum of \$40.00, including a maximum of \$10.00 for non-fracture X-ray fees.

EXCEPTIONS AND LIMITATIONS

No payments will be made for heat treatment, diathermy, massage, nor hydrotherapeutics.

No payments will be made for treatment of pre-existing conditions or direct complications thereof.

A pre-existing condition is defined as a congenital affliction or a condition which required medical treatment within one year prior to the issuance of this Policy and which pre-disposes or confers a tendency toward future injury or disease.

POLICY PROVISIONS

The Contract: This policy and the application of the Policyholder constitute the entire contract between the parties and any statement made by the Policyholder shall, in the absence of fraud, be deemed a representation and not a warranty. No statement made by any Insured whose eligibility has been accepted by the Insurer shall be used in defense to a claim hereunder.

No agent has authority to change this policy or to waive any of its provisions. No change in this policy shall be valid unless approved by an executive officer of the Company and evidenced by endorsement hereon, or by amendment hereto, signed by the policyholder and by an executive officer of the Company.

Notice and Proof of Claim: Written notice of injury upon which claim may be based must be given to the Company within TWENTY DAYS of the date of the commencement of the first loss for which benefits arising out of each such injury may be claimed.

Notice given by or in behalf of the claimant to the Company at its Home Office or to any authorized Agent of the Company, with particulars sufficient to identify the Insured Student, shall be deemed to be notice to the Company. Failure to furnish notice within the time provided in this policy shall not invalidate any claim if it shall be shown not to have been reasonably possible to furnish such notice and that such notice was furnished as soon as was reasonably possible.

The Company, upon receipt of the notice required by this policy, will furnish to the claimant such forms as are usually furnished by it for filing proof of loss. If such forms are not so furnished within fifteen days after the Company receives such notice, the claimant shall be deemed to have complied with the requirements of this policy as to proof of loss upon submitting, within the time fixed in this policy for filing proofs of loss, written proof covering the occurrence, character, and the extent of the loss for which claim is made.

Affirmative proof of hospital confinement for which claim is made must be furnished to the Company within ninety days after the termination of the period for which claim is made. Affirmative proof of any other loss on which claim may be based must be furnished to the Company not later than ninety days after the date of such loss.

Examination: The Company shall have the right and opportunity to examine the person of the Insured Student when and so often as it may reasonably require during pendency of claim hereunder.

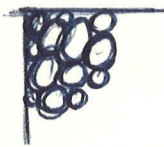

RE: A Summary Report without Recommendation

A change in our present college calendar could take one of three directions if our goal is to complete the fall semester prior to the Christmas holidays; and allow for more instructional flexibility:

1. Adopt the quarter system.
2. Start the fall semester in August and end before the Christmas holidays. Conclude the spring semester in May.
3. Start a shortened fall term in September, followed by one or two intersessions and a shortened spring semester ending in June.

The committee has arbitrarily chosen to suggest for your consideration the latter method. A proposal for a calendar with an intersession might take any of the following forms:

(1) 13 - 3 - 3 - 13

Students would take 4 courses during the two long semesters and one each during the two three-week intersessions.

(2) 12 - 4 - 4 - 12

Same as above, except for one week difference in length of semester.

(3) 14 - 4 - 14

Under this system a single intersession of 4 weeks allows a student to take one course on a concentrated basis. (Also known as the 4-1-4 Plan, used by St. Mary's and under consideration by Sonoma State.)

(4) 3 - 3 - 3 - 3 - 3 - 3 - 3 - 3 - 3 - 3

This system envisions one course per three-week period for a full year of 30 weeks.

Any of these systems can be adapted to our present beginning and ending dates and to our existing summer session schedule. They could also be used concurrently with the existing semester system.

There are many considerations involved in a change of this kind. Several of them are noted below for your discussion and comment. The committee does not feel free to recommend a course of action, but is unanimous in its feeling that an institution should continually search for better and more flexible ways of educating our young people.

Considerations are:

- 1) The creation of an enrichment/immersion experience for students during the intersessions.
- 2) Allowance for lowering of teaching loads during fall and spring semesters from five to four sections if an instructor teaches one section in each of the intersessions.
- 3) The possibility of teaching in summer session as an alternative to teaching during the intersessions.
- 4) The facilitation of the transfer of students from our institution to colleges presently on the quarter system.
- 5) The feasibility of changing traditional instructional patterns to fit the intersession.
- 6) Equalizing and balancing of teacher loads and scheduling of classes.
- 7) The effect of a modified calendar on our A.D.A.
- 8) The availability of rooms and instructional materials during intersessions.
- 9) The implications for the Evening College.
- 10) Possible hardships that this calendar might impose upon the Registrar's office.
- 11) Question of student acceptance of a new calendar.
- 12) The possible danger of proliferation of course offerings.
- 13) The effect upon the student government and participation in extra-curricula activities, particularly during intersession periods.
- 14) Problems of instructors in revising courses to fit the shortened sessions.
- 15) Number and content of examinations under the new system.
- 16) Arranging special off-campus experiences, group tours, and special events.
- 17) Effect on student enrollments, including enrollments during summer months.
- 18) The athletic program, including consideration of eligibility regulations affecting inter-collegiate competition.
- 19) Purchase and distribution of textbooks.
- 20) Making the fullest use of faculty and staff.
- 21) Faculty opportunity for employment or study during the school year.
- 22) Ambiguity concerning equivalency of work done in any varied calendar period which might give rise to questions about salary adjustments of faculty members.
- 23) Recruitment of faculty.
- 24) Coordination with major holidays.
- 25) Student opportunities for employment and the effect of intersession on students who are employed.
- 26) Operation of the library.
- 27) Cost and efficiency of registration.
- 28) Maintenance problems.

- 29) Necessary modifications in food service procedures.
- 30) Effect upon dormitory operations.
- 31) Printing of catalogs, class schedules and other periodic material.
- 32) Committees, academic senate and other groups in relations to terms of office, eligibility, requirements and election procedures.
- 33) Student publications such as newspaper and yearbook.
- 34) Possible variations in cost entailed in making the changeover to any given calendar.
- 35) Administrative tasks not listed above?
- 36) Other side effects not listed above?

PROPOSAL FOR A "DOUBLE INTERSESSION" SCHEDULE

In order to eliminate the inflexibility of the present schedule the Schedule Committee submits the following proposal;

- 1) The Academic Year would be changed to consist of;
 - A) a 12-week Fall semester (starting the same date as now)
 - B) a 4-week "First Interession" during the month of January.
 - C) a 4-week "Second Interession" during the month of February.
 - D) a 12-week Spring Semester(ending the same date as now).
- 2) The full time semester load for students and instructors would be changed to 12 units (four rather than five three-unit courses). Since the shortened semester means that classes would have to meet 4 hours per week it is suggested that the MWF class period be changed to 1hr.20 min. and the TTh period be changed to 2 hours. Consideration should be given to allowing classes to meet on a combined schedule (ie. M/WanTh) to allow for greater flexibility.
- 3) During each Interession each student would take, and each instructor teach, only one course. That course would meet a sufficient number of hours during that month to fulfill its unit requirement.
- 4) This proposal would affect all courses and faculty members. If a faculty member did not wish to teach during Interession he would be given the option of teaching a summer course to meet his load requirement.

It should be pointed out that an instuctor during the year would be in class the same number of hours as at present, but these hours and classes would be arranged differently.

It is hoped that this proposal could be adopted for the 1970-71 Academic Year in which case the calender would be as follows;

Fall Semester	Sept.10.- Dec. 9
Fall Semester Finals	Dec. 8 - Dec. 15
First Interession	Jan. 4 - Jan. 29
1st Interession Finals	Jan. 30
Second Interession	Feb. 1 - Feb. 26
2nd Interession Finals	Feb. 27
Spring Semester	March 3 - June 2
Spring Semester Finals	June 3 - June 11

This calender begins and ends the academic year on the same dates as the currently established calender.

Students would register for the Interessions during late November, but 20% of 2nd Interession spaces would not be made available until late January to allow a student to follow an interest aroused by a 1st session class.

Academic Senate Approves Experimental '4-1-4' Plan

ROINER PARK — The Academic Senate of Sonoma State College went on record yesterday as favoring the implementation of the highly experimental "four-one-four program," starting in the academic year 1970-71. The new schedule has been used extensively on the East coast and is also in effect at Mills College here in California.

The "four-one-four program" means, in effect, that the academic year will be broken up into fall semester, ending before Christmas, in which full time students will be expected to take at least three or four classes, followed by a four week

term in January, in which students will take one or two intensive study courses. After the four-week period students will return to the regular spring semester and will again take three or four classes.

The present system has a fall and a spring semester, so actually no time will be added to the amount of time students spend in classroom work. The fall semester will be shortened somewhat, but that time will be made up in the shortened four-week term in which students will be expected to do intensive study in a chosen area.

Barring any "legal" problems that would prevent it from being implemented, the new schedule will go into effect next school year.

ALTERNATE "ALL INTERSESSION" SCHEDULE 3-3-3-3-3-3-3-3-3-3

Under this proposal the academic year would be divided into ten equal sessions, each seventeen instructional days long (about three weeks including weekends.) During each session the student would take one class and only one class; each instructor would teach one class, and only one class. During a session a typical three-unit would meet for a total of 51 hours, but the scheduling and length of meeting would be flexible. The calendar would be such that there would be four or five days between each session. Christmas vacation, the present semester break, and Easter break would also be between sessions. The academic year would begin and end as presently. It is hoped that a student would not have to register for his next class until the last week of his present class, thus allowing him to follow his interests throughout the year. If a student took a three-unit class each session he would emerge with 30 units at the end of the year.

What do the militant, pious Catholic liberal arts college do when it is presented with a list of demands by militant students.

Unlike its neighboring public campuses, St. Mary's College in the East Bay's Moraga chose to look at them objectively, implement those with immediate apparent merit, and evaluate the rest.

The result has been that the poplar-lined campus, which enrolls 930 young men, has undergone a sweeping but bloodless revolution. The college's calendar, curriculum and entire outlook has been drastically changed.

Students, faculty and administrators generally agree the changes are for the better—even the plan now in the works to let girls in for the first time since the Christian Brothers took over the college in 1863.

DEAN

Nobody could be happier about the changes than Dr. Alan Pollock, the lay dean of the college.

"Some of the demands and requests of the students had already been suggested by the faculty, but we frankly weren't moving fast enough," Dr. Pollock explained. "If it hadn't been for their pressure, none of this would have happened so quickly.

"Four years to an administrator is normally just enough time to get his committees rolling to study some new proposal. But to a college kid, it's his whole career."

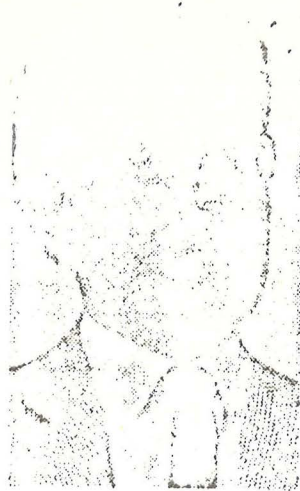
STARTING POINT

The demand for extensive changes dates back to little more than a year ago with a statement by Dan Whitehurst, 1969 student president, in the college newspaper.

"I picture a college in which the students are not concerned with getting grades or preparing for a job, but are dedicated to confronting the great issues of mankind, unafraid to consider or challenge any idea; trying to seek out the meaning of life," Whitehurst wrote.

GROUP FORMS

"This is nothing revolutionary—these very ideas are stated in the 19th century's Col-

lege make certain reforms to make them a reality."

Motivated by a genuine concern for the quality and relevance of their education, a movement began among the students that eventually materialized as an organization dedicated to change and called Students for Progressive Action Now (SPAN), with some 100 students signing up.

On February 18, 1969, SPAN issued a list of "demands and requests" to the administration. The list included a call to break up the academic year into more meaningful units than semesters, and a revision of academic requirements, grading procedures, and house rules.

SPAN also demanded that the school, which has served only males since its founding, be made co-educational.

By March, the campus was alive with debate. The academic council met with SPAN members and issued a resolution endorsing the proposals as "worthy of serious consideration." Extra faculty meetings were called, timetables for decisions set and secret ballots taken.

HEADLINE

"Professors to Ponder Proposals Proffered by Progressive Pupils," the college newspaper headlined.

Within 30 days, the faculty had voted to throw out the semester system and replace it with what has become known as the 4-1-4 calendar and curriculum.

Utilized by several other liberal arts colleges, including

University in New York, the plan breaks up the academic year into three parts. From September to Christmas, students concentrate on four courses, rather than the usual five, six or seven which is considered a normal load under the semester plan.

JANUARY

Four more courses are taken from February to June. But the key to the plan is the month of January, when students take only one course for an entire month. And that course centers almost wholly around independent study.

Explained Pollock:

"After all, this concentration on one thing at a time is the more usual pattern for serious intellectual work. As an example, a scientist or scholar will pursue one project to its completion before going on to something else."

Pollock said the stated aims of the college didn't jibe with what was actually done to achieve those aims. The stated goals say a graduate should be prepared for further education or a job but, more important, lead a young citizen into leading thoughtful, intellectual lives, he said.

CONCEPTION

"For this latter purpose, formal education has never been well conceived," he said. "From kindergarten through college undergraduate years, teachers give assignments, then grade what's turned in, and issue new assignments.

"When a young man graduates from college, he has no more teachers or assignments, but he is expected, somehow, to carry on.

"What we need is the opposite of what we have. Today, freshmen are put in the largest classes with the least direction and as they progress to seniors they get more and more attention.

"Instead, we should be progressively freeing the student, putting in a lot of time on freshmen and, as they mature, freeing them more and more for independent study. Then when they graduate, they will be able to carry on."

Pollock says he sees the 4-1-4 plan as a start, "an engine" for further curriculum changes that will improve

study in later years.

"This essentially is the idea behind the 'about,' he said. "It is just to do what you absolutely have to to stack up many units; it is to become curious, self-reliant student who goes beyond mere assignments.

"This is the kind of education that is going to carry man into his adult years—a lifetime of learning and discovery. And that's the kind of education we're trying to achieve."

SEMINAR

The new plan was implemented this fall, along with new "collegiate seminar" which was also approved by the faculty. The seminar was a solution to the sensitive question of requirements.

Did the mandating of more requirements lead to a lot of learning? Or did it tend to create a feeling of "do-it-time" to get a diploma?

Believing the latter might be all too true, the faculty devised the seminar as core curriculum required of all students—an on-going four year course that would confront them with some of the major problems of civilized man.

Each class centers around a prescribed reading list similar to the Great Books curriculum the college has been famous for for years. But the seminars are not limited to these books, which represent the most articulate and original contributions of our culture. But the tools of the seminar have been enlarged to include all sorts of cultural phenomena: graphic arts, film, and music.

The students have almost the right to sit in on faculty meetings, which, Pollock chuckles, has had the effect of speeding them up considerably.

The big test comes in January, when St. Mary's students will be free to go into individual study for the entire month for the first time. Some will go to San Francisco's mental hospitals, some will go to Napa to observe treatment of mental patients; a few will go to Europe to study something from archaeological education.

involving themselves in intensive study on a subject of their choice.

An even bigger test may come in the fall of 1971, the tentative date Dr. Pollock has now set for letting in some coeds.

The changes have not been rushed through without controversy, tensions and debate, but there has been little hostility and no violence, Pollock notes.

"Even this process of change through democratic action was a valuable educational experience," he concluded.

November 9, 1970

- I. Call to Order
The meeting was called to order at 3:08 by President Mark Karahadian.
- II. Roll Call
Those absent were Finance Commissioner Gary Cia, Sophomore Representative Kathy Padroni, AWS Representative Ann Coset and Publicity Commissioner Ken Osborne.
- III. Approval of Agenda
Two deletions were made to the agenda, one moving reports after Old Business and to delete announcements. The agenda was then approved as written.
- IV. Approval of Minutes
The minutes were approved as written.
- V. Reports
PRESIDENT: Mark Karahadian suggested that we move on to Old Business and have all reports after that item. The motion was seconded and passed.
- VI. Old Business
 - A. COMMUNICATION PAPER: The matter of Budgetary Freeze was brought up. Andy Duport made a motion to allow Steve Cabot to discuss the freezing of the budget before the discussion on the Communication Paper. John Carroll seconded. The motion carried.
Larry Gibson mentioned the fact that the Budget had been approved last spring and that there was no money allocated for students to do independent work. He felt that there should be more money for experimental grants so students will have money to do student projects. He suggested that we take \$2,000 from the Athletics budget and take the remainder of the insurance funds and put them into an experimental grant fund. He feels that this would alleviate the hassle students have to go through to acquire money for projects.
Mr. Canevari pointed out that there is \$1,500 in the budget under Student Services and it was designed into the budget for a Birth Control Clinic, if it came about. He also wanted to know how much money would be involved in the experimental grants.
Larry stated about \$8,000 would be involved.
David Herrington suggested another avenue to attain funds which would be to liquidate the Oak Leaf Funds.
Frank Lawler, Oak Leaf Rep. moved to cease funding of the current Oak Leaf issues, giving the staff and Mr. Cabot alliance to work together in an open communication experience. Mr. Hawkins would act as counselors and they would jointly publish the Communication Paper to fit the needs of the students by giving professional help. David Herrington seconded.

Mark asked Steve Cabot if this motion were acceptable to him and he said he had never heard of it before, and that he opposed the idea of a daily paper the size of the insert page because it would be too tedious to read. He stated he would not particularly like this set up. Mr. Hawkins had not been notified of this motion.

Andy Duport moved to vote immediately. It was seconded. The motion passed. Frank's motion was voted on and failed by a 3-17 vote.

Larry Krogness moved to delete the insurance payment for next semester and take \$2,000 from the Athletic budget and set that up for an experimental grant fund through which the Birth Control Clinic and the Communication Paper will be funded. David Herrington seconded.

Larry Farrell moved to vote immediately. David Herrington seconded, the motion to vote immediately failed.

A discussion of the insurance benefits were brought up and several points pro and con were pointed out.

Larry Krogness amended his motion to make fee for insurance voluntary and that information be available on this matter. The amendment was seconded by David Herrington. He also moved to vote immediately on the amendment. Andy Duport seconded. The motion carried. The vote on the amendment was 18-5, it carried.

Debbie Cox moved to amend the main motion and to delete Athletics so that only the insurance payment will remain. The amendment was seconded. A discussion followed. Mr. Canevari stated that the head of the Athletics Department, Mr. Matson was opposed to any change in the budget. Larry Krogness moved to vote immediately on the amendment, seconded. The motion passed to vote immediately. The vote on the amendment carried by a 12-9-1 vote.

Andy Duport moved to vote immediately on the motion on the floor, seconded. The motion carried. The original motion on the floor was passed by a 20-2-2 vote.

David Herrington moved to add Athletics to this motion, seconded.

Rosa Mar moved to vote immediately, seconded. The motion carried by a 21-0 vote. The vote on the motion to add Athletics back to the original motion failed.

David Herrington moved that CSA give Steve Cabot enough money to finance the Communication Paper to the end of the semester. John Busek seconded. Mr. Canevari thinks Communication Paper should be funded BUT he also feels that an editorial board should be widen to include more students. Andy Duport moved to amend the motion to include the following: a joint committee of editors comprised of five (5) students be established, that Steve Cabot be one of these students and chairman of this joint editorship committee. This editorship committee will function as any other committee and that each member of this committee have equal say. The remainder of this committee will be approved by the Student Affairs Committee.

Steve Cabot suggested that he and Andy discuss this matter and return in a week because he also had ideas for a publications board.

Andy rescinded his amendment so that he and Steve may discuss the subject of an editorial board.

Bill Adams moved to postpone the main motion til next week so that Andy and Steve can straighten thing out, seconded.

David Herrington moved to recess until 5:15, seconded. Bill Adams moved to vote immediately on the recess, seconded. The motion carried.

The meeting was called back to order at 5:15 by President Mark Karahadian. Roll Call was again called. Those absent were Gary Cia, Peter Chin, Kathy Padroni, Tami Ramirez, Ann Coset, Ken Osborne, Sue Meyers and Zandra Raphael. The house count was 20 after the recess. Mark briefly explained parliamentary procedure and asked that it please be followed.

A motion to postpone main motion until next week passed by a 15-3-1 vote. Steve and Andy will be getting together to discuss publications board.

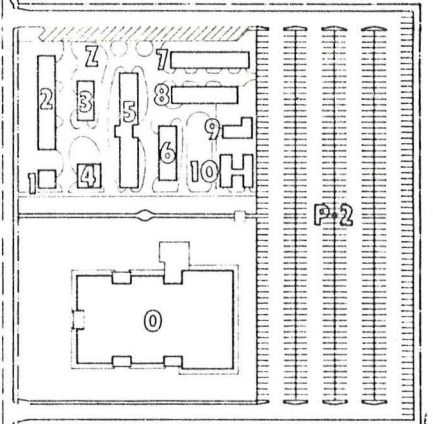

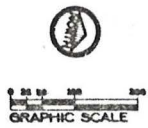
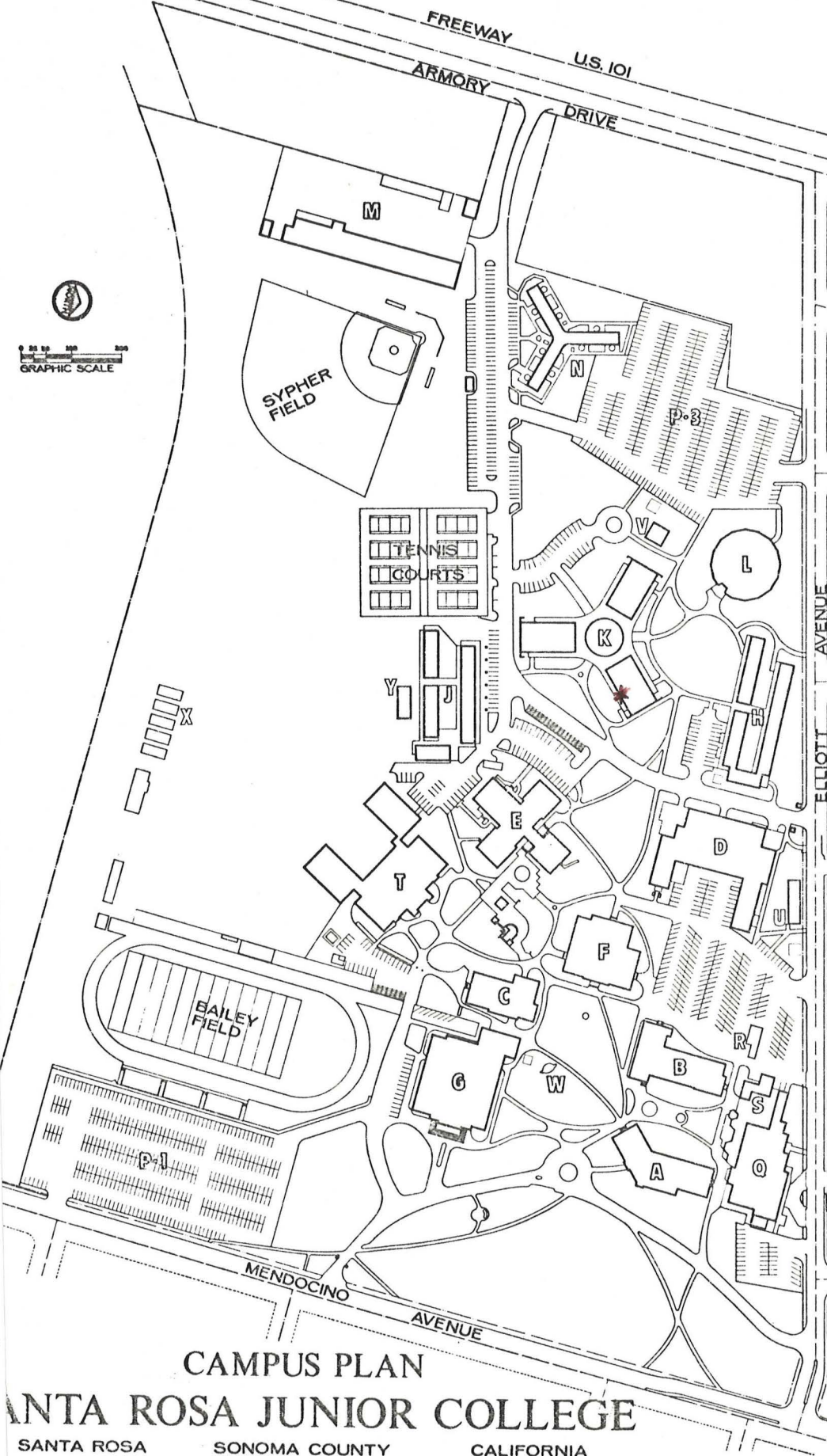

Dear Mr. Gibson:

During the College Student Assembly meeting of October 19, a resolution was passed that requested this office to replace Mr. Richard Nazarian on the newly formed Student Affairs Committee with "a more competent and capable administrator." Subsequently and in order, I engaged in the following conversations: (1) Mr. Eugene Canevari; (2) Mr. Richard Nazarian; (3) Mr. Larry Gibson, Mr. Mark Karahadian, and Mr. David Herrington. Resulting from these discussions, and upon concurrence of all concerned (though to varying degrees), I requested that the College Student Assembly, Executive Cabinet, meet with Mr. Nazarian, Mr. Canevari, and me to confront the issues. We met in the Board Room, Bailey Hall, 7:00 p.m. - 9:00 p.m., Tuesday, October 20.

The discussion was indeed honest and open, and from it results my basic decision to reject the College Student Assembly resolution. These personal reasons are cited. First, personalities more than issues are responsible for the disagreement between students and Mr. Nazarian. In fact, the conflict of personality is centralized in the persons of a limited number of students. Second, the resolution was ill-timed and implies a state of emotional as opposed to a reasoned response. If a crisis stage had been attained, the Executive Cabinet meeting on Tuesday evening should have preceded the College Student Assembly session on Monday in the interests of remediating problems. Third, removal of Mr. Nazarian from the Student Affairs Committee achieves nothing of a constructive nature. Because he is responsible for housing, bookstore, coop, and conduct, he is central to the proper functioning of the committee -- a committee, incidentally, newly conceived and never operative. If there are difficulties in the areas cited, these should be addressed to the entire committee, with expertise contributed by students, faculty, and administrators.

Questioned may be my action not to accept a recommendation that was passed by an apparent large vote. I assume full responsibility for my own actions, and, on occasion, responsibility for the action of others. If the Academic Senate, for example, passes a resolution reflecting upon policy, and I'm charged with implementing that policy, in good conscience I will proceed to apprise myself of the details and render a decision accordingly. Relationship to a student agency will not differ.

I submit that the College Student Assembly passed a resolution of the most serious nature, and did so without that documentation which is necessary if an educator of some 20 years experience can legitimately be called -- at least by implication -- incompetent.

Proposals for the Judiciary Board

1. The Parking Judiciary Board will be composed of five students selected by the Student Affairs Committee. Three students will constitute a quorum.
 - A. A judge will be appointed by ~~the president of CSA or~~ Student Affairs Committee, who will be responsible for selecting four other students to serve on the Judiciary Board.
 - B. An advertisement in the Bear Facts will call for students interested in serving on the Board to appear before a special meeting of the SA^C. This committee will then select five students.

2. The student must appear at the Law Enforcement Department within five days of issuance of ticket (as stated on citation) to appeal the citation. He will be required to post bail until the Board has passed a decision.
 - A. The student will fill out a Notice of Appeal which will include his name, date of issuance, officer who issued the ticket, plus his signature verifying his promise to appear, and his understanding of the Appeal Notice.

The date when the student is to appear before the Board to appeal his citation, will be stamped on the notice so that the student will know when he is to appear at the time he files for an appeal. A copy of the citation will be attached to the notice and dropped into a box provided for the Judiciary Board.

3. The Board will meet Mondays 12-1 to hear the appeals filed from the previous seven days, or five school days.
 - A. If a student is unable to attend the meeting, he will be able to postpone his case only if he refiles his appeal at the Law Enforcement Department before the Board meets. This is a one-time privilege.
 - B. If a student fails to appear before the board on the agreed date, and has failed to refile his appeal, his failure to appear will be regarded as admission of guilt, and he will forfeit his bail. In such a case, if the student then appeals to the Dean of Students, the Board would expect the Dean to uphold its decision regardless of mitigating circumstances.
 - C. The Board will pass judgement based on evidence on hand plus the student's testimony only.

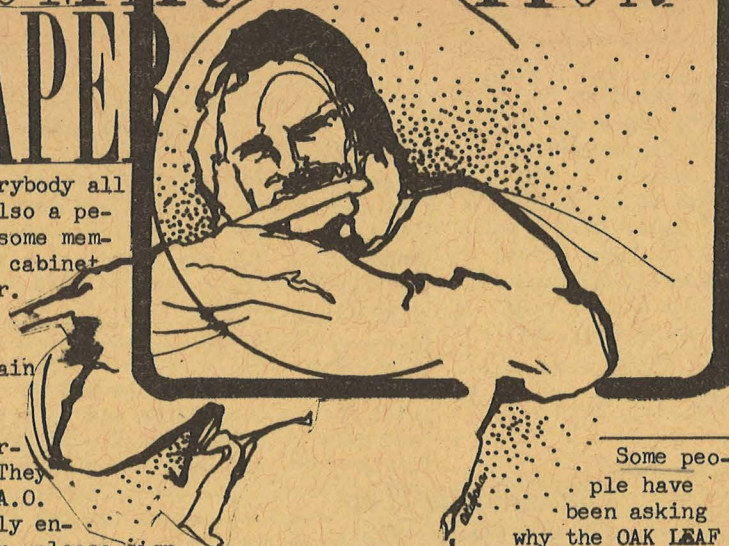
4. The Board will not judge the legality of the parking Regulations, but only whether or not there were mitigating circumstances to warrant a dismissal of the citation issued.

5. The Board will have the power to void any ticket appealed to them on the basis of a majority vote.

He then introduced Cathy Caffery who is the new Housing Commissioner. Her job will be to keep all information about student housing up to date.
CSA received a receipt on the \$20.00 donation that went into the Dick Blewett Memorial Fund. The note read as follows: Your contribution is to be held in a trust fund within the Santa Rosa Junior College Foundation until such time as an appropriate purpose has been identified for its use. The wishes of Mrs. Blewett will be uppermost in the final decision.
Mrs. Maggioria, wife of Mr. Maggioria passed away. A motion was made to send appropriate flowers or fund to either 1) Dick Blewett Fund, 2) own charity or 3) Cancer Foundation for a sum of \$20.00. Rosa Mar seconded. It was decided that the contribution will go to the Santa Rosa Junior College Foundation. The motion carried.
Mark received a memo from Jack Heely from the Presidential Selection Committee. CSA is to select two students to be on this committee. Nominations were made in Executive Cabinet. Those nominated are Jim Burnside, Chris Cody and Terry Calahan. Mr. Heely noted in his memo that who ever is selected must be able to devote a good deal of time to this committee. The meeting will be held Monday, November 16, 1970. A discussion followed on all candidates.
Mark briefly explained the purposes and duties of the Presidential Selection Committee. Andy Duport moved to approve each nomination individually. David Herrington seconded. Rosa Mar moved to approve Chris Cody to the Presidential Selection Committee, seconded. The appointment was approved. Andy Duport moved to postpone all nominations until Thursday at noon. Rosa Mar seconded. The motion passed.

B. VICE-PRESIDENT: Davide Herrington said he had be approached about the Constitution Committee. He wanted to know how to go about reactivating the committee. He also mentioned that members of CSA were not getting to the people. He suggested using College Hour to rap with interested students. Natives Americans are asking for supplies. David moved that any contribution BSU collect for the Native Americans, CSA match from the \$5,500 fund. Rich Trenam seconded. Mr. Canevari objected to this motion because it set no limit. David withdrew his motion.

C. ACTIVITIES ADVISOR: Mr. Canevari mentioned that there are some problems with the budgetary move that was made in CSA on Monday. The Board of Trustees authorized increases in student body card fees. Mr. Canevari does not feel they will allow CSA to wipe out insurance for other uses. By nest CSA meeting, he will have an alternative for student grants so to leave insurance in tact.

V. Old Business

A. CHRISTMAS COMMITTEE: Ann Coset said the committee decided to keep all action on campus. She wanted to know if they could set up a table to give out information for those who are interested. The next meeting will be Thursday at noon. David Herrington moved to approve the passing out of leaflets on Christmas proposals. Rosa Mar seconded. The motion passed. David Herrington suggested a Christmas feast for all students on campus.

B. ENVIRONMENTAL ACTION TEAM: \$500.00 is being spent on an Ecology Art Show on December 7-11. The display will show the beauty of nature and what happens when pollution sets in. Patrick McLaughlin brought out the fact that there is no soap in the bathrooms. Mark appointed him as a committee of one to get soap in the bathrooms.

C. FAMILY PLANNING: Monday, November 16, 1970 Bill Hall and Cindy Scarborough will make their presentation on the Family Planning Clinic. They will be asking for two things 1) permission to set up the clinic and 2) for space to set it up. The cost will be \$250. 00 per clinic. It will be for married students and for single girls over 21. Mark assigned AWS to be responsible for writing letters to the Board in favor of the clinic.

D. FROM THE FLOOR: Richard Penryn-Lowe and Patrick McLaughlin want to set up a motion media committee to investigate the ideas of motion media and the possibilities of setting up a workshop. Patrick and Richard will set up the committee and Rich Trenam volunteered to report back to CSA their findings.

VI. Adjournment

Andy Dupont moved to adjourn, seconded. The meeting was adjourned at 8:01.

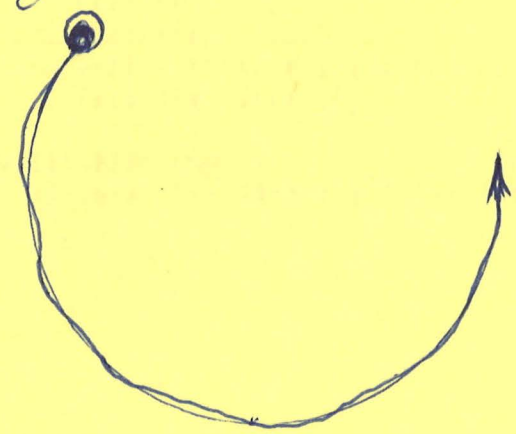

President Mark Karahadian called the meeting to order at 3:11.

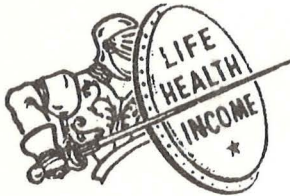

PART I. Accidental Death. If, as the result of such injuries, the Insured shall suffer loss of life within ninety days from date of such injury, the Company will pay \$1,500 in addition to any other indemnity payable under this Policy.

PART II. Medical Expense Benefits. If the Insured by reason of such injuries shall require the service of a legally qualified physician or surgeon (not a relative) within 26 weeks of the date of the accident, the Company will pay the actual expense personally incurred for any usual and normal treatment for medical services that are necessary and rendered within 52 weeks of the accident as follows: (1) The amount to be paid for necessary service of a legally qualified physician or surgeon shall be at the rate of \$6.00 per unit in accordance with the Medical, Surgical, and X-ray Procedural Index of the 1964 Relative Values Studies of the California Medical Association. Only one fee, the largest, will be paid for multiple surgical procedures performed through the same incision. Only the amount shown in the Relative Value Studies will be paid regardless of the number of physicians involved. For any operation or service not shown in the Surgical Procedural Index, the Company shall objectively determine the amount payable on the basis of an operation or service of equivalent gravity or severity; (2) the amount payable for the necessary services of Registered Nurses (R.N. and not a relative) shall not exceed \$420.00 for any one accident; (3) if there is no fracture, the amount payable shall not exceed \$10.00 (\$25.00 for skull) for necessary X-rays; (4) hospitalization due to injury must commence for surgical or medical reasons within 90 days of the accident and may not exceed 180 days for any one accident nor a maximum of \$40.00 per day for daily hospital room and board; (5) the maximum amount payable for special in-patient hospital services is \$200.00 and includes such fees as operating room, X-ray fees, laboratory, drugs, anesthetics, etc., but excludes nurses' and physicians' fees and personal items; (6) plastic or cosmetic surgery limited to a maximum of \$30.00; (7) the Company will pay up to a maximum of three office calls for chiropractic services as defined by statutes at the conversion factor stated in point (1) above; (8) ambulance fees are payable up to a maximum of \$30.00. However, in no event shall the amount payable under this PART II exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) in aggregate for any one accident, and the first \$10 of such expense.

PART III. Dental Expense Benefits. If the Insured by reason of such injuries, shall require treatment on or to the teeth, the liability hereunder shall be limited to the actual expense incurred up to fifty dollars (\$50.00) per injured tooth over and above the first \$10 of expense for such treatment actually accomplished within fifty-two (52) weeks of the accident on natural teeth.

PART IV. Athletic Team Air Travel. This Policy provides a maximum of \$1,500 Accidental Death under Part I, and in addition, a maximum of \$1,500 under Medical Expense Benefits, Part II, resulting from accidental bodily injuries to the Insured while being transported as a fare-paying passenger on a regularly scheduled aircraft passenger carrier to or from school and the place of an athletic event.

PART V. Motor Vehicle Coverage. This Policy provides a maximum of \$1,500 Accidental Death Insurance under Part I, and in addition, a maximum of \$1,500 under Medical Expense Benefits, Part II, resulting from accidental bodily injuries to the Insured while being transported in a one-or more-wheeled motorized vehicle by or under the sponsorship or arrangement of the insured School or School District or an authorized student body organization thereof to or from School or other place of instruction or the place of a School-sponsored event.

PART VI. Interscholastic Athletics Coverage. This Policy provides a maximum of \$1,500 accidental death insurance under Part I, and in addition, a maximum of \$1,500 under Medical Expense Benefits, Part II (in accordance with Sections 31752 and 31755 of the California Education Code), resulting from accidental bodily injury to the Insured while participating in interscholastic athletics or practicing therefor (except tackle football).

PART VII. Hospital Outpatient Emergency Care. If the Insured by reason of such injuries shall require the services of the Hospital Outpatient Emergency Room the Company will pay for any one accident the actual expense personally incurred over and above the first \$10 of expense for all such services rendered up to a maximum of \$40.00, including a maximum of \$10.00 for non-fracture X-ray fees.

EXCEPTIONS AND LIMITATIONS

The insurance hereunder shall not cover any loss which is the result of: (1) War or act of war, (2) participation in interscholastic athletics and practice therefor (except as provided under Part VI), (3) riding in or being in, upon or about any aircraft, (except as provided under Athletic Team Air Travel, Part IV), (4) any kind of hernia, (5) eyeglasses or contact lenses, (6) infection of bone, (7) disease, cost for appliances, sick bed equipment, wheel chairs and artificial limbs, (8) ptomaine, bacterial or vegetation poisoning, (9) appendicitis or appendectomy, (10) suicide or attempt thereat, (11) intentionally self-inflicted injuries, (12) heat exhaustion and sun stroke, (13) injuries occurring outside limits of United States or Canada, (14) prescriptions (except while hospitalized).

No payments will be made for heat treatment, diathermy, massage, nor hydrotherapeutics.

No payments will be made for treatment of pre-existing conditions or direct complications thereof.

A pre-existing condition is defined as a congenital affliction or a condition which required medical treatment within one year prior to the issuance of this Policy and which pre-disposes or confers a tendency toward future injury or disease.

POLICY PROVISIONS

The Contract: This policy and the application of the Policyholder constitute the entire contract between the parties and any statement made by the Policyholder shall, in the absence of fraud, be deemed a representation and not a warranty. No statement made by any Insured whose eligibility has been accepted by the Insurer shall be used in defense to a claim hereunder.

No agent has authority to change this policy or to waive any of its provisions. No change in this policy shall be valid unless approved by an executive officer of the Company and evidenced by endorsement hereon, or by amendment hereto, signed by the policyholder and by an executive officer of the Company.

Notice and Proof of Claim: Written notice of injury upon which claim may be based must be given to the Company within TWENTY DAYS of the date of the commencement of the first loss for which benefits arising out of each such injury may be claimed.

Notice given by or in behalf of the claimant to the Company at its Home Office or to any authorized Agent of the Company, with particulars sufficient to identify the Insured Student, shall be deemed to be notice to the Company. Failure to furnish notice within the time provided in this policy shall not invalidate any claim if it shall be shown not to have been reasonably possible to furnish such notice and that such notice was furnished as soon as was reasonably possible.

The Company, upon receipt of the notice required by this policy, will furnish to the claimant such forms as are usually furnished by it for filing proof of loss. If such forms are not so furnished within fifteen days after the Company receives such notice, the claimant shall be deemed to have complied with the requirements of this policy as to proof of loss upon submitting, within the time fixed in this policy for filing proofs of loss, written proof covering the occurrence, character, and the extent of the loss for which claim is made.

Affirmative proof of hospital confinement for which claim is made must be furnished to the Company within ninety days after the termination of the period for which claim is made. Affirmative proof of any other loss on which claim may be based must be furnished to the Company not later than ninety days after the date of such loss.

Examination: The Company shall have the right and opportunity to examine the person of the Insured Student when and so often as it may reasonably require during pendency of claim hereunder.

Payment of Claims: All benefits provided in this Policy are payable to the parents of or guardian legally responsible for the Insured Student, unless otherwise assigned.

Any payment in accordance with this provision shall discharge the obligation of the Company hereunder to the extent of such payment.

Legal Proceedings: No action at law or in equity shall be brought to recover on this policy prior to the expiration of sixty days after proof of loss has been filed in accordance with the requirements of this policy, nor shall such action be brought at all unless brought within three years from the expiration of the time within which proof of loss is required by the policy.

Insurance with Same Insurer: Insurance effective at any one time on the Insured under a like Policy or Policies in this Insurer is limited to one such Policy elected by the Insured, his Beneficiary or his Estate, as the case may be, and the Insurer will return all premiums paid for all other such Policies.

Illegal Act: The Insurer shall not be liable for any loss to which a contributing cause was the Insured's commission of or attempt to commit a misdemeanor or a felony.

Non-Participating: This policy shall not be entitled to share in the surplus earnings of the Company.

Conformity with State Statutes: Any provision of this policy which, on its effective date, is in conflict with the statutes of the state in which the Insured Student resides on such date is hereby amended to conform to the minimum requirements of such statutes.

"School-Sponsored Activities" as herein used shall be construed to mean all School functions which are scheduled by the School on or off the School premises, including classes, and which are under the direct supervision of qualified school authorities, including school-sponsored and school-supervised travel to and from such activities if the vehicle is operated by a qualified school authority. (See Part IV)

Hospital as used herein means an institution operated pursuant to law for the care and treatment of sick and injured persons, with organized facilities for diagnosis and surgery and having a 24-hour nursing service, and wherein surgical operations are performed by legally qualified physicians or surgeons.

- (3) If there is no fracture, amount payable shall not exceed a blanket \$50.00 for necessary x-rays. If a fracture exists, the first \$50.00 shall be blanket. The following is substituted:

"A maximum of eight (8) visits, in or out of hospital, will be made for diathermy, heat treatment, massage, or hydrotherapeutics."

It is further understood and agreed that the following Exceptions and Limitations is deleted in its entirety:

"No payments will be made for treatment of pre-existing conditions or direct complications thereof."

And that further, it is hereby understood and agreed that the Dental Expense Benefits under Policy Form 656H and Rider Form 1906 shall be amended to read as follows:

"If the Insured, by reason of such injuries, shall require treatment on or to the teeth, the liability hereunder shall be limited to the actual expense incurred up to One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) per injured tooth for such treatment actually accomplished within fifty-two (52) weeks of the accident on whole, sound, natural teeth."

It is further understood and agreed that the Special Hospitalization Services under Form 1906, Tackle Football Rider, is increased to \$200.00.

TACKLE FOOTBALL RIDER

The Policy to which this Rider is attached is hereby amended to include the scheduled benefits in consideration of an additional premium paid to the Company. This Rider is made part of and subject to the conditions and limitations of said Policy, except as herein stated. The risk covered by this Rider is not covered under the Policy.

The effective date of this Rider shall be the same as the effective date of the Policy but this Rider expires on the next following June 30.

The benefits set forth herein shall be payable for losses arising from accidental bodily injuries sustained while this Rider is in force and while the Insured is participating in a regularly scheduled and supervised tackle football game sponsored by the school, including practice sessions, hereinafter called such injuries.

MEDICAL EXPENSE BENEFITS

If, as a result of such injuries, sustained directly and independently of disease and all other causes and while this Rider is in force, the Insured shall require any of the following medical and hospital services within 120 days of the accident, the Company will pay the actual expense personally incurred within 52 weeks from the date the Insured received his first medical or hospital care or treatment as follows: (1) The amount to be paid for any necessary service of a legally qualified physician or surgeon or X-ray shall be at the rate of \$6.00 per unit value in accordance with the Minimum Fee Schedule adopted by the Division of Industrial Accidents of the State of California, October 1, 1966. Only one fee, the largest, will be paid for multiple surgical procedures performed through the same incision. Only the amount shown in the Fee Schedule will be paid regardless of the number of physicians involved. For any operation or service not shown in the Fee Schedule, the Company shall objectively determine the amount payable on the basis of an operation or service of equivalent gravity or severity; (2) the amount payable for the necessary services of Registered Nurses (R.N. and not a relative) shall not exceed \$420.00 for any one accident; (3) if there is no fracture, the amount payable shall not exceed \$10.00 (\$25.00 for skull) for necessary X-rays; (4) hospitalization due to injury must commence for hospital or medical reasons within 120 days from the date of the accident and is limited to ward room accommodations with three or more beds; (5) the maximum amount payable for special hospital services is \$100.00 and includes such fees as operating room, laboratory, drugs, anesthetics, X-rays, etc., and excludes nurses' and physicians' fees and personal items; (6) plastic or cosmetic surgery is limited to a maximum of \$30.00; (7) a maximum total payment up to \$30.00 will be paid for diathermy, heat treatment, massage or hospital appliances, rendered while in the hospital; and (8) ambulance fees are payable up to a maximum of \$25.00. However, in no event shall the amount payable under the Medical Expense Benefits exceed \$1,500 in aggregate for any one accident.

DENTAL EXPENSE BENEFITS

If the Insured, by reason of such injuries, shall require treatment on or to the teeth, the liability hereunder shall be limited to the actual expense personally incurred up to fifty dollars (\$50.00) per injured tooth for such treatment actually accomplished within 52 weeks of the accident on natural teeth.

ACCIDENTAL DEATH

If, as a result of such injuries, the Insured shall suffer, directly and independently of disease and all other causes, loss of life within 52 weeks from the date of the first medical treatment, the Company will pay \$1,500 in addition to any other indemnity payable under this Rider. Should the student be confined in a hospital longer than the 52 weeks, the Company's liability shall be extended under this provision until the student is discharged from the hospital.

Notice of Claim: Written notice of claim must be given to the Company within sixty days after the occurrence or commencement of any loss covered by the policy, or as soon thereafter as is reasonably possible. Notice given by or on behalf of the Insured to the Company at its Home Office in Benton Harbor, Michigan, or to any authorized agent of the Company, with information sufficient to identify the Insured, shall be deemed notice to the Company.

1. Our policy is with Fidelity Life and Income Mutual Insurance Co. Local agent is Robert Clark of the Insurance Marketing Associates.
2. Each student pays a premium of \$3.80 per year. \$1.90 per semester. 75 cents is billed and paid by the Board of Trustees, 75 cents is paid by the student and goes into the insurance fund, another 40 cents is taken out of the general student funds. Actually, the student pays \$1.15 per semester for the coverage.
3. So far this semester, there have been approximately 20 football injury claims and 15 non-football injuries claims made.
4. There are usually about 300 claims made per year.
5. SRJC has the lowest premium rate available. Most colleges pay about \$5 per student per year.
6. Accidental death---The policy pays \$1,500 in addition to other payments if the injured dies within 90 days of suffering an injury.
7. We have a factor of \$6 on our policy, which, according to the Sonoma County Medical Society, provides the going rate on most medical and surgical expenses.
8. When the policy was re-negotiated this year, benefits were increased in several cases.
 - a. The amount paid for X-rays if there is no fracture has gone from \$10 to \$50.
 - b. Maximum payment for a hospital room has been raised from \$40 to \$50.
 - c. Payment for dental injuries has been raised from \$50 to \$100 per injured tooth.
 - d. On the tackle football rider, maximum amount payable for special hospital services has been raised from \$100 to \$200 and includes such fees as operating room, laboratory, drugs, anesthetics, X-rays, etc. and excludes nurses and physicians fees and personal items.
 - e. Also on the tackle football rider, benefits pays for treatment to teeth amount to \$50 per injured tooth.
9. The ten dollar deductible clause has been eliminated from the policy.
10. Medical expense benefits are payable only to the extent not covered by other policies.
11. The pre-existing injuries clause has been eliminated, so payment is now made for pre-existing injuries. If a football player injures a knee which had been injured previously, he will still be paid for his present injury.
12. A maximum of eight visits, in or out of the hospital, can be made for diathermy, heat treatment, massage or hydrotherapeutics.

COVERAGE

Medical Expense Benefits

Insurance company will pay the actual expense personally incurred for any usual and normal treatment for medical services that are necessary and rendered within one year after an accident as follows: The amount shall be at the rate of \$6 per unit in accordance with the Medical, Surgical and X-ray Procedural Index of the 1964 Relative Values Studies of the California Medical Association.

Only one fee, the largest, will be paid for multiple surgical procedures performed through the same incision.

In no event shall the amount payable exceed \$10,000 for any one accident.

Dental Expense Benefits

The injured shall be paid up to \$100 per injured tooth within 52 weeks of an accident on natural teeth.

Athletic Team Travel

Policy provides a maximum of \$1,500 accidental death benefit and in addition, a maximum of \$1,500 under medical expense benefits resulting from accidental bodily injuries to the insured while being transported as a fare-paying individual on a scheduled aircraft to or from school and the place of an athletic event.

Interscholastic Athletics Coverage

This policy provides a maximum of \$1,500 accidental death insurance and in addition, a maximum \$1,500 under medical benefits for accidents resulting while the insured is participating in interscholastic athletics. There is a special rider attached for tackle football.

B. Experimental Grants: All experimental student grants for student projects will have to be academic in nature and must not amount to more than \$300.00 per grant. One project will be given money once and only once.



- I. Call to Order
President Mark Karahadian called the meeting to order at 3:15.
- II. Roll Call
Those absent were Kathy Saltgaver, Pam Buford, Tami Ramirez and Zandra Raphael. Andy Dupont was excused.
- III. Approval of Agenda
The agenda was approved as written.
- IV. Approval of Minutes
The minutes were approved as written.
- V. Reports
At this time Mark allowed Parliamentarian Chuck Katsis to give his report. Chuck once again announced the Food Drive that Steve Kelly is sponsoring. PEO will distribute the food. 
B. From the Floor

10. Each application will be submitted to the S.A.O. Upon submission, it will be dated. If an application is incomplete it will be returned to the student and the application will lose its priority standing.

PROPOSED GUIDELINES FOR STUDENT EXPERIMENTAL PROJECT GRANTS

SUBJECT: Report No. 2 on the Status of Student Government in California's Public Junior Colleges

This report is the second status report on the progress, problems, and changes made since I took office one year ago. The report contains four main sections:

- I. Accomplishments - A review of changes made since August 1, 1969
- II. Legislative and Policy Resolutions - A report of results of student policy and legislative proposals
- III. Present Problems - An analysis of current strengths and weaknesses of the student association
- IV. Goals for 1970-71 - Plans and goals for the coming year

I. Accomplishments

The past year was an extremely successful one for the CCCSGA. The following is a list of major changes and accomplishments of the past year:

A. A complete reorganization of the statewide student government association.

Nine area executive boards were set up and a nine-man statewide executive board was implemented to facilitate communications and accountability and to insure that each area of the state has both a voice and a vote in decisions.

B. Implementation of the position of Executive Secretary of the statewide student association.

Beginning in August, 1969, the statewide student association acquired the services of a part-time Executive Secretary to help reorganize the student association and to initiate legislative and policy proposals in Sacramento. The position is funded jointly by the CCCSGA and the California Junior College Association and, to our knowledge, is the first of its kind in this country.

C. Initiation of monthly meetings with the Governor.

One of the problems faced by students in seeking policy changes is getting a direct hearing by those in decision-making positions. The CCCSGA has arranged for monthly meetings with Governor Reagan to discuss student problems and proposals and to ask for needed changes. The meetings have helped provide a clearer understanding of the positions and problems of both the students and the Governor. The most notable successes of the meetings to date were the Governor's agreement to sign Senate Bill 524 (concerning circulating petitions for lowering the voting age) and the improved image and visibility of the statewide student association in Sacramento. More meetings are planned for this year, with an emphasis to be placed on the chief executive's support of CCCSGA legislative proposals.

D. Introduction of student proposals as legislative bills or as policy changes.

Following the fall conference, a number of student resolutions were presented to various governing agencies and to the Legislature as proposals for change. The next section of this report contains a complete rundown of how student resolutions fared in the first year of the new statewide organization.

E. Implementation of a quarterly newsletter, "The Student Voice."

This newsletter is published four times a year to help prepare students for conferences and to aid in the dissemination of program information and follow-up of legislative proposals.

F. Seating of students on major policy-making state agencies including the following:

1. The Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges
2. The Board of Directors of the California Junior College Association
3. The student advisory committee to the Legislature's Joint Committee on Higher Education (CCCSGA student is the chairman)
4. State committees on educational opportunity; grants, aids, and loans; and governance

G. Completion of a statewide survey of the progress and problems of student participation in governance in junior colleges in California.

The paper will be published in October, 1970, and distributed to all junior college presidents and student body presidents, and should provide a perspective for individual campuses on how they measure up to current practices in the state as a whole.

H. Revision and improvement of statewide conferences.

Last year the statewide conferences were changed to eliminate some of the duplication that occurred by having the same kinds of conferences in

fall as in spring. This year we will make further refinements. The fall conference will be devoted to developing legislative proposals and to orienting new junior college students. It will be a large (400 students) conference. The spring conference will be a conference only of presidents, and it will be devoted to meetings with key legislators and policy-makers in an effort to improve follow-up of legislative programs. Hopefully, this smaller conference in the spring will reduce costs and increase the effectiveness of the student legislative program.

II. Legislative and Policy Resolutions

There is a saying in political circles that very little significant legislation is passed in an election year. That saying surely applies to this past legislative session. The session was extremely disappointing, with the Governor's tax reform package dominating much of the time and effort of the session. The following is a report on how CCCSGA policy and legislative proposals fared.

A. Policy Matters

1. Insuring a transfer priority for junior college students.

A move by the state college system to move unilaterally in establishing transfer priorities was blocked. A negotiated compromise was passed (with the active participation of the California Junior College Association, the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges, and the California Community College Student Government Association). However, final resolution of this problem is still to be reached. We plan to see how the policy is implemented this fall before taking any further steps. If junior college students are denied transfer in the coming year, we will introduce additional legislation to try to insure them a top priority. Hopefully, this new policy will be effective and additional legislation will not be needed.

2. Establishing a mandatory course in ethnic studies for junior colleges in California.

This resolution was passed by the Board of Directors of the California Junior College Association, and is currently being reviewed by the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges. Hopefully, this course will be implemented and will contribute in a small way toward better understanding between races. **REPORT**

3. Addition of students as voting members to the Board of Directors of the California Junior College Association. **IMP!**

The California Junior College Association, at its May Board meeting, voted to add nine students as full voting members of the Board of Directors. The action should be ratified by the fall general assembly of the Association in November, thus allowing students to become a full fourth arm of the Association. The new CJCA Board of Directors will consist of nine trustees, nine administrators, nine faculty, and nine students.

B. Legislative Matters

1. AB 1887 (Coyle) - To eliminate mandatory physical education in junior colleges. AB 1887 passed both committees in the Assembly, passed the full Assembly after an extended and emotional debate, and was killed in the Senate Education Committee by a vote of 5:5 (we needed 6 votes). The chances of passing this bill next year are excellent. This will be a top priority in our second-year program.
2. SB 524 (Marks) - To lower the age required to circulate petition for lowering the voting age to 18. Passed the Assembly and the Senate and was signed into law by Governor Reagan.
3. AB 2438 (Deddeh) - To impose a mandatory student body fee for all students. This bill never had a chance this year. It died in the first committee.
4. HR 11959 (Federal affair) - Increases veterans benefits by more than 30 percent; provides new benefits for educationally disadvantaged veterans. The bill was signed into law by President Nixon. While the CCCSGA was only one of many groups supporting this bill, the student resolutions were communicated to the President and were acknowledged by his staff and by key senators in Washington, D.C. Our support did contribute to the implementation of this law.
5. AB 412 (Crandall) and SB 250 (Burgener) - To provide for additional junior college funding. These bills became entwined with discussions of the Governor's tax reform package (AB 1000 and AB 1001), and have been held for further study. A review of junior college finance is currently under way and should produce concrete proposals late this fall.
6. Lowering the voting age to 18 - this matter is being approached in two main ways:
 - a. Through the courts - The CCCSGA is involved in a court case (through Citizens for Lowering the Voting Age) that will test the recent congressional mandate to give 18-year-olds the right to vote. The case should be heard in October. Depending on the outcome of the court case, we will do one of two things:
 - (1) If we win, we will begin a voter registration drive to sign up newly franchised voters on junior college campuses.
 - (2) If we lose, we will begin a petition drive (under SB 524 just signed into law) to gather signatures to put the matter of lowering the voting age on the ballot.
 - b. In the Legislature - ACA 40 (Briggs), which would have put the question of allowing 18-year-olds the right to vote on the November ballot, passed the Assembly and died in the Senate. The measure received 23 votes, but fell short of the 27 votes needed (two-thirds of the 40-member house).

Until the courts decide on the federal mandate, all of these approaches will be slowed down. Hopefully, the Supreme Court will hear the matter in October and will rule in our favor. A further report on our court case will be made in The Student Voice in November.

III. Present Problems

A. Area organization

When we started the reorganization program last August, a three-year plan for reorganization of the statewide student association was developed. All of the goals for the first year have been achieved. I now believe that the junior college student association is better organized and much more effective than any other student association in California-- at the statewide level.

The next step in reorganization, and a major problem, is to more effectively develop each area in the state so that communications and accountability to local campuses are more fully insured. To date, the statewide student executive board has functioned well. Some areas are also functioning well. We now need to concentrate on additional help to weak areas so all reorganization work will be completed by this spring.

B. Finance

While the statewide student association is stronger than ever, many individual campuses are in financial trouble. Sale of student body cards is down, budgets are slim, and programs are being curtailed. The chances of passing a mandatory student body card bill are practically zero. Newer and more creative approaches to financing student activities must be found. The "crutch" of the mandatory student card is slipping away.

Some schools have had success with extensive discount programs that help student cards to "pay for themselves." Other schools have developed new financing patterns in cooperative efforts with the junior college district office. One plan currently being discussed at the state level is to devote a major portion of the spring conference to financial problems. Hopefully, we could enlist the help of several experts on financial affairs to assist us in developing a sounder and more effective approach to financing student programs than the current attempt at mandatory student cards. In any case, the whole question of financing of student activities will be reviewed and acted upon this spring.

C. Work in the districts

Almost the entire thrust of the legislative and policy program of last year occurred in Sacramento. This is natural in the first year of operation. However, to be more effective, we must improve contacts with legislators and policymakers out in the districts. Theoretically, when a bill is about to be heard, we should be able to call the nine area presidents who in turn will call the local campus presidents in their respective areas. We should be able to generate hundreds of letters and telegrams, not just randomly, but directed to each legislator from each

local constituency. This is the best way to have an impact in Sacramento. We can get the bill authors, we can provide the testimony, but you must follow-up out in the district. This is a prime goal for spring--to make this system work. If we do, we can involve 92 colleges and thousands of students directly in the legislative process.

IV. Goals for 1970-71

We are well ahead of schedule in terms of the three-year plan for reorganization of the California Community College Student Government Association. The major goals for this fall include the following:

A. Improve the areas' organization

Each area will meet with the statewide president and the Executive Secretary. At these meetings, plans for each area, unique needs of areas, and suggestions for improvement will be discussed. In addition, new communication mechanisms are being developed to insure that we know about you and you know about us.

B. Implementation of special committees

Two special student committees are being set up to try to insure a minority voice in a majority system. The committees are for veterans and minorities. These committees will develop legislative proposals to bring to the fall conference, meet with legislators to discuss these proposals, and advise the state board and the Executive Secretary about needs of their particular group.

C. Foundation proposals

Two proposals for foundation funding of CCCSGA activities will be submitted this year. One proposal will be for a general grant to help improve and expand CCCSGA statewide activities. This money would be used for student publications, travel, and expanded conferences and communications.

A second proposal would request funds for several student interns to assist the Executive Secretary in working with policymakers and legislators.

Both proposals are now in draft form and should be submitted this spring.

D. Further refinements in conferences

As mentioned earlier in this report, there will be one large conference in the fall and a conference of student presidents in the spring. The format of the conferences will also be changed. New workshops will be added and ineffective workshops will be deleted. It is also imperative that area presidents do a much more effective job of orienting students before they come to the state conference. Preparation is the key to effective student programs. We can only do so much in providing opportunities for students. Beyond a limit, students are entirely on their own in making the most of those opportunities.

E. Development of a special student services program

Plans are under way to offer a number of special student services through the CCCSGA statewide office in Sacramento. Included in the plans are the following kinds of services:

1. Discounts on travel programs

Current proposals include trips to Europe, Hawaii, etc. CCCSGA members will soon be able to travel at a reduced rate. Negotiations are currently under way with several travel groups, and a final contract should be produced late this fall.

2. Discounts on special purchases

The CCCSGA is examining the possibility of arranging special discounts on certain services and products (such as automobile necessities, insurance, entertainment, etc.). This particular program will be developed this spring and will be ready for implementation next fall.

A final note

To help all of you communicate better with each other, I am enclosing a list of names you should know. Hopefully, all of us can work together as effectively as last year to produce further needed changes in public junior colleges in California.

If you have any comments, suggestions, or criticisms of the ideas presented in this paper, please drop me a line. I would appreciate your judgment.

Good luck in the coming year and welcome back.



5. The application will include some information about the student and will include a statement of his purpose in doing the project.
6. Each S.P.G. application will include a detailed budget breakdown.
7. Students must have a faculty advisor to assist them with the project. The student will be required to meet with the advisor once every two weeks to discuss the progress of the project. Failure to aggressively seek the advice of the faculty advisor for the project may result in charges of misconduct against the student.
8. All financial matters pertaining to the S.P.G. will be handled through the Student Activities Office. All requests for funds must be signed by the student and his faculty advisor.
9. Each application will be signed by the student and his advisor
10. Each application will be submitted to the SAO. Upon submission, it will be dated. If an application is incomplete it will be returned to the student and the application will lose its priority standing.
11. All S.P.G. for the year 1970-71 will be completed by June 1, 1971.

Two statements of importance were discussed those were the Advisor Agreement Statement and the Student Agreement Statement. Andy Dupont moved to approve the Student Project Grant Guidelines as written. Gary Cia seconded. The motion carried.

C. From the Floor

The question of the Family Planning Clinic came up and Mr. Canevari reported the reason that the clinic had been delayed was the fact that the subject of legal liability. The clinic will come up for decision at the next board.

VII. New Business

A. Marie Balentine presented three problems areas in CSA

I would like to request a \$300.00 student grant for a high quality black and white photography project. The prints, archivally processed and matted on museum board, would be the beginning of Santa Rosa Junior Colleges permanent collection of fine photographic prints.

The photographs, to be of nature scenes, will be specially processed for maximum quality and permanence. Using a modified Morgan-Adams archival process such as the Smithsonian uses, the prints will theoretically last 150+ years. The end result of the project will be a portfolio of the finest prints to be presented to Santa Rosa Junior College for a permanent collection. I will retain all rights to the negatives and prints made from them, but the college may use the prints from the portfolio as they wish, such as shows, displays, etc. The prints may not be cropped or reproduced in any form. One idea for their use may be a display in the new college library when it opens.

The benefit to me would be twofold: 1.) I would be able to work with highly advanced methods of fine photographic print production, and 2.) I would gain valuable experience with my medium.

I feel that since the effect a photographic statement has depends upon the print one sees, the better and more controlled the print is, the clearer the statement. I expect to learn more about the subtle nuances of the photographic print and its creation, and as my life shall be as a photographer, this is of the utmost importance to me. I want to be able to make a photographic statement and have that statement live in a print which I create.

The subject of the photographs, nature, is a topic with which I am familiar photographically and spiritually, and which I feel to be of the utmost importance to man and his future. I have done previous shows at Santa Rosa Junior College, including a display for the college production of "Little Mary Sunshine", and recently a show of environmental photographs. Both of these productions have been about a given theme, but this is to be my theme, using highly advanced methods of production. I am currently employed as a photographer for the Speech and Drama Depts. of SRJC.

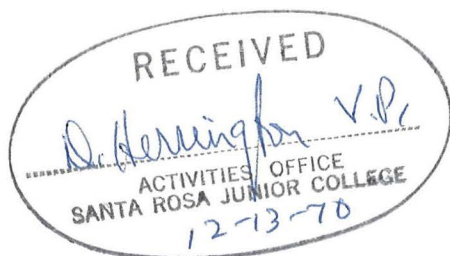

As a student of Santa Rosa Junior College, I am writing you to request that the results of Wednesday's elections for executive vice-president be declared void on the grounds of an improper ballot.

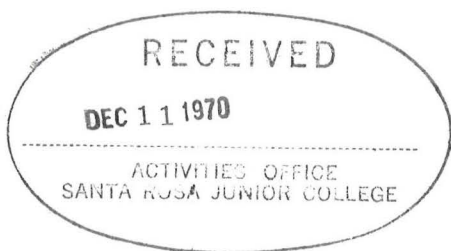

UC Faculty Desires To Go Back To Semesters; "Harmful," Not Helpful

BERKELEY — A University of California faculty committee suggests abandoning the quarter system and reinstating the semester plan at UC's nine campuses.

The Academic Senate's Committee on Educational Policy issued the report yesterday, saying the educational consequences of the quarter system are "more harmful than helpful."

UC regents switched to four 10-week quarters four years ago with the idea of more fully utilizing expensive campus facilities.

But the 1970 summer quarter was eliminated in an economy move and a similar move is being considered for next summer.

The summer quarter was "pivotal to the advantages of the quarter system," the committee said.

A survey last week of deans and department heads revealed that two favored quarters, three were neutral and 40 others "expressed mild to vehement disapproval."

The Berkeley Academic Senate has scheduled an advisory vote on the topic for Nov. 10. The final decision rests with UC regents.

Since abandonment of the system of two semesters in a nine-month academic year, the committee said incomplete grades have risen sharply.

"A student finds the quarter to be a hurried and unsatisfactory experience," the report said. "He spends a higher proportion of his time in mechanical tasks that have nothing to do with his education.

"The faculty member . . . finds himself teaching 'bit-sized' survey courses in the time available."

Subject: Student Conduct Guidelines.

At its meeting on Monday, November 30, the Board of Trustees approved the employment of Western Education Consultants as a firm to advise and suggest with reference to possible changes in the Student Conduct Guidelines. More specifically, the firm will be concerned with an evaluation of the following sections in the guidelines document:

Student Rights and Limitations (II)	Campus Disruption (VIII)
Student Responsibilities	(III) Academic Freedom (IX, B,C)
Due Process (IV, A, B, E)	Speakers, Funds, Information (X, XI)

WHY?

(Among other reasons, though the experience of spring and summer, 1970, should suffice as justification)

- (1) Dissatisfaction, regardless of an individual's campus role or position on an issue, has been expressed throughout the campus as it relates to procedures for processing student due process. The roles and procedures of the administration, Board of Review, and Board of Trustees require close scrutiny.
- (2) Clarification is required with reference to the role of an advisor and to the particular use of language selected to state the entire guidelines document.
- (3) Determination of the adequacy of procedures for processing complaints, from whatever source, is important.

WHO?

The Santa Rosa study will be performed by Jan David Blais, President of Western Education Consultants, formerly Administrative Dean of Students at the University of California, Berkeley.

Previous to that assignment he was an attorney for the Massachusetts Crime Commission and in the trial department of Goodwin, Procter & Hoar, Boston. His degrees are B.S., Holy Cross College; M.P.A., LL.B., Harvard University. Assisting on the study will be H. Dale Tillery, Ph.D., Associate Professor of Education and Director of the Junior College Leadership Program, University of California, Berkeley. Also assisting will be Milton Gordon, Associate Counsel, Board of Regents, University of California.

WHEN?

December 8, 1970 - start.
January 4, 1971 - presentation of preliminary report
Week of January 11, 1971 - conference on preliminary report
February 15, 1971 - presentation of final report

HOW?

Phase I. Collection of data through discussions with college officials, faculty, board members, students, and officials of other institutions. Review of records and other written material. Completion of preliminary analysis. Presentation of written statement of specific problems, preliminary recommendations and working plan for further investigation. Four weeks.

Phase II. Acceptance of these preliminary recommendations, with mutually agreed-on modifications as required. Two weeks.

Phase III. Further investigation and analysis. Preparation of recommendations in detail, focusing on specific improvement possibilities, and including cost estimates of recommended changes where applicable. Confirmation of these recommendations in a final written report. Four weeks.

NOTE: Legal requirements and limitations, including those of the California Education Code, will be taken into account by this study. Should recommendations be developed which would require a change in law for implementation, assistance in drafting proposals for presentation to appropriate agencies will be given the college as part of this study.

PREFACE

The idea of a campus government was presented originally at this year's Hoberg's Conference in the form of a proposal which would somehow provide an organization that enhanced effective communication between students, faculty, administration and classified staff. Reference was frequently made to the concept that we are all involved in education as one large family.

If we are to function as "a large family," or indeed if we are even to communicate openly and honestly with one another, we must do so not only on retreats as was the case at Hoberg's, but at "home" also. It seems to me that we should discuss and integrate our differences on campus and should strive to make future Hoberg's, "vacations" and not retreats for the entire "family".

It is hoped that all copies of this constitution will be returned to me with comments and evaluations written in the same spirit as was this constitution; which was and still is a search for workable and creative solutions to the problems of conflict we all face on this campus.

Vital to the integration of any conflict is a feeling of equality sensed by the conflicting factions. Readers of this constitution hopefully will sense the importance of sincerely felt equality amongst students, faculty, administration and classified staff, that is necessary for efficient and meaningful communication.

The adoption of this constitution or some closely related

form of it by all of us at this campus could minimize the severity of the divisions between us and maximize the potential for a meaningful educational experience so desired by us all.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

This entire constitution has been taken from a model proposed by the Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions.

Many valuable insights and key problems of faculty, students and administration were revealed to me, and aided in the formation of this constitution in "The American University" by Jacques Barzum, who was Dean of Faculties and Provost at Columbia University for twelve years.

Personal thanks for encouragement and suggestions should go to my fellow students, faculty and administrators who I have met with in the past few months to discuss the idea of a campus government rather than a student body government.

PREAMBLE

We, the students, faculty, administration and classified staff of Santa Rosa Junior College, together with the Board of Trustees, in order to establish a flexible and creative form of self-government, do ordain this constitution as our own; whose purpose it shall be to provide for the constant improvement and quality of education through open and honest communication between all concerned.

ARTICLE 1

Rights of the Governed

Membership in this organization shall be restricted to all concerned who purchase a Campus Government Card.

SECTION 1. No person, group, or association shall impinge upon the development of intellectual curiosity, integrity, and accomplishment of any member of this organization.

The atmosphere of intellectual freedom whereby all concerned may best grow to understand moral, aesthetic, social, and economic values shall be preserved by this constitution.

SECTION 2. Academic freedom at this institution shall be officially limited to the definitions of Academic Freedom in the California Education Code. It is further recognized by members of this organization that if the California Education Code at any time appears to be in need of change, it shall be the responsibility of this government to respectfully submit proposals for change to the proper authority.

SECTION 3. The members of this organization recognize in good faith the the only power of veto over their government is held by the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College. If such power is ever exercised by the board, accompanying it must be specific recommendations for the revision of the legislation.

ARTICLE 11

Elections Board

SECTION 1. In order to provide for the responsible selection of

candidates running for office in this campus government, there shall be an elections board headed by the Dean of Campus Activities (presently the Student Activities Advisor) who shall appoint two students and one faculty member to assist him.

a. The members of this board shall not cast a vote in the elections for which they are serving.

b. Any appointee of the board may be removed by majority vote in the General Assembly. He shall be replaced by another appointee.

SECTION 2.

a. It shall be the responsibility of this board to provide adequate and convenient facilities for the electorate to discuss issues with the candidates.

b. This board shall present to the electorate views of the President, the Planning Branch, and the General Assembly of this government on the state of the campus one week prior to the date set for nominations.

c. This board shall provide once a week facilities for voter registration during the entire school year except between the state of the campus messages provided for above and the election of candidates.

d. All voter registration shall be invalidated after each presidential election.

e. All members of this organization must register in order to vote.

SECTION 3. Persons wishing to be nominated for candidacy to any government office provided herein may be rejected only if they demonstrate to the elections board an unfamiliarity with the provisions of this constitution.

SECTION 4. This election board shall devise an election code which shall be approved by the majority of the General Assembly and the Planning Branch of the government.

ARTICLE 111 The Presidency

SECTION 1. The president of this campus government shall be responsible to all its members and shall protect academic freedom as guaranteed herein. He shall interpret for himself the spirit of this constitution and shall make every effort to insure its livelihood and viability. He shall be a representative of this campus government to the community of taxpayers who help to support this institution and shall respond justly to their criticisms and comments concerning it.

SECTION 2. He shall be familiar with the provision of junior colleges as outlined in the California Education Code and shall respond to this code in a manner which is representative of this campus government.

SECTION 3. He shall take care that the educational resources available at this institution are evaluated according to the needs and wishes of the members of this organization and he shall make recommendations concerning the use of those resources to the proper authority.

* SECTION 4. In case of illness or resignation, the president may appoint one of the vice-presidents to succeed him.

SECTION 5. The General Assembly together with the Planning Assembly may discharge the president with a two-thirds majority vote in each assembly.

SECTION 6. The president shall submit whatever legislation he deems necessary to the General Assembly which shall be acted upon within thirty days.

SECTION 7. The president, with the assistance of the finance department provided for herein, shall submit budget proposals to the General Assembly for the following fiscal year by May 1 and final action by the General Assembly shall take place before the end of the school year.

ARTICLE IV The Vice Presidencies

SECTION 1. There shall be one vice president elected from each of the following groups; students, faculty, administration and classified staff, whose responsibility it shall be to reflect the ideals and interests of the electorates they represent.

SECTION 2. The vice presidents shall provide adequate feedback to their respective electorates concerning immediate and important issues.

* SECTION 3. The three vice-presidents shall work together to integrate conflicts which arise between their electorates. They shall be responsible for providing for a means of efficient and enjoyable communication which exists at all times between their respective electorates. They shall encourage a sense of equality and a singularity of purpose between their electorates and shall propose to the General Assembly whatever legislation they feel is necessary to achieve these ends. Such legislation must be acted upon by the General Assembly within thirty days.

SECTION 4. The vice presidents may be requested by the president to administer such duties as may be appropriate to their office.

ARTICLE V
The General Assembly

SECTION 1. The General Assembly shall consist of the following voting memberships:

a. one student and one faculty member, running on the same ballot, from each department included in education and instruction at this institution.

b. two administrators running on separate ballots.

c. two classified staff running on separate ballots.

d. 1) one student and one counselor running on a ballot for students with undeclared majors.

2) one student and one counselor running on another ballot for students with undeclared majors.

e. one member of the Board of Trustees of Santa Rose Junior College.

f. The above voting membership may receive at a general election one vote from each paid member of this organization who is registered to vote in the department most appropriate to their particular classification on campus. Students may vote in any one and only one department which they choose. Faculty must register to vote in the department they are from. Administrators and classified staff shall vote only in the department in which they belong.

g. One Commissioner of Speakers, Assemblies and Forums elected by all concerned who shall appoint an assistant with one vote in the Assembly.

h. One Commissioner of Social Events elected by all concerned who shall appoint an assistant with one vote in the assembly.

i. Two Inter-Club-Council Commissioners elected by members of the Inner-Club-Council.

1) one commissioner shall represent clubs of a social nature.

2) the other commissioner shall represent clubs of an academic nature.

3) each shall have one vote in the General Assembly.

SECTION 2. Responsibilities of members of the General Assembly

a. The student/faculty departmental representatives shall reflect the interests and needs of their respective electorates.

b. The administrative representatives shall within the scope of this constitution reflect the interests and needs of the administration.

c. The classified Staff representatives shall reflect within the scope of this constitution the interests and needs of the classified staff.

d. The Commissioner of Speakers, Assemblies and Forums together with his assistant shall encourage the members of this organization to submit proposals for speakers, assemblies and forums. They shall also seek out persons to speak at this campus whom may be appropriate to timely or desired issues. All proposals shall be passed by the majority of the General Assembly.

e. The Commissioner of Social Events and his assistant shall provide for dances, rallies, parties and functions which represent the various social interests of the members of this organization. Realizing the importance of social intercourse to all persons, the Commissioner of Social Events shall make every effort to coordinate some social events which provide for the general good feelings and happiness amongst all members of this organization. All events must be approved by a majority of the General Assembly.

f. The Inter-Club Council Representatives shall reflect the interests of the clubs that they represent and shall do their utmost to encourage the formation of other clubs on this campus which represent the interests of the various members of this organization.

SECTION 3. Duties of the General Assembly

The General Assembly shall:

a. meet twice weekly. At one of these meetings a member of the Board of Trustees shall be present and preferably a Board member shall be present at both meetings. Only one Board member may vote at meetings of the General Assembly.

b. be the official law-making and policy making body for all matters pertaining to the members of this organization that are within the scope of this constitution, and more specifically within the scope of the budget provided for herein.

c. determine the cost of the Campus Government Card which shall entitle the bearer to all benefits and protection provided herein for members of this organization.

1) There shall be no free Campus Government Cards given to any members of this organization.

2) All members of this organization must have a card.

3) Purchases of Campus Government Cards shall not be retroactive.

4) The cost of the Campus Government Card shall be uniform.

5) Revenue from Campus Government Cards shall be collected by the Department of Finance provided for herein.

d. make expenditures according to the budget provided for herein.

e. provide adequate insurance for risks and liabilities to members of this organization who are not covered elsewhere under other auspices of this institution.

f. set aside adequate funds for projects pursued by members of this organization which enhance development of intellectual curiosity and personal growth in moral, social, and economic values.

g. provide for changes in curriculum and instruction which will improve the quality of education as defined by members of this organization.

h. encourage experimentation and creative thought in newer and better ways of education.

i. be conscious of the sense of equality and mutual respect between faculty, students, administration and classified staff,

that is the spirit and the law set forth herein.

j. provide in practice, services, activities, and general information for a cleaner, more humane and more beautiful natural environment which will best serve not only the members of this organization but the community outside of this campus.

k. pass all legislation by a majority vote of its members present except in cases specifically provided for herein.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of the elected representatives to present a budget request for the following fiscal year to the Finance Department provided herein by April 1. Only one budget request shall be submitted from each department which is represented in the assembly. Budget requests must be specifically related to the provision of this constitution.

SECTION 5. Committees:

a. shall be formed by caucus with a chairman appointed by the General Assembly Chairman.

b. shall approve all action by majority vote. If a committee is to become permanent on this campus, its members shall serve no longer than two years and vacancies may be filled by appointment of the committee chairman. All matters within the scope of this constitution which are annually or routinely handled shall be placed on the agenda of the General Assembly. (Several existing committees should be dissolved and their functions absorbed by the General Assembly).

SECTION 6. The Faculty Vice-president of this organization shall serve as Chairman of the General Assembly for its first three meetings. At the fourth meeting the Vice-president shall conduct nominations and elections for General Assembly chairman from amongst its members.

ARTICLE VI

The Planning Department

SECTION 1. Shall be composed if they so desire, of all presidents and vice-presidents who have held office within the past three years. The presidents and vice-presidents who wish to become members of this department shall appoint by majority consent past members of the General Assembly who wish to become members of this department. The above members of the department may appoint by majority consent anyone who is a member of this organization. The planning department shall not total more than one half of the General Assembly.

SECTION 2. Members of the planning assembly shall elect a chairman from amongst themselves who shall serve for one year unless the members of the department wish to discharge him and elect another in his place.

SECTION 3. The Planning Department shall meet once a week and preferably one of the days after the General Assembly meets.

SECTION 4. The Planning Department shall review all proposals passed by the General Assembly and either pass it by majority to the Board of Trustees or return it to the General Assembly by majority vote with recommendations. The objection stands unless the Assembly passes the proposal again by a majority vote at which time the proposal is final.

SECTION 5. It shall be the responsibility of the Planning Department to recommend alterations of this constitution which will correspond to similar alterations in the members of this organization as a whole.

SECTION 6. The Planning Department shall do its utmost to anticipate crisis and shall propose solutions to prevent it. Also this department shall seek out and arrange for research on the improvement of higher education and shall involve itself with the imaginative and philosophical aspects of education as provided for herein.

SECTION 7. Members of this assembly may be asked by the president of this campus government to:

- a. attend conferences and conventions sponsored on behalf of higher education and to initiate proposals for the same.
- b. to sponsor events for the public which will involve them in matters of an educational nature relating to this college.

SECTION 8. The Planning Department shall at all times be conscious of the competency, integrity and efficiency of all facets of this government. as provided herein. They shall help to insure the safety of intellectual curiosity, academic freedom, and the environment which is most conducive to the development of social, economic and moral values provided for herein.

All proposals which relate to this section shall be acted upon by the General Assembly within thirty days after they are received.

SECTION 9. The Planning Department shall submit its budget proposals by April 1 to the Department of Finance.

ARTICLE VII Department of Finance

SECTION 1. a) Shall consist of two students appointed by the president on recommendation from the chairman of the Department of Business at this college. One faculty member in the Department of Business shall be the

advisor.

b) One of these three persons shall be in attendance at each General Assembly meeting.

c) Shall meet with the Planning Department if requested .

d) Shall counsel with the President on the budget proposals received from the General Assembly and Planning Department on April 1.

e) And shall work with the President in preparing a budget for the following fiscal year which shall be completed by April 30.

SECTION 2. If no students majoring in business desire to receive credit for serving in the Department of Finance, the President shall appoint three persons familiar with governmental accounting to serve and they shall receive pay as decided upon by a majority of the General Assembly. Paid persons shall not have priority over students who wish to serve in this department for credit.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of this department to make monthly reports of all income and expenditures of this government and to provide updated reports upon request to any member of this organization.

SECTION 4. This department shall collect all monies as may be authorized by the General Assembly.

SECTION 5. Members of this department are encouraged to give advice to persons serving in this government.

SECTION 6. The President of this government shall sign for all payments of bills and requisitions releasing the funds of this organization. If he is not present to sign or if he is under the age of twenty-one, he shall authorize one of the vice-presidents to sign for him.

ARTICLE VIII General Provisions

SECTION 1. The President shall present to the Department of Finance a budget proposal which shall pay for all proposed secretarial and administrative functions necessary to the efficient operation of this government. No person holding an office may be paid for service in that office or be appointed for a job which is funded by the members of this organization. No person appointed by the President to a paid secretarial or administrative position shall have a vote in the General Assembly or Planning Branch.

SECTION 2. All complaints from members of this organization concerning elected officials shall be submitted to the chairman of the Planning Department and further investigation may be completed as provided herein.

SECTION 3. No elected or appointed member of this government shall accept bribes for services rendered while in office.

SECTION 4. All persons who intend to serve in this government shall be selected on the basis of individual capabilities and for no other reason.

SECTION 5. Funds collected from the members of this organization may be spent only as authorized.

SECTION 6. All government officers shall be elected for one year.

SECTION 7. All students participating in this government shall receive credit as authorized by the General Assembly.

SECTION 8. The president of this government shall be a student.

ARTICLE IX

SECTION 1. Amendments to this constitution shall not conflict with any other part of it.

SECTION 2. Amendment proposals shall be presented to and discussed with the Planning Department. Upon their recommendation the amendment proposal shall go to the General Assembly, whereby with a majority vote, the proposal shall be presented to the electorate in the coming general elections. If two-thirds of the electorate vote for the proposal it shall become an amendment to this constitution.

SECTION 3. A proposal may be made by any member of this organization to rewrite any part or all of this constitution. In such a case, the Planning Department shall review the proposal and submit it to the General Assembly, whereby after review, it shall then be presented to the electorate in the next general election. If the proposal passes by a two-thirds majority of the electorate it shall become effective in the following school year.

ARTICLE X Enactment Clause

SECTION 1. Upon approval (in the coming election, Fall 1970) of three-fourths of the students who voted in the last general election, this constitution shall become effective (in the 1971-1972 school year) in all articles which provide for their

inclusion.

SECTION 2. Upon approval of the Faculty Senate, faculty members shall become a part of this government in all articles in which they are provided for herein.

SECTION 3. Upon approval of the Administration and Classified Staff, this constitution shall become effective in all articles which provide for their inclusion.

ELECTION CODE

- SECTION 1. The Elections Committee shall be composed of the following: Elections Commissioner as chairman, Executive Vice President, one Representative-At-Large and other members deemed necessary by the committee chairman.
- A. If any members of the committee shall be a candidate in an election, the President shall appoint a temporary replacement to serve only for that election.
- SECTION 2. The Elections Committee shall serve as the governing body over all general and special elections.
- A. A general election is that in which candidates for Associated Student offices, Homecoming and Bear Fair queens and Bear Fair Ugly Man are elected.
- B. A special election is that in which the College Student Assembly announces an election for purposes other than the above.
- SECTION 3. Any Santa Rosa Junior College student who has purchased an Associated Student membership card shall be eligible to cast one ballot.
- SECTION 4. The College Student Assembly shall determine the exact dates of the regular and special Associated Student elections.
- A. Elections for Associated Student President, Executive Vice President, Vice President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary shall not be later than three weeks prior to the end of the semester or before eight weeks prior to the end of the semester.
- B. The election for Head Song Leader and Head Yell Leader shall be during the Spring semester preceeding the term of office and held on the same day as the general election for other Associated Student offices.
- C. Election for Representatives-At-Large for the Fall Semester shall not be later than four weeks and not before two weeks after the Fall semester begins. Spring semester election for Representatives-At-Large shall be conducted on the same day as the general election for other Associated Student officers for the Spring semester. All Associated Student members may vote for eight Representatives-At-Large, four to be Sophomores and four to be Freshmen.
- SECTION 5. Casting of the votes shall take place over a one day period, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and not less than two polling places will be in operation during this time. At the discretion of the Elections Committee one polling place may be located inside the cafeteria.

SECTION 6. A candidate for all offices must be in regular attendance.

- A. All elected members of the College Student Assembly must be able to attend College Student Assembly meetings as scheduled.
- B. All candidates must have a 2.0 grade average during the semester in which elected in order to take office the following semester.
- C. Candidates for all offices, except Representatives-At-Large must have completed twelve units or more at Santa Rosa Junior College before taking office.
- D. Candidates for President shall have had at least two successive semesters of academic work and twenty units or more at Santa Rosa Junior College prior to taking office.

SECTION 7. All candidates must have read and be familiar with the Associated Students of Santa Rosa Junior College Constitution and all Codes and Statutes.

SECTION 8. Candidates for Head Yell Leader and Head Song Leader shall declare the names of their assistants at the time of filing for nomination and present a statement of good health signed by a physician for all assistants, Head Yell Leader and Head Song Leader.

SECTION 9. No person may run for more than one Associated Students office in a given semester.

SECTION 10. Nominations for office shall be by petition.

- A. Petitions may be obtained from the Activities Office no earlier than fifteen days before the election and returned to the Activities Office no later than five days before the election.
- B. Petitions shall include the name, address, phone number, office sought and class schedule and must be signed by at least 75 Associated Student members.
- C. All petitions shall be checked by the Elections Commissioner to be sure the candidate is eligible.
- D. In the event a minimum of two petitions is not filed for one office with the Activities Office by deadline date, the College Student Assembly may, by majority vote, nominate eligible candidates.

SECTION 11. All elections shall be by secret ballot.

- A. The order of candidates' names on the ballot will be in alphabetical order under the candidates' respective offices unless the incumbent is running for re-election and then his name shall appear first.

(Section 11 - Con't.)

- B. The order in which the offices shall be placed is: President, Executive Vice-President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Head Yell Leader, Head Song Leader, and Representatives-At-Large.
- C. Candidates running for re-election shall have "incumbent" placed under their names, candidates presently holding another elected or appointed College Student Assembly office may designate that office under their name, and other candidates may state positions held in any other recognized student organization.

SECTION 12. Write-in votes may be written in pencil or pen and a write-in candidate, for an office with no nominated candidate, must have at least fifty write-in votes for one office in order to be declared elected.

SECTION 13. All properly marked ballots shall be counted no later than five hours after the closing of the polls. The Activities Advisor shall be responsible for the safekeeping of the ballots for two weeks after the election, upon which time the ballots shall be destroyed.

SECTION 14. Results will be posted at the Activities Office only after each candidate is notified by the Elections Commissioner and told of the candidates victory or defeat.

- A. The posted results shall include the amount of votes cast for each candidate and shall designate under each office the winning candidate. The posting of the amount of votes cast for each candidate shall only apply to Associated Student officers' elections.

SECTION 15. The Elections Commissioner and one other Elections Committee member shall send to the President the names of the elected candidates and their respective offices along with one blank ballot with the votes cast for each candidate within twenty-four hours after the election.

SECTION 16. Nominees for the elected Associated Student offices shall be allowed no less than five minutes each for a campaign speech at a regular assembly of the Association.

- A. Candidates may have one other student speak before and/or in place of the candidate.
- B. The Assemblies Commissioner shall preside at the assembly. In case he is running for office, the President shall appoint another student.

SECTION 17. Candidates may use the Activities Office duplication machine at no cost.

SECTION 18. There will be no campaigning the day of election within fifteen feet of the polls.

SECTION 19 No more than \$25.00, including contributions, may be spent for one campaign for each candidate.

- A. All candidates or their campaign managers must file in writing to the Elections Commissioner within three weeks after the election a detailed report of expenses of their campaign.
- B. If a candidate is found to have spent more than \$25.00, or has filed a false statement of expenses, this shall be sufficient grounds for either disqualification of candidacy or removal from office. In the event a candidate is removed from office under this Section, the provisions of Section 20 shall apply.

SECTION 20 It shall be the duty of the Elections Commissioner to regulate campaigning and disqualify any candidate found by the Commissioner to be in violation of any rules or regulations of the Associated Students.

- A. Any candidate disqualified may appeal the decision of the Commissioner to the College Student Assembly within eight days after the decision of the Elections Commissioner. A two-thirds vote of the College Student Assembly members voting shall reinstate the candidate.
 - (1) If a candidate is disqualified and then reinstated, but after the election, the President shall declare the election for the office void and a special election shall be held within ten days after reinstatement.
- B. The Elections Commissioner shall inform the President, in writing, of any protests of violations by any student to the Elections Committee, within twenty-four hours after the protest has been made.

S.R.J.C. ** ASB Publicity Code

PURPOSE: The purpose of this code is to provide more orderly, pleasing and effective publicity, and at the same time retain the beauty at the SRJC campus.

DEFINITION: "Poster" is construed to mean any means of conveying messages other than by machines.

Section I - Content

Clause I Posters will deal with information of general interest, to faculty, administration, and students originating with student groups (clubs, organizations and Associated Students).

Clause II Posters will deal with election announcements (see election rules), events of clubs and organizations, dances, assemblies, athletics events, Mid-Day Series, Open Forum, Academic Department announcements and events, and others at the discretion of the Publicity Commissioner or the Advisor of Student Activities.

Section II - Approval

Clause I All posters must be approved before posting. This may be done in the office of Student Activities by the Publicity Commissioner, his delegated representative, or by the Advisor of Student Activities. Posters which are not approved will be removed.

Clause II Approval of posters will be made depending on appropriateness as to size and content.

Section III - Placement

Clause I In general, all posters will be confined to the area in front of Doyle Center across the campus to the north side of the Auditorium and from the front of Analy Hall west across the campus to the circle drive. Other areas for publicity will be considered at the discretion of the Publicity

(Section III - Clause I Con't.)

Commissioner or the Advisor of Student Activities.

Clause II The interior of the Cafeteria will be used on occasion by the Publicity Commissioner only, or his designated agent, for publicizing an ASB activity or event of such importance to be of interest to the campus community as a whole.

Clause III The four brick columns in the cafeteria, up to the ceiling of the inside terrace room and the four outside brick columns on the south wall of the cafeteria, (outside only) up to the overhang, may be used for publicity by the Publicity Commissioner or his designated agent. No handbills or leaflets may be distributed in the cafeteria.

Clause IV The brick columns in the interior of the cafeteria may be used for general Associated Students publicity with the approval of the Publicity Commissioner, his designated agent or the Student Activities Advisor.

Clause V No posters of any kind are to be placed on campus other than the area designated under Section III, Clause I and II unless specific exception is authorized by the Advisor of Student Activities.

Clause VI No publicity will be placed on or in buildings except as other wise noted in this code. Publicity cannot be located where it will obstruct walkways or driveways -- Publicity will be placed on Large Oak trees only (no small trees to be used). This clause will be strictly enforced.

Clause VII All posters are to be fastened securely at all corners. Means of fastening will be determined by material of surface upon which the poster is to be placed. -- Examples are tying, if possible; using masking tape or other kinds of adhesive that are not harmful or detrimental to the wall or surface; or taking (if first checked with Publicity Commissioner or Advisor or Student Activities).

Clause VIII No posters can be placed in or on the windows of coop. Only those areas noted in Clauses III and IV.

Section IV - Bulletin Board Notices

Clause I Student's personal notices, such as items for sale or trade, may be placed on the bulletin board located in Analy and Burbank Halls and on the Kiosks. These signs will be removed by the Publicity Commissioner or his designated representatives.

Section V - Transportation Requests

Clause I Transportation requests may be placed only on the bulletin board right outside the Student Activities Office. Standard Advertisement cards must be procured in the Student Activities Office.

Section VI - Kiosks and Analy Hall Bulletin Board

Clause I Notices and publicity for general Student Body interest may be placed on the Kiosks and the Analy Hall Bulletin Board -- Use to clubs and individuals is also accepted, but must be approved by the Publicity Commissioner or the Advisor of Student Activities for that purpose.

Section VII - Off-Campus Organizations, Groups or Individuals

Clause I All off-campus posters, literature and publicity must be approved by the Counseling Coordinator (Dean of Student's Office).

Section VIII - Time Limits

Clause I All campaign posters within a radius of ten (10) yards of the polling place are to be taken down the day before the election.

Clause II All campaign posters must be taken down carefully no later than twenty-four hours after the event if the event is held after Friday noon.

Clause III All posters will be restricted to two weeks posting prior to the event.

Clause IV During elections each candidate will be limited to a maximum of 10 posters. Posters will be of reasonable size decided upon by the Publicity Commissioner. No hanging signs except by the Publicity Commissioner for Associated Students purposes.

Section IX - Responsibility

Clause I All posters must be stamped for approval before posting. This may be done in the Student Activities Office by the Publicity Commissioner or his designated representative or the Advisor of Student Activities.

(Section IX - Con't.)

Clause II It shall not be the responsibility of the Publicity Commissioner to make or provide materials except for Associated Student functions.

Clause III The responsibility for all campaign posters rests with the individual publicized. Failure to comply with this publicity code will result in the removal of a candidate from an election. Individuals, clubs and organizations in violation of this code will be subject to a fine of not more than \$15.00.

Clause IV Clubs and organizations publicizing an event are responsible for their posters and publicity machines.

Clause V Any poster or publicity machine which represents a violation of this code will be removed at the discretion of the Publicity Commissioner.

Clause VI Any person mutilation or moving any poster or publicity machine, other than the publicity Commissioner, will be summoned to appear before the CSA Executive Cabinet and will be subject to their action.

Clause VII An appeal to action taken by the CSA Executive Cabinet may be taken to the College Student Assembly for a decision.

Clause VIII Any exception to these regulations must be approved by the CSA Executive Cabinet.





- C) shall serve as a member of the Standing Committee on Student Activities.

Constitutional Amendment #3:

3. Artical 4, Section 2, Line 1 shall read:

The College Student Assembly shall consist of all elected Associated Student Officers with the exception of Head Yell Leader and Head Song Leader.

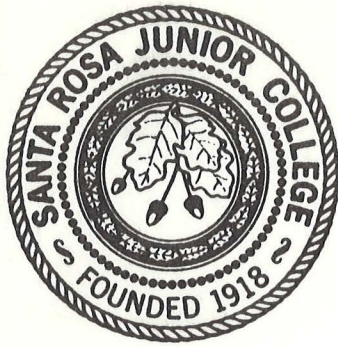

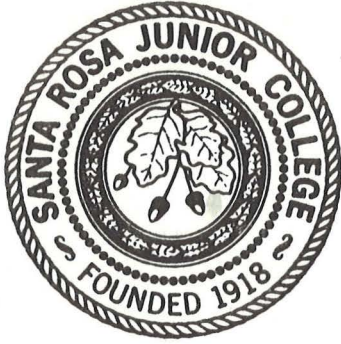

STUDENT PROJECT GRANT GUIDELINES

1. Student Project Grants will be granted by a majority vote of the College Student Assembly.
2. Student Project Grants will be considered on a first come-first served basis.
3. A Student Project Grant for a single project may not exceed \$300 and an individual may receive only one grant for the year 1970-1971.
4. Each application for a Student Project Grant will include a detailed description of the proposed project. The description will also show the educational value of the project.
5. The application will include some information about the student and will include a statement of his purpose in doing the project.
6. Each Student Project Grant application will include a detailed budget breakdown.
7. Students must have a faculty advisor to assist them with the project. The student will be required to meet with the advisor once every two weeks to discuss the progress of the project. Failure to aggressively seek the advice of the faculty advisor may result in charges of misconduct against the student.
8. All financial matters pertaining to the Student Project Grants will be handled through the Student Activities Office. All requests for funds must be signed by the student and by his faculty advisor.
9. Each application will be submitted to the Student Activities Office. Upon submission, it will be dated. If an application is incomplete it will be returned to the student and the application will lose its priority status.
10. ~~All Student Project Grants~~ Student Project Grants for the year 1970-1971 will be completed by June 1, 1971.
11. Each application will be signed by the student and his advisor.

The purpose of our joint research project is to explore three areas of the silk screen printing process. In all three projects the application of photographic stencils will be used to derive the imagery.

Rick Cate will explore the interaction and relativity of color. Of primary concern will be the investigation of non-spectral color, namely fluorescent silk screen pigments. This will be accomplished by the use of multiple printings using repeated images and then varying the colors and registration of each printing.

Steven Kelez's project will involve the investigation of photomechanical techniques and manipulations in creating photo-silk screen stencils. This will include rosterization, montage images, and the overprinting of multiple texture and pattern screens. Also planned is an experiment to create what appears to be a three dimensional image, but in fact is a two dimensional print. This is possible by offsetting each print and by using colored filters when viewing the final print.

Gary Lisandrelli plans to explore imagery possibilities by combining hand derived stencils (direct blackout) with photographically derived stencils. By combining these two stencil techniques Gary plans to create imagery that becomes surreal. Within this surrealistic format Gary also intends to create the sensation of motion, metamorphosis and depth.

All three participants are art majors with a special interest in printing and photography. By combining these two graphic arts processes we hope to explore a new dimension in image making. Through practical application we also hope to learn about color and form and its effects upon one another in creating an image. By having a joint project, with individual research, we feel that there will be a great deal of information

exchange as well as a sharing of the materials involved.

Upon the successful completion of this project we plan to put on an exhibit of our best prints in each area we have chosen to work in. We hope you will make this possible through your generosity and the Student Project Grant.

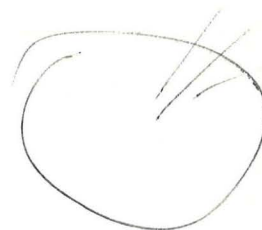
