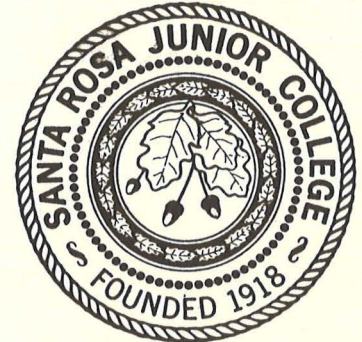

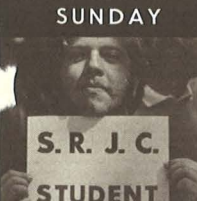

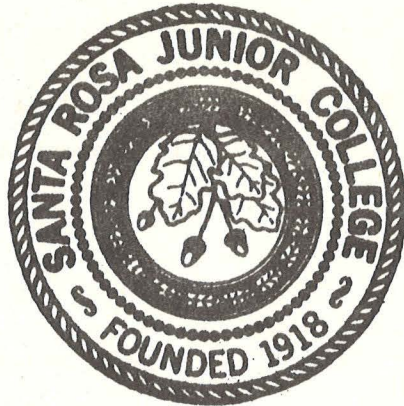

THE ACADEMIC CALENDAR AT SRJC
(A Proposal for Change)

I A GENESIS

A recent survey of 2,378 colleges and universities revealed that a calendar revolution is taking place in the United States. This national survey received 2,429 replies from a total of 2,609 questionnaires mailed, representing an exceptional return of 93%. This is the first or preliminary phase of a continuing study for another year after which the results will hopefully be published in some meaningful and functional form.

The study did reveal some findings which can only be described as startling. For instance: prior to 1970-71, there were 1,753 institutions using the traditional semester while only 83 were using an early semester (begins in late August or early September and ends before the Christmas break). In 1970-71, 850 institutions were on the traditional semester while the number in the early semester had catapulted to 657. In 1971-72 the number of institutions on the early semester rose to 828 with only 602 remaining on the traditional semester.

Early in the spring of 1972 the SRJC Curriculum and Instruction Committee appointed an Ad-hoc Committee to study, survey, report findings and make recommendations with regard to a possible revision in the academic calendar which would end the fall semester at the time of the Christmas Holidays. Seeking guidance, the Ad-hoc group surveyed the faculty and administrators, asking the basic question: should SRJC continue to follow the traditional semester plan or attempt to develop a plan whereby the fall semester would end before Christmas? One hundred eight-five (185) copies of the Opinion Survey (dated April 21, 1972) were distributed. Out of 129 returned ballots, 107 (83%) were in favor of some kind of early semester plan while 22 (17%) voted to retain the traditional plan.

This ratio (better than 4 to 1) became the genesis for the implications and proposal which follows:

II IMPLICATIONS OF THE EARLY SEMESTER PLAN

Advantages

1. Educationally advantageous to complete courses in one block prior to Christmas break.
2. Ability to combine Christmas vacation and semester break for travel or extended vacation without academic responsibilities.
3. Accommodates students transferring to a semester OR quarter college.
4. Alleviates claim by some instructors that little can be accomplished in the few class meetings following vacation.
5. Recognition that students work throughout the year and there is not so much demand for work at Christmas time only.
6. Job placement office reports that few of our students are placed in jobs in resort areas because they desire students who can go to work in late May.
7. Job placement office reports few calls for help in agriculture currently.
8. Sonoma State College expects to change (or has) to early semester.
9. Pressure on registrar's office between semesters greatly lessened.
10. Should not cause fiscal problems because we would offer same classes with slight arrangement due to different lengths of semesters.
11. Summer school not affected.
12. Longer breaks between semesters but shorter summer vacation.

Disadvantages

1. Students and faculty would not have Christmas vacation to study or correct papers.
2. Calendar does not coincide with high schools so families with children in both schools would have to arrange accordingly.
3. High school students transferring mid semester might encounter difficulties if our spring semester begins prior to theirs.
4. Job placement office reports few calls for harvest work but those who do work will be affected.
5. Length of semesters not equal - the fall slightly shorter. (Might pose problem for Evening College).
6. Vacations for classified staff might have to be rearranged.
7. Warm weather end of August might not be conducive to study in those classrooms not air conditioned.
8. Faculty might have to arrange class material to cover less in fall and more in spring.
9. Shorter summer vacation period but longer break between semesters.

III A PROPOSAL FOR CHANGE

It is believed that the advantages outweigh the disadvantages in changing our Academic Calendar to an "Early Semester". It is also recognized and believed that no one calendar answers all of the exacting criteria expected of it by all those involved in the academic community. It should be expected that a traumatic period of adjustment will take place by all segments of the community.

The ad-hoc committee recommends that the College Calendar for the school

year 1973-74 be as follows:

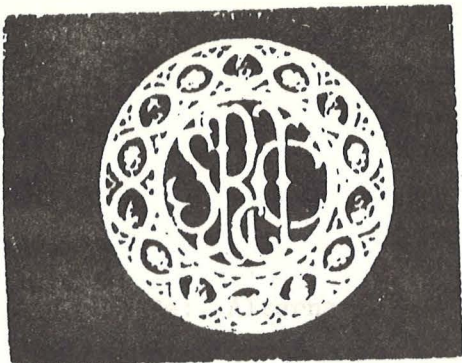

The committee concurred with the idea of moving the college calendar up in order to end the fall semester before Christmas. The following suggestions were offered as alternate dates to those proposed.

The basis for alternate #1 is the fact that there was an inequity in the number of days between fall and spring semesters (83 vs. 92) and this would then make fall semester 85 days and spring 90 days, which would be liveable.

The reasoning for alternate #2 is that there is a possibility that the veterans may lose benefits if school does not resume within a 30 day period.

Alternate #3 just allows school to start on a Monday rather than a Thursday.

The adoption of any of the above plans would allow for the possibility of a Winter Session sometime in the future

It was moved, seconded and passed that the above proposals be forwarded to the Clearing House.

The final examination policy, as it now appears in the Faculty Handbook, was corrected to read as follows:

The final examination schedule is included on the schedule of classes printed in May and December. Instructors are asked to report conflicts or room change requests to the Dean of Instruction.

Final examinations are to be held in all courses (except certain activity classes). They shall not be held on a day designated for instruction.

Only in cases of emergency is a student permitted to petition the Scholarship Committee to take final examinations at a time other than that scheduled. If a student is unable to make the final examination the Registrar's Office and the instructor should be notified.

- 1. The final examination testing period will be seven days; two hour examinations will be held in courses of two units or less, and three hour examinations will be required for those of more than two units; not more than two examinations per day will be schedule for day college classes.*

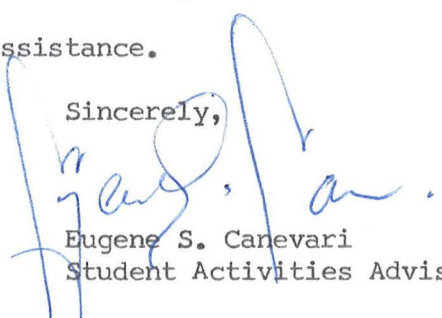

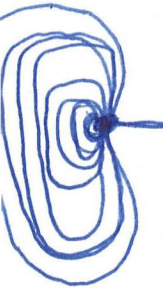

Meeting 2

I. Call to order

The meeting was called to order at 10:35 a.m. by Corresponding Secretary David Chun.

II. Roll Call

Jack Flores was absent.

III. Approval of agenda

Under reports: Item "B Parking Report - Roger Miller" was added. Under New Business: Items "c Coop" "d Bookstore" "e Day Care" "f Finance Report" "g Policy Decision" "h Book Sale" "i Communications Commissioner" were added. The agenda was approved as changed.

IV. Approval of minutes

It was requested that last week's discussion of the status of the Student Activities Advisor and the student taking minutes be noted. The discussion centered mainly around the question of whether the Advisor should have agenda items under his own name, and whether he should continue to give information and advice at meetings. There was also discussion as to whether the student worker taking minutes should be allowed to voice opinions at the meeting. There were no official decisions made. The minutes were approved as amended.

V. Appointments

a. Commissioners

Greg Cosko suggested that the post of Communications Commissioner be re-created, and that Bill Sonnenschein be appointed to fill the position. The Executive Cabinet would have to declare an emergency in order to create the position at this meeting, so it was suggested by Mr. Canevari that this be done at Monday's CSA meeting. At this point Dave Chun moved to suspend parliamentary procedure; Greg Cosko seconded the motion and it passed.

Mike Harris wanted to establish some sort of policy on the status of the Student Activities Advisor. He felt that the Executive Cabinet should be able to make its own successes and failures without the benefit of advice from Mr. Canevari. Dave Chun pointed out that Mr. Canevari did, after all have valuable information, and said that he should be allowed to give the Executive Cabinet the benefit of this information. He stated that the meetings are open, and that Mr. Canevari had as much right to speak as anyone. Bob Reagan resented the fact that many things, from approval of posters to money requests, must go through the Student Activities Advisor. He felt that everything in the office, including all documents, should be open to all students.

Dave Chun moved and Bob Reagan seconded the motion to call an emergency, and create the position of Communications Commissioner, with Bill Sonnenschein appointed to the position. Michael Harris suggested that the Executive Cabinet let Bill Sonnenschein act unofficially until Monday.

Dave Chun suggested that the Executive Cabinet establish the amount of power that CSA will have over the Communication paper. It was generally agreed that the members of the Cabinet want to make sure the paper will not be used to air the opinions and grievances of the Communications Commissioner; thus they feel CSA should retain some control over what is printed in the paper.

It was decided that Bill himself should write a proposal describing how he would write the paper, who would edit it, etc., and present it to CSA.

b. College Committees

Student Affairs: President Fesperman appointed Bill Unkel and Judy Sonneschein to the Student Affairs Committee. Bob Reagan moved and Dave Chun seconded the motion to approve the appointments. The motion passed. President Fesperman appointed Kathy Rampkin to the same committee. Bob Reagan moved and Greg Cosko seconded the motion to approve the appointments. The motion passed.

c. Bob Reagan noted that an item has been placed in Bear Facts announcing hours when students can come in and talk to a Cabinet member about becoming involved in student government. The hours will be daily, 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m., and an appointment sheet will be posted.

d. Finance Committees: Bob Reagan proposed that two new student committees be set up. The committees are:

Budget and Audit Committee: The purpose of the committee would be to draw up and audit the yearly budget. The membership would include Bob Reagan, Paquita Davis, Susan Phipps, Stanford Ling, and 2 additional CSA members -- a total of 6 members.

Daily Dispersement Committee: The first step in making a request for money would be to go to the Daily Dispersement Committee. Membership would include Bob Reagan, Paquita Davis, Dennis O'Malley and two additional students.

A formal proposal regarding the two committees will be submitted to CSA by Bob Reagan.

e. Michael Harris suggested that Michael Harris be appointed to Women's Concern. President Fesperman made the appointment; Bob Reagan moved and Dave Chun seconded the motion to approve the appointment. The motion passed, with Greg Cosko voting negative.

President Fesperman appointed Candy Cox to Women's Concern. Bob Reagan moved and Dave Chun seconded the motion to approve the appointment. The Motion passed.

VI. Reports

a. Parliamentary Procedure

Mr. Cameron suggested that each request for action be made in the form of a motion, that each motion carry a second, and when there is a call for a vote, that the president call first for the affirmative, then the negative votes.

b. Parking

Roger Miller reported that if parking gates are installed, the yearly income from parking would be \$10,762 per 1,000 students, if each student were to pay 10¢ each time he parked. Night school and summer session students would also pay this fee. He also reported that: 1. this income would be used to remodel the visitor's bleachers on the football field; 2. Ken Hall residents would lose their reserved spaces; and 3. it was suggested by Mr. Forsythe that students purchase a \$10 parking permit each semester. S.R.J.C. police would enforce permit-parking regulations.

Roger could not make any suggestions for action because there is not enough information available to make a decision. He suggested that files be kept on each faculty committee so that information would be more accessible. Bob Reagan moved and Dave Chun seconded the motion that Roger make an official request to discover whether parking gates have already been ordered. The motion passed.

VII. Old Business

- a. Bike Guards for Evening College
Jerry Lamerrill was not present to make his presentation.
- b. Ecology Speaker Funds
This item was canceled, as it has not been possible to contact Mr. Burn.
- c. Agenda Sign
Several members of the cabinet felt that the sign posted next to the agenda asking that all agenda items be signed might be offensive to some students who may not wish to sign their names. It was decided that the sign should be rewritten, and that students need not be required to sign their agenda item.

VIII. New Business

- a. College Calendar - Proposed changes
The Clearing House Committee has requested response from CSA about the proposed calendar changes. The proposal involves converting to the early semester system. Michael Harris suggested that the proposal, which is several pages long, be summarized into one page for the convenience of the CSA members. It was also suggested that a special meeting be called for this proposal, so that SSA would not be rushed into making a decision. Bob Reagan will present the calendar proposal to CSA.
- b. From the Floor
There was no business from the floor.
- c. Coop
Greg Cosko suggested a change of atmosphere for the Coop; he suggested a casual corner with furniture that could take a beating. Janet Fesperman appointed a Coop committee, headed by Greg Cosko, to look into the Coop situation, including food, price and budget problems. The committee is to be approved by CSA.
- d. Bookstore
President Fesperman appointed a Bookstore committee to look into the Bookstore situation and propose changes.
- e. Day Care
President Fesperman appointed a Day Care committee to look into alternatives while waiting for approval of our Day Care application from the State. The committee, headed by Michael Harris, will not interfere with the work done by Judy Freedman or the present Day Care Committee. The new Day Care Committee and the Bookstore Committee are to be approved by CSA.
- f. Finance Report
Bob Reagan asked the Cabinet for funds to pay students to direct traffic in the main parking lots during the first two days of school. He suggested that four students work three hours each at \$1.95 per hour. A motion to this effect was made, seconded, and passed.
- g. Policy decision
It was decided that a new finance policy will be adopted by the Executive Cabinet: any requests for money made at an Executive Cabinet meeting will be considered, but voting on the request will be postponed for one week.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:10 p.m.

UNPRECEDENTED

Academic Senate Praises Students

In an unprecedented action, the Santa Rosa Junior College Academic Senate has congratulated the outgoing student government for "an unusually productive term of office."

In a letter addressed to the College Student Assembly, John Bigby, president of the Academic Senate, reported the Senate discussed at length progress made by the student government in many areas of concern.

Bigby's letter said the Senate felt the semester had contributed to "student involvement in governance . . . and the creation of a more amenable social and academic environment at SRJC."

Areas specifically mentioned included the bicycle compound, built at the behest of the Associated Students; the on-going planning for a child-care center; the continuing program of Student Project Grants; the proposed campus FM radio station; and the general awareness of the importance of social concern in an academic institution.

Bigby's letter concluded, . . .

"It was the unanimous wish of the members of the Academic Senate that we express to you all our admiration for work well done. As a result of your efforts, subsequent student governments should have both a model to follow in some important areas and a foundation on which to build for still more significant accomplishments."

Associated Students officers Fall semester included Joe Blackburn, president; Katherine McClure Grissett, executive vice president; Robert Matson, vice president; Mary Sue Fred-

ani, recording secretary; Diane Vlastos, corresponding secretary; Robert Reagan, finance commissioner; and Ron Edwards, assistant finance commissioner.

In addition, the Fall semester government also included representatives from the freshman and sophomore classes and a number of committee members.

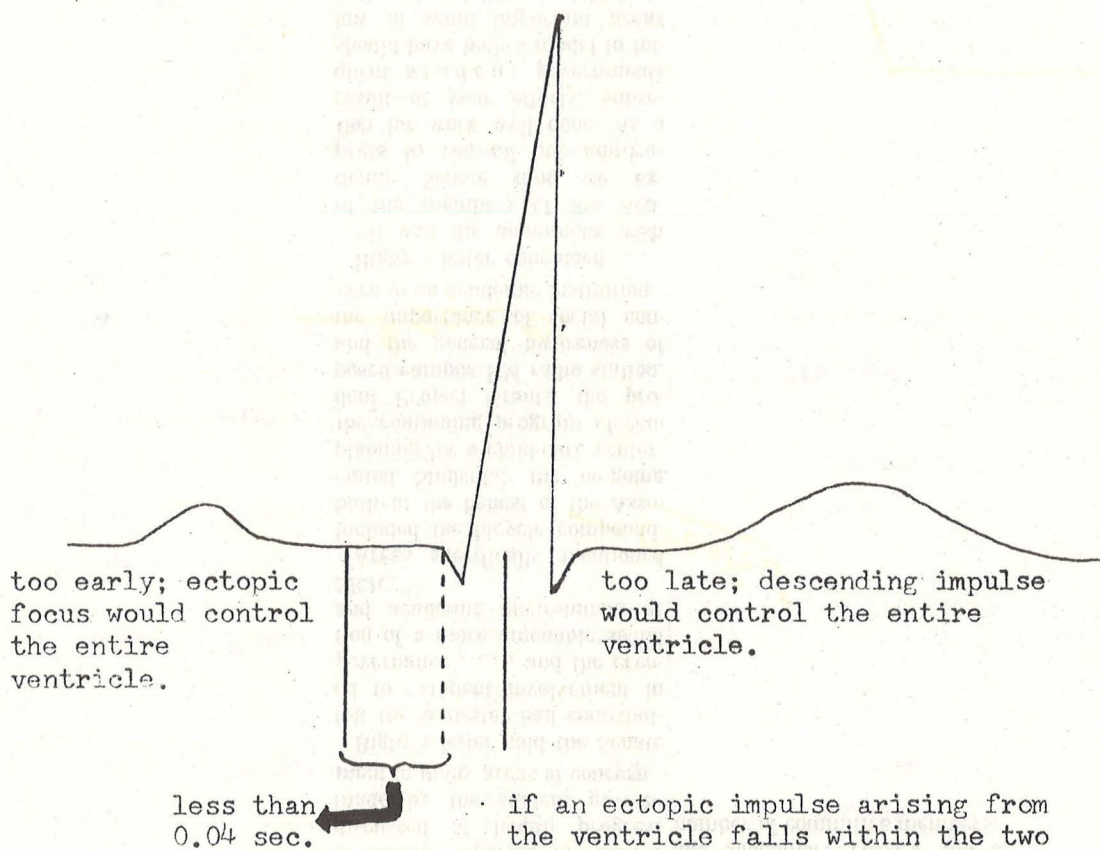

I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 3:25 by President Janet Fesperman.

II. Roll Call

Absent: Paquita Davis, Sharon LaRose, Diann Porter, Don Smith (resigned),
Dionisio Cisco Rio (resigned).

III. Approval of Agenda

Under New Business, item "g" was changed to item "a". The agenda was approved as changed.

Bob Reagan moved and Dave Chun seconded the motion to suspend rules in order to hear a presentation by Mr. D'Abbracci about the phone tax. Mr. D'Abbracci told the Assembly about the tax collected by the phone company which is used to support the war. He stated that anyone who objected to paying this tax could send the proper amount to a trust fund set up by The American Friends Service Committee instead. Dennis O'Malley moved and Dave Chun seconded the motion to redirect funds used to pay the phone tax of the Associated Students to the American Friends Service Committee. The motion passed.

IV. Approval of Minutes

The minutes of the final fall semester CSA meeting were approved as written.

V. Reports

a. Parliamentary Procedure

Michael Harris made a brief explanation to the Assembly about a few principals of parliamentary procedure.

b. Political Science Classes

Mr. Canevari told the Assembly about Political Science 50, which is one or more units of credit for joining CSA, and about Political Science 51, which is the Parliamentary Procedures class.

VI. Appointments

a. Bookstore Committee - Janet Fesperman appointed Bud Weyle to head the Bookstore Committee.

b. Cafeteria Committee - Greg Cosko has been appointed to head the Cafeteria Committee.

c. Day Care Committee - President Fesperman appointed Maureen McCallin and Kathy Baron to the Day Care Committee.

VI. Old Business

a. From the Floor

Robert Reagan announced a policy decision regarding requests for money-- any motion involving Associated Student money must be postponed for one week to allow sufficient time for discussion and decision.

VII. New Business

a. Communications Commissioner

Greg Cosko moved and Dennis O'Malley seconded the motion to create the position of Communications Commissioner. The duties would include acting as a communique between the College Student Assembly and the Executive Cabinet, explaining in detail some of the more complicated actions of the Assembly, and possibly publishing a newsletter, if the need arises. Editorialship of the newsletter would be up to the Communications Commissioner.

The motion passed.

b. The decision of whether or not to create the position of Switchboard Commissioner was postponed indefinitely.

c. Dave Chun moved and Bob Reagan seconded the motion that CSA co-sponsor the up-coming Book Fair with the December Coalition. The motion passed.

d. College Calendar

Bob Reagan moved and Dennis O'Malley seconded the motion to request that the Clearing House Committee postpone for one month the deadline for CSA to submit a response concerning the proposed calendar changes. The motion passed. It was suggested that the time be used for circulating an opinion survey to get the response of as many students as possible.

e. MAI Donation

Dennis O'Malley moved and Bob Reagan seconded the motion to donate \$5,000 to Medical Aid to Indo-China. The motion was postponed for one week.

f. MAI Committee

Dennis O'Malley requested that a MAI ad hoc committee be set up for the purpose of continuing to raise money for Medical Aid to Indo-China. President Fesperman appointed this committee.

g. Lettuce Boycott

Dave Chun read to the Assembly a letter that he planned to send to all Sonoma County Safeway Stores and the Oakland Safeway Store protesting the fact that Safeway does not carry UFW lettuce. The letter stated that students of the college would boycott Safeway unless UFW lettuce was carried. Dennis O'Malley moved and Greg Cosko seconded the motion to send the letter. The motion passed.

Dave read a second letter to be sent to the Press Democrat, Bugle, etc., announcing the stand that the College Student Assembly has taken on the lettuce issue. Bob Reagan moved and Greg Cosko seconded the motion that the letter be sent. The motion passed.

i. Air Force Recruiter

Dave Chun reported that Air Force recruiters will be in Bailey Hall this Wednesday. He suggested that CSA should try to either have the recruiters moved to a free speech area, or request that a table be set up at the same time and place as the recruiters, so that members of CSA and Vietnam Veterans Against the War could offer another alternative to students considering joining the service. Several motions to this effect were made and withdrawn. Greg Cosko moved and Glynn Andreasen seconded the motion to have Dennis O'Malley approach the administration with the above request. The motion passed.

j. From the Floor

Dave Chun moved and Bob Reagan seconded the motion to hold an

emergency meeting on Wednesday, Feb. 14, 3 p.m. in Conference Room 1.
The motion passed.

Jack Flores moved that CSA support the Brown Coalition in demanding that the city schools hire more minority people. Bob Reagan seconded the motion. The motion passed, and a letter will be written.

Parking - Roger Miller made the same parking report that he submitted to the Executive Cabinet.

VIII. The meeting was adjourned at 5:30

I have been given the responsibility to write you on behalf of the College Student Assembly.

We are concerned that there are U.S. Air Force Recruiters coming on campus Wednesday, February 7th. We have been told that these Recruiters will be in Bailey Hall, with a table, recruiting students.

We feel that Bailey Hall is a bad location for such activities as it is not a free speech area. We feel that the Military Forces are recruiting students under a pretense that is debatable and controversial. There are veterans on campus who feel compelled to relate their military experiences to students considering military service.

We feel they have the right to be present in the area of recruitment to do this. However, we also believe that they should not be allowed to interfere with the recruiters. If they are allowed the protection of appearing in an area where the opposing viewpoint will not be given the opportunity to express their concern, the recruiters will be faced with a long day of personal harassment by individuals. We feel they can be relieved of this by simply having them recruit in a free speech area.

We sincerely feel we are making this request in the best interest of all concerned.

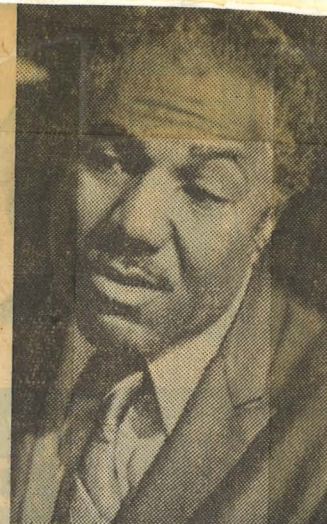

Day Care Fund Cut Protested

SACRAMENTO (UPI) —

State schools chief Wilson Riles has protested a proposed federal welfare cutback that he says will wipe out preschool day care for more than 30,000 California youngsters.

In a statement Wednesday, Riles said the new regulations planned by the Health, Education and Welfare Department would "end or drastically reduce" day care programs for children of poor families, migrant workers and college students.

The proposals would make certain children ineligible for day care and cut \$40 million earmarked for the state's preschool programs over the next 15 months, he said.

In a telegram to HEW Secretary Caspar Wienberger, Riles said the proposals "mock our efforts at both the federal and state levels to encourage hard-pressed and ambitiously responsible single parents to stay off the welfare roll."

Riles said the state would have to spend more than \$34 million a year to continue the day programs if it loses the federal money.

"If these regulations were written in the name of economy, they represent the falsest kind of economy," he declared. "They are false because they would cost all levels of government far more in the future than is being spent now for children of parents who are seeking to stay off welfare."

Each semester, a voting representative of the OAK LEAF is chosen by the advisor and editor of the OAK LEAF to serve as a representative to the College Student Assembly. The representative is approved by the Executive Cabinet of the CSA. As I was involved in this same position last semester, I was reappointed to the post.

Before I was appointed, the members of the Executive Cabinet put me through a political interrogation which lasted 15 minutes.

POLITICAL QUESTIONING

The first few questions were innocent enough, but I felt my peers would be hostile to whatever I said. My first assumption proved correct. Most of the questions, however, centered around my feelings on the Vietnam war and my views of amnesty. I told them how I felt, but felt a political motive behind the line of questioning. I immediately became angry because of the nature of the question, and said, "No, I am not in favor of amnesty, because then those that have died would have died in vain."

REPORTING OBJECTIVELY

I feel student government should be concerned with matters of importance to students on this campus, regardless of how they feel about Vietnam.

This wasn't the end, for as soon as that question was answered, one of the student officials asked me, "How can you report the meetings objectively if you don't agree with us politically?" That question went unanswered.

PAST EDITOR

Now I'd like to say, however, that I have served as editor of my hometown weekly paper this past summer, and became involved in one of the biggest political issues that town has ever seen. Both "sides" thought the story was fair, and from this I learned one does not have to be without opinion to write objectively. Accuracy and objective reporting are second nature to all good reporters.

They continued with other questions such as, "What do you feel is the function of the student activities advisor?" and "What is the function of the student government in relation to the administration?"

REQUEST DENIED

After letting everyone speak, from the floor and otherwise, several of the cabinet members objected to Diane Vlastos speaking because, they said, she was being paid to take the minutes of the meeting. Even though she was the elected secretary, she was an employee of the students and could not voice opinion as long as she was being paid. She asked to speak as one student to another, but was denied this request.

OPINIONS ELIMINATE

Several students were recognized from the floor, and told officials they were not being representative of all the students if they were trying to eliminate differing opinions.

The Associated Women Students (AWS) representative underwent a similar interrogation procedure. However, her reactions were not solicited on the Vietnam war and amnesty.

REPRESENTATIVE RESIGNS

This attack on me, personally, and on the OAK LEAF was, I feel, unnecessary, unprovoked, and undeserved. Therefore, because I feel I will not be able to play both politician and newsman, I hereby resign from my post as representative for the OAK LEAF, so that I may write stories about student government without prejudice.

Woman Liberationist! SRJC Student Body Has A Woman as President

By CELIA ERSLAND

"Somebody got involved in my life," says Janet (Mrs. Edward) Fesperman.

She is referring to the fact that she is no longer on the dark side of life. When she was a child and then an adolescent in New York City, she remembers, "I used to steal in the supermarkets because I was hungry. I had no home life. My mother drank. It was so unbearable that now I will not trust anyone who drinks more than one beer . . ."

Janet, her mother, a sister and two brothers emigrated from Puerto Rico when Janet was four years old. She only has one memory of her father: her mother chasing him with a broom.

"Mother was not able to take care of the family; I tried to support us." Janet left high school and drifted on the fringe of the drug scene.

Evil

"My 'teenage-hood' was such hell that I haven't gotten over it yet," she shudders, her huge dark eyes even darker with the remembered sorrows of an evil childhood.

But she is all right now, thanks to a child psychologist who met her at a youth center when she was 15.

Today Janet is the first person from an ethnic minority and the second woman to be elected

student body president in Santa Rosa Junior College history.

She was backed by the December Coalition, an "active group of students who looked into student government . . . got up the issues . . . interviewed people . . ."

Her eyes blazed and her tiny 95-pound frame seemed to vibrate with intensity as she added: "Some people think we're a bunch of crazy radicals. We're not. We just don't leave things up to the administration. They overlook students' needs . . . when we interviewed students, we found that they were most concerned because there is no child care . . . prices too high in the 'Coop' . . . and in the bookstore . . . milk is too expensive, too. . . ."

Art Book

"You want to hear what happened to me last semester? I was given a list of books; I went to our bookstore here on campus. One art book I needed was \$30. Thirty dollars! That's a lot of money for me, so I went over to Sonoma State to the Cosack Book Store. The exact same book was \$10."

She sighed, her eyes brooding beneath her "natural," her five-foot-one figure hunched over her desk. (Her headquarters as student body president

Demonstration

"Then one day it was Demonstration Day . . . I was standing in a store with my baby in my arms . . . I looked up the street and there was a mob coming, throwing bottles, stones . . . the men in the store pushed me out . . .

"I begged them to let me stay in there, but they pushed me out and shut the door . . . I slipped and fell, and Renee bumped her head. I felt unreal. We decided that we had to find a little shack in Sebastopol."

They did, although it was held together with "toothpicks and Scotch Tape." No local insurance company would insure it, so the Fespermans have a policy with Lloyds of London.

"We were severely duped," she frowned, her mouth drooping at the corners.

"But another thing that made me decide to go back to school was realizing that I have a daughter. . . I don't want her to wash floors. . ." She hugged Renee, who is four and who played in the cubicle while we talked.

Child Care

"We need a child care center here at the JC," she said again. "There is one for training students, but you have to put your baby's name on a waiting list before it's born. Anyway, it's very rigid. . . I would not do that to my worst enemy (send anyone to it)."

Janet feels a responsibility to younger people because of her own "salvation" from delinquency.

She was sinking into apathy and anger when she happened to go to a youth center in New York. "I didn't understand. . . I thought, 'Everything is bad. . . I'm hungry. . .'" I met Dr. Iris Bruel. . . I fought her. . . but then I began to change. She adopted me and I lived with her till I was 18. . . she's proud of me now!"

She worked as a volunteer for a drug abuse program in Harlem. "Another thing that inspired me was losing half of my friends in high school to drugs."

And she continues to work with people — she was a volunteer for The House and now she is going to have a radio program in Spanish and English for a new bilingual radio station.

"Mexicans make me miss my family," she said. "They have a language problem. . . the Chicanos can't cope with the language. . . Blacks are okay now. . ."

"I've always considered myself Black," she said "I call myself a Black Latin. . ."

A major in Ethnic Arts, Janet is taking 18 units and stopped for a moment to praise one of her teachers, Elizabeth Bell, who has a class in the Evening College in English.

"She guides you into writing and is careful with her comments. She gets totally into your work. Another thing is that I've gotten to like the older people who come to night class. I used to stereotype people; now I see that some older people feel very strongly about things. . ."

Some of her woodcuts hang on the walls of her little office. They are West Indian in motif — very fine, I thought, and I asked what other hobbies or interests she had.

She rocked curly haired Renee in her lap and laughed.

"One thing I'd like to say. I don't get a salary. . . we voted on no salary for student government. Do you know that at Chico State the president got \$550? That is cor-rupt-ion!" She sort of sang out that last word like an old time minister might do in a sermon.

"It's an act of love to work for the student body," she continued. "I want people to come in with problems and suggestions. . ."

Because she spoke often of her role as a woman, I asked if she were a Woman's Liberationist.

She raised her arm, fist clenched, and with a merry laugh she cried, "I consider myself a Human Liberationist! I want to liberate everything — women, dogs, civil rights. . ."

re in the Student Activities Office of Doyle Center.)

"One of the things we're trying to have is a woman's survival center, where women students can talk to other women . . . you really feel alienated when you come back to school after a long time . . ."

Janet, who is 27, was "10 years out of school. At 18 I wasn't ready for college . . . I joined the Civil Rights Movement . . . the reason I'm at school today is that I'm not going to let a man be responsible for me for the rest of my life!"

Computer Programmer

But she speaks lovingly of her husband, a composer who works as a computer programmer for Singer Sewing Co.

"His name is Edward Lee Fesperman and he's from Birmingham, Ala. I met him at a trike party in New York . . . he's Scotch-Irish . . . we've been married six years — I'll be married 60 years to him . . . he has helped me grow . . . has never oppressed me and I'm free to do what I wish . . . a marvelous father . . ."

They came to California because they were "totally unable to cope with the filth in New York."

They tried living in the Haight Ashbury in San Francisco. "I saw the Summer of Love here — it was really the Summer of Drugs. Upper middle-class kids rebelling against their parents . . . I remember that I was pregnant, and I went to visit a friend . . . they (some middle class white kids) were making 'Nigger jokes.'

"I talked to my husband about it and we decided, 'There's no solid feeling here'; we moved over to Berkeley and lived there three years."

SRJC Opens Day Care Center

A day care center for children of parents attending classes at Santa Rosa Junior College began operation today.

The Student Activities Office said the opening culminates months of effort by students and SRJC staff members. The federally-funded program will utilize space at the First Congregational Church, Mendocino Avenue and Silva Street, three blocks from the campus.

Director of the Center is Judy Freedman, a credentialed elementary school teacher, who did much of the ground work on

the project. She will be assisted by other paid staff members as well as volunteers.

The center is being financed at least through June by Title 4-A funds made available through the state government. Low cost, and no cost, care will be offered for infants and children, aged 3 months through 6 years. The program will include snacks, play and creative activities, lunch, and rest periods.

Priority will be given to single parent families, as well as current, former, or potential, welfare recipients.

Parents able to pay will be asked to do so on a sliding scale, based on their income. According to Mrs. Freedman, the high end of the scale will be \$1.25 an hour, with most parents probably paying less.

Initially the center will be open from 7:45 p.m. until 4:15 p.m., Monday through Friday, when school is in session.

The Congregational Church is providing at no cost, other than utilities, three classrooms, an outdoor play area, and the use of a kitchen.

The center will have a capacity of 19 older children at a time, and six infants. There will be no maximum number of hours that any child may use the facility, but the center will try to accommodate class schedules of individual parents.

Parents will be asked to volunteer several hours a week to provide assistance with the operation of the center. Those that participate can receive credit under a Social Science 51 program at the school.

Operation of the center will be

under the direction of a board of directors, which will include a representative of the church, an SRJC faculty member, a representative of the Associated Students, and four parents using the center. All parents with children enrolled will be voting members of the non-profit organization operating the program.

Interested parents, who have small children and are attending SRJC, may contact the student Activities Office in the Doyle Student Center for further information.



Students Will Get Legal Service

Santa Rosa Junior College students will now have a source of free legal advice on campus.

At its Monday session, the board of trustees authorized the student government to enter into a contract with Terry Curtis, an attorney and political science instructor, to provide the service to students two hours per week at noontime.

The program, which will be evaluated this summer, is designed to give students guidance. Functions will be limited.

In other action this week the SRJC board of trustees:

—Toured Pioneer Hall and decided to formally accept the renovation project and file a notice of completion. The facilities will be ready for use as soon as

the furniture and fixtures are ready. Two-thirds of the building will now be used as a bookstore and the remainder will house student activities offices and related facilities.

—Was informed that the new swim complex would be ready for use next Tuesday. The naming of the facility was discussed and two suggested names were those of former trustees N. Warne Lark and Dr. Robert Quinn.

—Heard a report from Eugene Canevari on the child care center which goes into operation today at the First Congregational Church. Funded by the state, the center will provide daytime care for children whose parents are attending classes at SRJC. It will operate through the semester.

—Heard a report on meetings with Sonoma County officials relative to use of the Los Guilucos School site.

—Received from John Bigby and Jean Yates a resolution from the Academic Senate which calls for the renovation of Analy Hall to serve as an art department facility.

—Authorized the establishment of a revolving fund to provide books on a loan system to needy students not on the EOP program or receiving financial aid. The program will be set up through the COIL (Center of Independent Learning;) center. Turned down were two student suggestions, one for using special reserve funds to purchase books for needy students and the other for a 20 per cent reduction in book store prices. However, it was pointed out that profits from the book store are pledged to pay off the bonded indebtedness of Pioneer Hall.

—Authorized spending \$1,600 to purchase detection-monitoring equipment in the audio-visual section of the Plover Library.

—Discussed but took no action on the recently-completed English Department evaluation. All agreed it was a valuable report.

—Took no action on a proposal from Jack Perella to spend \$2,400 to send a five-member team to the national forensic competition in Tennessee.

—Accepted the 1971-72 audit report prepared by Roy F. Mitchell & Associates.

We, the Brown students of Santa Rosa Junior College, have asked to be placed on the agenda of the Board of Trustees because we feel that there is a very pressing need and the board should be made aware of this need. Due to certain changes made by Financial Aids, Brown students are no longer eligible for monies from EOG and BIA. Also, students who may qualify for said monies that registered late may not receive any money until possibly mid-semester.

The need is one of books for classes, without certain text books students are falling behind and therefore becoming discouraged and dropping out. What we are asking this board for is an immediate solution to the problem. We have spoken to Dr. Mikalson about a revolving book fund. He saw the need and felt it was a real one. In a conversation with the Student Finance Committee, they totally agreed that the need for books for our students was as pressing as the need for the Child Day Care Center.

We are not asking for district funds if they are not available but we are sure that certain affluent members of the community would be willing to contribute money towards our revolving book fund. With proper publicity through both your contacts as well as our own we are certain that this must come about immediately.

If you as board members are apathetic to this situation, you are surely encouraging more Brown student drop-outs!

As part of our evaluation of student services the College Student Assembly and other concerned groups have been studying the operation of the bookstore and its effect on the students of Santa Rosa Junior College. Inasmuch as the problem of too little space for books has already been resolved by the rebuilding of Pioneer Hall our major area of concern is now with the price of books and their availability to low-income and marginal income students. Although we had not planned on approaching you this soon the situation has become so urgent that we ask that immediate attention be given to our request. There are many students who are unable to buy the books needed for their classes. What this means is that some students have to go without books (and risk flunking out of school), or as the case sometimes is, the necessary books are ripped off. Also, a significant number of students are unable to borrow books for the entire semester. With the philosophy that books are an absolute essential to present-day education we ask that the Santa Rosa Junior College District Board of Trustees adopt the following policy:

1. Authorize withdrawal of funds from special reserve (or other appropriate fund) to be used to purchase books for low-income and marginal-income students. Administration could be through the Assistant Dean of Students and the library or the Center of Independent Learning.
2. authorize a twenty percent reduction of prices in the bookstore.

Female Hitchhikers — Windfall for Rapists, Molesters

There's no doubt about it.

A woman who hitchhikes is playing a dangerous game of Russian roulette.

Some are lucky. It could only amount to a proposition, and perhaps some liberties with the woman.

Others have been badly beaten, had their clothes ripped or taken away, raped and dumped somewhere.

In a sense, they're lucky, too. They got away with their lives.

Then there are the unfortunates. They never get home. Days, weeks or months later, their nude bodies are found in some secluded roadside.

This sort of thing happens everywhere, including right here at home.

Any woman who has hitchhiked to any extent can tell you what misfortunes they've experienced.

For many women, perhaps, it's hard to imagine that something like this will happen to them — or they think they can handle a situation if it arise — so they keep on hitching.

Kim Wendy Allen wasn't afraid to hitchhike: neither was Jeannette Kamahale.

Not long ago, a rapist had to put in some effort to find a victim. He had to break into a home, snatch a woman from the street or a park at night, or accost one who'd just left a bar with too much to drink.

Female hitchhikers are a windfall for rapists and molesters. What a bonanza for them!

Last year in Sonoma County, 50 rapes were reported to the sheriff's office alone. That's an average of one a week, mostly hitchhikers.

The situation reaches epidemic proportions when you consider that the majority of rapes, molestations or attempts are never reported.

Case in point is a current attempt rape case where the suspect has admitted to more than a dozen rape tries on hitchhiking women in the last few months. Only in one case — the one which resulted in his arrest — was there an official reported to authorities.

There's a lot of "creeps" lurking out there. A quick look at the sheriff's ledger, upon which "mentally disordered sex offenders" are registered, will alarm you.

Let's look at some of the rapes or attempts in the last few years. Mind you, these are only a few of them.

May 17, 1968 — Two young women were hitchhiking in western Sonoma County when two young men picked them up. After a brief ride both were savagely raped and one suffered a serious head injury and hospitalized when she jumped from the car.

Sept. 8, 1968 — A 20-year-old woman was hitchhiking with a male companion in the Santa Rosa area. They were picked up by two young men and driven to the Mark West Springs area, where the male was dumped over an embankment. The two men took the woman in their car and one raped her in the back seat as they drove around, dropping her off in east Santa Rosa.

Dec. 28, 1969 — A 58-year-old woman was accosted in the B Street parking lot in Santa Rosa in the early morning hours, forced into her own auto and raped.

Sept. 5, 1970 — A 17-year-old Oregon girl was hitchhiking with two male companions and given a ride to Sonoma County. The two men were forced out of the car and the girl taken to the Mark West Springs area, viciously beaten, raped and subjected to acts of sexual perversion.

Oct. 3, 1970 — Brenda Howard, 20, Santa Rosa, was walking from downtown Santa Rosa to her home on Dutton Avenue late at night. She was picked up by Kenneth B. Comstock, raped and stabbed to death north of Petaluma. Comstock was given

Dec. 4, 1970 — An 18-year-old Sonoma State College co-ed accepted a ride while hitchhiking at Steele Lane and Highway 101. She was driven to the access road off of Wilfred Avenue and raped at gunpoint. The suspect then dropped her off at her apartment in Cotati.

March 24, 1971 — A 13-year-old runaway girl was hitchhiking in the Santa Rosa area during the day and was picked up by a middle-aged man in a Cadillac. She was driven to a secluded spot on the Healdsburg-Trenton Road area, stripped naked and raped.

May 19, 1971 — A 19-year-old Berkeley woman accepted a ride with a man in a white camper pickup truck in the Santa Rosa area. Although the woman pulled a knife when the man ~~was~~ **was going to rape her,** the man overpowered her and did rape her. She jumped out of the truck later on Guerneville Road.

Aug. 3, 1971 — A 55 year-old San Francisco woman was driving from Guerneville to the coast when a young man in a pickup truck forced her off the road near Jenner. The man forced his way into the women's car, raped her and robbed her.

Sept. 19, 1971 — A 26-year-old Guerneville woman was walking across the Guerneville Bridge at night. She was abducted by two young men and driven to Mays Canyon Road where she was

raped by both men who left her at the crime scene.

Nov. 5, 1971 — A 17-year-old Sonoma State College coed was on her way home from school when her car broke down. A

man offered to drive her home, but instead took her to the Rio Nido area where he disrobed and tried to rape her. The man fled and the girl was left unharmed when her screams brought residents from their homes.

Jan. 10, 1972 — A 16-year-old Petaluma girl was walking at night in East Petaluma when she was kidnaped by a young

man, but she was able to leap from the car when it slowed to make a turn and she escaped unharmed.

Jan. 29, 1972 — A young woman was hitchhiking at night in

the Petalume area and picked up by three young men, who beat, stripped and raped her, then threatened to kill her if she reported it. She reported it and

one suspect was arrested. The suspect, identified as Robert Antonio Lopez, jumped bail on March 16, 1972, and is still at large.

FEB. 4, 1972 — Maureen Sterling, 12, and Yvonne Weber, 14, were dropped off at the Redwood Empire Ice Arena in the early evening. Later, they either accepted a

ride from someone or were abducted. Their skeletal remains, with no evidence of clothing, were found 10 months later, Dec. 28, 1972, over an embankment on

Franz Valley Road.

MARCH 4, 1972 — Kim Wendy Allen was on her way home to Santa Rosa from her job in Marin County. She was last seen hitchhiking at Bell

Avenue in San Rafael in the afternoon. The next day, two boys found her body — tortured, strangled and raped — over an embankment on Enterprise Road.

March 13, 1972 — An 18-year-old Sonoma State College co-ed was walking from Cotati to the college early in the evening. She was accosted near the college by a young man with a

APRIL 26, 1972—J cannette Kamahale was hitchhiking from Cotati to a class at Santa Rosa Junior College. A man in a pickup truck with a home-made c a m p e r picked her up. She has never been heard of since.

May 28, 1972 — A 24-year-old Santa Rosa woman was on her way home about 2 a.m. in her car when a man in a pick-up truck forced her off the road near Larkfield and Highway 101. The man got into her car, drove to a secluded spot and raped her.

July 14, 1972 — A 21-year-old Petaluma woman was abducted in downtown Petaluma at night, driven to Salmon Creek and raped. A suspect was arrested and his trial is pending.

July 21, 1972 — A 21-year-old woman was hitchhiking in the Guerneville area and picked up by a young man in a Volkswagen. She was taken to Green Valley Road and raped at kni-

Aug. 1, 1972 — Two Novato girls, 14 and 15, were hitchhiking in Guerneville, picked up by the same man in the Volkswagen, taken to Green Valley Road, raped and subjected to sexual indignities. The man was arrested and sent to Atascadero State Hospital.

Aug. 5, 1972 — An 18-year-old girl accepted a ride from four teenaged boys. They took her to a home on South Wright Road where they stripped her and one of them raped her while three of them held her down. She escaped and ran naked to a nearby home.

Sept. 30, 1972 — A 19-year-old girl was riding her bike near the Sonoma County Fairgrounds when a man stopped, pointed a shotgun, said he was going to rape her and demanded she get into his car. The girl talked her way out of it and the man fled.

Oct. 25, 1972 — A 17-year-old girl was hitchhiking on Sonoma Avenue and picked up by a man in a yellow car who drove her behind St. Eugene's Church. The girl pulled a knife, but the man overpowered her, stripped and raped her.

Oct. 28, 1972 — An 18-year-old girl was walking on Frazier Street, near Petaluma Hill Road, when she was forced into a car with four young men. They got her in the back seat, cut away her blouse with a knife and one of the men raped her while driving in the area.

Nov. 22, 1972 — A 24-year-old Rio Nido woman accepted a ride from a young man in a 1956 red Volvo. The man drove her to Martinelli Road where he started tearing her blouse in an alleged attempt to rape her. The woman jumped out of the car and ran for help. The young man has been arrested and his trial is pending.

NOV. 30, 1972 — Lori Kursa, 13, was last seen on this date after having run away from home several weeks earlier. On Dec. 14, 1972, her nude body was found over an embankment on the Calistoga Grade, overlooking Rincon Valley. She died of neck injury.

Again, these are only a few of the many similar incidents that have been reported to authorities.

Many of these women could have avoided their ordeals had they found other modes of transportation, assuming they were available.

In a number of cases that were reported, suspects were arrested.

What happened to these men in the courts is another story.

COLLEGE STUDENT ASSEMBLY BOOK LOAN ASSOCIATION

They got her in the back seat,
cut away her blouse with a
knife and one of the men raped
her while driving in the area.

Nov. 22, 1972 — A 24-year-old
Rio Nido woman accepted a
ride from a young man in a 1956
red Volvo. The man drove her
to Martinelli Road where he
started tearing her blouse in an
alleged attempt to rape her.
The woman jumped out of the
car and ran for help. The young
man has been arrested and his
trial is pending.

NOV. 30, 1972 — Lori Kurs,
13, was last seen on this date
after having run away from
home several weeks earlier.
On Dec. 14, 1972, her nude
body was found over an em-
bankment on the Calistoga
Grade, overlooking R i n c o n
Valley. She died of neck inju-
ry.

Again, these are only a few of
the many similar incidents that
have been reported to authori-
ties.

Many of these women could
have avoided their ordeals had
they found other modes of trans-
portation, assuming they were
available.

In a number of cases that
were reported, suspects were
arrested.

What happened to these men
in the courts is another story.

I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 3:20 by President Desperman.

II. Roll Call

Absent were Jack Flores, Monnica O'Grady, Paul Howard, Diann Porter, Sharon LaRose, Michael Schwartz, Mike Mullin, and Stan Sloan.

III. Approval of Agenda

Item #1 under Old Business was postponed one week. The agenda was approved as changed.

Bob Reagan moved and Dennis O'Malley seconded the motion to suspend the rules in order to hear a presentation by the Y-Riders. At the end of the presentation, the Y-Riders asked for a donation of \$375 to pay for the insurance for their bikes. The request will be considered by the Finance Committee.

IV. Approval of Minutes

The minutes were approved as written.

V. Reports

a. Bill Unkel presented a letter addressed to the Assembly from the Student Affairs Committee asking the Assembly to support enforcement of the animal control laws on campus. Bob Reagan moved and Bill Sonnenschein seconded the motion that CSA support enforcement of animal control laws. The motion failed.

b. Finance Committee - Paquita Davis reported that the Student Finance Committee recommended the following budget cuts: Handbooks, Calendars- ; Insurance Premiums- \$1,000; FM Radio- \$450; Student Conferences- . Dennis O'Malley moved and Dave Chun seconded the motion to approve the proposed cuts. Bill Sonnenschein moved and Bob Reagan seconded the motion to postpone this for one week. The motion passed.

c. Glynn Andreasen reported that he discussed with Dr. Dougan the possibility of cutting the number of Bear Facts distributed from 2,000 to 1,500, provided that some Bear Facts are posted around the campus. Dr. Dougan was in favor of this. Bob Reagan moved and Dave Chun seconded the motion to do this. The motion passed.

d. Bob Reagan read a letter from the Women's Survival Center. The letter explained what services the Center would provide and requested space, a full-time paid co-ordinator, and a budget of \$2700. Dave Chun moved and Bob Reagan seconded the motion to support the proposal. The Motion passed.

d. From the Floor

Fred Samia moved and Bill Sonnenschein seconded the motion that the Assembly send to the Administration a statement on the standing of CSA regarding military recruitment on campus. A poll would be taken to find out students' feelings about military recruitment on campus. The motion passed.

IX. The meeting was adjourned at 5:00 p.m.

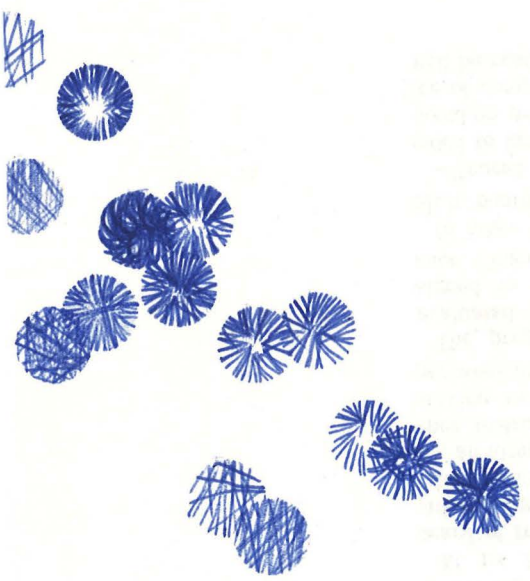

This proposal concerns the opening of Kent Hall to all students. If accepted, each apartment would be divided by sexes on a first-come-first-serve basis. The program would begin in the fall of the 1973-1974 school year. All residents of Kent Hall would have to understand that this is a pilot project, and that they would be subject to any changes or decisions the Board of Trustees might make.

An evaluation of the project, by the Kent Hall Council, would be made in the spring of 1974.



Students Will Get Legal Service

Santa Rosa Junior College students will now have a source of free legal advice on campus.

At its Monday session, the board of trustees authorized the student government to enter into a contract with Terry Curtis, an attorney and political science instructor, to provide the service to students two hours per week at noontime.

The program, which will be evaluated this summer, is designed to give students guidance. Functions will be limited.

In other action this week the SRJC board of trustees:

—Toured Pioneer Hall and decided to formally accept the renovation project and file a notice of completion. The facilities will be ready for use as soon as

the furniture and fixtures are ready. Two-thirds of the building will now be used as a bookstore and the remainder will house student activities offices and related facilities.

—Was informed that the new swim complex would be ready for use next Tuesday. The naming of the facility was discussed and two suggested names were those of former trustees N. Warne Lark and Dr. Robert Quinn.

—Heard a report from Eugene Canevari on the child care center which goes into operation today at the First Congregational Church. Funded by the state, the center will provide daytime care for children whose parents are attending classes at SRJC. It will operate through the semester.

—Heard a report on meetings with Sonoma County officials relative to use of the Los Guilucos School site.

—Received from John Bigby and Jean Yates a resolution from the Academic Senate which calls for the renovation of Analy Hall to serve as an art department facility.

—Authorized the establishment of a revolving fund to provide books on a loan system to needy students not on the EOP program or receiving financial aid. The program will be set up through the COIL (Center of Independent Learning) center. Turned down were two student suggestions, one for using special reserve funds to purchase books for needy students and the other for a 20 per cent reduction in book store prices. However, it was pointed out that profits from the book store are pledged to pay off the bonded indebtedness of Pioneer Hall.

—Authorized spending \$1,600 to purchase detection-monitoring equipment in the audio-visual section of the Plover Library.

—Discussed but took no action on the recently-completed English Department evaluation. All agreed it was a valuable report.

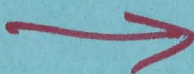
—Took no action on a proposal from Jack Perella to spend \$2,400 to send a five-member team to the national forensic competition in Tennessee.

(We choose these hours purposely in order that women wih no place to go between afternoon and evening classes can use the Center, especially because of the hitchhiking/transportation difficulties.) At \$2.20/hour, this staffings salary would be approximately \$380/month.
4. A budget. Besides salaries, we would have certain incidental expenses such as duplicating and telephone, which would be carefully monitored by staff to prevent abuse. These expenses might amount to another \$200 or so. per month, so we request a total budget for the Center of approximately \$2700 per semester.

A MORE EFFECTIVE CSA?

During the student body election campaign the December Coalition for Action promised students that we would make government responsible to the students and that we would work to make students more aware of student government. We ran on a platform of making significant, actual changes in the way that student government is conducted. Since gaining the entire ~~the~~ slate of elected officials we might not have proven ourselves to be "think-alike, do-alikes", but we have been working and we have been doing the things we thought are important. But has as much been done as possible with the amount of energy and talent that we have? Has the student body been made as much aware of what is happening as is possible? My opinion is that we are not doing the job that we are capable of doing. My suggestion is this:

1. Hold formal CSA meetings on every other Monday rather than on every Monday. This will allow agendas and minutes to be distributed to students so that they will be able to keep up with what we are doing
2. Hold CSA standing committee meetings on alternate Mondays as work and training sessions. Proposals can then be brought out among a smaller group concerned with a particular problem.
3. Proposals which are submitted to the College Student Assembly for action should ~~XXXX~~ be accompanied by a recommendation from a subordinate CSA body such as Executive Cabinet or a committee.

While these changes might slow us down at first, they will make whatever action we take stronger because ~~we~~ we will have done it ourselves.

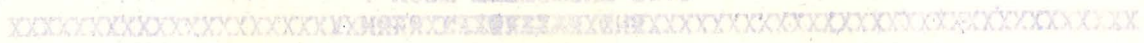

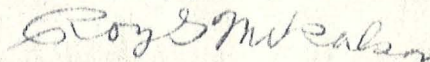
Dear Ms. Fesperman:

"We've washed our hands of the problem," said Greg Cosko, Executive Vice President of CSA, after the College Student Assembly failed to pass a motion supporting reinforcement of animal control on campus.

"If county people come in, we should protest against this bureaucratic and judicial garbage," countered Bill Sonnenschein, Communications Commissioner.

This discussion and digressions consumed about half of Monday's regular CSA meeting.

During the discussion, ASB President Janet Fesperman commented that, "Dogs are fed and treated better than some of us humans. I feel we should be as responsible for our dogs as we are for ourselves."

In other actions, CSA:

... accepted a Finance Committee proposal for cuts to bal-

ance the present budget, cutting \$1400 out of handbooks and calendars, \$1000 from hospital insurance premiums, \$450 from the FM radio station, and \$119 from the student conference fees.

... reduced the number of Bear Facts from 2000 to 1500.

... adopted a proposal to open Kent Hall housing to all students, at the suggestion of April Williams and Kathy Lazarus.

... heard a presentation by the YMCA, dealing with a donation towards insurance for a motor-bike rider program. Glen Andersen asked the youths who gave the report if the YMCA couldn't find some other outlet that would not create pollution, suggesting work to better the environment. The YMCA asked for a total of \$375.

President Fesperman left during the middle of the meeting, as she has done during the previous two CSA meetings.

The following procedure is to be followed for all positions termed "management" by the Board of Trustees, with the exception of the Superintendent/President. The process of filling the Superintendent/President position will be established by the Board of Trustees with consultation with the campus community.

WRITING OR REVISING JOB DESCRIPTION

When an administrative position is vacated or is created, the supervisor of that position will, in consultation with the president, prepare an up-dated job description.

POSITION ANALYSIS

A committee will be established for each administrative position to be filled. It will be an ad hoc committee which will be dissolved as soon as it has fulfilled its functions. The primary committee will consist of three faculty members appointed by the Academic Senate and three administrators, one of whom will be the supervisor of the position, appointed by the president.

This primary committee will review the job description and needs for the position as outlined by the position supervisor and the president. This primary committee will then recommend to the president that the position be filled, and at what level, or not be filled. The president will then convey the committee's written recommendation along with his own, if different, to the Board of Trustees, who will make the final decision.

SEARCH AND SCREENING

The composition of the search and screening committee is at this point determined by the president after consulting with the Academic Senate president, the CSEA president, and the Student Body president to determine if classified employees and students are to be added to the committee's original composition. If classified and/or students are added, the committee will be composed of three faculty, three administrators, two classified and/or two students.

The first meeting of the committee will be called by the administrator designated by the president as the temporary chairman. At the first meeting a regular chairman will be selected by the committee.

1. The search and screening committee will make recommendations on the following:
 - a. Extent of advertising for the position: campus, local, statewide, nationwide.

March 5, 1973
Meeting #5

I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 3:20 by President Fesperman.

II. Roll Call

Absent were: Paquita Davis, Christine Trouette, Bente Mitchell, Barbara Smith, Vern Baxter, and Lorraine Fleming.

III. Approval of Agenda

Under Old Business, item "b" was postponed one week, and item "h" Book Loan, was added. Under reports, a report by Dave Chun ("b") was added; a parking report ("c") by Mark Caro was also added. Item "d" Student Project Grants Changes was added under New Business. An item concerning Oak Leaf editorial policy was added. "W-C" was added to take care of some motions left from the previous Executive Cabinet meeting. The agenda was approved as changed.

IV. Approval of Minutes

The minutes were approved as written.

VI-A. CSA Meeting Change

Michael Harris proposed the following:

1. That CSA meet on alternate Mondays;
2. That on those Mondays when CSA does not meet, the designated time be used for workshop meetings and training;
3. That any proposal to CSA must go through the Executive Cabinet or a CSA subcommittee. It was pointed out that these bodies could not veto an item, or prevent it from being brought up at an Assembly meeting. Fred Samia moved and Dave Chun seconded the motion that CSA adopt this proposal with the provision that the members of the Assembly meet every Monday, and then split into the separate meetings on the alternate Mondays. The motion passed.

VI-C. Bob Reagan discussed the four motions he had brought up at the previous Executive Cabinet meeting. He withdrew the motions from the agenda, to be brought up next week.

It was asked if any Associated Student funds go directly to the Assistant Student Activities Advisor. Mr. Canevari replied that no Associated Student funds go directly to the salary; indirectly, a portion of student funds goes to the district. It is the district that apportions some of these funds to the Assistant's salary.

Bob Reagan restated three of his motions (the one concerning the report was omitted), which were seconded by Dave Chun. The motions were postponed until next week.

Bill Sonnenschein moved and Dennis O'Malley seconded the motion to suspend the agenda to hear the Oak Leaf editorial policy. The motion passed.

Oak Leaf Rep Greg Voral stated the Oak Leaf Cree, and then questioned who returned several hundred copies of the Oak Leaf to the Journalism Office. It was stated that the three students who did so, did it as a peaceful protest against allegedly biased coverage of Assembly meetings. There was much discussion concerning the validity of the act, and of the

accusation of bias made against the Oak Leaf.

Fred Samia moved to condemn the three members of the Assembly who took the Oak Leafs. It was pointed out that the students were not acting in behalf of CSA. The motion failed. It was announced that there would be an advisory meeting at 1 p.m. tomorrow in the Journalism Office.

V. Reports

- a. Dave Chun reported that there will be an Environmental Fair April 27 in front of the Coop.
- b. Dave Chun made a speech praising the Coalition and student government, and listing the achievements of the government this semester.
- c. Dave Chun moved and Fred Samia seconded a motion that only the Activities Advisor, the ASB President, and the Accounts Manager be given private offices; and that the allocation of additional space be recommended by the Executive Cabinet and approved by CSA. It was pointed out that the building does not belong to the Associated Students, but to the district. The motion is to be discussed further and voted upon next week.
- d. Parking - The following has been passed by the Parking Committee:
 1. The proposed purchase of parking gates was suspended;
 2. The present parking fee was revised: the first 2 tickets are to be \$3 each, and thereafter \$5 each--effective April 2, 1973. Strict enforcement of tow-away zones is to be implemented. The office of Dean of Students is to be requested to discipline students for three or more outstanding tickets during the school year. Mark Caro, who gave the report, also noted that the administration has been considering a flat parking fee, and will probably set one next semester.

VI. d. Bob Reagan moved and Dennis O'Malley seconded the motion that the budget cuts proposed at the last CSA meeting be made (Insurance Premiums - \$1,000; FM Radio - \$450; and cut the rest of the funds for Handbooks Account and Student Conferences Account) The motion passed.

VII-a. Bob Reagan moved that the present Student Project Grant Guidelines be amended. The amendments are attached. Dennis O'Malley seconded the motion; the motion passed.

Bob Reagan moved and Dennis O'Malley seconded the motion that the application acceptance period be opened Thursday, to last two weeks. The motion passed.

VI. F. Hyde Park Code Amendments.

Fred Samia moved that certain changes be made in the Hyde Park Code. The overall effect of the changes would be to increase the freedom of students to use the facilities, and to lift certain limitations. The motion passed. The changes must now be approved by the Dean of Students.

VI. h. Revolving Book Fund

The student Finance Committee will meet again to work on this issue. The committee is trying to find other funds within the budget that can be used for the book fund, so that funds from the frozen reserve need not be used. Jack Flores reported that the Brown Coalition will go out and solicit funds for this project.

The meeting adjourned at 5:30 p.m.

Award Fields

Community College Awards are presented in four general academic fields:

- Business
- Science-Engineering
- Social Science-Humanities
- Technical-Vocational

College Winners

College winners are selected by faculty committees which ideally will include representatives from each of the award fields and the Dean of Student Activities. Each college may select one student for each award field.

Requirements

1. The student's career ambitions and area of academic concentration should coincide with the general field in which the award is to be given.
2. Candidates selected must be full time students carrying a minimum of 12 units per semester and should have earned college credits of not less than 36 nor more than 70 units leading to an Associate of Arts degree. Candidates attending colleges on the quarter system should have earned not less than 48 nor more than 105 quarter units leading to an Associate of Arts degree.
3. The student must have an overall grade point average of 3.0, based on a 4.0 scale.

Note: Selection of valid candidates as College Winners is of paramount importance, especially in the Technical-Vocational field. Students following this course of study often do not continue their advanced education at four-year colleges or universities. Thus, the Community College Awards, in many cases, is the last opportunity for such students to receive the recognition they deserve for their Technical and Vocational accomplishments. We therefore ask that great care be exercised in the selection of legitimate college winners in this category to insure an equitable and proper distribution of awards.

4. Candidates should have a record of active participation and leadership in co-curricular activities during their four semesters at the college. Employment during this period also should be given proper consideration.
5. Schools should submit the following information for each College Winner:
 - a. College Transcript of Grades
 - b. Activities Record and Dean's Supporting Statement

THE TWO PROGRAMS

- 3) A Student Project Grant for a single project may not exceed \$300; and, if the committee feels the need for monies have not been justified, they can award less than the amount asked for. Students are encouraged to share part of the expenses for grants and his, or her, budget should indicate this. Financial need will also be taken into consideration and a student should make a statement regarding his financial status. Grants without a detailed budget and personal statement of financial status may not be awarded.
- 4) Each application for a Student Project Grant will include a detailed description of the proposed project, a description of the project's educational value, a short personal resume about the applicant, and a detailed budget break-down.
- 5) Students must have a faculty advisor to assist them with the project. The student will be required to meet with the advisor once every two weeks to discuss the progress of the project. Failure to aggressively seek the advise of the advisor may result in charges of misconduct against the student. The faculty advisor may be asked by the Student Project Grant committee to take part in the presentation of the proposed student grant.
- 6) All financial matters pertaining to Student Project Grants will be handled through the Student Activities Office. All requests for funds must be signed by the student and his faculty advisor.
- 7) Members of the College Student Assembly may not apply for a grant.
- 8) All Student Project Grants must be completed by Dead Week of the semester of application, unless an extension is granted by C.S.A.
- 9) Students must submit a progress report by the date mid-term reports are issued.
- 10) With proper notification, the student may be required to present his project to classes or other groups.

- 11) Not more than one-half of all funds allocated to Student Project Grants will be spent in the fall semester.

Interesting Events

An interesting series of events last Thursday prompted the OAK LEAF to look into some of the actions of three student government officers. The following is an account of these events.

8:30 a.m. - Editor Mike Allen and Staff Writer Rob Melton arrived at the OAK LEAF office and distributed papers.

10:30 p.m. - Janet Ealy, Campus Editor, arrived to deliver the missing papers and found all the issues of the OAK LEAF that had been distributed earlier stacked up in the middle of the floor in the OAK LEAF office. Accompanying them were three notes.

11:30 p.m. - Greg Voral, Feature Editor, arrived to find Ealy with the papers and the notes. They proceeded to redistribute all the papers.

The official explanation of the three students' actions came at the next day's CSA meeting. Greg Cosko, Executive Vice-President, said the action was a, "nice, gentle, non-censuring protest." Michael Harris said, "we resent some of the things that are coming down." During the discussion of OAK LEAF policy at the CSA meeting, students had some strong opinions of the paper.

Annis O'Malley said, "I personally don't have the time to be copying writing the editor of the paper (if a mistake is made). It is obvious the OAK LEAF is slanting their articles to make us look like a bunch of rabble-rousing, no place to go, just trying to raise hell on campus, and that's not what we're after."

Gene Canevari said, "I think you have the right and obligation to report, in writing, to its contents. I think when you take the physical act of depriving other students from that freedom of the press, you're opening the door to the same kind of activity towards a different OAK LEAF. . . . If you picked up that number of newspapers, you took it out of the hands of the students, you WERE suppressing the news and there is no way to avoid that."

That the student government fails to realize in their dealings with the OAK LEAF is that it is the students who are paying for the OAK LEAF, not student government. The OAK LEAF endeavors to print the truth accurately, fairly and objectively.

Because of the very nature of the student government's actions, they are suppressing the freedom of the press on this campus. By their intimidation of a certain reporter, they feel they can get the truth, as they see it, printed.

Bill Sonnenschein, Communications Commissioner, told CSA that the small staff can be a handicap. However, he said there was no excuse for the "biased, infactual report of what CSA did during the meeting." Sonnenschein objected to the "bias of this particular writer." There are more forms of communication than the OAK LEAF. When the student government takes the law into its own hands, then it ruins its credibility. It is suggested that if student government is interested in printing their own news, that the Communications Commissioner write stories for the new Redwood Junction Chronicle (SRJC) that was a popular form of government communication last semester.

Should it be possible for student government to take the initiative and report the facts straight, first, and then try to communicate their findings, in hopes of them possibly solving the problem? Or does the problem lie in the interpretation of the article by its readers? For it is possible that personal interpretations are being "read" into news articles?

There will be the first ones to admit a mistake, and correct it, but we must remember that "nobody's perfect."

The clincher came when a motion was entertained to condemn the actions of these three students. The motion was defeated soundly, and the OAK LEAF representative Greg Voral commented, "Then can I take it as a tacit, no vocal approval of the actions of these students?"

"A little bit of guerilla theater," is what Greg Cosko, Executive Vice-President of the College Student Assembly (CSA), termed the impulsive behavior which he and two other CSA associated people, Michael Harris and Bente Mitchell engaged in last week.

Thursday afternoon, after the OAK LEAF had been distributed throughout the campus, these three students, allegedly upset with the news story on the latest CSA meeting and the editorial cartoon, decided to "rip off" the paper from the points of distribution, and return them to the OAK LEAF office.

Upon depositing the reclaimed papers, the culprits signed notes testifying of their deed. (see page one for photo of notes).

I believe this act is instructive.

MINORITY INFLUENCE

It shows the impact that even a small group of individuals can have on the majority. Because of the self-termed "gesture" of these students, the rest of the students on campus were denied (temporarily) the opportunity of reading the student publication which is printed partially with the use of their money.

It is unfortunate that these individuals felt it necessary to resort to such tactics, and regrettable that because of the structure and nature of the OAK LEAF, action cannot be taken to prevent a recurrence.

If the three previously mentioned students, or any other student or faculty member is displeased with the way news stories are handled, and feels that there is a plain misstatement of fact, then chances are that an official correction is in order. The OAK LEAF recognizes its obligation to set the facts straight.

If anyone disagrees with the editorial comments made in the paper, they are welcome to submit a letter for publication.

And if possibly the problem cannot be resolved by either of these means, there is yet another avenue, the Board of Publications. This board is made up of the student body president, editor of the OAK LEAF, "student at large," dean of students, and the OAK LEAF advisor.

"CASH AND CARRY"

Perhaps the OAK LEAF should only be distributed on a "cash and carry" basis. This would affix a definite cash value to individual copies of the paper, and therefore, before anyone was inclined to liberate copies from the stand they would be obligated to purchase every copy. This would serve as an effective deterrent. It may be glamorous to participate in "guerilla theater," but to be tagged a common thief is quite another matter.

Student publications have traditionally found themselves in an uncomfortable position. The situation at SRJC is no exception.

On one hand, the OAK LEAF is charged to publish those things which are deemed of importance and/or interest to the college community. I feel that the news of CSA is both.

As it is with most school newspapers, the OAK LEAF is beholden to the student council for at least part of its funds, but in addition to this connection, the paper has a voting representative on the council.

TOUCHY SITUATION

Needless to say, this arrangement makes for a touchy situation. The paper has clearly defined economic interests, and the council appreciates favorable coverage.

Independence from any controlling influence is the most valuable asset of any newspaper, unfortunately this is not the case at SRJC. Whether the OAK LEAF decides to move more in this direction (i.e. become financially independent) remains to be seen.

But a student newspaper also has the responsibility of attempting to achieve objectivity within its news columns.

The OAK LEAF must work as hard at this goal, which I believe is an important one, as any other newspaper.

What is needed now is for the OAK LEAF and CSA to make the most of their involvement, and to rededicate themselves to their respective goals. CSA: furtherance of student decision-making. The OAK LEAF: objective reporting of news, opinion stating, and entertainment. Let neither party stoop to "guerilla" tactics.

March 12, 1973
Meeting #6

I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 3:19 by President Fesperman.

II. Roll Call

Absent were: Bente Mitchell, George Hains, Stan Sloan, and Bill Sonnenschein.

III. Approval of agenda

Under reports, item "b" a report from Mike Harris was added. The agenda was approved as changed.

IV ~~VI~~. Approval of Minutes

It was asked that the underscores under the words "directly" and "indirectly" be stricken. It was also asked that the three motions made by Bob Reagan be witten out. The motions are as follows:

Bob Reagan moved that the Executive Cabinet condemn the Student Activities Advisor's action of hiring David Herrington without consulting this Cabinet; and that the president of the college and the Board of Trustees be notified of this action.

Bob Reagan moved the Financial to read:

Section 1, page 2, strike out the following line "in case of emergency or the prolonged absence of the Commissioner of Finance, requisitions may be signed by any two of the following: the president of the Associated Students, the Activities Advisor, the Dean of Students, the Accounts Manager.

Insert the following: In case of emergency or the prolonged absence of the Commissioner of Finance or the Assistant Commissioner of Finance, requisitions may be signed by the president of the Associated Students, the Executive Vice President, the Vice President, or the two representatives elected to the Executive Cabinet. A valid requisition will require two signatures of the above-named people during emergencies.

Section I, page two, strike the following: "In case of emergency, the Activities Advisor or the Dean of Students may authorize an expenditure."

Insert the following: In case of emergency, The College Student Assembly or the Executive Cabinet may authorize an expenditure."

Section 3: Insert after the statement, Ordinarily, checks shall be made out to the vendor. These checks must be signed by a student and the Accounts Manager, or the Activities Advisor. No payment will be made without:

1. a valid requisition signed by a student and the Activities Advisor.
2. a check signed by a student and the Accounts Manager or the Activities Advisor.

3. The following list of students should be authorized to sign checks in order to have a smooth operation: The president of the Associated Students; the Executive Vice President of the Associated Students; the Commissioner of Finance and his or her assistant.

Bob Reagan moved that the Student Activities Advisor make 100 copies of the Model Code for Student Rights, Responsibilities, and Conduct issued by the Law Student Division of the American Bar Association May 31, 1969, Copyright 1969 American Bar Association, 1155 East 60 Street, Chicago, 60637, copied from the Reference Shelf Volume 42, no. 3 the H.W. Wilson Company, New York 1970.

The minutes were approved as changed.

V. Reports

b. Michael Harris outlined the procedure of the alternate meetings on Mondays. The Assembly will meet as a group; call roll; announce the individual committees, what the meetings will be discussing, and their meeting-places; and then adjourn to the separate committees.

a. Bob Reagan moved the following program take place for the Book Drive: 1). Place an Ad in Bear Facts asking students to bring old and unused books to the Student Activities Office; 2). Put a press release in the Press Democrat about the Book Drive; 3). Print 500 leaflets designed by an artist and printed by Graphic Arts to be charged to the Publicity Account; 4). Hire a ~~MA~~ non-CSA student to head the drive at a salary of \$20; Through ICC offer prizes of \$50, \$30, and \$10 for the 3 largest amounts of books collected by on-campus clubs and organizations.

No. 4 was changed to any student; No. 5 was amended so that a minimum of 50 books had to be turned in in order to collect a prize. The motion was seconded and passed.

c. From the Floor

Arts and Lectures Committees

One main objection to the approval of the Committee on Arts and Lectures was that some members of the Assembly felt there should be a tighter ratio between the number of faculty members and students. Bob Reagan amended the proposal to change the number of faculty members from eight to six. Christine Trouette seconded the motion; the motion passed. Greg Cosko moved to accept the proposal. Fred Samia seconded the motion; the motion passed.

Selection of Administrative Personnel

Copies of this proposal are to be made and distributed. The proposal will be discussed in the Executive Cabinet.

Oak Leaf - Glynn Andreasen expressed dissatisfaction with the ~~MAKING~~ ~~MAK~~ Advisory meeting held last week.

Drapes - Michael Harris asked whether we should continue to try to give out contracts for the JAO drapes to students. Bob Reagan moved that if no student bids of sufficient stature are received within 7 days, the contract should be given to a private contractor. The motion ~~MAKING~~ was withdrawn. Bob Reagan moved that if no student bids of sufficient stature are received within two weeks after the next Oak Leaf is published, the contract is to be given to a private contractor. The motion passed.

VI. Old Business

a. College Calendar Proposal

Bob Reagan moved and Bill Unkel seconded the motion to send the proposal to a committee meeting next Monday. The motion passed.

b. Basic Student Inalienable Rights

Bob Reagan moved that the seven rights be adopted and placed in campus guidelines. Right #4 was amended; the words "as a" were placed after the word "picketing" for the purpose of readability. The motion was withdrawn. Bob Reagan moved that rights 1-7 be adopted along with #8, which would state that student government would have full control in financial matters. The motion failed. Bob Reagan moved that rights 1-7 be adopted. The motion was seconded and passed.

c. Model Code

This was tabled until information can be obtained on the copyright.

d. Financial Code

Bob Reagan moved to have the following inserted in Article 4, Section 4k of the Financial Code:

1. Finance Committee - It shall be the duty of the College Student Assembly to approve the four appointed members of the Finance Committee.

2. It shall be the duty of the Finance Commissioner and the Assistant Finance Commissioner to appoint four people to serve on the Student Finance Committee subject to a majority vote of the College Student Assembly.

Glynn Andreasen seconded the motion. Dave Chun suggested that the motion be studied, and then voted upon next week.

Bob Reagan also moved to have the following inserted in Section 6 of the Code:

1. Duties of the Student Finance Committee.

a. All requests for funds from the College Student Assembly must come before the Student Finance Committee for a recommendation from this committee before action can be taken by CSA or the Executive Cabinet.

b. Monitor and audit fiscal operations. c. Present to the College Student Assembly no later the fourth week before the termination of the Spring semester the proposed budget of the following semester along with the Finance Commissioner.

Since this is a constitutional change, it must be voted on in a general election. The proposal will go to the Financial Committee for re-wording.

e. Pioneer Hall *restated*

Dave Chun the motion passed in the Executive Cabinet; namely, that only the Activities Advisor, Accounts Manager, and ASB President be given private offices, and that the use of all other space be recommended by the Executive Cabinet and decided by CSA. Bob Reagan amended the motion, requiring the Assistant Advisor to share an office with the Vice President, the Corresponding Sect'y and the Recording Sect'y; requiring office secretaries to leave their desks unlocked; and giving government members the freedom to move the SAO desks around. Glynn Andreasen seconded the amendment. The amendment failed. The main motion passed.

President Fesperman appointed Susan Phipps as Elections Commissioner.

Bob Reagan moved and Dennis O'Malley seconded the motion to approve the appointment. The motion passed.

f. Military Recruitment - Stricken from agenda.

g. From the Floor

Bob Reagan moved to amend the Financial Code to give immediate authority to the Finance Commissioner, Asst. Finance Commissioner, and ASB President to sign checks instead of the Accounts Manager. The motion passed.

Bob Reagan moved and Dave Chun seconded the motion that a job description of the Activities Advisor and his staff be furnished at the next meeting. The motion passed.

VII. New Business

a. Student Grants Committee - Dave Chun, Dennis O'Malley, Barbara Smith, Greg Cosko, Mike Mullin were elected to the Student Project Grants Committee.

b. Y-Riders - The Finance Committee recommended that no funds be given to the Y-Riders. ~~Lorraine Fleming moved~~ Paul Howard moved to disapprove the expenditure of \$375 to the Y-Riders. Lorraine Fleming amended the motion to read that as soon as funds become available, the Y-Riders would have first priority. Dave Chun amended the amendment to read that as soon as funds become available, the Y-Riders would be put on a priority list. The amendment to the amendment passed, becoming the first amendment. The first amendment failed. The original motion passed.

c. Forensics - Information only

Mr. Perella informed the Assembly that he expected to nominate 3 to 6 people to compete in the State Championship at Orange Coast College.

The cost of sending these people by car would be approximately \$60-75 per person, including food and lodging. The cost of traveling by car would be about \$80 per person. Paul Howard thought the cost of car traveling could be cut considerably; for instance, he felt that the cost of food should not be included in the amount asked for. Mr. Perella pointed out that some fixed fees are included in the quoted amounts.

d. From the Floor

Dave Chun moved to send a letter to all media condemning U.S. government actions in Wounded Knee. Bob Reagan seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Dave Chun moved and Bob Reagan seconded the motion that all CSA minutes be kept within the Assembly until they are approved. The motion passed.

Dave Chun moved and Bob Reagan seconded the motion to set up P.A. equipment every Wednesday for free use by students. Priority to use the equipment would be given to students who had signed a sign-up sheet. In case of prior commitments, i.e. other activities in close outdoor adjoining areas, the equipment would not be set up. The motion passed.

VIII. Announcements

Bob Reagan reminded students to bring used books to the SAO.

Vern Baxter and Dave Johnson were congratulated for their work on the Public Science College Community Communication Committee.

IX. Adjournment

The meeting was adjourned at 5:45.

A proposal for the creation of a Committee on Arts and Lectures.

- 1) A Committee on Arts and Lectures would be created immediately beginning with the 1973-74 school year, would take over the functions of the Mid-Day Series Committee, the Open Forum, and The Program Coordination Committee.
- 2) In addition to the above, the committee would be given responsibility for the Scholar-Residence program, and, in cooperation with the Evening College, for short courses of interest to the general public.
- 3) The Mid-Day Series, The Open Forum, and The Program Coordination Committees would continue to be responsible for their 1972-73 programs. These committees will be abolished at the end of the spring 1973 term.
- 4) The Committee on Arts and Lectures would have eight faculty members and three students (one-half the present membership of the three committees). The Assistant Dean of the Evening College will be an ex officio member of the committee. No later than March 15, the faculty members for the 1973-74 committee will be appointed by the Committee on Committees in consultation with interested members of the present committees.
- 5) The first meeting of the Committee on Arts and Lectures will be no later than March 30, 1973.
- 6) The budget for the Committee on Arts and Lectures will specify how much funds shall be spent for each of the different types of programs the committee will administer. Thus, there will be separate allotments for 1) programs involving controversial, social, political, and moral issues; 2) programs of special merit for students of the college; 3) programs of special merit for the general public and students; 4) Scholar-in-Residence; 5) short courses--seminars; 6) mid-week movie.
It is recommended that the present proportion of the total budget for each of the above categories be the same for the 1973-74 school year.
- 7) In addition to the functions mentioned above, it will be required that the committee hold a well-publicized meeting once a semester in which it explains to interested members of the campus community its general policies, its past and future programming, and in which it invites criticisms and evaluations.
- 8) It is recommended that the college administration endeavor to provide the necessary means, in addition to those services presently provided by the office of the Assistant Dean of the Evening College, to enable the committee to perform its technical and administrative functions efficiently.

This war has also demonstrated the incapacity of the national media and established institutions to provide the full and unbiased information needed by citizens in a democracy.

- (b) Immediately upon its foundation the Peace Institute is prepared to establish a comprehensive Indochina Studies section, which includes films, video-tapes, slide shows, and all manner of printed materials.
- (c) The Peace Institute will provide information on other areas of international conflict, and serve as a clearing-house in times of local and national internal crises.
- (d) The Peace Institute will co-ordinate existing SRJC courses that would add to its general focus, for veterans and other students, in areas such as the psychology/sociology of peace, war, violence, revolution, aggression and oppression.
- (e) The Peace Institute will sponsor seminars, lectures, and short courses, & seek to stimulate appropriate curriculum additions in desired areas.
- (f) The Peace Institute will be staffed by student volunteers, with guidance and assistance from interested faculty.

PROPOSAL

In order to facilitate this program we request:

- (a) A large room for the lounge-library, and seminars, in either the new SAO building, or in one of the newly vacated student services buildings.
- (b) That CSA give an initial funds grant of \$500.00.

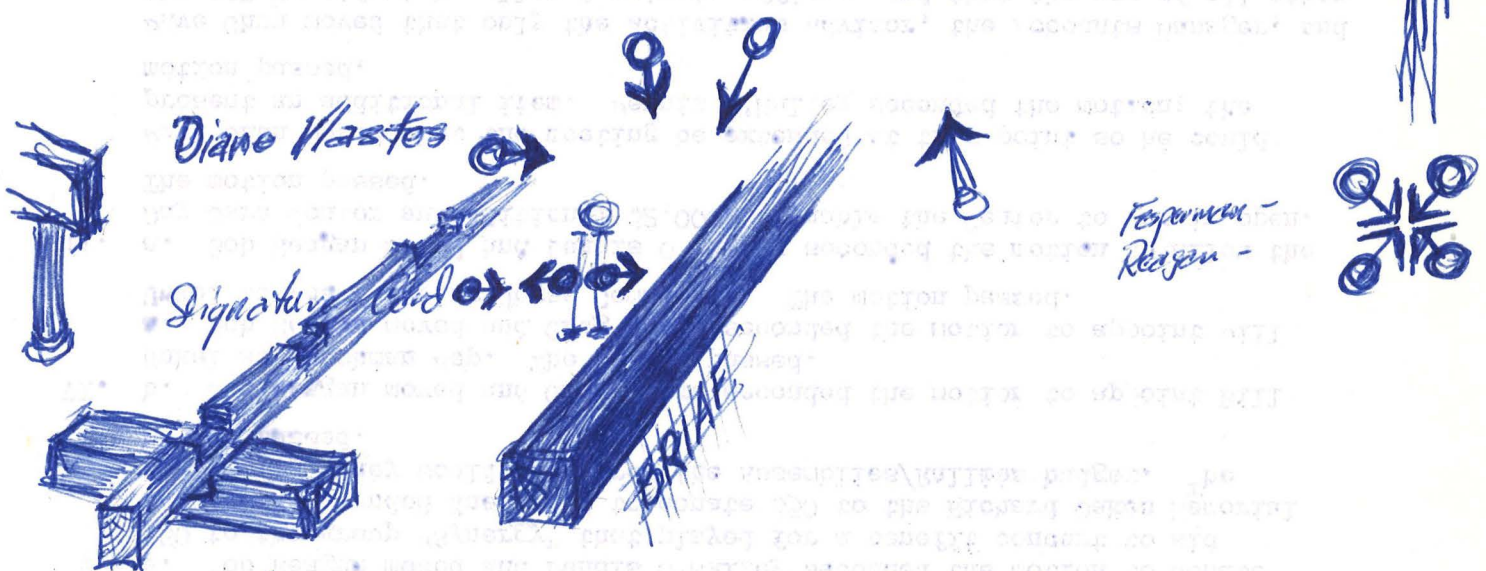

SUBJECT: Recommendations on Space Usage

The sub-committee consisting of Betty Goulart, Dennis Maxson, Hal Walker and Jack Healy was assigned the task of reviewing the space available in the Doyle Student Center and making recommendations back to the Clearing House Committee on the future use of that space.

The sub-committee issued a campus-wide notice of the availability of the space and solicited proposals from all campus sources. The following proposals were received:

1. From the Library - a space for approximately eight typewriters to be relocated from the Library.
2. From Mr. William Smith - a space to use for storage and a workroom area for items removed from the Museum.
3. From Theatre Arts Department - the bookstore space for use as a costume workshop-classroom.
4. From the Art Department - the bookstore space for use as a classroom-storeroom to be used primarily for sculpture.
5. From Dr. Patricia Smith - the bookstore space for use as a Psycho-educational Clinic to serve children with learning problems.
6. From the Police Science Department - the bookstore space for use as the campus police patrol headquarters.

7. From the Graphic Arts Department - the bookstore space for relocation of the graphic arts department.
8. From the College Student Assembly and the Student Affairs Committee:
 - a. The old student activities office for use as an FM Radio Station in cooperation with the Speech Department.
 - b. A free-floating space for use of a variety of student activities to be changed as needs change.
 - c. A student lounge
 - d. An extension of the food service in a variety of ways.
9. From the Woman's Concern Committee - a "Woman's Survival Center."

As a preliminary step, the sub-committee reviewed the blueprints of the Doyle Student Center and determined what, if any, restrictions existed as to the use of the available space. One structural restriction appears to exist in respect to the storeroom attached to the Bookstore. That structure does not meet the requirements of the State of California Field Act relating to structural requirements for buildings used for instructional purposes. In short, it is not "earthquake proof." That one room cannot be used as an area where students work as part of an instructional program or where they gather for other purposes. No other structural restrictions exist.

Several reports reached the committee concerning restrictions on the use of all of the facilities in the Doyle Student Center. The opinion was expressed that because of the method of finance used to construct the center, that the facilities must not be used for anything other than direct student services. Direct student services apparently means activities other than instruction or activities directly supporting the

instructional program.

Our investigation included interviews with various campus administrators and as a result, we reached the following conclusions:

1. All of the buildings on the campus, including the Doyle Student Center, are the property of the district and under the control and direction of the trustees.
2. The method of finance used to construct the buildings took advantage of the fact that the majority of the activities housed in them were income producing. Although the primary purpose of the buildings was to house cafeteria, bookstore and student activities, the method of finance does not appear to preclude the use of portions of the buildings for other purposes on occasion as the need arises. There has never been a serious suggestion that buildings or portions of them built with tax funds be restricted to direct instructional services.

The recommendations of the committee are strictly the members' evaluation of the relative needs at the present time. Other factors will have to be taken into consideration before any of the recommendations are finally implemented. Factors such as costs of remodeling, equipment and personnel were beyond the scope of this committee and, except in cases where costs were obvious and would preclude the suggested use, were not considered in detail.

One other obvious point should be mentioned. It was assumed that the following suggested uses are of a temporary nature. As the needs of the campus change and additional facilities become available, new studies should be initiated to reallocate space.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. The old Bookstore sales area be assigned as an Art classroom.

A note of caution should be given along with this recommendation. Assigning this area as a classroom could have a negative effect on the "use formula" as mandated by the State. If the use of the Bookstore area as a classroom would jeopardize State funding for planned construction, this use would have to be considered.

2. The storeroom area attached to the Bookstore be used for storage by the Art Department in connection with the classroom and also by the Theatre Arts Department for costume storage. Hopefully, this use would help relieve the congested conditions in Burbank Auditorium.

3. The former student activities offices be used to house an FM radio station. This suggestion is contingent upon the implementation of an agreement between the Associated Students and the Speech Department and the availability of adequate instructional staff.

If this suggested use cannot be realized, consideration should be given to the use of this area to house the campus police patrol office and related service activities.

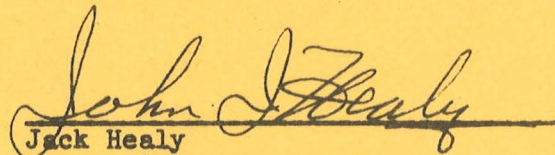
RELATED RECOMMENDATIONS:

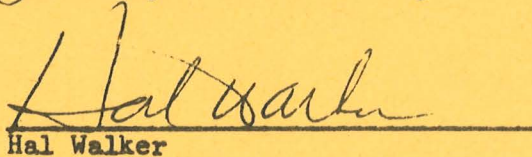
1. The Graphic Arts Services should be relocated. In view of the space needs of the Registrar, the continued use of the space now used by Graphic Arts appears to be inappropriate. It is suggested that the College consider the addition of a relocatable building to

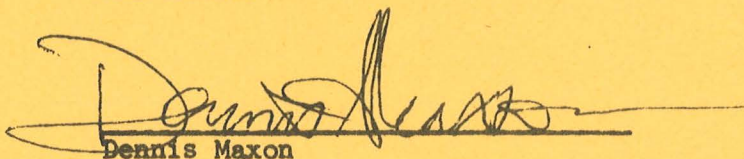
house this service. This addition could be located next to the relocatable housing the Data Processing service.

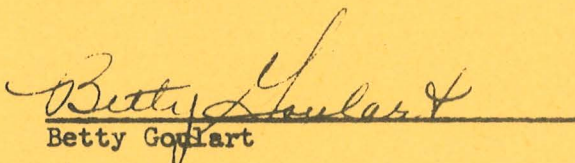
2. The College consider the reallocation of the space adjacent to the Cafeteria presently used by the Switchboard. It appears to the committee that far too much space is being used for that purpose now. A re-study of the space could result in the continuance of the Switchboard activity and an allocation of space for the "Woman's Survival Center."
3. It is recommended that the Bear Cub Den be re-designed and re-furnished to provide a more acceptable student lounge.

b. Selection of Administrative Personnel - The Clearing House Committee has rewritten the proposal, which will be available soon.

th c. Typewriters - Greg Cosko moved and Dennis O'Malley seconded the motion that CSA request Mass Newman to make at least four typewriters available to students. Greg withdrew the motion, then restated it, adding the words "in the library." The motion passed.

d. From the Floor - Bill Unkel moved to commend Janet Daly and Mark Caro for bringing the parking situation to the attention of the students. Dennis O'Malley seconded the motion. The motion passed. Mark acknowledged Mr. Canevari's assistance.

Bob Reagan announced that he will be asking for even more library hours.

e. Military Recruitment - Bob Reagan moved that CSA officially oppose military recruitment on campus. He asked that letters be sent to the Administration, the Board of Trustees, and to Oak Leaf condemning recruitment on campus. He also asked that an IBM poll be conducted to find out the students' opinion. Greg Cosko seconded the motion. The motion passed, with a roll call vote.

VII. New Business

a. Peace Institute - Fred Samia moved and Dave Chun seconded the motion to set up a Peace Institute on campus. A large room and an initial grant of \$500 was requested of CSA. The motion passed. It was pointed out that CSA does not have the power to allocate space on campus; it was also understood that money will not be available until the Finance Committee is able to meet and recommend where the money will come from.

b. December Coalition Park - Dave Chun moved that the area in front of the Coop be named the December Coalition Park. The motion failed.

c. Letters - Dave Chun moved that two letters, one to Tino Decampo giving sympathy and encouragement, and the other to several politicians demanding an investigation of the Decampo case, be approved and mailed. The motion failed. Dennis O'Malley moved and Greg Cosko seconded the motion to revote with a roll-call vote. The motion passed. On the re-vote, the original motion passed.

d. Space Allocation - Dave Chun moved that priority for the old SAO space be given to the Woman's Survival Center, The FM Radio Station, and the Peace Institute (not for simultaneous occupation, and not in any particular order). The motion passed.

e. Budget Cuts - Stricken

m 5 f. Constitution Committee - Dave Chun moved and Bob Reagan seconded the motion to set up a constitution committee to study the constitution and recommend changes. It was decided instead to delegate this responsibility to the Meeting Procedures Committee.

g. Oak Leaf Request for Funds - The Oak Leaf requested a total of \$380 to send five students to the Statewide Journalism Conference. The Finance Committee recommended that the group either drive to the conference or take a midnight flier, and that no more than \$300 be allocated. Greg moved that \$300 be allocated to the Oak Leaf. This was amended to \$300, and the motion passed.

h. Bake Sale - Greg Cosko moved and Dennis O'Malley seconded the motion that CBA officially involve itself in the December Coalition Bake Sale. The motion passed.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:40.

PROPOSAL FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF
A WOMEN'S SURVIVAL CENTER ON CAMPUS

The Women's Concerns Committee sees the need for a Women's Survival Center on campus. Our goal is to provide a place where women can feel free to get to know one another and discuss their various interests and concerns. We envision such a Center as soon serving as a matrix for numerous women-related activities on campus; in this sense it would be an active, growing process, a framework to reflect our changing needs.

What would we need for the Center?

- (1) A large room. The space which the bookstore now occupies be ideal.
- (2) A few pieces of furniture, such as a desk, counter, and bookshelves. We will provide the rest of the furnishings to make the Center attractive.
- (3) One full-time, paid receptionist-overseer to answer the phone and remain in the center from 11--a.m. daily. (We choose these hours purposely in order that women with no place to go between afternoon and evening classes can use the Center, especially because of the hitchhiking/transportation difficulties.) At \$2.20/hour, this staffing salary would be approximately \$380/a month.
- (4) A budget. Besides salaries, we would have certain incidental expenses such as duplicating and telephone, which would be carefully monitored by staff to prevent abuse. These expenses might amount to another \$200 or so per month, so we request a total budget for the Center of approximately \$2700/semester.

What would be the core function of the Center?

- (1) Counseling services: Several faculty women have already volunteered to provide psychological/vocational guidance. We hope that the Center's counseling service will encompass such areas as career guidance, pregnancy counseling, advice about the Re-Entry Program (for women returning to school), and family problem-solving.

- (2) Referral service: We plan to establish a network of concerned women and agencies who will offer guidance to those in need, perhaps simply by allowing their phone numbers to be given to someone wanting to discuss a problem with which they've had experience. Other areas of referral could include housing, skills exchange, job openings, religious guidance, therapy groups, child care, and carpools. It is primarily for this service we will need the telephone.
- (3) Lounge: One of the main purposes of the Center would be to provide a place for women to meet each other, relax, drink coffee, and generally share their interests and problems.
- (4) Educational Center: The Women's Survival Center would also serve as a conduit for educational materials and information. For a start, we would provide in the room, shelves for books and a table with relevant literature. Eventually the Center might sponsor women speakers to come and visit us, such as writers, lawyers, or doctors.

Although these are the basic services we believe a Women's Survival Center should provide, we hope it will also serve as a nexus for a variety of other women's concerns which might arise. The establishment of a general gathering place would just be the initial stage from which diverse, purposeful activities could evolve.

SRJC Adopts 'Get Tough' Policy on Parking Tickets

A "get tough" policy on parking tickets will go into effect Monday, at Santa Rosa Junior College.

The campus Parking Committee voted recently to sharply increase the price of parking tickets on campus. The new rate will be \$3 for the first two tickets, then \$5 per ticket thereafter.

The increased prices, and the tightening down on parking regulations were voted this semester by the Parking Committee, rather than the installation of coin-activated gates on the main parking lots.

Originally, it was planned to install the gates at Easter vacation, but the committee ac-

tion postponed the gate concept — at least temporarily.

School officials said the gates may be installed in the Fall, or students may be required to purchase a parking sticker, a policy which presently is not in effect.

Don Fischer, campus patrol chief, said the increased cost of parking tickets also will apply to students in the Evening College program.

He outlined present parking regulations: no parking in red zones, all students (day students) must have a student parking sticker on their car, and all other parking regulations must be obeyed.

WHY INVITATIONS TO THE PRG & DRV?

It is important that these invitations be issued for a number of reasons. First and foremost is that The Agreement on Ending the War and Restoring Peace in Vietnam specifically states that there are two political forces, with armies in southern Vietnam, and a third neutralist element, without political definition or an armed force. They are: The Provisional Revolutionary Government (the political arm of the National Front for Liberation-NLF), the Saigon administration, and those individuals and organizations (Buddhists, Catholics, intellectuals, etc.), who favour peace.

This is what the whole war (as far as America is concerned) has been about, that a popular and independent movement for liberation, and not an "invasion" from the north, was being fought.

Chapter 1, Article 1, of the Agreement says: "The United States and all other countries respect the independence, sovereignty, unity and territorial integrity of Vietnam as recognized by the 1954 Geneva Agreements on Vietnam."

Chapter V, Article 15(a): "The military demarcation line between the two zones at the 17th Parallel is only provisional and not a political or territorial boundary, as provided for in paragraph 6 of the Final Declaration of the 1954 Geneva Conference."

These three equal segments will have the monumental task of "...Achiev(ing) national reconciliation and concord, end(ing) hatred and enmity...", through the National Council of National Reconciliation and Concord, which will supervise until "genuinely free and democratic general elections under international supervision..." are held.

This is the crux of the whole Agreement, the Vietnamese remember only too well the promise of free elections from the French colonialists as they left their country, and how they were never held. All of us who want a truly genuine peace for an independent Vietnam, must see to it that these three segments of the Vietnamese people get equal representation and recognition.

Over 60 of the world's countries have recognized the Provisional Revolutionary Government officially, and have established working diplomatic relations. The US is not one of them.

President Nixon, through word, and deed, has provided support only for the government of General Nguyen Van Thieu, who has been described, even by the moderate press, as a "dictator who rules through terror and force", and who once said that he didn't think the Vietnamese people should have "too much democracy, too soon."

Chapter IV, Article 6(c), of the Agreement: "Foreign countries shall not impose any political tendency or personality on the South Vietnamese people."

This very weekend General Theiu will visit at the Western White House in San Clemente, and will address businessmen in Los Angeles.

It is common knowledge that continued aid plans in the form of massive 'donations' of weapons, (that has given Theiu the third largest air force in the world), "civilian" advisors (1955 again?), and economic enticements up to four billion dollars a year, are part of the Nixon Doctrine, projected for the next decade.

By inviting representatives of the PRG and the DRV to our country, in the true spirit of peace and reconciliation, to share their experiences, we take a step towards insuring that the peace we have all wanted so badly, will in fact, be a true and just peace for all the Indochinese people.

U.S. Vietnam Commitment To Continue Indefinitely

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The members of the expeditionary force which fought America's long war left South Vietnam Thursday, but the U.S. military and economic commitment to the Saigon government will continue for an indefinite period.

President Nixon will discuss the commitment—and its future implementation—when he heads talks next week in California with South Vietnam's President Nguyen Van Thieu.

The discussions at the West White House in San Francisco Monday and Tuesday are expected to cover all aspects of American support and confirm the willingness of the U.S. government to continue aiding Saigon.

Since the Vietnam cease-fire agreement went into effect Jan. 27, the United States has been supplying South Vietnam with replacement military equipment and ammunition on a one-for-one basis. The peace agreement allows both sides to do as long as they do not produce new military equipment and troops.

In Saigon, a symbol of the continuing American military presence in South Vietnam will be the large staff of 100 to 125 men assigned to the office of the U.S. military attaché at the American embassy.

Beyond that, the Nixon administration has made it clear that it intends to maintain a presence of the 7th Fleet in the Southeast Asian waters, B52 bombers in nearby Thailand and several thousand troops on the ground.

High administration officials have not said how this continuing military might could be used, but they have left little

doubt it could be unleashed quickly if the Vietnam peace agreement collapses.

Nixon has personally warned that the administration considers some of the shipments of men and supplies which North Vietnam has been sending south along the Ho Chi Minh trail to be in violation of the peace agreement. And he has threatened unspecified retaliatory action if it continues.

The hard-line posture of the United States, even as it disengages from its direct military involvement in South Vietnam, has been illustrated

most recently by the controversy on Capitol Hill over continued American bombing in Cambodia.

Marshall Green, assistant secretary of state for East Asian affairs in testimony Wednesday before a House Foreign Affairs subcommittee described the American bombing raids in Cambodia as "the clenched fist" of the United States. He made clear that the United States would continue these bombardments until a cease-fire becomes effective in Cambodia.

Using a carrot-and-stick approach, the administration has sought to encourage North Vietnam to keep the peace in Indochina by proposing a massive international reconstruction effort.

Ziegler did not directly address the question of presidential authority. Rather, he emphasized that the operations are being conducted in response to a request from the government of President Lon Nol.

"The Cambodian government has asked for our air support to assist Cambodian forces in resisting the Communists' offensive," Ziegler said at the daily White House news briefing. "At such time as there is a cease-fire in Cambodia, the United States will adhere to that cease-fire agreement."

Ziegler put the main burden for the continuing American military operations in Cambodia upon the failure of the Communists to respect the Vietnam peace agreement or a cease-fire offer made by the Lon Nol government.

North Vietnam, he said, "has not withdrawn its forces from Cambodia in accordance with the agreement."

Furthermore, he said, the Communists in Cambodia have failed to respect a unilateral cease-fire declared by the Lon Nol government at the time the Vietnam peace agreement went into effect January 28.

"The situation in Cambodia is that Communist forces are conducting offensive operations and the United States is responding to a request for assistance," Ziegler said.

Ziegler declined to specify whether the "Communist forces" he referred to were North Vietnamese or Cambodian insurgents.

The White House said yesterday that the U.S. will continue bombing in Cambodia until the Communist forces in that country stop their military operations and agree to a cease-fire.

The Nixon administration's position was outlined by White House press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler in response to questions as to how long the U.S. intends to continue air operations in Cambodia and what the President's constitutional authority is for ordering such raids.

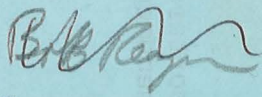

Students In Stands On Two Issues

The College Student Assembly of Santa Rosa Junior College has taken official positions on two national issues — one in support of a nationwide boycott against Safeway stores for its policy of buying non-union lettuce and the other condemning actions of the federal government in its treatment of the American Indians.

In action at its March meeting the Student Assembly adopted the following statement:

"Recently, our brothers and sisters in Wounded Knee, S.D., have been victimized by the U.S. Government. We, the Santa Rosa Junior College — College Student Assembly, feel strongly about the way the whole affair was handled and offer our solidarity to all the Native Americans as well as all the innocent victims involved in past, as well as present, movements in this country.

"In light of this incident, we . . . condemn the actions of the U.S. government and ask that a full unconditional pardon be given to those at Wounded Knee; and that an unbiased committee review all grievances that the Native Americans have in this country. We also urge all those who are upset by the government's recent actions to write to their congressmen."

Earlier, the student group adopted the following statement on the supermarket boycott:

"The College Student Assembly would like to congratulate Caesar Chavez and the United Farm Worker's Union for helping to liberate the farm workers.

"In regard to the nationwide boycott against Safeway's policy of buying non-UFW union lettuce, the . . . College Student Assembly has decided it is time to take a vocal and economic action against their stores.

"Therefore . . . the College Student Assembly has endorsed the UFW union and will also observe the nationwide boycott against Safeway stores. We urge the community to also take part in this boycott."

Kent Hall At SRJC To Be Coed

Kent Hall, the dormitory on the Santa Rosa Junior College campus, will go coeducational.

The request by the Kent Hall Council, made earlier this year, was approved by the SRJC board of trustees Monday night with the understanding it would be on a trial basis and no more than three of the housing units be assigned to women.

This would provide dormitory facilities for 12 females, presumably starting with the fall semester.

In making its recommendation for approval on a "trial basis only," the staff noted that the physical facilities would "lend themselves to segregation by four-member apartments."

In other action the board:

HEARD a progress report on the new swim center indicating it is open and being used for both classes and recreational swimming. In a progress report on the liberal arts building the board was informed that a committee will meet with architect John van Dyk to make revisions in the square footage in order to meet state standards.

HEARD a clarification from the Attorney General indicating that apprenticeship classes are not limited to registered apprentices.

SAW a copy of a letter from Dr. Dan Walker, superintendent-president of Yuba College in Marysville, to William Carle, superintendent of the Konocti Unified School District in Lake County, indicating Yuba would provide free room and board to Lake County students attending school at Yuba. SRJC officials noted they could not match such an offer.

—DISCUSSED three acres of property on Armory Drive which are being offered for sale. The trustee felt the price of the land, located to the rear of the college maintenance yard, was "beyond reach."

—AUTHORIZED Monica Riley to attend the Army War College Seminar June 4-8 at no cost to the district and Ray Peterson of the English Department to attend the Sixth Annual Conference of the Western College Reading Association at Eastern New Mexico University at a cost not to exceed \$175.

—CORRECTED management positions designations under the Dent Bill by withdrawing the name of Eugene Canevari, student activities director.

—HELD a lengthy personnel session which included a request by Dr. Gary Squires for reconsideration of the pay rate for department chairman during the spring semester.

—APPROVED several budget transfers and deferred two agenda items—a discussion of student housing and establishment of a committee on arts and lectures.

Fellow Students, Brothers and Sisters:

For the past semester your student government has been working to protect your rights as students at Santa Rosa Junior College. We have questioned the Administration of this college continuously trying to ascertain the validity of student government and the all-campus committee system. At this point, we, the members of your student government have reached an unresolvable impasse with the administration of this college.

Student government representing your views have questioned:

- 1.) The use of funds from the college bookstore.
- 2.) The use of proposed parking fees.
- 3.) The use and the title of the Doyle Student Center.
- 4.) The use of profits from the Coop and why food prices are so high.

At this time, we, the members of your student government want you to be aware of the impasse we have reached with the administration of this college. We, the members of your student government, wish you to know that we have exhausted every legal channel of communication with the administration of this college concerning the above-mentioned real student issues. Pointed questions have been asked of the administration concerning where your money is going, and we have received nothing but the most general and vague information in response to our questions with an added statement telling us that we are only a recommending body and regardless of our input into the all-campus committee system, the administration of this college will do as it sees fit.

Some of you may be aware of the fact that a blanket \$5 per car parking fee is being proposed for next semester. When questioned about the exact uses of this fee, the administration of your college failed to justify the disbursement of your money. The administration proposed to hire a full-time person to be the Officer of Campus Safety, 80 per cent of his salary to be funded from your parking fee. When questioned about exactly what this man's duties would be, we were informed that in fact this new person would be the Chief of the S.R.J.C. campus patrol.

The new chief's duties will, in fact, be partly instructional, supervisory, and enforcement of all campus safety and security regulations.

We feel at this time that no more than 20 per cent of this man's time will be directly related to parking problems. The California Education Code specifically stipulates that all parking fees shall be spent only in the operation, maintenance, and construction of parking facilities. Now we ask you, is this where you want your money to go? Do you want to pay some \$13,000 a year for an instructor-policeman on campus?

Also, we would like to bring to your attention the use of Doyle Student Center. This is the old Bookstore, Coop, and old Student Activities Office.

ASSOCIATED STUDENTS

DOYLE JUNIOR COLLEGE FOUNDATION

This facility is being paid for by revenue bonds which stipulate that the Doyle Student Center will be used for noninstructional purposes and specifically noninstructional student activities. The renovation of Pioneer Hall has provided us with a beautiful new bookstore and Student Activities Office. Now we have several rooms that presently are not being used that could furnish the students with much needed space for student non-instructional activities. The renovation of Pioneer Hall has provided us with a beautiful new bookstore and student activities office. These facilities, specifically the old bookstore, and the old student activities office, have been vacant and unused for over a month. This clearly indicates faulty planning on the part of the administration regarding the efficient use of the Doyle Student Center. Also you should know that profits from the college bookstore have been pledged by the J.C. District to pay off the revenue bonds which made our fine buildings a reality. Your money is paying for Doyle Student Center and Pioneer Hall and therefore they are your buildings; for your use as a student activities center. The administration of this College has stated in front of many reliable witnesses that the above mentioned facilities are in fact for student activities but at this time refused to act on recommendations from your student government concerning the use of vacant space in the Doyle Student Center. Topping this all off without consultation with the students, the administration has authorized partial use of your old bookstore facility for the housing of a new telephone switching system and have already started the installation of said Centrex telephone system.

Now we ask you-- is this fair? Is the administration of this college acting in the best interests of the students? Is the administration of this college protecting your rights as students of this school? We, your representatives in student government, think not, and would like you, the students, to be aware of the very real interests you have intrusted us to protect.

I encourage your help and questions concerning these matters and will be happy to openly and frankly discuss these matters with any and all interested persons.

We, your representatives in student government, are striving to make your school function in the best interests of all students. We enlist your help in accomplishing this task.

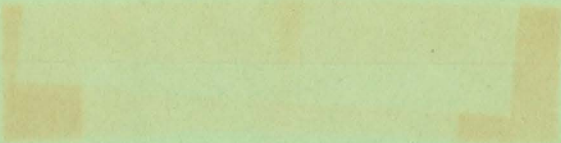

Completely Voluntary Student Fee May Bring Down Walls of CSA

There may be no student government next semester if lobbying to make the Associated Student Body fee completely "voluntary" succeeds.

Two divergent views emerged in Monday's hot College Student Assembly (CSA) meeting, as debate centered around the possibility of eliminating the waiver and giving students the opportunity to refuse the ASB fee payment with-

out question.

The debate started when the administration requested CSA recommend a procedure for collecting next semester's Student Body fee.

Last week, in Executive Cabinet, a request was made to the administration asking that fees and waivers be processed during pre-registration and registration.

Present plans by the Registrar's Office make provisions for collecting the fees and waivers only dur-

ing the three-day registration process.

At the CSA meeting, Michael Harris, Fred Samia, and several other students charged CSA with making the student fee involuntary and a form of coercion.

Greg Cosko, Executive Vice-President, and Robert Reagan, Finance Commissioner, asked CSA to give the next "representative government a chance to work with as much money as we had."

Reagan and Cosko contend that making the fee too easy to reject would "eliminate the budget." Greg Cosko estimated a loss of 75% in revenues if the new system is put into effect.

If the fee were voluntary, David Chun said, the student would not have to obtain a waiver. Dennis O'Malley added that students would purchase their ASB card if they felt the government was credible in dealing with the budget.

Harris and Samia reminded Greg Cosko, who headed a drive last semester to make the fee voluntary, that he had forgotten his "whole trip to get the word out."

Cosko and Reagan asked that student government be given a fair chance to explain the budget and talk to students not wishing to purchase the card.

Samia said the whole system is "backwards;" that students should seek out the Student Activities Office if they wish to join the Associated Students.

Samia and Chun charged the CSA Executive Cabinet with setting up

The purpose of the Student Affairs Commission of SRJC is to stimulate and focus all available college and non-college resources upon the goal of assisting students to attain the skills, knowledge, motivations and secure the opportunities needed for them to become fully self-sufficient, specifically,

1. Significantly and meaningfully involve students in developing and carrying out student programs.
2. Plan and evaluate both long-range and short range strategies for overcoming poverty in the community.
3. Serve as an advocate of students on matters of college policy and programs which directly or indirectly affect their status, promoting institutional improvement and desirable changes in social policies and programs.
4. Conduct in it's own right or delegate to other appropriate agencies the development and conduct of programs financial through student funds or other available monies.

The above enumeration of rights, privileges, and responsibilities shall not be constrewed to deny or disparge others retained by students in their capacity as members of the student body or as citizens of the community at large.

MEMBERSHIP

Any duly enrolled students of Santa Rosa Junior Collæge shall be eligible for regualr membership in the Student Affairs Commission.

Any non-student person of the Sonoma Cōunty Junior College District shall be eligible for honorary membership upon application by those in-dividuals to the Student Affairs Commission. A 2/3 affirmative vote of the Student Affairs Commission shall be necessary for acceptance of an honorary member.

PRIVILEGES and RESPONSIBILITIES

Honorary members shall be -

1. Eligible for reduced rates to all Student Affairs Commission sponsored home athletic events, social events and cultural programs.
2. Allowed to participate in the discussion and implementation of all Student Affairs Commission activities except that of policy making.
3. Prohibited from direct participation in the selection of the members of the Student Affairs Commission Exec. Comm.

Regular members shall be:

1. Eligible for reduced rates to all Student Affairs Commission sponsored home athletic events
2. Eligible to participate in Student Affairs Commission sponsored athletics.
3. Allowed to hold office on Student Affairs Commission Exec. Comm.
4. Have free, or reduced, rates literary publications, rallies, dances, assemblies, social events, and allow Student Affairs Commission supported events.
5. Allowed to cash checks at the Bookstore, Cafeteria or the Accounting Office with proper identification.
6. Eligible to participate in all phases of Student Affairs Commission activities, including discussion, policy-making and implementation.
7. Eligible to participate in the selection of the members of the Student Affairs Commission, Exec. Comm.
8. Other such privileges and responsibilities as determined by the Student Affairs Commission.

ADMINISTRATION and COORDINATION

The Student Affairs Commission, Exec. Comm. shall be the primary policy making, administration and coordination organ of the S.A.C.

1. Act as chairman at all SAC meetings

Act as chief administrative person of SAC, including direction and coordination

Serve as chairman and appoint the members of the Standing Committee on Administration and Procedure.

2. Finance - Verify, sign and authorize requisitions and purchase order forms for the disbursement of funds of SAC as budgeted.

Authorize all payments of bills against the SAC

With the approval of the SAC, Exec. Comm. the members of the Standing Committee on Finances, including an Assistant Finance Commissioner who shall perform all duties of the Finance Commissioner in his absence. The Ass't. Finance Commissioner shall not have a vote on the Exec. Comm.

The SCF shall make monthly reports of all income and expenditures to SAC no later than the fourth week before termination of the spring semester the proposed budget for the following year.

SOCIAL and ENTERTAINMENT

1. Be responsible for the operations of all SAC Assemblies, Rallies, and Dances.
2. Serve as chairman and appoint with approval of SAC, EXEC. Comm. the members of the Social and Entertainment Committee.

As officers of the Associated Student Body of Santa Rosa Junior College, we have been involved since the beginning of the fall semester, through the system of student participation in the All-College Committee structure, in the formulation and review of the administrative policy of this Community College. Our active participation in this system, as well as the experience of governance of the Associated Students' organization has been of great educational value to us; unfortunately, the experience thus far has left us far from hopeful regarding the efficiency, candor, truthfulness, and sound democratic procedure with which this college is administered.

In the course of our efforts to deal with such student-centered issues as parking regulation, campus security, allocation of vacant space in the Doyle Student Center, and Bookstore-Cafeteria policy, our proposals and investigations have often met with arguments and answers of a most ambiguous nature. When we have attempted to obtain "hard" information in any form, from back minutes of the Parking Committee meetings to a legal opinion regarding titles to and assessments. The above mentioned real property, to the use of undistributed income from the service concessions, we have encountered not only the routine labyrinth of ad hoc committees, but what seem to us to be great gaps either in the record keeping ability of the Administration or in its sheer credibility.

We are firm believers in the social contract, even within the limits imposed on us as students vis-a-vis the Education Business. The record of our actual accomplishment within the system has been one of which any taxpayer would approve. Our plans for the future, which center around enlarging the Community College's participation in community development, are fully realizable if we are accorded the respect we feel is being withheld along with the information we require. In the present situation, however, we find ourselves faced ultimately with two alternatives; the betrayal of those whom we represent, or leadership of an aroused student population.

It is our feeling that the situation here is becoming serious enough to warrant our taking steps which will cause this conflict to oberboil the teakettle of our so called "All-College" committee system into the public arena. It is our serious intent to obtain the information we want by any means at our disposal. We feel that the business of the Community College is the Community's business, and as representatives of the most directly affected public, we have decided to seek the aid of your esteemed office in obtaining the information we need to carry on with the business.

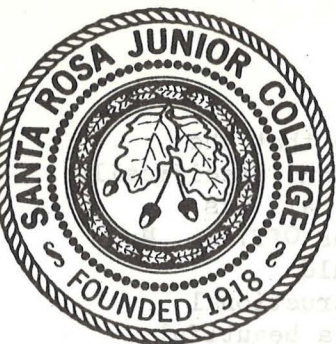

For the past semester your student government has been working to protect your rights as students at Santa Rosa Junior College. We have questioned the Administration of this college continuously trying to ascertain the validity of student government and the all-campus committee system. At this point, we, the members of your student government have reached an unresolvable impasse with the administration of this college.

Student government representing your views have questioned:

- 1.) The use of funds from the college bookstore.
- 2.) The use of proposed parking fees.
- 3.) The use and the title of the Doyle Student Center.
- 4.) The use of profits from the Coop and why food prices are so high.

At this time, we, the members of your student government want you to be aware of the impasse we have reached with the administration of this college. We, the members of your student government, wish you to know that we have exhausted every legal channel of communication with the administration of this college concerning the above-mentioned real student issues. Pointed questions have been asked of the administration concerning where your money is going, and we have received nothing but the most general and vague information in response to our questions with an added statement telling us that we are only a recommending body and regardless of our input into the all-campus committee system, the administration of this college will do as it sees fit.

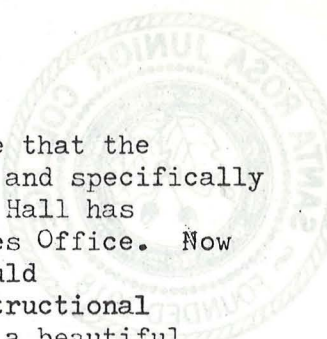
Some of you may be aware of the fact that a blanket \$5 per car parking fee is being proposed for next semester. When questioned about the exact uses of this fee, the administration of your college failed to justify the disbursement of your money. The administration proposed to hire a full-time person to be the Officer of Campus Safety, 80 per cent of his salary to be funded from your parking fee. When questioned about exactly what this man's duties would be, we were informed that in fact this new person would be the Chief of the S.R.J.C. campus patrol.

The new chief's duties will, in fact, be partly instructional, supervisory, and enforcement of all campus safety and security regulations.

We feel at this time that no more than 20 per cent of this man's time will be directly related to parking problems. The California Education Code specifically stipulates that all parking fees shall be spent only in the operation, maintenance, and construction of parking facilities. Now we ask you, is this where you want your money to go? Do you want to pay some \$13,000 a year for an instructor-policeman on campus?

Also, we would like to bring to your attention the use of Doyle Student Center. This is the old Bookstore, Coop, and old Student Activities Office.

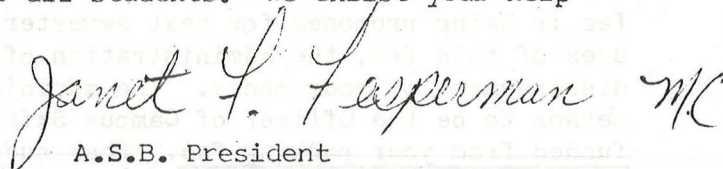


This facility is being paid for by revenue bonds which stipulate that the Doyle Student Center will be used for noninstructional purposes and specifically noninstructional student activities. The renovation of Pioneer Hall has provided us with a beautiful new bookstore and Student Activities Office. Now we have several rooms that presently are not being used that could furnish the students with much needed space for student non-instructional activities. The renovation of Pioneer Hall has provided us with a beautiful new bookstore and student activities office. These facilities, specifically the old bookstore, and the old student activities office, have been vacant and unused for over a month. This clearly indicates faulty planning on the part of the administration regarding the efficient use of the Doyle Student Center. Also you should know that profits from the college bookstore have been pledged by the J.C. District to pay off the revenue bonds which made our fine buildings a reality. Your money is paying for Doyle Student Center and Pioneer Hall and therefore they are your buildings; for your use as a student activities center. The administration of this College has stated in front of many reliable witnesses that the above mentioned facilities are in fact for student activities but at this time refused to act on recommendations from your student government concerning the use of vacant space in the Doyle Student Center. Topping this all off without consultation with the students, the administration has authorized partial use of your old bookstore facility for the housing of a new telephone switching system and have already started the installation of said Centrex telephone system.

Now we ask you-- is this fair? Is the administration of this college acting in the best interests of the students? Is the administration of this college protecting your rights as students of this school? We, your representatives in student government, think not, and would like you, the students, to be aware of the very real interests you have intrusted us to protect.

I encourage your help and questions concerning these matters and will be happy to openly and frankly discuss these matters with any and all interested persons.

We, your representatives in student government, are striving to make your school function in the best interests of all students. We enlist your help in accomplishing this task.

CONSTITUTION OF THE ASSOCIATED STUDENT BODY

- SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE -

We the students of Santa Rosa Junior College, in order to initiate and co-ordinate student activities; to represent student needs, interests, and welfare; to supplement and complement formal education on the college campus; to develop in students an understanding and appreciation of their personal, social, and vocational relationship to the campus and to the society; and to provide an environment in which students can totally fulfill their objectives, hereby establish this constitution.

NAME

The name of this organization shall be the "Associated Students of Santa Rosa Junior College.

AUTHORITY and POWER

The Associated Student Body is established under the authority of the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College and the State of California, and subject only to the laws and regulations thereof.

The Associated Student Body is the recognized organization representing the interests of the overall studentbody.

MEMBERSHIP

Any duly enrolled students of Santa Rosa Junior College shall be eligible for regular membership in the Associated Student Body.

Any non-student person of the Sonoma County Junior College District shall be eligible for honorary membership upon application by those individuals to the Student Affairs Board. A 2/3 affirmative vote of the Student Affairs Board shall be necessary for acceptance of an honorary member.

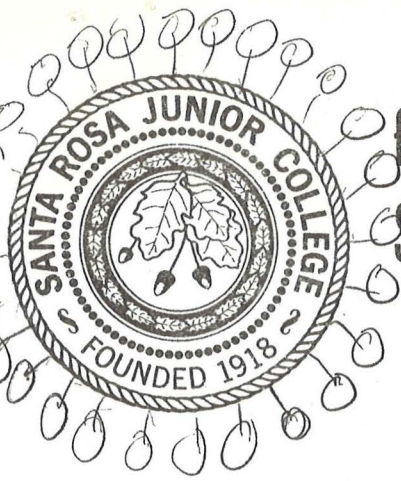

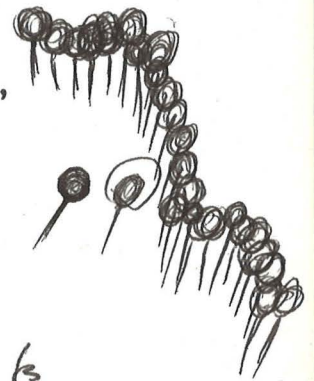

DECEMBER COALITION for ACTION

WHY WE NEED A NEW CONSTITUTION!

This constitutional change is but another part of the overall efforts of the December Coalition to remove student government from the control of the Student Activities Director and make it independent and responsible to the students. And as expected, we have run into much opposition from the Activities Director and a small group of his personal friends. The primary objection to these Constitutional changes is that they will allow a student to ~~sign~~^{co-sign} Associated Students checks along with the Activities Director. This is the first attempt in many years in which students have said, "We are going to do something that is beneficial to us without first asking the college Administration if they will allow us to do it." While we realize of course that the opinions and policies of the college must be considered, it is of much more importance to see that the rights of the students are not ignored by the college Administration in their efforts at expediency.

The December Coalition holds that the only student government is one which is ~~is~~ independent of the other forces of the college. Under the current ASB Constitution the College Student Assembly cannot even meet UNLESS THE STUDENT ACTIVITIES DIRECTOR IS PRESENT!!! Is this student government? The faculty needs and has an independent collective voice in the form of the Academic Senate, and the President of the college, an administrator, does not have to be present for it to meet. Are student rights and student needs any less important?

These Constitutional changes, if passed, would;

1. Allow the chairperson to sign ASB checks with the Activities Director

3. Increase the term of office to one year to allow more time for completion of projects
4. More clearly identify the duties and responsibilities of the student officers
5. Involve more students in student government through use of the committee system

Initiative

Approval of an initiative measure shall require a two-thirds majority of the votes cast.

Referendum

Any measure may be submitted to referendum by a two-thirds vote of the board. The Board shall scedual an election to be held not more than two school weeks after submitting a measure to referendum. Approval of a referendum measure shall require two thirds majority of the votes cast.

Recall

A recall measure may be proposed by a petition signed by a number of members equal to one-half of the votes cast on the last Associated Student Election. The board shall schedule an election to be held not more than two school weeks after receipt of a valid petition. Approval of the recall measure shall require a two-thirds majority of all votes cast.

The budget committee met and wants to completely cut the budget for 14 items. Barbara Smith moved to pass the budget cuts off until next week. It passed.

VI. Old Business

A. Constitution

Bill Unkel moved to accept the proposed Constitution in its present form but with drew his motion. Eight amendments were suggested in the meeting.

Bob Reagan moved to accept the first amendment which read, "Any student affairs board member can nominate committee members." It passed.

Bob Reagan moved to accept the second amendment which read, "Elections shall be held not less than one week nor more than two weeks after the receipt of valid petition or vote of 50%." Glyn Andressen seconded the motion and it passed.

MEETING TO DISCUSS A NEW STUDENT ACTIVITY FEE

In the spring of 1970, Sonoma students voted out the mandatory activity fee. On *Tuesday, April 24 at 11 a.m. in the Quiet Lounge*, an open meeting will be held to discuss the current impact of that move.

The reasons for voting out of the activities fee were many; one is clear, students at CSCS now pay \$9 per semester less. Another clear consequence is the financial difficulty of programs such as Intercollegiate Athletics and the Center for Performing Arts. For example, the Athletic Department, despite a championship basketball season, is in debt and has dropped its intercollegiate football program.

A mandatory fee could support such things as: augmented medical care, child care, legal aid services, transportation services, more emergency student loan funds, student-funded newspaper, etc. It could also improve the quality of the intramural program, recreational athletics, lectures and concerts.

On the other hand, there has been a marked increase in the number of programs and clubs without a supporting budget. There is significantly MORE student involvement in planning programs now than in the past, and programs reflect genuine student interest.

If a new fee is instituted, an organizational means for allocating the revenue will have to be developed. This has always been a thorny issue involving questions of accountability and independence. The creation of an organization does not, however, mean having traditional student government again. New proposals will be discussed at the meeting.

To have a new activities fee by next Fall, there must be a student referendum this Spring. Discussion at the meeting will therefore focus on how much support or opposition there is to a new fee and to a Spring referendum. Because of limited time, and since the issue affects every student, it is particularly important to have students voice their opinions at the Tuesday, April 24 meeting at 11 a.m. in the Quiet Lounge. (See article entitled "Student Voice.")

Glynn Andressen moved and Bill Unkel seconded the third amendment which read, "The purpose of ASB is to protect the overall rights of students. It failed.

Bob Reagan moved and Glynn Andressen seconded the fourth amendment which read, "S.B shall consist of 20 elected members. The 20 elected members were named, and the motion failed.

Bob Reagan moved to accept the fifth amendment which eliminates the phrase, "responsible to Board of Trustees". It failed.

Bob Reagan moved to accept the sixth amendments which read "Two coordinators will be freshmen or women." He withdrew his motion. Bob Reagan moved to accept the amendment as it was restated. It then read, "One-half of the elected coordinators shall be from the Freshman class. It passed.

Bob Reagan moved to accept the seventh amendment which said, "There shall be an elected Commissioner of Campus Safety."

VII. Adjournment

The meeting was adjourned at 5:20 due to lack of a quorum.

Talk of Student Government

ROHNERT PARK — Student government, or a reasonable facsimile of it, may be on the way back at California State College-Sonoma.

The issue of student government arose after an ill-fated attempt to revive student activity fees. It appears now that while the fee issue will be dropped, greater student representation on college decision-making bodies is in the works.

Student government, or the lack of it, has, like student activity fees, been extinct at Cal State.

However, a meeting was held at the school yesterday to discuss both issues, and one result may be students voting for their own representatives, either in a "student senate", or as delegates to the faculty Academic Senate.

The meeting was attended by about 30 people, most of them students, with some of the college administration present as well. Most of the talk centered around ways of improving the present, almost non-existent voice students have in college government.

The issue of the student activ-

ity fee was also discussed, but was dropped when it became apparent that very few participants in the discussion favored imposing the \$8 a semester fee.

A former college student body president, Jim Gillette, shocked most of the students at the meeting when he said, "There is supposed to be student representation on the Academic Senate and in the President's cabinet. There aren't any students in those bodies, though."

This prompted student Jack Armstrong to say, "There's power here that we're not aware of."

Bill Carr, college activities director, said, "There could be a student government, but there's not. The constitution provides it, but it's in disuse."

With time running out in the school year, a large amount of work would have to be done to gear the machinery of a student, campus-wide election.

The Associated Student constitution would have to be revised to set guidelines or student legislative bodies, and any proposals would have to be aired at another meeting.

One thing seems clear, however: Cal State students may soon have a louder voice in college issues.

Last week I wrote you a letter informing you of some intolerable difficulties that your student government is having with the Administration concerning our input into, and the validity of the all-campus committee system.

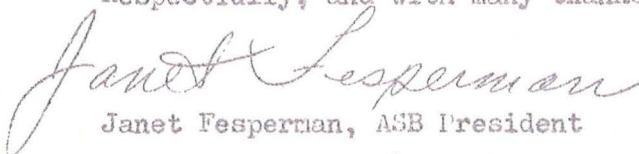

SRJC Rejects Student Pleas, OK's Parking Fees

Santa Rosa Junior College trustees, rejecting student pleas, voted last night to initiate on-campus parking fees, effective in September.

The tariff will be \$5 per semester for day students, and \$2 for Evening College students.

Student spokesmen insisted there is no serious parking problem on campus and called the new fee schedule unnecessary.

"It's an illegal thing," shouted student Finance Commissioner Bob Reagan, as the vote concluded. "We'll take it to court!"

The junior college was one of the few large campuses in the state without a parking fee. Most are substantially higher; for instance, \$15 at California State College, Sonoma.

The college administration proposal projects a \$30,000 budget with revenues of \$27,000 from fees and \$3,000 from fines.

It proposes spending the money for:

60 per cent funding of a new Co-ordinator of Campus Parking and Safety, \$9,158; additional personnel from the SRJC police association, \$10,905; operating expenses, \$7,396; and reserve for maintenance, \$2,541.

Trustee Walter Haehl of Cloverdale, without comment, cast the lone dissenting vote.

The plan was a modified version of the campus parking committee proposal which suggested \$5 fee for evening college students as well.

Mark Caro, a member of the college Student Assembly, told the board the plan is "totally unreasonable . . . not really intelligently put together."

He said the actual cost of maintaining the 1,368 campus parking spaces is \$13,000 annually, and that trustees were, in effect, asking students, to finance an unnecessary, self-sustained system.

Not mentioned in the debate

was the earlier charge by students that they were being forced to subsidize the college police science department and campus police.

Greg Cosko, student executive vice president, warned the imposition of an additional fee could damage student government, which depends on a voluntary \$9 fee from students.

He said there is no serious parking space problem on campus, except during the first two weeks of each semester and that students are well satisfied with the present parking system.

Others complained about the

plan to sell more parking stickers, an estimated 1,500, than there are spaces available.

But college President Roy Mikalson, defending his administration's proposal, said there will be more than sufficient turnover so that plenty of space will be available.

Trustee William Race also backed the fee, saying it had been planned for some time and pointing out that student leaders two years ago opposed acquisition of additional space for parking because it would encourage the use of more autos

Voting for the fee were Race, John Jacobs, John Lounibus, and Robert Call.

Trustees Albert Maggini and Lucious Button did not attend the meeting.

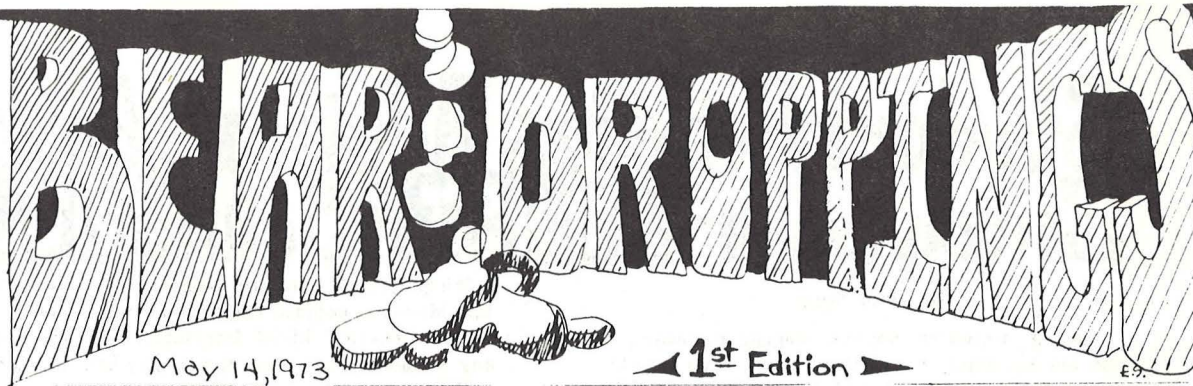
The defeat for the students followed a minor victory when trustees agreed to allow the former bookstore and student offices in the Coop to be used for student activities until the end of the semester.

"Hear, hear," cried all the students. "With the great Colonel Can-Of-Air to lead us, we can't lose."

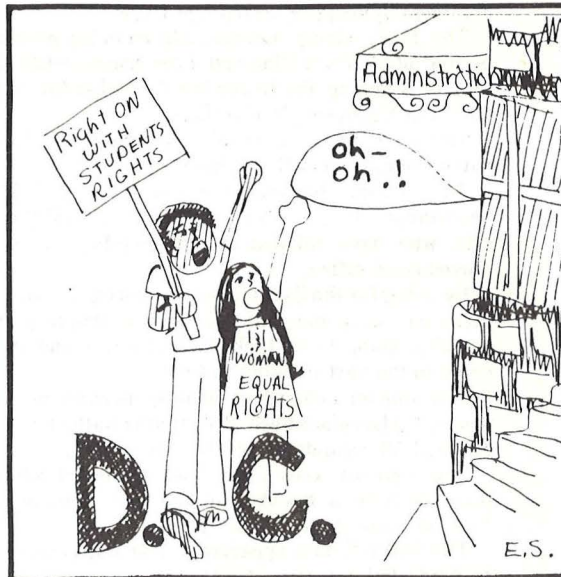

Student Activities Advisor, Asst Involved in NASTY Scandal!

Student Activities Advisor Eugene Canevari, and his assistant, David Herrington, have been involved in forming the Positive Action Team (PAT), confidential sources stated last week.

The PAT, whose membership includes members of the SRJC Vet's Club and a few hand-picked people, is opposing the December Coalition for Action (DCA) in Wednesday's elections.

The sources have proof that explicitly implicates Canevari and Herrington.

They claim Herrington asked one of the SAO's secretaries to give him a list of the members of CSA who have missed enough meetings to be removed from office.

He asked for the list before a woman called all these members and made false claims that they were possibly going to be kicked out of office and should come to the next meeting to fight.

The woman refused to identify herself on the phone, but has since been identified as Kathy Lazarus, PAT candidate for Vice-President.

The sources also state that Canevari advised Ron Edwards, a member of the Vet's Club and the PAT, of methods to defeat the DCA.

The SAO officials apparently have used their time as paid administrators for these purposes.

Canevari is paid \$21,800 a year by the District, and Herrington is paid half by student government and half by the District.

These flagrant abuses of power raise two serious questions:

--Do the Student Activities Advisor and his assistant have the right to become personally involved in the students' government?

--And will the PAT, if elected, represent the students or the administration?

The first question smells of the same power-mad drive that has crumpled the Nixon Administration via the Watergate affair.

Two paid officials are using their time and positions to defeat a government that has threatened their power.

Canevari has always held on to CSA with a firm grip. In the past, students rarely contradicted what he had to say.

The DCA, on the other hand, has been attempting all semester to give the control of student government to the students.

When former assistant student activities advisor Bob Marmor resigned a short time into the semester, Canevari hired Herrington without asking any students, even though they pay half his salary.

Herrington, a former SRJC student body president, immediately set to work helping to organize the PAT. He was seen time and time again with the PAT's leadership, advising them on various matters.

In fact, many people speculated that Herrington was picked because, as a former ASB President, he would have some status in forming an opposition political party.

The student activities advisor and his assistant are supposed to help the student government in power. That is what they are paid to do.

They are not paid to become directly involved in student elections or to use their positions of power to maintain that power.

The second question is perhaps the most serious. The PAT is claiming to represent student interests.

How can they be if they are being hand fed by Canevari, Herrington, and the college's administration?

The PAT is indeed made up of students, many of them hard-working. However, it appears they respect the "authority" of the administration so much they are willing to be used by it.

In fact, the PAT's candidate for president is Robert Long, a member of the Vet's Club.

The Vet's Club had controlled CSA for three years prior to this year, and those years were marked by a marriage between the administration and student government.

The only question that remains is, do students want to control their own government, or do they want the administration, via Canevari and Herrington, to control it for them?

The Coalition was especially upset that the news media, both on and off campus, have mentioned nothing about this threat to instructors' and students' rights.

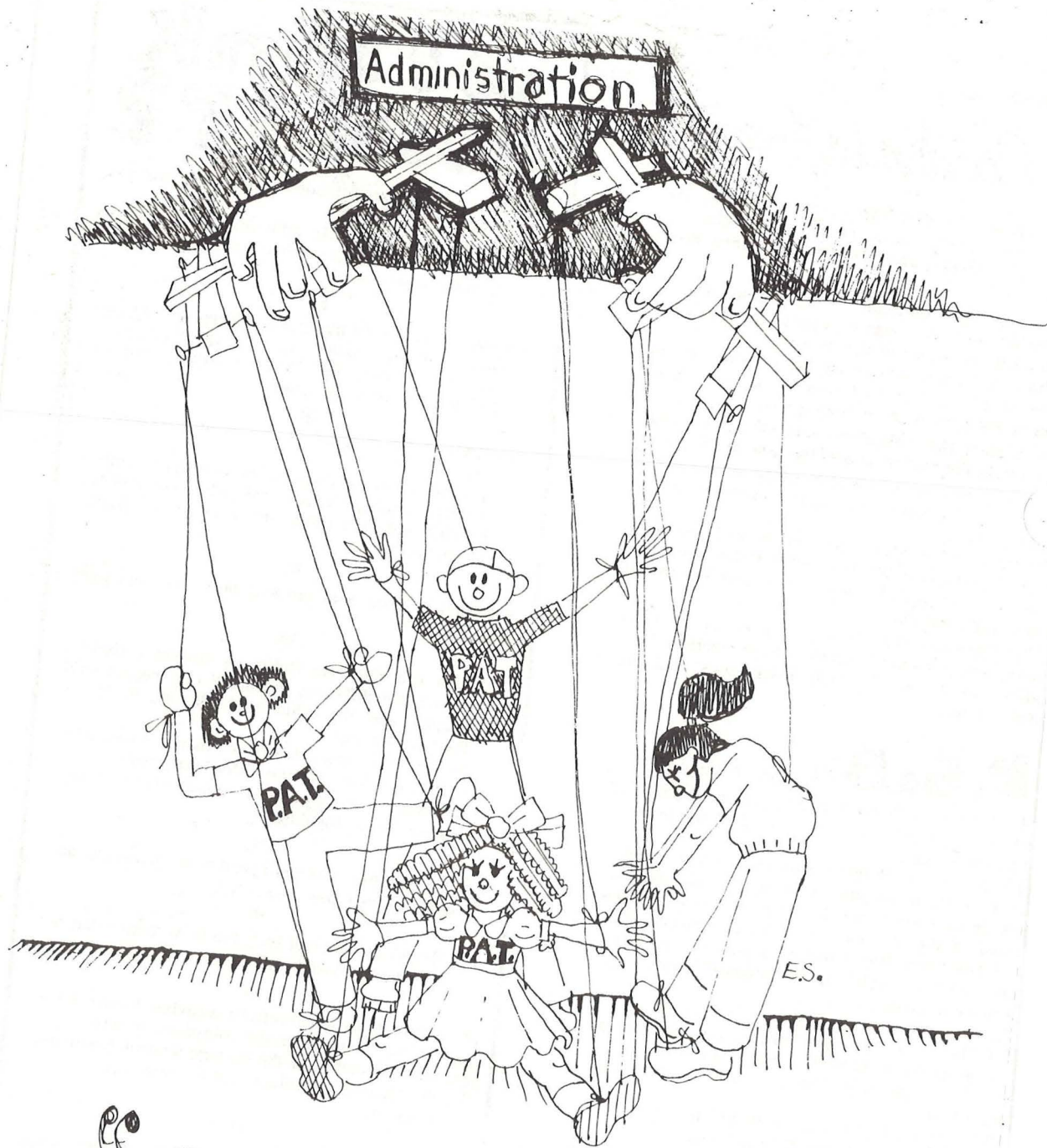

(Section III - Con't.)

Clause IX Other types of Publicity for elections are sandwich boards, open forum and outdoor stage (for speeches), small fence south of Analy Hall, Garbage cans, and posters on stakes on edge of grass.

Section IV - Bulletin Board Notices

Clause I Student's personal notices, such as items for sale or trade, may be placed on the bulletin board located in Analy and Burbank Halls and on the Kiosks. These signs will be removed by the Publicity Commissioner or his designated representatives, every two weeks.

Section V - Transportation Requests

Clause I Transportation requests may be placed on the bulletin board outside the Student Activities Office. Standard Advertisement cards may be procured in the Student Activities Office.

Section VI - Kiosks and Analy Hall Bulletin Board

Clause I Notices and publicity for general Student Body interest may be placed on the Kiosks and the Analy Hall Bulletin Board -- Use to clubs and individuals is also accepted, but must be approved by the Publicity Commissioner or the Advisor of Student Activities for that purpose.

Section VII - Off-Campus Organizations, Groups or Individuals

Clause I All off-campus posters, literature and publicity must be approved by the Counseling Coordinator (Dean of Students' Office).

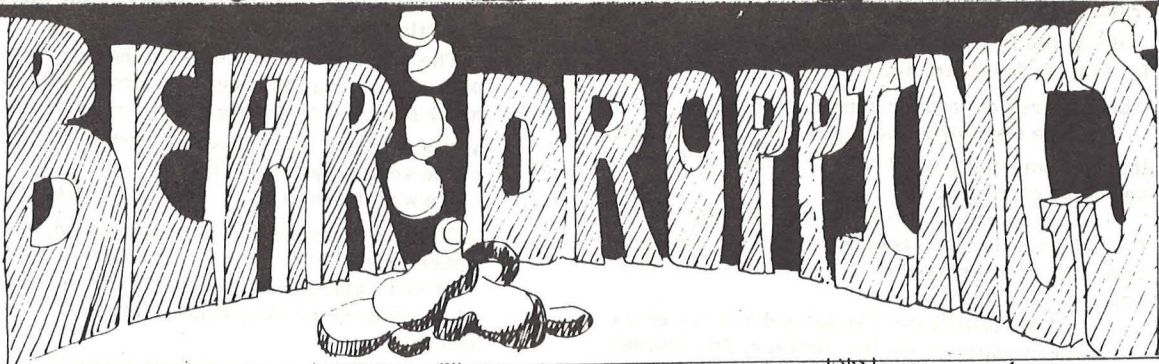
Section VIII - Time Limits

Clause I All campaign posters within a radius of ten (10) yards of the polling place are to be taken down the day before the election.

Clause II All campaign posters must be taken down carefully no later than twenty-four hours after the event if the event is held after Friday noon.

Clause III Posters will be restricted to two weeks posting prior to the event. During elections, posters will be restricted to one week posting prior to the election day.

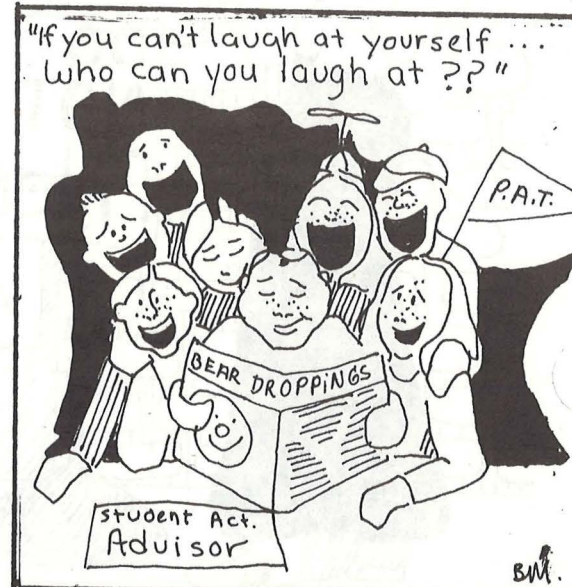

TOGETHER...again!

ce again the administrators of this college have stepped their bounds by denying you (the student) of your right to a free press. Acting under the College Conduct Standards seal disapproval Mr. Win Jewett, manager of the area, ordered his employees to confiscate ALL files of the BEAR DROPPINGS found in the coop week. The ruling states: "Campus organizations may distribute free of charge leaflets and similar material at outdoor areas of campus life, and at approved assembly-type programs presented by them."

Two days later in a meeting with Dr. Mikalson (vice president), Dr. Dougan (dean of students), Gene Cannevari (student activities advisor), Win Jewett, Steve Petty (teacher representing A.F.T.) and two-thirds of the BEAR DROPPINGS staff, it was learned this rule is seldom enforced. Oppression of the press is nothing new on this campus, the most recent and controversial case being a publication known as TOGETHER. In May of 1970 Robert Hall received an ASB grant to fund an experimental newspaper. Four issues of TOGETHER were printed, but after the second issue Hall, Bruce Muma and Drake Diller were expelled from school and charged with misconduct.

The charges brought forth by Richard Nazzarian, charged from "failing to use a faculty advisor" to resorting to the most offensive kind of gutter language" (obviously referring to the use of terms such as fuck, shit and richard m. nixon.) The students were reinstated by the college's Board of Review only to have the decision overturned by the ULTIMATE AUTHORITY, the Board of Trustees.

In the last three years there have been several Supreme Court Decisions stating that College Publications CAN NOT BE BANNED because of the use of "foul" language.

We can only hope the administration will not resort to some other ancient rule in order to stop this.

National oppression is trickier to fight than local oppression. If you are a black rebel, they can't exile you; they either have to intimidate or kill you. But in higher education- high school college, they can just bounce you out of the fold. Rebel students and renegade faculty members get mowed or shot down with devastating accuracy. In high school its usually the student who gets in college its more often the teacher. Others get

tired of fighting and voluntarily leave the system. This may be a mistake though. Dropping out of college, for a rebel, is a little like going North, for a Negro. You can't really get away from it so you might as well stay and raise hell."

place," he asked the Horrible People. "Don't you like the food here?"

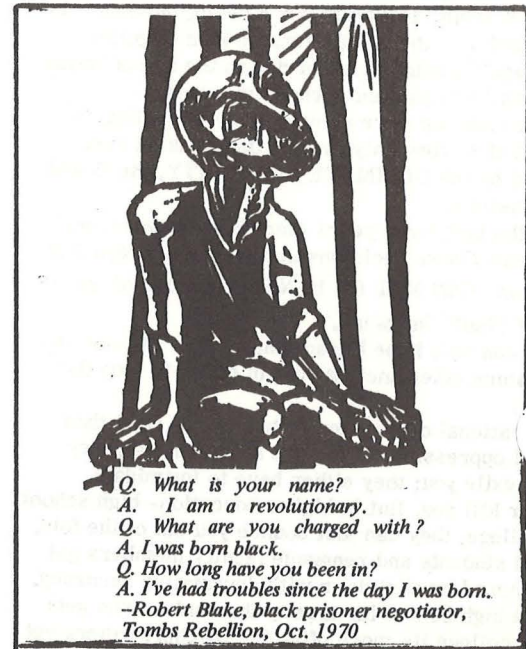
"No," they replied. "It tastes like droppings and costs too much."

You can guess what happened. The Nazz, outraged by that dirty word, put on the best performance of his career.

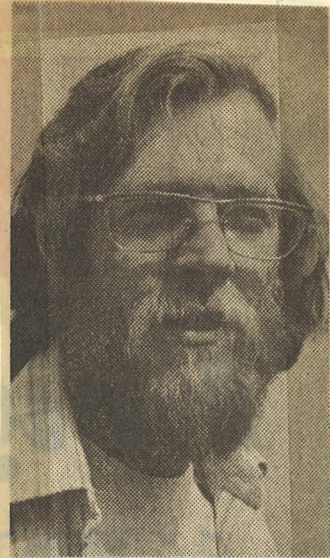
All within one breath, he kicked the Horrible People out of town and swore nobody would say that dirty word in the eating place again, or else.

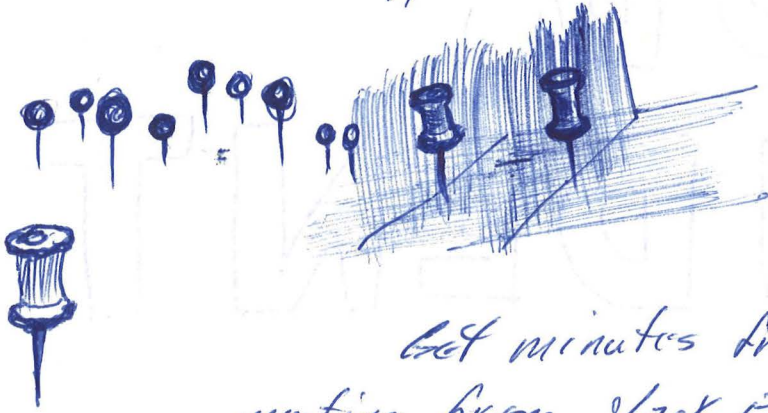

Based upon said Public Accountant's certificate and also upon this Board's own investigation, this Board does certify to the matters contained in this paragraph 3.

4. That the said facilities abandoned are no longer economically capable of producing net revenues.

5. The Board further certifies that the estimated net operating revenues to be derived during the 1973-1974 fiscal year from facilities of the system remaining after said abandonment shall be not less than one and three-tenths (1.3) times the net maximum annual debt reserve on the bonds.

Dear Gene,

I would like to resign as advisor to the College Community Film Guild effective June 15, 1973. I find that I cannot devote enough time to that job and still fulfill my obligations in the English Department and other college-related activities.

I also feel that any new advisor should help reorganize the concept of the College Community Film Guild to make it more workable. Television production is almost certainly beyond the possibility of a small, semi-organized group of students who have no access to equipment (even the meager amount at S.R.J.C.). Community news services cannot be run on a volunteer basis, no matter how much the local stations would like to see this done. Live, synched sound is not possible with the modest equipment and budget available to students. And finally, the constant pressure to form classes outside normal channels should be stopped.

I leave with a sense of failure, but I feel the time has come to leave under any circumstances. If necessary, I will continue to serve as advisor until September of this year, but if no other advisor can be found I suggest disbanding the organization, placing the equipment in the SAO for use by students, and the possible reorganization next fall with more modest goals in mind.

Thank you for giving me the chance this year, I hope I can be of service to the SAO in the future in a more successful venture.
