UCLA STUDENTS FIGHT FOR CURRICULUM REFORM

On June 7th, students at UCLA won a major victory in a nationwide effort for ethnic studies programs. For twenty-five years the Chicana/o students at UCLA have been demanding that the Chicana/o Studies Program be given department status. Instead, while the Chicano student leadership was attending Cesar Chavez's funeral in Delano, CA., the administration announced that the program would not gain department status and that the Chicana/o Studies Library budget was to be cut by 70%, which would force the library to shut down.

On May 11, 1993 the Conscience Students of Color group held a sit-in at the Faculty Center where they demanded that the Chicana/o Studies Program become a department and the Chicana/o Studies Library budget be restored. The 200 students that participated in the sit-in the proceeded to take over the building. The Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) was called in and used excessive force in arresting the students. One student, Sabrina Smith, External Vice President of the UCLA student government association and member of the USSA Board of Directors, was sprayed in the face with "Pepper Spray," a mace-like substance. Ninety-nine students were arrested in all.

The deployment of the LAPD instead of the UC Police Department on the UCLA campus was a direct violation of students' rights – the administration is required to request assistance from UCPD, the campus' security force. In addition, all the students were charged with felonies instead of misdemeanors for trespassing.

On May 25th, nine people began a hunger

strike on the UCLA campus to demonstrate their commitment to Chicana/o Studies. In the next two weeks there were regular protests where thousands of students and people from their community came together to demand a Chicana/o Studies Department. The nine hunger strikers included seven students (including one high school student), an assistant professor and a community activist. On the 14th day of the hunger strike, the administration agreed to all of the student demands. The students won the following demands: The Cesar Chavez Center for Interdisciplinary Instruction in Chicana/o Studies; no budget cuts to ethnic and gender studies programs; the full restoration of the budget for the Chicana/o Studies Library; and all charges against the students dropped. Congratulations!!!

Meanwhile, UCLA students also joined students at UC-Irvine who were wrapping up another hunger strike. Students at Irvine managed to get the administration to make the following commitments to Asian American Studies: four faculty for the Asian-American Studies Program; two support staff; and one program assistant for their Cross Cultural Center. These victories, among many others, show that when students organize, we can empower ourselves and make concrete changes.

SRJC looks to a challenging future

Optimism despite hard economic times

Santa Rosa Junior College enters its 75th year with budget problems, program cuts and student fee increases, as Sonoma County growth and ethnic diversity put pressure on the college to do more.

The campus, which has 31,000 students, will grow to 67,000 students by 2003. And it must adapt to rapid changes in technology — 59 percent of what high school students learn today is obsolete in four years; 80 percent of the technology that will exist in the year 2000 has not been invented yet.

But President Robert Agrella, speaking at a luncheon Thursday attended by 350 community leaders, politicians and educators, said the college can change to meet challenges ahead.

Agrella, who is only the college's fourth president since it opened in 1918 with 19 students, said he is optimistic SRJC will "hold one of the keys to the future economic

growth, development and prosperity of Sonoma County."

The luncheon was sponsored by the SRJC Foundation as part of the college's 75th anniversary.

Over the years, the college has gained a reputation for excellence in preparing students for four-year universities and vocational training, with a Doyle Scholarship program that has given \$12 million to 25,000 students since 1949.

"The combination of our academic rigor and our excellent occupational training programs have placed SRJC among the top community colleges in the nation," Agrella said. "But the past is prologue. To paraphrase Winston Churchill, if we focus on the past or the present, we shall find we have lost the future."

Agrella said technology will play a vital role in SRJC's future. A college task force is studying offering courses via computers. Students could stay home and dial into class on their own PC, if not next year no later than two years from now.

Less immediate is interactive television, a new technology in which students actively engage in class work from home.

The concept of 30 students in a classroom

with one faculty member will be gone, Agrella said.

The technology also will mean colleges won't need a central, "megacampus." While SRJC will still maintain its central Santa Rosa campus, it also will expand its new Petaluma campus and open a campus in the Healdsburg area sometime within the next two decades.

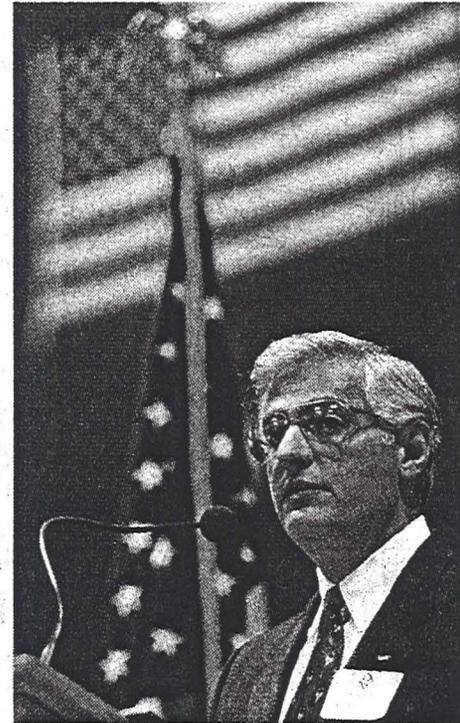
SRJC also is planning to develop a Learning Resource Center, which will retain the traditional roles of a library and become the hub of the development of the new technology.

"The LRC is our information highway to the future," Agrella said.

Agrella said the "golden days" of state funding are over and the college will have to turn more to donations from foundations while pursuing state and federal grants. And students will have to pay more.

Student fees were \$6 a unit and \$60 maximum two years ago, but were increased this year to \$10 a unit with no maximum for regular students and \$50 a unit for students with four-year college degrees. Next year, Agrella said he expects fees to go to \$12 to \$15 a unit for regular students and \$104 a unit for students with four-year degrees.

"While certainly it has been a monumental increase, it's still the best buy," Agrella said.

The increases caused a 4 percent decline in enrollment this year, with thousands of students with four-year degrees dropping out. But

lifelong education and retraining to remain employable and he expects those students to return.

As he discussed funding, Agrella announced a donation made Thursday of 10,000 shares of Coddling Bank stock, worth about \$100,000, by Sonoma County developer Hugh Coddling and his wife, Connie.

Coddling made a similar contribution Thursday to Sonoma State University. The donations are in

recognition for how much the colleges have done for the community.

Agrella also presented an award to Andrew Shepard, Exchange Bank chairman, in recognition of the scholarship set up by bank founder Frank Doyle, who put 51 percent of the bank's stock into a trust to finance SRJC scholarships. This year, \$3 million in scholarships were awarded.

Article 4. Student Organizations
(Article 4 enacted by Stats. 1976, Ch. 1010)

Purpose and Privileges of Student Body Organization

76060. Any group of students may organize a student body association within the community colleges with the approval and subject to the control and regulation of the governing board of the community college district. Any such organization shall have as its purpose the conduct of activities on behalf of the students approved by the school authorities and not in conflict with the authority and responsibility of the community colleges officials. Any student body organization may be granted the use of community college premises and properties without charge subject to such regulations as may be established by the governing board of the community college district.

(Enacted by Stats. 1976, Ch. 1010.)

Authorization for Activities by Student Organizations

76062. The governing board of any community college district may authorize any organization composed entirely of students attending the colleges of the district to maintain such activities, including fundraising activities, as may be approved by the governing board.

The governing board of any community college district may, by resolution, authorize any student body organization to conduct fundraising activities on community college property during school hours provided that the governing board has determined that such activities will not interfere with the normal conduct of the community colleges.

As otherwise authorized by law, a community college district may assume responsibility for activities formerly conducted by a student body organization. A student body organization employee who was employed to perform the activity assumed by the district pursuant to this section shall become a member of the classified service of the district in accordance with Section 88020.

(Amended by Stats. 1977, Ch. 427.)

Deposit or Investment of Student Funds

76063. The funds of any student body organization established in the public schools of any community college district shall, subject to approval of the governing board of the district, be deposited or invested in one or more of the following ways:

(a) Deposits in a bank or banks whose accounts are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

(b) Investment certificates or withdrawable shares in state-chartered savings and loan associations and savings accounts of federal savings and loan associations provided such associations are doing business in this state and have their accounts insured by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation.

(c) Purchase of United States savings bonds (Series F and G) as authorized for investment by subdivision (a) of Section 16430 of the Government Code.

(d) Shares or certificates for funds received or any form of evidence of interest or indebtedness issued by any credit union in this state, organized under the provisions of Division 5 (commencing with Section 14000) of the Financial Code or the statutes of the United States relating to credit unions insured by the administrator of the National Credit Union Administration or a comparable agency as provided by a state government.

The funds shall be expended subject to such procedure as may be established by the student body organization subject to the approval of each of the following three persons which shall be obtained each time before any of such funds may be expended: an employee or official of the community college district designated by

- 2) certificated adviser to SGA
- 3) student

Allocation of Funds for Male and Female Students

89241. Insofar as practicable, from the total amount of funds available for athletics from the General Fund, the trustees shall ensure that reasonable amounts will be allocated to male and female students, except that allowances may be made for differences in the costs of various athletic programs.

(Enacted by Stats. 1976, Ch. 1010.)

Annual Report to Legislature

89242. The trustees shall report annually to the Legislature on the progress made in providing comparable incentives and encouragements to females to engage in athletics.

(Enacted by Stats. 1976, Ch. 1010.)

CHAPTER 3. STUDENTS

(Chapter 3 enacted by Stats. 1976, Ch. 1010)

Article 1. Student Body Organizations

(Article 1 enacted by Stats. 1976, Ch. 1010)

Establishment; Purpose, Fees

89300. A student body organization may be established at any state college or university under the supervision of the college or university officials for the purpose of providing essential activities closely related to, but not normally included as a part of, the regular instructional program of the college or university. Such an organization may also operate a campus store, a cafeteria, and other projects not inconsistent with the purposes of the college or university, and property of the college or university may be leased to such an organization for such purposes.

The trustees may fix fees for voluntary membership in such organization established at a state college or university.

Notwithstanding any provisions of law to the contrary, if a student body organization is established at any state college or university, upon the favorable vote of two-thirds of the students voting in an election held for this purpose, in such manner as the trustees shall prescribe, and open to all regular students enrolled in such college or university, the trustees shall fix a membership fee which shall be required of all regular, limited and special session students attending such college or university. No fees shall be charged to students registering solely in extension classes.

The trustees may approve an increase in the student body fee only after such a fee increase has been approved by a majority of students voting in a referendum established for that purpose.

Such required fee shall be subject to referendum at any time upon the presentation of a petition to the president of the college or university containing the signatures of 10 percent of the regularly enrolled students at such college or university. A successful referendum shall take effect with the beginning of the academic year following that in which the election was held.

Payment of membership fees pursuant to this section shall be a prerequisite to enrollment in the college or university, except that if sufficient funds are available any state college or university student may at his option and subject to the regulations of the trustees establishing standards in that regard, agree to work off the amount of the fee at the prevailing rate of the college or university for student assistants. The trustees may adopt regulations setting standards for determining which students shall be eligible to work off the amount of the fee.

COLLEGE-WIDE COMMITTEES

Pg. 1 of 1

The College-Wide Committee structure is designed to allow for active participation by all segments of the College community in the formulation of policy recommendations. Committee policy recommendations are forwarded to the Board of Trustees through channels as defined in statements of Committee duties and procedures.

Once policies are adopted by the Trustees, the appropriate administrator(s) shall implement them as defined and approved. Periodically the appropriate Committees will evaluate the policies and will make recommendations for revisions if needed.

Faculty Committee members are assigned in a process designed and administered by the Academic Senate. All faculty employed at least one year on a full time basis are eligible.

Student members of Committees are appointed by the Associated Student Body President and affirmed by the College Student Assembly.

Classified members of Committees are assigned by the local chapter of the recognized collective bargaining unit.

Administrative members of Committees are appointed by the Superintendent/President.

The Instructional Office shall maintain a list of current College-Wide Committees and their membership.

College Council shall certify membership of College-Wide Committees; the Instructional Office shall maintain a current list of the Committees and their membership.

ENCOURAGING GREATER STUDENT PARTICIPATION IN GOVERNANCE

9

Second Reading, Action Scheduled

Background

As part of a series of actions to be undertaken in creating a new structure for community college governance, Assembly Bill 1725 (Chapter 973, Statutes of 1988) charges the Board of Governors with the responsibility for establishing:

“ . . . minimum standards governing procedures established by governing boards in community college districts to ensure faculty, staff, and students the right to participate effectively in district and college governance, and the opportunity to express their opinions at the campus level and to ensure that these opinions are given every reasonable consideration, and the right of academic senates to assume primary responsibility for making recommendations in the areas of curriculum and academic standards . . . ”
[*Education Code*, Section 70901(b)(1)(E)]

The reform legislation also charges district governing boards with the responsibility of establishing “procedures not inconsistent with minimum standards established by the Board of Governors . . . ” to implement the roles of faculty, staff, and students in governance. [*Education Code*, Section 70902(b)(7)]

As part of that implementation activity, the Board is to develop, in cooperation with district and student representatives, a plan for encouraging greater student participation in appropriate aspects of campus, district, and systemwide governance (Section 61, AB 1725).

This agenda item consists of three proposals intended to meet both the Board’s obligation to develop a plan for encouraging student participation in governance and a minimum standard regulation for local procedures. It is comprised of a set of actions to be undertaken by the Board of Governors and the Chancellor’s Office, a set of initiatives to be commended by the Board to district governing boards, and a regulation establishing minimum standards on student participation in district and college governance.

- establish a professional staff consisting of one executive director, one full-time clerical support staff, and one student intern.
- reimburse travel and meeting costs incurred by student representatives and professional staff for participation in advisory committees, task forces, and the Chancellor's Consultation Process; for participation in intersegmental meetings; for participation in community college organizations, and for conducting workshops and conferences.
- pay for printing, word processing, and mailing costs related to the establishment of publications to facilitate communication and to promote student participation in student elections.

Action Ten

The Chancellor's Office will undertake to establish and maintain State-administered services to assist students and local districts in recruiting and training students for participation in governance, staff training in student development, and review and planning for encouraging greater student participation in governance.

Program and staff development efforts should combine traditional and emerging delivery methods. Where appropriate, workshops, conferences, and technical assistance should be augmented by new technologies, such as teleconferencing and computer bulletin boards.

Commended Initiatives for Local Governance

This section elaborates upon each of the initiatives the Board of Governors commends to local boards for encouraging greater student participation in district and college governance. The proposed initiatives are intended to provide guidance and direction that local governing boards may choose to follow as they develop their own mechanisms for encouraging greater student participation.

The recommendations are presented in the context of the general planning goal to which they make the greatest contribution.

Enhancing Access to Governance Mechanisms

Whereas most colleges and districts provide for student membership on a limited number of governance committees, students have not had the opportunity to participate fully in the formulation of policies, as well as in those processes for jointly developing recommendations for action, that have or will have significant effect upon them; nor have they been accorded the same rights and privileges generally held by their fellow members.

Students should know they are part of and belong to a community of learners, faculty, staff, and administrators. Involvement of students in local governance promotes student retention and identification with the institution and its goals. Moreover, methods for building a true community of interest include effective methods of student governance and of communication among students. Ensuring greater participation for students would directly benefit both them and the institution by creating greater incentive to participate and rendering the collegial process itself more meaningful for all.

Providing the same rights and privileges recognizes the role of students as participants, as colleagues, and as status-holding members of the institution.

Recommendation 1

To foster participation in local governance, students should be accorded membership on district and college governance committees, task forces, and similar groups. The extent of student membership will be determined by each committee or group, but should be such as to ensure the opportunity for student influence in the deliberative process.

Recommendation 2

As a symbol of institutional identity and as a means of fostering student participation and communication, the role of the student trustee on the district governing board should be strengthened by granting to him or her the rights and privileges accorded by law, such as the right to make and second motions and the right to receive compensation up to the prescribed limit (*Education Code*, Sections 72023.7 and 72425). The student trustee should also be given the right to have his or her advisory opinion on motions before the board reflected in the minutes.

Recommendation 3

To provide opportunity to influence the deliberative process and encourage improved policies and recommendations, student members of the various district and college governance bodies other than the district governing board should be granted the same rights and privileges generally held by fellow members.

Recommendation 4

Every district and college should maximize the opportunity for student participation in governance through reasonable accommodation of time and resources. To facilitate student attendance, the prior commitments of all members of any given committee should receive equal consideration in scheduling meetings. Students should have ready access to campus resources to adequately carry out committee responsibilities (e.g., use of telephones and office equipment, and printing and distribution of pertinent materials).

Improving Accountability

Whereas their participation in governance is both appropriate and necessary, students must appreciate that they have a responsibility for entering effectively into the process. Full and accurate representation of constituent concerns and interests is the essence of effective student participation. Therefore, student representatives must be accountable to an officially recognized student government association or organization.

Recommendation 5

Each college should formally recognize the associated student organization or its equivalent, as provided by *Education Code*, Section 76060, as the official body representing the college's enrolled student population.

Recommendation 6

Student representatives who serve on district or college committees, task forces, or other governance bodies should be recommended, or where appropriate, appointed by the officially recognized associated student organization or its equivalent, as provided by *Education Code*, Section 76060. The representatives are to be fully accountable to that organization(s). Achieving student equity and diversity should be a significant factor in student appointments and nominations.

Recommendation 7

Students should maintain the scholastic standards of the college while serving in governance capacities.

Recommendation 8

Student representatives should be expected to work within the established parameters of the governance process.

Improving the Quality and Effectiveness of Representation

If they are to make sound policy judgments and effectively represent their constituency, student representatives need to be fully informed and knowledgeable about committee matters. This will maximize their effectiveness, and will inspire mutual respect and trust as colleagues in shared governance.

To the degree that faculty, staff, and administrators work to bring about effective student participation, students will find natural and appropriate roles within the total governance structure. Several conditions should be fulfilled by colleges and districts to support student responsibility for involvement in shared governance.

Recommendation 9

Every district and college should ensure to students, in a timely manner, the availability of pertinent documents and materials related to governance activities. Resources should include, but not be limited to, background materials, including copies of past minutes, meeting agendas, and related documents.

Recommendation 10

Districts and colleges should provide appropriate means to strengthen student knowledge and understanding of governance issues in order to increase student preparedness, to foster greater self-confidence in student leadership roles, and to enhance student credibility.

Appropriate means should include:

- inservice training and orientation conducted at the beginning of each academic year for the purpose of building trust, fostering teamwork, and preparing for meaningful participation in the governance process. Those planning to participate in campus and district governance should be involved.
- the provision of ongoing consultative services such as regular, timely meetings with committee chairpersons, the development of mentorships, or other alternative means of sharing with students, supported by both faculty and administration.

Recommendation 11

Institutional commitment should be made to providing the comprehensive student development needed to facilitate and support the governance work of students, and to provide a leadership-development program and training for student representatives. Student development and training should be provided by qualified staff.

At a minimum, a student leadership course should be available to students interested in governance.

Recommendation 12

Districts and colleges should, in both word and deed, recognize the importance of local student government. Therefore, they should respect the integrity of and provide appropriate support for elections initiated by an associated student organization or its equivalent to conduct elections for the purpose of assessing a student representation fee or a student body center building and operating fee, as accorded by law (*Education Code*, Sections 54801, 54803, 54805, 76060.5, and 72253).

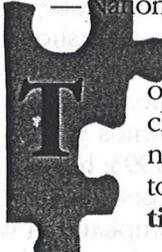

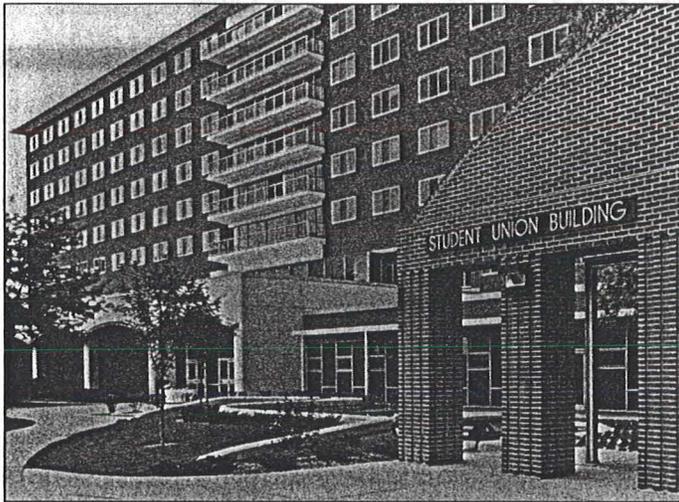

Research on the dynamics of group action, is reviewed and evaluated.

One Midterm examination, in-class projects, a Final examination, and a report of one civic meeting will form the objective basis for the course grade. Class participation will also be evaluated. The student is expected to bring the required text and a notebook to all class sessions. Required text is Sturgis Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure.

Students are expected to be responsible persons who will never miss a class except in an emergency. The student should discuss any absence with the instructor. Attendance in class is mandatory. Attendance or non-attendance can have an impact on your grade.

Mock meetings and class participation may be graded A through F on plus, check or minus.

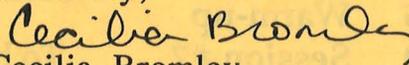

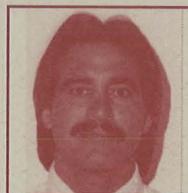

 - B. Bob Flores (Advisor)-There was the Professional Development Day meeting yesterday. There is a class named Political Science 50 which will be meeting on Wednesdays 2:00-3:00 pm. A.S. Membership is down 730 in comparison to last year. This means we have lost \$7,300. Persons with a BA who have to pay \$50 a unit have now dropped 60% this year. The Athletics Department is now under the Student Services.

Please inform any potentially eligible students that O'Meara Grants are available this year for SRJC students who meet the following criteria:

- (1) The applicant must be accepted and currently enrolled full-time in a degree or certificate program at SRJC.
- (2) The student's program requires regular attendance in a total of twenty (20) or more classroom, laboratory, clinical, practicum, internship, tutorial or contact hours per week, *not homework, study time, etc.*
- (3) The applicant must have a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.0 in all college work and be in good standing; that is, not on probation, dismissal, or subject to dismissal.
- (4) The student must have completed all processing of a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and have remaining financial need of at least the amount of the award. These will be about \$200 - \$500 per year.
- (5) The student must submit a completed O'Meara Grant Application/Nomination form that includes a nomination from an SRJC Department chair, counselor, instructor, faculty advisor or program director.

The **deadline** for applications to be completed and submitted to the Financial Aid Office is **5:00 pm, Friday, October 8, 1993**. Students in courses beginning at times other than in August should provide details on their application in order to be considered.

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Voucher Initiative Is a Big Gamble

ONE ISSUE that has been largely overlooked in the debate over the school voucher initiative is how the initiative involves a risk of over \$1 billion a year to state taxpayers.

Opponents of the voucher initiative claim that, by providing a \$2,600 voucher to some 500,000 students who would be attending private schools anyway, the initiative will result in a new cost to state taxpayers of well over \$1 billion.

Proponents of the initiative counter that the \$2,600 cost of the voucher is much less than the cost of students in public schools and, since large numbers of public school students will be induced to attend private schools as a result of the initiative, this new \$1 billion cost will be more than offset by these savings and that the state even stands to save over \$1 billion a year.

Who is right?

We don't know yet.

But according to the state's legislative analyst, it would take about 1 million students shifting from public schools to private schools for the state just to reach the break-even point of no cost to taxpayers.

By contrast, there are only 43,000 spaces currently available in private schools, according to a recent survey.

If the voucher initiative passes:

- Would a million new private school spaces be made available?
- Would there be a rush to open new private schools even though the voucher initiative will undoubtedly be challenged in the courts?
- Would there be a high level of investment in new voucher-redeeming private schools when the voucher initiative could be repealed by the state's electorate at any subsequent election?
- Would the new private schools expect to make a profit charging only the voucher level of \$2,600 per student?

Or, would they charge \$5,000 a student to make a profit, thereby continuing to limit the private school market to only those who could afford the additional tuition?

Given these issues, is it realistic to expect that the enrollments of private schools will almost triple from the current level of 550,000 to 1,550,000?

Remember, anything less than 1 million public school students shifting to private schools and the voucher initiative will cost state taxpayers money. Thus, the question becomes:

Should state taxpayers gamble \$1 billion that there will be at least a million spaces available in private schools?

But there's also another part to this gamble.

The whole premise of the voucher initiative is that offering school vouchers will spur a significant expansion of private school opportunities and, as a result, encourage a revitalization of public schools as they strive to compete with the private sector.

This premise is nothing more than a theory about the benefits of privatizing education — a theory that has yet to be tested.

Should California embark on a full-scale, statewide experiment to test this theory at a potential cost of over \$1 billion per year?

Or, would it make more sense to test this theory first on a small scale, and thereby limit the potential cost to state taxpayers?

The bottom line is that the proponents of the voucher initiative are asking state taxpayers to gamble over \$1 billion a year in a radical and risky experiment to test the validity of an untried theory.

Does this gamble make sense to you?

POLICY

DRAFT 3/10/93

It is the policy of the Santa Rosa Junior College District to provide equal educational opportunities for students with disabilities physical, communicative, and/or learning disabilities in accordance with state and federal law and regulations including the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and Title 5 of the California Administrative Code. Pursuant to Title 5, Sections 56000-56076, the College District has developed a comprehensive program to serve students with physical disabilities and special learning needs the Disability Resources Department to assist students with disabilities in securing appropriate instruction, academic accommodations and auxiliary aids. It is the intent of the District College that such individuals be served by regular classes and programs whenever possible. To that end, students with disabilities shall be admitted to courses and programs and matriculate through such courses and programs on an equal basis with all other students. To ensure equality of access for students with disabilities, academic accommodations and auxiliary aids shall be provided, to the extent necessary to comply with state and federal law and regulations. For each student, academic accommodations and auxiliary aids shall specifically address those functional limitations of the disability which adversely affect equal educational opportunity. When the severity of the disability of an otherwise qualified student precludes successful completion of a course required for graduation from SRJC, despite an earnest effort on the part of the student to complete the course and despite provision of academic accommodations and/or auxiliary aids, a course substitution or waiver of the course requirement shall be considered. no student shall be denied admittance to any course or program without due consideration for the student's potential and abilities and for the additional assistance provided by adaptive or sensory aides, as well as other supportive services and programs.

In addition, pursuant to Title 5, Sections 56000-56088 the College has developed a comprehensive program to serve student with physical disabilities and special learning needs. The Learning Services Department includes:

Enabling Services: provides intake assessment and support services to students with physical disabilities enabling them to attend classes at SRJC.

Adaptive P.E. Program: provides specialized classes in swimming, body conditioning, and wheelchair athletics to students with physical disabilities.

Learning Skills Program: provides assessment, special classes, counseling, and tutoring to learning and communicatively disabled students.

The aim of these programs is to ensure educational opportunities for students with disabilities at SRJC, within the limitations of the resources of the College, and to enable such students to take part in the regular college program whenever possible.

The District will maintain specific criteria and procedures to implement this policy.

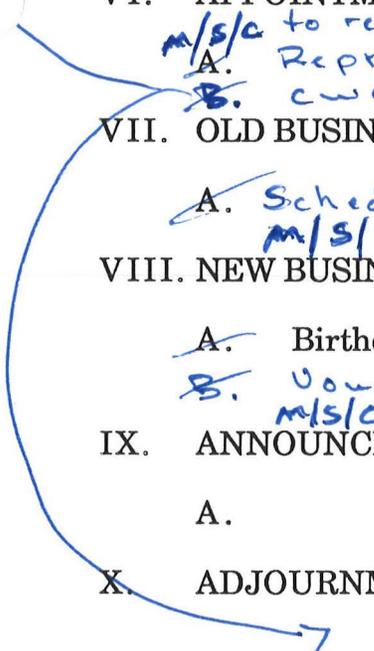

"PARENTAL CHOICE IN EDUCATION" INITIATIVE

Background

The "Choice in Education League" has drafted and qualified a voucher initiative entitled "Parental Choice in Education" which will be included on the November 1993 ballot. Its authors qualified it by circulating it for signatures. Due to technical problems, it missed its original deadline of November 1992 and was scheduled for the June 1994 ballot until Governor Wilson called for a special election on November 2, 1993.

Summary

The "Parental Choice in Education" initiative is comprised of the following elements:

- Vouchers (called "scholarships" in the proposal) would be at least 50 percent of the statewide average spending per public K-12 pupil in the prior year. (For 1992-93, the estimate is 50 percent of \$5,000 per pupil which equals \$2,500 per pupil.)
- Expenditures for the \$2,500 "scholarships" as well as the \$2,500 "savings" of the remaining per pupil expenditures would both count as appropriations toward the Proposition 98 minimum guarantee as though the public schools had received them;
- Children enrolled in private schools on October 1, 1991 are not eligible to receive vouchers until 1995-96, while others (including both present and prospective public school students) are eligible in 1993-94. (The authors indicate that they intend to revise this timetable so the Legislature will have until Fall 1994 to develop an implementation plan before the first voucher payments would be made. It is not clear whether revisions are possible, so the 1993-94 implementation date may take effect despite the authors' intent. If so, public schools will suffer losses retroactive to September 1993.);
- Any private school may become a scholarship-redeeming school by meeting the legal requirements for private schools as of October 1, 1991 and, if it does so, may set its own tuition level and raise fees above both the current level and the voucher amount;
- Scholarship-redeeming schools may not discriminate on the basis of race, ethnicity, color, or national origin (but no mention is made of religion, gender, or handicapping conditions thus allowing discrimination on these bases);
- Scholarship-redeeming schools must have at least 25 students (unless the Legislature decides otherwise);
- Scholarship schools may dismiss any student who is "deriving no substantial academic benefit or is responsible for serious or habitual misconduct";
- Regulations, including those related to ensuring quality instruction and accountability, may only be made upon approval by a 3/4 vote of the Legislature, or, if pertaining to health, safety, or land use, by a 2/3 vote of local government and a majority vote of the "qualified electors within the jurisdiction", meaning *a majority of those registered*, not just those voting at a particular election;

- The Legislature is allowed one year to establish a process by which public schools may become scholarship-redeeming schools. Such schools would then be subject only to the minimum Education Code requirements for private schools. Unlike private schools, however, they would not be allowed to charge tuition in excess of the "scholarship" amount.

Issues

The complexity of the voucher initiative raises a number of policy issues about elements of the proposal. They include:

- Voucher schools are able to raise their fees without regard to either their tuition level prior to the voucher availability or the level of the voucher itself. Thus, the poorest children are unlikely to be able to attend many private schools — they only will be able to attend those which charge less than \$2,500 (which tend to be parochial elementary schools) and will have no access to the majority of private schools.
- Students who choose to attend scholarship-redeeming private schools will use state education funds provided by Proposition 98 but will not count as students in determining the level of funding under that proposition. Thus, there will be a drop in funds available for students who remain in public K-12 schools and community colleges.
- In addition to paying for the transfer of many students from public to private school, the voucher initiative would provide \$2,500 for every student already enrolled in a private school. Thus, the state would be subsidizing those who can already afford to pay for private school education, while those most needy would find many private schools still out of financial reach.
- Proponents argue that the fiscal loss to public schools could be mitigated by the ability of the Legislature to increase Proposition 98 funds; however, this would require either a shift of resources from other public sector activities or tax increases — and recent experience indicates that neither is likely in the present economic and political climate.
- The initiative provides no standards for defining a student who is "deriving no substantial academic benefit or is responsible for serious or habitual misconduct." Further, there is no due process procedure in these cases. Thus, private schools can define a child as "deriving no substantial benefit" and send such a child back to public school against the wishes of the parents. "Choice" in this case is with the private schools — not with the parents, as voucher supporters suggest.
- It is unclear whether the ability to dismiss students who are "deriving no substantial academic benefit" would apply to students whose disability makes their academic achievement difficult or slow. It is likely, however, that federal and state law would continue to require that these students receive a free and appropriate education within the public school system.
- There is no provision for transportation costs in the initiative. Consequently, poor children are unlikely to be able to attend some private institutions because their parents are less likely to be able to afford the time or costs involved.
- Some analysts suggest that the voucher initiative will have a minimal effect because a recent study by the Southwest Regional Laboratory (SRL) concluded earlier this year that there are only 43,000 spaces available for new students in private schools, so relatively few students could transfer. However, private school educators question the validity of that study because researchers questioned principals — who do not set policy — only about the number of *current* spaces available. Some

critics indicate that private schools want to be ready in case the initiative passes and could convert some former Catholic schools back to school use, return classrooms used for other purposes to basic instructional use, and increase class size to accommodate more public school transfers.

- Although the initiative declares that vouchers are grants to children through their parents, voucher payments are made directly to private schools, including parochial and other sectarian schools. This may raise the question of direct aid to religion which is prohibited under the California Constitution, Article IX, Section 8 and Article XVI, Section 5. In a similar case, the California Supreme Court invalidated a program requiring the loan of state-purchased textbooks to pupils of sectarian schools (CTA v. Riles, 29 Cal. 3d 794), holding that this was direct aid to religion.
- Local health, safety, and land use regulations could be imposed upon scholarship schools by local district governments only upon a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the local governing body and a majority vote (1/2) of the qualified electors, i.e., all registered voters, rather than those voting at a particular election, which is usually the requirement. Since voter turnout often is far less than 100 percent, the probability of obtaining a majority vote of those registered is slim and thus local governments are unlikely to have the ability to regulate these schools in any way.
- The State Board of Education would be allowed, though not required, to impose student testing requirements on scholarship schools. However, it would not be able to specify which tests are used — only that the tests must be nationally normed. The tests are to be "designed and scored by independent parties," with no specification of who would meet this requirement.
- By failing to prohibit discrimination on the basis of gender, religion, or physical or mental disability the initiative may be in conflict with state and federal law, including the Civil Rights Act and California Government Code Section 11135 which prohibits state funds to any grantee that discriminates on the basis of ethnic group identification, religion, sex, color, or mental or physical disability.

Fiscal Impact

The Legislative Analyst estimates the range of the net fiscal impact of the voucher initiative from \$1 billion in additional *costs to local districts* to \$1 billion in *savings for the state*, depending upon the legal interpretation of the measure, its implementation, and parental and student response to it. *However, the result for public education, including community colleges, is a significant loss of revenues from the system under any scenario.*

First, the voucher initiative would add to the costs of education by paying \$2,500 for every K-12 student now enrolled in private school which becomes a "scholarship-redeeming" school. Currently, there are 530,000 students in private schools with more than 25 students, which could create an additional cost of \$1.3 billion (530,000 x \$2,500).

Second, an additional amount, up to \$1.3 billion if all current private school students participate, would be removed from the public school system as "savings" under the initiative's terms.

Third, for every student who chooses to leave a public school and transfer to a private school, the cost would be the \$2,500 for the voucher, plus \$2,500 "savings" removed from the school's budget, plus (due to the provisions of Proposition 98 and the terms of the initiative) an additional \$5,000 per student. This loss would be offset, in part, due to the fact public schools would save \$4,000 per student, the marginal cost of the student who no longer requires public school services. Thus, the net effect for each public school student who transfers to a private school would be a \$6,000 loss.

Implications for Community Colleges

Under the terms of the voucher initiative, community college students are not eligible for vouchers/"scholarships," nor are the colleges eligible to become "scholarship-redeeming schools." In spite of this, community colleges would be affected fiscally by each student who receives a voucher. This occurs due to the language of Proposition 98 which provides K-12 and community college funding from a single "pot" of money (known as the "Proposition 98 guarantee") which is referenced in the voucher initiative.

Since the community colleges now receive approximately 9 percent of Proposition 98 funds, it is estimated that community colleges will lose \$850 for each voucher issued to a public school student who transfers to a private school and \$425 for each voucher issued to a student already attending a private school.

It has also been estimated that if approximately five percent of public school students move to voucher schools and 75 percent of private school students use vouchers, K-12 and community college budgets will be cut 18 percent. For community colleges, this could mean a loss of Prop 98 "guaranteed" revenue of from \$429 million to \$486 million.

SUBJECT: Fall Enrollment Comparisons for 1989-1993

You will find attached our latest five year Fall semester enrollment chart compiled by Vicki Stewart. Data is extracted from our first census reports for the Fall semesters. As you know, by the end of each semester overall headcount is considerably higher than at first census.

A few observations:

- This Fall's overall enrollment has decreased by -13% compared to last Fall. The total units enrolled has decreased by -6.2%.
- Women still dominate enrollment by a substantial margin.
- Full time students have increased their proportion of total enrollment for each successive year. Full time enrollment increased by +16% over the five year period.
- Hispanic students show the largest headcount increase in the ethnicity category and reflected a percentage change of +39%. Overall, non white enrollment has also shown a higher rate of growth than white students. White enrollment actually decreased significantly this Fall by a -15% margin for the five year period. This is primarily attributable to the impact of the BA+ fee and evening decreases.
- Continuing students have increased as a proportion of total enrollment. New students decreased in 1993 compared to 1991 by -24%, again primarily in the BA+ and evening categories.

EDUCATION CODE
SECTION 66010.4
MISSION OF CALIFORNIA COMMUNITY COLLEGES

- (a)(1) The California Community Colleges, shall as a primary mission, offer academic and vocational instruction at the lower division level for both younger and older students, including those persons returning to school. Public community colleges shall offer instruction through but not beyond the second year of college. These institutions may grant the associate in arts and the associate in science degree.
- (2) In addition to the primary mission of academic and vocational instruction, the community colleges shall offer instruction and courses to achieve all of the following:
- (a) The provision of remedial instruction for those in need of it and in conjunction with the school districts, instruction in English as a second language, adult non-credit instruction, and support services which help students at the post-secondary level are reaffirmed and supported as essential and important functions of the community colleges.
 - (b) The provision of adult non-credit education curricula in areas defined as being in the state's interest is an essential and important function of the community colleges.
 - (c) The provision of community services courses and programs is an authorized function of the community colleges as long as their provision is compatible with an institution's ability to meet its obligations in its primary missions.
- (3) The community colleges may conduct to the extent that state funding is provided, institutional research concerning student learning and retention as is needed to facilitate their educational missions.

RESOLUTION OF THE
PARENTAL CHOICE IN EDUCATION INITIATIVE
(PROPOSITION 174)

WHEREAS, The Choice in Education League has qualified for the ballot an initiative entitled, "Parental Choice in Education" (Proposition 174), which would, if approved by voters, give each K-12 student a \$2,500 "voucher" that could be used to pay tuition at a private school; and

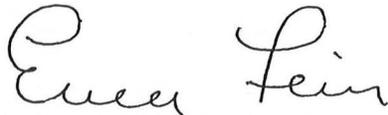

The Parental Choice in Education Initiative, also known as the school voucher initiative, will appear as Proposition 174 on California's November special election ballot. It has been said that there has never been a bigger educational issue before the electorate in California. Supporters and opponents agree that the initiative has the potential to radically restructure the education of California's 5.5 million school-age children.

There is a great deal of controversy surrounding the Parental Choice Initiative and the campaigns both for and against it are extremely well-funded and visible. It is important that we have a good, objective understanding of this complex initiative and the impact it would have on the education system in our state.

In essence, the Parental Choice Initiative would amend the California Constitution and effect major changes in the financing of public and private schools. It would establish a school choice system under which parents would be given the opportunity to use state tax money to pay private school tuition for their children. The measure would give parents a voucher, much like a scholarship, which could be used to pay all or part of the enrollment fees at any qualified private school, including religious schools, that would accept the voucher and their child. The dollar value of the voucher would be set by the legislature, but would not be less than 50% of the public school per student expense. This year, for example, the voucher would be worth about \$2600.

To qualify for voucher receipts, a private school would not be allowed to discriminate on the basis of race, ethnicity, color or national origin or to advocate unlawful behavior. Private schools would not, however, be required by this initiative - or by law - to comply with the detailed Education Code

regulations that apply to public education, nor would all forms of discrimination be prohibited.

Funds for the voucher program would be realized through a reduction of the public schools budget. For each student that receives a voucher to attend a qualified private school, the public schools budget would be reduced by an amount equal to the cost of educating that student in the public school system, approximately \$5200 annually. Half of that amount, \$2600, would fund that student's voucher. The other half would return to the State's general fund for other non-educational uses.

It has been estimated that should Proposition 174 pass, the first year reduction in revenue to the community college system due to loss of Proposition 98 funding would be between 300 and 400 million dollars.

Two aspects of the finances of the Parental Choice Initiative have caused particular confusion. The first concerns the costs associated with vouchers for students already enrolled in private schools. The second concerns the basic arithmetic of school funding which has always been, and would continue to be, based on student attendance.

The specific financial calculations which clarify these two issues are complex and detailed. However, taken together, they clearly indicate that the financial impact of the voucher initiative would significantly reduce funding for public school students. A careful analysis of the budget projections, both sides agree, shows that this initiative would result in far more being cut from the education budget than the \$5200 per pupil cost attributed to student transfers to private schools. Officials estimate that billions of dollars are at stake and that the State's per student funding would drop even further in comparison to national averages if this initiative is passed.

Advocates for this initiative believe that a voucher system grants parents a wider range of choice in their children's education and that it saves the State money by shifting more of the education burden to the private sector. They also contend that it would shock public education into change and that free market competition for funding would "force" public schools to make critically needed improvements.

Opponents say that the voucher initiative would financially cripple a system already operating under severe fiscal constraints and make any progress impossible. They believe that the problems of California's education system would be exacerbated by taking money from the schools and that the voucher initiative abandons the system rather than driving it towards positive change. They also fear that the initiative allows private schools to pick and

choose their students, opening up the possibility of a highly discriminatory system supported by tax dollars. They believe that the students remaining in public schools would receive a far inferior education as a result of this initiative.

According to legislative analysts, the Parental Choice Initiative includes some specific provisions to carry out its purposes, but also leaves a number of questions unanswered and significant implementation issues to be addressed. A whole new bureaucracy would need to be created - and funded - to implement the provisions of the initiative.

In response to the controversy surrounding this issue, legislators are already seeking alternative programs to address the concept of parental choice without causing such severe cutbacks to public education. Recently enacted legislation allows parents significant options in choosing schools for their children within the public school system. As a result of these efforts, students will no longer be required to attend the school in their district of residence, but may transfer to any public school of their choosing.

The Parental Choice Initiative voices community dissatisfaction with public education and challenges the system to initiate real and meaningful reform. Voters in California will decide in November whether the enactment of a voucher system helps or hinders efforts to provide quality education to our State's diverse population of over 5.5 million children.

As we near the November election, you will be bombarded with pro and con messages about this issue. It is imperative that we each have a clear, factual understanding on which to base our opinion of the voucher initiative. 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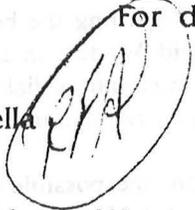

REDUCING MANDATES, WAIVING REGULATIONS

Introduction

Discussions regarding proposed mandate and regulation relief for California's community college districts and State Chancellor's Office have progressed to the point where district governing boards, administrators, faculty, staff and students must now articulate their views regarding the benefits and drawbacks of this important issue from a district perspective. Chancellor David Mertes, in a presentation to the State Board of Governors in July, asked district governing boards to "enter into a dialogue" with their campus community concerning suspension of mandates and waiver of regulations.

This **Consultation Brief** outlines the issues under discussion, the possible implications of mandate and regulation "reform," and the arguments pro and con. This paper also provides suggested procedures for undertaking a district-wide discussion and some questions that could help address the issues.

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The CCCT and CEOCCC boards of the League seek the input of local boards of trustees, CEOs and other interested parties on the issue of whether your district supports proposals to suspend certain state mandates and allow districts to seek waivers of certain state regulations. The League wants to know if there is a district consensus of support for these proposals and if not, why not and how the proposals could be modified to gain consensus for change.

Local districts should send their responses to the League office by December 1.

Background

Earlier this year, Chancellor Mertes proposed suspending certain state mandates and regulations in an effort to reduce the related administrative and staff costs for both the Chancellor's Office and local districts and as a strategy for improving educational services and outcomes in a period of diminishing resources.

The Chancellor is proposing that the current emphasis on program procedures and standards be replaced with a program emphasizing accountability indicators, and particularly student outcome measures. This is a fundamental change in the role and responsibilities of the state office—particularly as related to working with local districts—and shifts responsibility for accountability from the state office to the local districts.

As Dr. Mertes has told the Board of Governors, "At the core of [these recommendations] is a belief that our office essentially should not have compliance and regulatory activity as its primary function. We are not, nor should we appropriately be, policemen for local districts. We believe that our office should be working in coordination with the local districts to make available a level of expertise that can help colleges implement a given area in which we are involved." He added, "Accountability indicators, particularly outcome indicators, will move us beyond the rules and regulations regarding program inputs and processes, to focus directly on results. And when all is said and done, the ultimate goal for all of us is to improve student outcomes."

The proposals for relief from mandates were released by the Chancellor's Office in March. Because of proposed reductions in state funding to both the Chancellor's Office and the local districts, the proposals also were put forward as a cost-saving measure. The proposal identified specific laws and regulations which could be suspended or repealed and recommended a process for districts to seek waivers of specific regulations when certain criteria were met.

Some of the laws and regulations recommended for suspension included:

- ▶ State review and approval of district comprehensive plans.
- ▶ Local district EOPS maintenance of effort requirement.
- ▶ Site evaluations by Chancellor's Office regarding matriculation, EOPS, DSPS, faculty and staff diversity, minimum employment qualifications and special projects.
- ▶ State review of all matriculation assessment instruments.
- ▶ Submission to state by local districts of DSPS program plans.

The proposal also includes recommendations that Fund for Instructional Improvement and deferred maintenance funds be distributed on a formula basis rather than on an approved project basis; that no regulations be adopted if state funds are not provided; and that local districts certify implementation of their transfer center plans rather than develop an annual report to the state.

In addition, the Chancellor's proposal lists more than 25 Title 5 regulations that should be made subject to local district waiver if state funding fails to meet legal guidelines and if the district has made efforts to comply in the past and will continue to make those efforts in the future. Approval of waiver requests would be made by the Board of Governors.

The Title 5 regulations recommended to be subject to waiver include:

- ▶ The full-time/part-time instructor ratio ("75-25" law in AB 1725).
- ▶ Reporting requirements regarding faculty and staff diversity fund expenditures.
- ▶ Requirement that each district have vocational education advisory committees.
- ▶ Evaluation and audit of matriculation (waiver of parts only).
- ▶ Requirement for a full-time EOPS director (this section is already waivable).
- ▶ Requirement for maintenance of local commitment of revenue for EOPS.

As part of his effort to reduce the Chancellor's Office regulatory role and increase its ability to assist districts with meeting educational goals, Dr. Mertes also is proposing that efforts be accelerated to implement the AB 1725 accountability model. This model would include both a statewide report and parallel college reports on student access, success and satisfaction, staff composition, and fiscal conditions.

The reports would include information on such "performance indicators" as enrollment by ethnicity, high school graduates and gender; the average expenditure per student in categorical programs; numbers of students enrolled for two consecutive terms and students who transfer and/or receive degrees, certificates or vocational awards; assessment of student satisfaction with institutions; staff diversity by age, gender and ethnicity; and measurements of fiscal stability within the 71 districts.

Response to Proposal

Community college organizations have responded to the proposals with both support and opposition. Many chief executive officers have voiced support for this effort, indicating, as one wrote, "It begins to uncouple the mismatch of intended accountability and excessive overregulation which has evolved into the micro-managing of our local districts by the state...Relief from mandates would enhance the ability of districts to improve efficiency and effectiveness at the local level."

The CCCT and CEOCCC boards of the League strongly support this effort. The League believes the development of the statewide accountability model and the reduction of unproductive reporting and unnecessary restrictions will help colleges meet local and state education goals. Furthermore, the League board believes the system should, as Dr. Mertes has urged, emphasize student outcomes and not evaluation of program implementation.

Opposition to the recommendations has come from several groups, including faculty unions and employee organizations. The EOPS Association sees the recommendations as "a threat to the emerging populations in California. These reductions are incompatible with their charge of overseeing and providing accountability to the accomplishments of the EOPS mandates and mission."

The AFT College Guild of the Los Angeles CCD wrote the Board of Governors, "Experience has shown that when protective and defining mandates are removed they are rarely re-instated or put back into effect. Higher education will not be served by a rush to judgement in the removal of carefully crafted standards or the structural entities that have brought them to fruition."

The State Academic Senate says the proposal "potentially dismantles important categorical, student-service programs as well as the legislative mandate to improve community college instructional and student service quality now addressed by the system's full-time/part-time regulations."

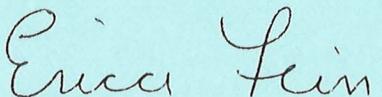

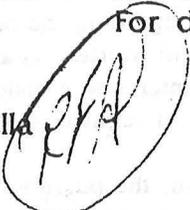

Re: Final Actions by the Governor on Selected Legislation

Monday midnight was the deadline for the Governor to take action on the large number of bills (over 1000) sent to him during the final weeks of the 1993 legislative session. Following are brief summaries and Governor's action on selected bills of particular interest to community colleges. (Note: a complete year end report on all legislation will be available with the November Board of Governors agenda.)

Measures Signed by the Governor

FACILITIES

SB 343 (Morgan), Chapter 0506

Eases requirements for leasing unneeded district facilities such that districts may more easily rent such facilities for periods greater than five days.

AB 59 (Tucker), Chapter 0137

Requires \$50 of every fine or forfeiture from handicapped parking violations to be used to alter existing facilities to increase accessibility for persons with disabilities.

FISCAL POLICY

AB 1290 (Isenberg), Chapter 0942

Enacts the Community Redevelopment Law Reform Act which modifies (and under certain circumstances) reduces revenues districts may receive in a redevelopment district.

STUDENT FEES

AB 39 (Archie-Hudson), Chapter 1132

Makes various technical adjustments to statutory provisions governing the differential fee for students with baccalaureate degrees and above, including exempting students from dual payment of enrollment fee, exempting students in contracted education classes, as well as exempting students who show

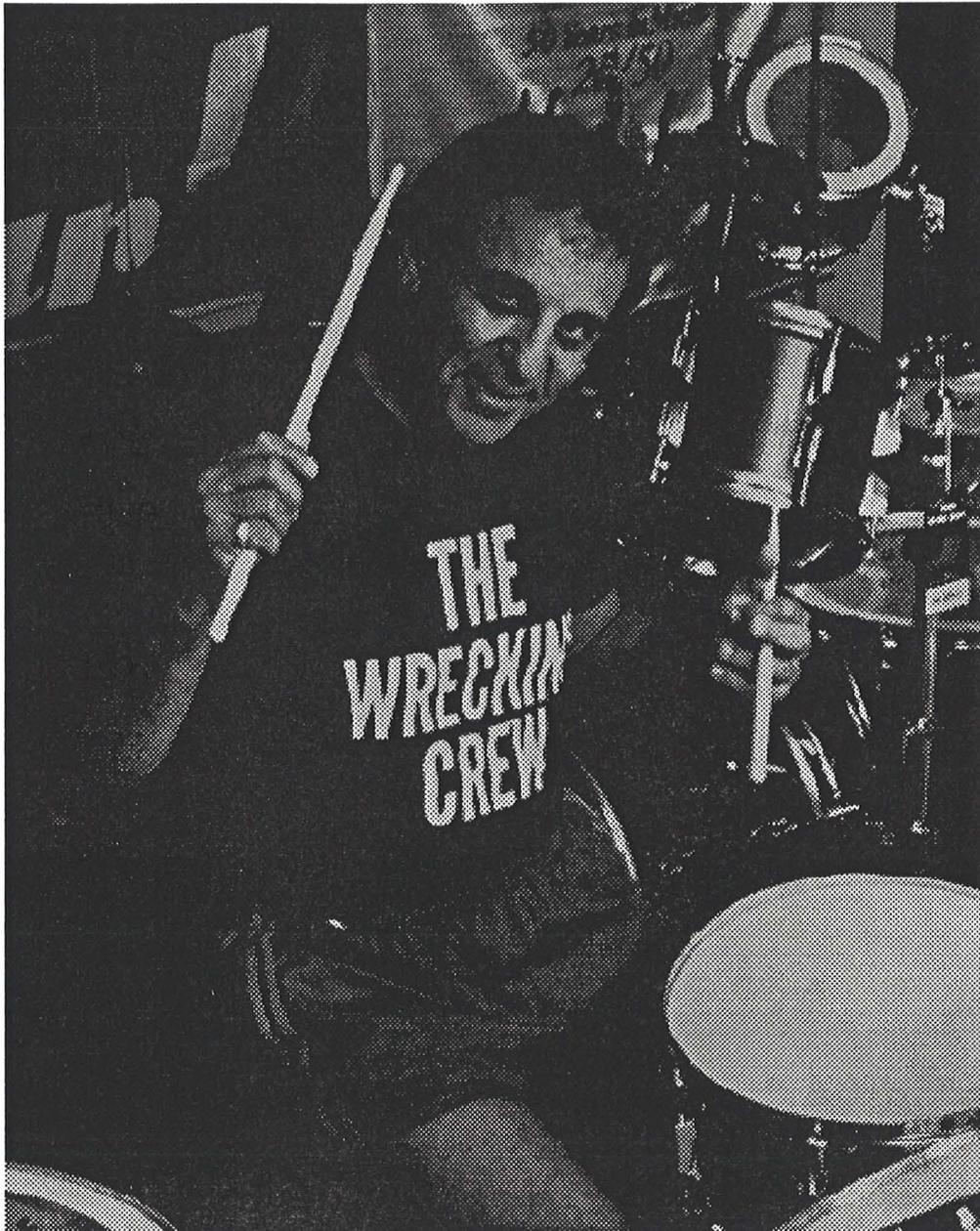

Santa Rosa Junior College

Student Conduct Standards and Due Process/Discipline Procedure

Purposes:

Santa Rosa Junior College holds that its primary function is the development of intellectual curiosity, integrity and accomplishment. The College further holds that it is in an atmosphere of intellectual freedom and discipline that students can best grow to understand moral, aesthetic, social and economic values.

General Responsibilities:

To further these objectives, the College employs teachers and other staff, maintains physical facilities, and attends to the health and safety of persons on the campus. The individuals making up the College community are diverse yet interdependent. Their objectives and the framework provided by the College are necessarily complex. Thus each member of the College community should cooperate in the pursuit by others of their educational objectives, and support the College in providing this framework in which teaching, learning and service are honored.

The College has the responsibility to make reasonable efforts to accommodate students with special conditions or needs. All students must be able to benefit from instruction offered at Santa Rosa Junior College.

Occasion may arise when a student's physical, medical, and/or psychological conditions may pose undue risk to the student or to others. In this case, the College has the responsibility to determine that the student's participation is not in the best interest of the student and the College.

College Conduct Standards:

Interference with the College's educational objectives or community life is cause for disciplinary action. All members of the College community and visitors are expected to refrain from such interference including, among others, the following particular types of conduct on College premises and at College sponsored or authorized activities.

Section 1: Standards of Conduct

Students shall conduct themselves in a manner which reflects their awareness of common standards of decency and the rights of others.

Students shall be disciplined only for good cause which shall include, but not be limited to, the following categories of misconduct.

- A. Dishonesty, such as cheating, plagiarism, or knowingly furnishing false information to the College
- B. Forgery, alterations, or misuse of College documents, records, or identification
- C. Obstruction or disruption of teaching, administration, disciplinary procedures, College activities, or other authorized activities on College premises
- D. Physical or verbal abuse of any person on College owned or controlled property or at College sponsored or supervised functions, or conduct which threatens or endangers the health or safety of any such person
- E. Willful misconduct resulting in injury or death to a student or College personnel or which results in cutting, defacing, or other injury to any real or personal property owned by the District
- F. Theft of or damage to property of the College or of a member of the College community or campus visitor
- G. Willful or persistent smoking in any area on College property where smoking has been prohibited by law or by regulation of the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College
- H. Unauthorized entry into College facilities, or unauthorized use of College supplies or equipment
- I. Violation of College policies or of campus regulations concerning student organization, traffic, the use of College facilities, or the time, place and manner of public expression
- J. Use, possession, sale or distribution of narcotics, hallucinogenic drugs or substances, or any poison classified as such

by Section 4160 of the Business and Professional Code on College property or at any College sponsored event, or appearance on campus or at College sponsored event after illegal use of narcotic, dangerous drug, or any intoxicant (Schedule D Sec.4160 B.P.C.)

- K. Use, possession, or distribution of alcoholic beverages on College property, at any College sponsored event, or appearance on campus or at any College sponsored event after consuming alcoholic beverages
- L. Disorderly, lewd, indecent, or obscene conduct on College owned or controlled property or at College sponsored or supervised functions
- M. Continued disruptive behavior, failure to comply with directions of College officials acting in the performance of their duties, continued willful disobedience, habitual profanity or vulgarity, open and persistent defiance of authority or persistent abuse of College personnel requiring inordinate drains on staff time, resources and supervision
- N. Possession and use of any deadly weapon, threatening persons on College property or at College sponsored events (P.C.245)
- O. Assault, battery, or any threat of force or violence upon a student or College personnel
- P. Persistent, serious misconduct where other means of correction have failed to bring about proper conduct (E.C. Sec. 76033)
- Q. Failure to observe precautions which the College deems necessary to insure the safety of the student or others
- R. Sexual assault or related physical abuse including rape, forced sodomy, forced oral copulation, rape by a foreign object, sexual battery, threat of sexual assault, or conduct that threatens the health and safety of another person.

The records regarding disciplinary action and decision or any appeals of any student or students found guilty of violating this conduct standard will be made available to the victim of such assault. (E.C. Sec.76234)

No Student shall be removed, suspended, or expelled unless the conduct of which the student is disciplined is related to College activity or College attendance. (E.C. Sec.76036)

Any violation or violations of any law, ordinance, regulation, or rule regulating or pertaining to the parking of vehicles shall not be cause of the suspension or expulsion of a student. (E.C. Sec.76034)

The chief administrative employee at a community college shall, prior to the suspension or expulsion of any student, notify the appropriate law enforcement authorities of the county or city in which the school is situated of any acts of the student which may be in violation of Section 245 of the Penal Code. (E.C. Sec. 76035)

Section 2: Forms of Disciplines/ Penalties

The following forms of discipline may be imposed on a student who is guilty of misconduct:

- A. Reprimand: Notice that students conduct in a specific instance does not meet College standards and that continued misconduct may result in a more serious disciplinary action.
- B. Probation: Notice that the student found in violation of the College standards may continue to be enrolled under stated conditions, violations of which may be cause for more serious disciplinary action.
- C. Restitution: Reimbursement for damage to or misappropriation of property which may take the form of appropriate service to repair or otherwise compensate for damages. Restitution may be imposed in combination with any other penalty.
- D. Suspension by Instructor: Denial of the right to attend a particular class for a specific length of time, may not exceed two (2) class meetings of class. (E.C. Sec. 73031)
- E. Suspension by President: Denial for good cause of all campus privileges, including one or more of the following;
 1. The right to enter the campus
 2. Exclusion from one or more classes for a period of up to ten (10) days of instruction
 3. Exclusion from one or more classes and activities for the remainder of

the school term

4. Exclusion from all classes and activities of the Community College for one or more terms.

(Periods of suspension do not allow for makeup class work.)

(E.C. Sec.76031 & P.C.246, see required notices, Sec. F)

- F. Expulsion: by Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College for an indefinite period of time includes loss of all College privileges including College employment and the privilege of entering any portion of the campus except by written authorization from the Vice President of Student Services. Expulsion must be imposed by the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College. Readmission is contingent upon a showing of rehabilitation by the student. (E.C. Sec.76031 & P.C.246) Penalties of a lesser degree may be applied by the Vice President of Student Services as part of the process from those listed.

Section 3: Disciplinary Procedures/ Process

(Educational Code, Section 760300-76037)

A. Notice of Discipline

1. Charges: Disciplinary charges may be initiated against a student by another student, staff member, or a non-campus person. A complaint must be in writing, signed and presented to the Vice President of Student Services who will investigate and take appropriate action. The Vice President of Student Services may also initiate disciplinary action on behalf of the College.
2. Notice: A student charged with misconduct shall be given notice in person or by certified return receipt mail to meet with the Vice President of Student Services or other administrative officer designated by the President of the College at a specific time, date, and place for a conference regarding a charge of misconduct. In the case of a minor student, such notice shall go to the parent or guardian.*

*(Failure on the part of the student to meet with the Vice President of Student Services as requested may result in a decision being made in the student's absence, and the student shall be notified of this decision by certified return receipt mail or in person.

Processing of all student records, registration and transcript detail may be held in abeyance until the student follows up on a Notice to Appear.)

3. Conference with the Vice President of Student Services

- a. The student shall be given a written statement of the charges.
 - b. The student shall be asked to make a written response to the charges within two (2) school days.
 - c. The Vice President of Student Services and the student shall discuss the charges and response, if available.
 - d. The Vice President of Student Services shall inform the student of this decision with respect to the charges and recommend disciplinary action or the date and time when another meeting shall be held for further discussion of the Vice President's recommendation.
 - e. The Vice President of Student Services may:
 - i. Dismiss the charges
 - ii. Reprimand the student
 - iii. Order restitution
 - iv. Order probation
 - v. Recommend suspension to the President
 - vi. Recommend expulsion to the President
- B. Suspension by Instructor: An instructor may suspend a student from class for a definite period up to two (2) class meetings no matter the length or type of class. (E.C. Sec.76032). Prior to suspension the instructor shall meet with the student, inform him/her of the cause of the suspension, and allow the student to present his/her side of the matter. (E.C. Sec. 76032) As soon as possible an instructor shall ask the parent or guardian of a minor student who is suspended to attend a parent conference. At the request of the parent or guardian or instructor, a College administrator shall attend the conference. (E.C. Sec.76032)
- C. Suspension by the President:
1. If the Vice President of Student Services recommends suspension, he/she shall notify the student of student's right to a hearing before the President and specify the time and place of the hearing. The student may, in writing, waive his/her right to a hearing.

2. The President shall conduct the hearing at which the Vice President of Student Services shall present the basis for his/her recommendation of suspension and the student shall present his/her defense.
3. The President may dismiss the charge or impose one or more of the following sanctions:
 - a. Reprimand the student
 - b. Order restitution
 - c. Order probation
 - d. Suspend the student
 - e. Recommend expulsion to the Board of Trustees
4. The President may suspend a student for the period prior to the hearing to protect lives or property and to insure maintenance of order provided that the hearing is to be held within ten (10) days after the suspension is imposed.
5. If a suspension of a minor is ordered by the President, he/she or his/her designee shall notify the parent or guardian in writing by certified return receipt mail.

D. Expulsion by Governing Board: If expulsion is recommended, the Vice President of Student Services shall notify the student of his/her right to a hearing before the Board of Review and the procedures to request a hearing:

1. Composition; The Board of Review shall be composed of two (2) teachers and one (1) administrator appointed by the College Committee on Committees, the President of the Associated Students, and one (1) student who is not a member of the College Student Assembly but who is elected to Board of Review membership each semester by the College Student Assembly. It shall be the responsibility of the President that no member of the Board of Review is personally involved in the underlying situation to avoid conflict of interest.
2. Jurisdiction; The Board of Review shall review a disciplinary recommendation of expulsion only upon written request of the student for whom expulsion is recommended. The finding of this review shall be communicated by the Board of Review Chairman to the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College in the form of a recommendation to uphold or lessen the disciplinary

action recommended by the Office of the President. The Board of Review is not a court of law, but is a lay body whose sole function is to investigate, reach a conclusion, and make a recommendation to the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College.

3. Organization: One of the members of the Board of Review will be appointed as Chairperson by the College President. He/she shall serve in that capacity for the entire school year unless he/she resigns. In case of resignation, the President shall appoint a second chairperson.

a. Three members of the Board of Review must be present for it to take any action.

b. The President may authorize the formation of additional Boards of Review as needed with selection to be made through the same procedures as outlined above.

c. Alternates to serve on a summer Board will be chosen as needed through these same procedures except that the President of the Associated Students will appoint the student members

d. The Chairperson shall determine the time and place of all meetings.

i. The Chairperson has the obligation to maintain a responsible and orderly process during the meeting. He/she is vested with the right to adjourn the meeting at any time he/she feels orderly procedures are not being followed.

ii. The Chairperson shall determine whether to use a tape recording of the meeting and/or minutes taken by a College secretary. The record (s) shall be filed in the Office of the Vice President of Student Services.

4. Procedures:

a. It shall be the responsibility of the Vice President of Student Services to submit to the Board of Review the Vice President's Due Process and Disciplinary Procedure Summary which includes charges, written statements, evidence, and disciplinary recommendations.

b. A meeting of the Board of Review shall be convened no earlier than twenty-four (24) hours (one school day) and generally no later than

seven (7) school days following the filing of a request for hearing in the office of Vice President of Student Services.

c. The meetings of the Board of Review shall be closed to everyone other than the Board of Review members, the student charged, an adviser selected by the student, the representative of the Vice President of Student Services or other College representative, the person designated to record the minutes, and witnesses while they are presenting testimony.

d. The Vice President of Student Services shall be asked first to make any further comments and answer questions regarding the Vice President's Due Process and Disciplinary Procedures Summary. The Vice President of Student Services may provide further evidence and witnesses.

e. The student together with a representative, may appear in person to present evidence and witnesses. The student shall have an opportunity to question adverse witnesses.

f. Persons involved may be asked questions by the student, the Vice President of Student Services, and any member of the Board of Review.

g. Written as well as oral evidence may be introduced by the student and the Vice President of Student Services.

h. All matters upon which the recommendation is based must be introduced into evidence at the meeting of the Board of Review.

i. The members of the Board of Review shall vote by open written ballot, and the votes shall be recorded in the minutes by name.

j. The Chairman of the Board of Review shall transmit a recommendation to the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College and the student that the:

- i. Charges be dismissed
- ii. Student be reprimanded
- iii. Restitution be ordered
- iv. Student be placed on probation
- v. Student be suspended
- vi. Student be expelled

k. If the action recommended is expulsion, the Chairman of the Board

of Review shall inform the student that he/she may demand a hearing before the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College.

5. Decision by the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College:

a. The Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College shall review the record of those student disciplinary cases in which the Board of Review has recommended a penalty of expulsion.

b. At least one week prior to the meeting at which the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College will decide the matter, the Board of Review will submit to the Board of Trustees and the student a statement of its recommendation and findings. The Board of Review will also submit a copy of the record produced by the Vice President of Student Services.

c. The student may submit a brief written statement to the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College stating his/her own position and including his/her own request for disposition of his/her case. This statement must be submitted to the Board of Trustees and the Board of Review at least two (2) days prior to the meeting at which the Board of Trustees will decide the matter.

d. The student and his/her adviser may make a brief oral presentation to the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College at the meeting. If he/she wishes to do so, he/she must notify the Board of Trustees. A representative of the Board of Review may also make a brief oral presentation.

e. The Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College may dismiss the charges or impose one or more of the following sanctions:

- i. Reprimand the student
- ii. Order restitution
- iii. Order probation
- iv. Suspend the student
- v. Expel the student

E. Student Records: Right to Include Statement or Response to Disciplinary Action.

"Whenever there is included in any student record information concerning any disciplinary action taken by community college

personnel in connection with the student, the student shall be allowed to include in such record a written statement or response concerning the disciplinary action." (E.C. Sec. 76035)

1. The President shall, prior to the suspension or expulsion of any student, notify the appropriate law enforcement authorities of any acts of a student which may constitute an assault with a deadly weapon as set forth in Section 245 of the Penal

Code of California. (E.C. Sec. 76031)

2. The President shall report all suspensions to the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College. (E.C. Sec. 76031)

3. Suspensions and expulsions shall be so noted on the official records of those affected.

4. The standards and actions listed herein do not interfere with rules and regulations established by individual instructors regarding grading, attendance, and classroom expectations.

Although all staff members representing the College are concerned with the welfare and discipline of students, it is the responsibility of the Vice President of Student Services in concert with the other campus offices to see that rules and regulations are maintained.

If there are any questions regarding Student Conduct Standards of Due Process/Discipline these should be referred to the Vice President of Student Services at Santa Rosa Junior College.

The rules and regulations as set forth in these pages were officially adopted by the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College on June 14, 1971, in compliance with a law passed by the State Legislature in the fall of 1969.

These rules and regulations were revised to meet State Education Code requirements and approved by the Board of Trustees on March 12, 1984.

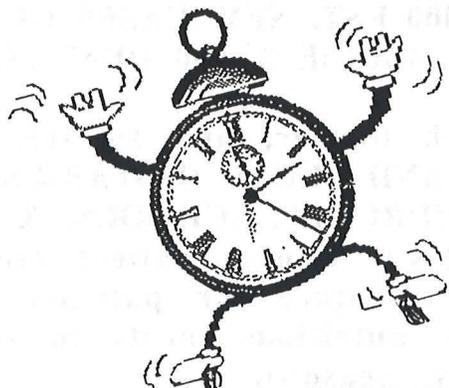

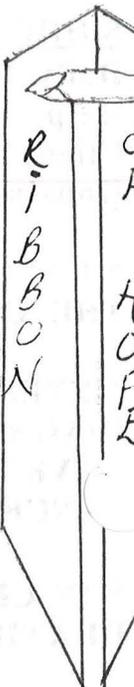

e) Develop recruitment, retention, and academic success strategies to more equitably serve African-American, Hispanic, American Indian, people with disabilities, and other under-represented populations.

* 11. Retain more students

The College should continue to improve and encourage retention of students while maintaining the highest educational standards. We should study ways in which to minimize the number of times students are unsuccessful and subsequently re-take classes. Our student orientation materials and program information should emphasize the time commitment required for academic success, as well as the importance of seeking help from instructors outside of class and developing study skills. We need to expand the use of non-credit labs, study groups, mid-term conferences, guidance courses for probation students, and other programs and activities designed to improve retention. Staff development activities should encourage across-the-curriculum collaboration on ways to improve teaching and promote retention. The District also should expand its recognition of successful students.

- a) Ensure that new student programs emphasize
 - the time commitment needed to succeed in college,
 - the importance of seeking help from instructors outside the classroom,
 - the importance of study skills. 1993-94
- b) Expand the use of non-credit labs (e.g., Chem 760) to assist students in high-attrition courses. 1993-94
- c) Support and facilitate the use of study groups. 1993-94
- d) Develop an aggressive telephone follow-up system for students who miss classes. 1993-94
- e) Recommend that staff development activities include opportunities for instructors from across the curriculum to collaborate regarding teaching and retention (i.e., mini-Great Teachers workshops). 1993-94
- f) Recommend that probation students be required to enroll in a guidance 60, 55, or 355 course during the semester they are on probation. 1993-94
- g) Recommend that the District expand the recognition of successful students (e.g., publish an honor roll in the *Oak Leaf* and provide other forms of public recognition). 1993-94
- h) Extend the use of faculty-student mid-term conferences. 1994-95
- i) Develop department-by-department annual retention studies. 1994-95
- j) Conduct a research study to determine the retention rate for students who add a class after the second class meeting. 1994-95

k) Recommend that the instructional office schedule basic skills courses in support of specific departments/programs (e.g., trade-tech). 1994-95

—12. Promote the success of students both within and beyond the classroom

As part of our mission, we seek to promote the educational and academic success of students in many different ways. During 1993-94, Academic Affairs and Student Services will conduct a review of programs designed to address the needs of specially targeted students. Areas for review should include programs for remedial and developmental education, cultural diversity and global awareness, under-represented and underserved students, and improving retention.

a) See Goals 5, 9, 10, 11, and 13, which address the objectives of this goal. 1993-94

—13. Promote understanding of the meaning of higher education for college students

To enable students to share in the responsibility for their success in college, we must promote a good understanding of what it means to be a college student. Achieving this goal requires ensuring that the curriculum and faculty help equip students with college skills by incorporating these skills into presentations and assignments. The curriculum and faculty should also encourage in students the values and attitudes essential to success in a college environment. Course readings, assignments, and lectures should encourage development of critical thinking skills and respect for diverse viewpoints. Finally, faculty should transmit the highest level of professionalism to students, and student performance should be measured against appropriate standards of academic achievement.

a) Ensure that the curriculum and faculty provide students with college skills, including organizational, listening, note-taking, test-taking, and research skills, and information literacy. Accomplish these through

- incorporating development of these skills into course presentations and assignments;

- emphasizing, supporting, and promoting courses and presentations in the curriculum that provide college skills. 1993-94

b) Ensure that the curriculum and faculty encourage strong educational values and attitudes within students, including student responsibility in the learning experience (e.g., commitment to class attendance, commitment to learning as a process of trial and error, acknowledgement of diverse learning patterns, participation and involvement in the learning process, and willingness to accept constructive criticism in a cooperative environment); critical thinking and respect for diverse viewpoints; and integrity in meeting the standards for educational excellence. Accomplish these through:

- encouraging faculty to assume responsibility for providing an interactive learning environment in the classroom;
- ensuring that course readings, written assignments, and lectures demonstrate the diversity of opinions and arguments in an academic discipline;
- ensuring the highest level of professionalism among faculty in all lectures and assignments, transmitting this level of professionalism to students, and measuring students' performance against appropriate standards of academic achievement. 1993-94

14. Increase instructional support for adjunct faculty

Adjunct faculty require the same instructional support services that are available to regular faculty. Whether instructors teach during the day or evening, on or off the main campus, they share the need for library, audio visual, clerical, and graphic arts services, as well as the need for support by the counseling staff. SRJC should provide off-campus adjunct faculty with emergency preparedness and information specific to their off-campus site. We also should survey off-campus faculty to assess the adequacy of off-campus facilities and equipment and study the possible need for weekend services to students and faculty.

WHAT ARE THE OBJECTIVES OF THE SENATE?

To promote the development and maintenance of teaching excellence within the framework of academic freedom and professional responsibilities and ethics.

(4) You may become a member of one of the Ad Hoc Senate Committees or one of the Senate Sub-Committees.

We are located in Bussman Hall, Room 1498. Our records are kept on file there. Office hours are Monday through Thursday 9:00 am to 2:30 pm. The Office is closed on Fridays and during the Summer.

The College should continue to improve and encourage retention of students while maintaining the highest educational standards. We should study ways in which to minimize the number of times students are unsuccessful and subsequently re-take classes. Our student orientation materials and program information should emphasize the time commitment required for academic success, as well as the importance of seeking help from instructors outside of class and developing study skills. We need to expand the use of non-credit labs, study groups, mid-term conferences, guidance courses for probation students, and other programs and activities designed to improve retention. Staff development activities should encourage across-the-curriculum collaboration on ways to improve teaching and promote retention. The District also should expand its recognition of successful students.

- emphasizing, supporting, and promoting courses and presentations in the curriculum that provide college skills. 1993-94

b) Ensure that the curriculum and faculty encourage strong educational values and attitudes within students, including student responsibility in the learning experience (e.g., commitment to class attendance, commitment to learning as a process of trial and error, acknowledgement of diverse learning patterns, participation and involvement in the learning process, and willingness to accept constructive criticism in a cooperative environment); critical thinking and respect for diverse viewpoints; and integrity in meeting the standards for educational excellence. Accomplish these through:

- encouraging faculty to assume responsibility for providing an interactive learning environment in the classroom;

- ensuring that course readings, written assignments, and lectures demonstrate the diversity of opinions and arguments in an academic discipline;

- ensuring the highest level of professionalism among faculty in all lectures and assignments, transmitting this level of professionalism to students, and measuring students' performance against appropriate standards of academic achievement. 1993-94

14. Increase instructional support for adjunct faculty

Adjunct faculty require the same instructional support services that are available to regular faculty. Whether instructors teach during the day or evening, on or off the main campus, they share the need for library, audio visual, clerical, and graphic arts services, as well as the need for support by the counseling staff. SRJC should provide off-campus adjunct faculty with emergency preparedness and information specific to their off-campus site. We also should survey off-campus faculty to assess the adequacy of off-campus facilities and equipment and study the possible need for weekend services to students and faculty.

- k) Recommend that the instructional office schedule basic skills courses in support of specific departments/programs (e.g., trade-tech). 1994-95

—12. Promote the success of students both within and beyond the classroom

As part of our mission, we seek to promote the educational and academic success of students in many different ways. During 1993-94, Academic Affairs and Student Services will conduct a review of programs designed to address the needs of specially targeted students. Areas for review should include programs for remedial and developmental education, cultural diversity and global awareness, under-represented and underserved students, and improving retention.

—13. Promote understanding of the meaning of higher education for college students

To enable students to share in the responsibility for their success in college, we must promote a good understanding of what it means to be a college student. Achieving this goal requires ensuring that the curriculum and faculty help equip students with college skills by incorporating these skills into presentations and assignments. The curriculum and faculty should also encourage in students the values and attitudes essential to success in a college environment. Course readings, assignments, and lectures should encourage development of critical thinking skills and respect for diverse viewpoints. Finally, faculty should transmit the highest level of professionalism to students, and student performance should be measured against appropriate standards of academic achievement.

- a) Ensure that the curriculum and faculty provide students with college skills, including organizational, listening, note-taking, test-taking, and research skills, and information literacy. Accomplish these through

- incorporating development of these skills into course presentations and assignments;

Student Equity Plan

- Student Equity policy adopted the Board of Governors September 1992; to become effective March 6, 1993.
- The student equity policy intent is for districts 1) to attain, at a minimum, proportional representation of their service area in the access of students from historically underrepresented groups to the instruction and services provided by their colleges; and 2) to maximize the rate of student success which is defined as retention and completion of educational objectives.
- The underrepresented population is defined as women, persons with disabilities, and ethnic minorities (American Indians or Alaskan natives, Asians or Pacific Islanders, Blacks and Hispanics).
- Pursuant to this policy, SRJC:
 - Formed a Student Equity Steering Committee.
 - Determined the extent of the college's current student equity related achievements for educational and student services.
 - Conducted campus-based research to define Sonoma County's under-represented population, and their enrollment at SRJC; defined retention, course completion, degree and/or certificate completion and transfer rates for under-represented students.
 - Plans to adopt a Student Equity Policy and Procedure.
 - Will adopt a Student Equity Plan which will consist of student equity goals and timelines, and student equity achievements and goals by department and student service.
 - The Student Equity Plan is due in Sacramento by December 31, 1993.
- Informational presentations are in the process of being made to the following groups: College Council, President's Cabinet, Academic Senate, Student Government Assembly, and Educational Policy Committee.
- The Student Equity Plan will be presented as an "informational" item at the November Board of Trustees' meeting; final adoption is hoped for at its December meeting.

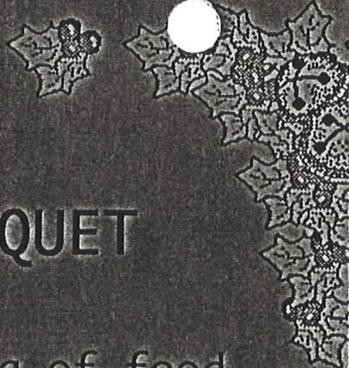
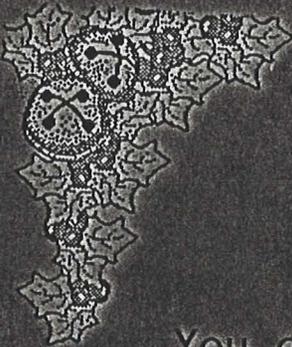

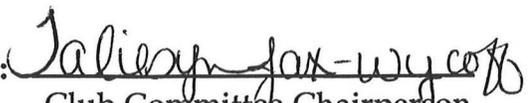
