


SGA: STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSEMBLY-The legislative body of the Associated Students composed of all Associated Students elected and appointed officers.





1993-94 Year Apportionment Reduction; 1994-95 Budget Tenuous

New prior-year correction for 1992-93 and an additional 1993-94 property tax calculation reveal new shortfalls of \$10 million (.5%) and \$23 million (1.5%), respectively, for community colleges. This new 1.5% shortfall is in addition to the 2% deficit which has previously been taken from community colleges. It will be deducted from each district's February 1994 apportionment amount, thus creating additional tight budgets for districts.

The Chancellor's Office fiscal staff had preliminary estimates of a 4.7% increase for 1994-95 which is likely to be reduced further by the shortfall without extenuating circumstances, including continuing immigration, housing needs, and the entry of CSU students into the community college system. This will be exacerbated by the fact that earlier state revenue projections for the fourth quarter 1993 appear to be materializing as expected. The fourth quarter recovery projection has been revised. A recovery is likely until at least 1995 and some analysts believe that 1996 is a more optimistic projection. Thus, while the Department of Finance always is quite conservative, the 1994-95 year is expected to be the most difficult yet.

The Chancellor's Office indicates that the Department of Finance representatives

have taken note of the UC and CSU fee increase proposals and informally have suggested that the Board of Governors and the community college system consider fee increases. At the BG meeting, CO staff brought Phase 3 of their 1993 *Study of Fee Impact* which indicates that the increase from \$6 to \$10 per unit last year resulted in a drop of 50,000 students. This report, which will be forwarded to the Department of Finance, further indicates that this is consistent with continuing estimates that community colleges lose up to 20,000 students per \$1 increase in fees.

The Administration has hinted that it may not support general obligation bonds for higher education in 1994. The

state is approaching the 5% debt service limit which some analysts consider acceptable. If the Administration does not sign the necessary legislation to place the bonds on the ballot, the primary alternatives for community colleges would be either state revenue bonds or local general obligation bonds. The difficulty is that revenue bonds, unlike GO bonds are counted against community colleges' Proposition 98 guarantee and thus reduce the amount available for apportionments; and local GO bonds require a 3/4 vote which is very difficult to achieve. Further, revenue bonds may not be used for architectural barrier removal or equipment replacement under

The Chancellor has been invited to summarize and report on the document to the senior staff of the Departments of Education and Com-

merce, and has participated in a forum conducted by the Education Commission of the States.

Phil Bardos was named Chair of a new Ad Hoc Commission on Innovation Coordinating Committee. Bardos will be assisted by members Shirley Ralston and Vishwas More. This committee's tasks will include regular reports on the status of COI recommendations throughout the consultation process.

Introduction

In September 1993, representatives of the District and SEIU classified staff participated in a three day intensive workshop conducted by the California Foundation for Improvement of Employer-Employee Relations (CFIER) to learn interest based negotiation techniques that build and strengthen relationships. Since then, the team members have met regularly using the new techniques and procedures.

This memo is intended as a progress report on what has been accomplished and as an outline of future plans.

Process

The process of negotiations has changed. Now the focus is in building a long term working relationship with clear and open communication and an understanding of each other's interests and constraints. Overlapping interests offer opportunities to maximize joint gains. This process of searching for underlying interests is time consuming, and in the short run, takes longer than a more confrontational or positional method. The ultimate goal, however, is to produce an agreement that is easily renewed and updated, and that requires a much smaller time investment to maintain.

Once interests are clearly stated, options to meet the interests are explored. Brain storming is one of the techniques used. Freely practiced, this technique allows creative play with a variety of options and often produces the seeds for some of the best solutions. Because many ideas are generated before commitment is reached, the negotiation team has agreed to limit discussion of day-to-day progress to team members and those with a specific need to know (e.g., the Classified Advisory Council, SEIU local 707 advisors, the Board of Trustees, Dr. Agrella). Periodically, the team will produce joint progress reports, such as this one. In addition, we may also release information to constituent members, but we have agreed to advise each other when we do so. In this way, we hope to provide timely information to interested parties, maintain good rumor control, and limit unpleasant surprises to either party. Among the first agreements reached were the ground rules covering the negotiations process. These ground rules are designed to keep the process as participatory and non-confrontational as possible.

Timeline

Interest based negotiating is a new and unfamiliar activity, and one that requires practice. More experienced negotiators suggest that structuring the process to promote early success provides incentive to continue. Consequently, the initial scope of negotiations was limited to items of top priority to both sides. As a further aid to reaching early agreement, easier items will be negotiated first. As a practical matter, items involving financial commitment will be held in abeyance until after February, when the first information about state funding is given to the District. Among the first agreements reached were the ground rules covering the negotiation process. We have set the goal of completing negotiations on the five articles listed below by June 30, 1994.

Tentative Agreement #1

The first tentative agreement reached by the negotiating teams reads as follows:

"It is mutually agreed that the current continuing contract between the Sonoma County Junior College District and the SEIU Local 707 Classified Bargaining Unit will be extended through June 30, 1994 with the exception that the following articles will be subject to re-negotiations:

- Article 4 - Evaluation of Personnel Files
- Article 6 - Hours of Employment
- Article 7 - Pay and Allowances
- Article 9 - Health and Welfare Benefits
- Article 19 - Classification and Reclassification

It is understood that each agreed change to the individual articles above, including effective date, may necessitate minor changes in other, related articles."

The Research and Planning (RP) Group, an organization of local college research professionals under the direction of Barbara Beno, President of Vista College, provided valuable assistance in the work by surveying community college students in spring 1993. This is just the first of a number of such collaborative studies we plan to conduct with the RP Group.

**1993 Report on Fee Impact
Principle Findings**

December 1993

- Statewide, community college budgets increased by less than 1% for 1992-93, not enough to cover inflation. In spring 1993, fees for credit students were increased:
 - ▶ from \$6 per unit to \$50 per unit for students with baccalaureate (BA/BS) degrees
 - ▶ from \$6 per unit to \$10 per unit for students without baccalaureate (BA/BS) degrees
 - ▶ the 10-unit ceiling for which students are charged fees was lifted
- Enrollments declined by 106,000 students (7%) from fall 1992 to spring 1993;
 - ▶ 54,000 credit students with a BA/BS degree
 - ▶ 50,000 credit students without a BA/BS degree
 - ▶ 2,000 noncredit students
- Spring 1993 enrollment declines are attributable primarily to the fee increases. Had there been no fee increases in spring 1993, other factors—such as increased course sections and increased unemployment—would have countered the usual small fall to spring enrollment decline to produce a small enrollment increase.
- These enrollment declines were expected, based on comparisons to the effects of fee increases at both two- and four-year colleges. Community college students are quite responsive to fee increases.
- Financial aid in the form of Board of Governors grants was provided to financially needy credit students (without BA/BS degrees), changing the percentage of students on aid from 19% to 25%—still far below the 61% estimated to be eligible for financial aid.
- Many of the 131,000 students with BA/BS degrees in fall 1992 were eligible for fee waivers in spring 1993 because of economic or physical disadvantage. The result was:
 - ▶ 31,000 had their fees waived and enrolled (24%)
 - ▶ 46,000 paid the fees and enrolled (35%)
 - ▶ 54,000 withdrew (41%)
- Of the 54,000 BA/BS students who withdrew, 25,000 are estimated to have been enrolled for job training. Most often impacted were minority and continuing (versus new) students.
- Of the students without BA/BS degrees who withdrew, most often they were minorities, over age 20, continuing, and enrolled full time.
- Enrollments are down another 2% in fall 1993 due to course cuts and increased fees. Increased fees and inadequate budgets have resulted in the community colleges serving 140,000 fewer students than estimates of current demand would indicate. Colleges report large waiting lists for classes in mathematics, English, and certain basic sciences.
- Apart from the fee increases, reduced budgets the past three years have forced colleges to hold down costs by limiting salaries. It is not likely that such strategies can continue. Other alternatives need to be pursued, if, as it appears, revenues will not be sufficient to support college enrollment demand.


Financial Assistance Fair Proposal for SGA

Dear Editor:

Californians under 21 should be made aware of a new law which took effect this year.

Beginning January 1, drivers under the age of 21 who are caught driving with any measurable amount of alcohol in their systems will have their licenses taken away "on-the-spot" and suspended for one year.

Driving is inherently dangerous. However, young people are particularly at risk. Twelve teens a day die nationwide in alcohol-related crashes. In California, approximately 45 percent of all roadway crashes involve alcohol — and in most cases teenagers are involved. Last year, 238 Californians, ages 16-20, were killed in alcohol-involved crashes.

This new "zero tolerance" law reflects California's no-nonsense attitude toward drinking and driving, and we need to inform our young people about this law and the consequences of driving under the influence.

We urge your newspaper to publicize this new law through an editorial and/or news article. If you would like further information or a photograph, please contact me at 916/444-8014.

New Law Suspends Licenses of Drivers Under 21 Who Drink and Drive

(SACRAMENTO) Beginning this year, underage motorists who have had any measurable amount of alcohol to drink will have their licenses suspended for one year.

The new law (SB 689), effective January 1, 1994, allows law enforcement officers to seize the driver's license of any person under 21 with a blood alcohol content (BAC) of .01 percent or higher. Even one half of a beer will put a person over that limit.

Prior to the new law being passed, state law provided no penalty for drivers 16-18 unless caught with a BAC of at least .05 percent, or drivers 18-21 caught with a .08 BAC or higher. California law still prohibits the purchase of alcohol by minors.

The law (SB 689) states that a driver under age 21 must submit to a Passive Alcohol Sensor (PAS) test administered by a law enforcement officer. Failure or refusal to do so, or failure to complete the test, will result in a one-year license suspension regardless of the minor's blood-alcohol level. Also, that person would be required to pay an additional \$100 along with other licensing fees for reinstatement or first-time license issuance.

If the offender does not



possess or is not presently eligible for a license, they will be disqualified from applying for a driver's license for one year. (Since this is not a criminal sanction, the suspension is not recorded on the individual's Department of Justice or Department of Motor Vehicles record.)

When a young driver is stopped by a law enforcement officer and determined to have a BAC of .01 percent or more, the officer will confiscate the person's driver's license "on-the-spot" and issue a 30-day permit. The officer will then transport the offender to a safe location so they can call someone to come get the driver and the vehicle.

If there is a passenger in the vehicle who hasn't been drinking and has a valid driver's license, the officer will allow that person to drive the vehicle and the drinking driver home.

RE: Revised District Smoking Policy and AB291

Two recent events will affect tobacco smoking at all properties owned by the Sonoma County Junior College District.

First, the revised No Smoking Policy (4.11.4) was approved by the Board of Trustees at the December 14, 1993 meeting. In addition to banning smoking in all indoor areas of District buildings (including the college dorm), the revised policy prohibits smoking in all District or contracted vehicles. It also prohibits smoking in outside areas where smoke can come inside a building and affect the occupants. If the need arises, the revised policy allows designated smoking areas.

A subcommittee is forming to implement the revised policy. Their job will include evaluating problem areas already reported to the Safety Committee, developing a signage system, and instituting a publicity program to inform students and visitors.

The second event is the passage of AB291 (Speier, October 1993). This bill, which became effective January 1, 1994, closely mirrors the revised smoking policy. It bans smoking in all state owned or leased facilities, including community colleges. It explicitly prohibits smoking within five feet of a main entrance or exit of a building, and in District-owned passenger vehicles.

The law also requires that information on the availability of smoking cessation programs be offered to employees. The SHAPE Committee (Safety and Health Awareness Program for Employees) offers periodic smoking cessation classes to District employees. If you are interested, call Cindy Frank at x1610. A second alternative is to contact the Sonoma County Public Health Department/Health Education Division at 576-INFO. The County offers **free** stop smoking classes at locations throughout the county.

Palomar College Student Representation Fee Bylaw

Section I - Collection

A. The Student Representation Fee is collected by Palomar College at the time of registration and deposited in a separate fiduciary fund established per the California Community College's Budget and Accounting Manual. Students may opt to waive this fee. The chief fiscal officer of Palomar College shall have custody of the money collected. The District may retain up to seven percent of the fees collected for administering the fees. See Education Code Section 76060.5.

Section II - Purpose

A. The student Representation Fee shall be expended to provide for the support of governmental affair representatives who may be stating their positions and viewpoints before city, county, and district governments, and before offices and agencies of the state government. See Education Code Section 76060.5.

Section III - Assigning Representatives

A. The ASG President shall assign students to represent Palomar College for purposes authorized by Education Code Section 76060.5.

B. All assignments/appointments of individuals to use student representation fees will be made by the ASG President and approved by a majority vote of the ASG.

Section IV - Representatives Responsibilities

A. In coordination with the Director of Student Activities, students using representative fees will:

1. Make appointments to visit with officials prior to going on a trip. Normally, the appointment will be confirmed in writing.
2. Submit a written report on the results of their meeting to the ASG (copy to the Director of Student Activities) within one week after their return. An oral report may also be required if requested by the ASG President.

Section V - Accountability

A. Records on trips, visits, etc., by individuals using Student Representation Fee monies will be kept by the Director of Student Activities. These will include, at a minimum, letters to officials, expenditures of funds and a copy of the report on the results of the meetings/conferences.

California Education Code

§ 76060.5 Election for Purpose of establishing Student Representation Fee

If a student body association has been established as authorized by Section 76060, the governing body of the association may order that an election be held for the purpose of establishing a student representation fee of one dollar (\$1) per semester. The election shall be held in compliance with regulations of the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges and shall be open to all regularly enrolled students of the community college. The affirmative vote of two-thirds of the students voting in the election shall be sufficient to establish the fee. However, the election shall not be sufficient to establish the fee unless the number of students who vote in the election equals or exceeds the average of the number of students who voted in the previous three student body association elections.


The student representation fee authorized by this section shall be collected by the officials of the community college, together with all other fees, at the time of registration or before registration and shall be deposited in a separate fiduciary fund established per the California Community Colleges Budget and Accounting Manual for student representation fees. The money collected pursuant to this section shall be expended to provide for the support of governmental affairs representatives who may be stating their positions and viewpoints before city, county and district governments, and before offices and agencies of the state government. The chief fiscal officer of the community college shall have custody of the money collected pursuant to this section and the money shall be disbursed for the purposes described above upon the order of the governing body of the student body association. The district may retain a portion of the fees collected and deposited pursuant to this section that is equal to the actual cost of administering these fees up to, but not more than, 7 percent.

The student representation fee authorized by this section may be terminated by a majority vote of the students voting in an election held for that purpose. The election shall be called and held in compliance with regulations of the Board of Governors of California Community Colleges and shall be open to all regularly enrolled students of the community college.

A student may for religious, political, financial, or moral reasons, refuse to pay the student representation fee established under this section. the refusal shall be submitted on the same form that is used for collection of fees as provided by the college, which, as determined by the college, shall be nearly as practical in the same form as a model form prescribed by regulations of the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges.

By arranging our registration materials in this manner the Associated Student Government of Palomar College is in compliance with the appropriate sections of the Education Code and Title V.

Polly Klaas Community Service Award
(a project of the Financial Assistance to Students Committee)

Purpose:

Problems: Deteriorating state of education coupled with the rising cost of education; rising risk to children; insufficient funds for government to address community needs; lack of good employment opportunities for college students; lack of community involvement by college students;

Solution: Until people begin to care about each other the problems will continue to grow. People need to come together under a sense of concern for our future. The students of Student Government Assembly are taking a leading step in creating this sense of community.

The Polly Klaas Community Service Award will work to encourage community college students to take their skills and abilities and apply them to problems that affect their community. The encouragement will be achieved through monetary compensation to students and eventually be coupled with education. The highest priority will be given to volunteers in K-12 education followed by those who volunteer in programs aimed at benefiting minors.

Benefits: Community needs not being met will be; Students will get an opportunity to explore their potential and career interests while working on real world problems; improve community image of college students; Gives money to students so they have time for community service; allows students to do real world jobs related to their major; community gains access to the most valuable resource on the planet, people with new ideas.

Phases:

The Polly Klaas Community Service Award is just the first phase of a three phase project intended to incorporate student education with community service. The SRJC Associated Students are attempting to start progression to this goal by setting up an account through Student Government that would monetarily award students who preformed community service in their previous semester at Santa Rosa Junior College.

The second phase is still very conceptual. It will involve direct contact with existing community service organizations in Sonoma County with the intent of discovering where student involvement would be most effective and implementing these suggestions through SGA projects.

The third and final phase It is hoped that the monies solicited from business and government will eventually be sufficient to fund a student problem solving task force. This task force would be set up as a class at the junior college and would facilitate students working together using their individual skills and talents to positively change their community. Each semester the students ,with the help of a trained instructor, would chose a problem that affects their community and develop a plan to solve or improve the problem by the end of the semester.

The account will be set up as a trust through the Polly Klaas Foundation so we could use their 501C3. The trust guidelines(these need to be decided by FASC) would be such that SGA would have access to funds for the PKCSA and when the fund reached a certain amount, SGA could use them for other community service projects such as those mentioned in phase 2 and 3.

Account will be funded through grant solicitation of businesses and government agencies. There is an incredible amount of government funding available for this type of project and we are confident that businesses will be eager to claim their support for a Polly Klaas project. It is hoped that the Polly Klaas Foundation will be willing to let business write off donations on their 501C3.

We have talked to the Polly Klaas Foundation and they are prepared to endorse this project with a small grant and a cover letter, to be included in the grant applications to other organizations.

Award will be given based on hours of community service performed. Those students who volunteered in the K-12 education system would have their hours multiplied by a factor of 1.5 for purpose of determining total hours served. Students who participated in programs which aimed to improve the lives of those under the age would receive a multiplier of 1.25.

6 members of SGA(Executive Vice-Pres, Vice-Pres, Community involvement rep, three others elected by and from SGA) will serve on a committee which will be responsible for reviewing applications and determine which students will receive

awards. It is hoped that at least 2 advisors will be available to guide this process including one from the Polly Klaas Foundation.

The application will require students to verify their involvement with the signature, address and phone number of an advisor. Students will also be required to write a 100 word essay telling what they got out of their service. Half of the application will be filled out by the organization at which the service was preformed. Space would be provided for the evaluation of the applicant and evaluation of the program. Ideas for improvement and expansion of the project would also be asked for.

Santa Rosa Junior College Student Representation Fee Bylaw

Section I - Collection

A. The Student Representation Fee is collected by Santa Rosa Junior College at the time of registration and deposited in a separate fiduciary fund established per the California Community College's Budget and Accounting Manual. Students may opt to waive this fee. The chief fiscal officer of Santa Rosa Junior College shall have custody of the money collected. The District may obtain up to seven percent of the fees collected for administering the fees. See Education Code Section 76060.5.

Section II. - Purpose

A. The Student Representation Fee shall be expended to provide for the support of governmental affair representatives who may be stating their positions and viewpoints before city, county, and district governments, and before offices and agencies of the state government. See Education Code Section 76060.5.

Section III - Assigning Representatives

A. The Associated Students President shall assign students to represent Santa Rosa Junior College for purposes authorized by Education Code Section 76060.5.

B. All assignments/appointments of individuals to use student representation fees will be made by the Associated Students President and approved by a majority vote of the Student Government Assembly.

Section IV - Representatives Responsibilities


A. In coordination with the Director of Student Activities, students using representative fees will:

1. Make appointments to visit with officials prior to going on a trip. Normally, the appointment will be confirmed in writing.
2. Submit a written report on the results of their meeting to the Associated Students president (copy to the Director of Student activities) within one week after their return. An oral report may also be required if requested by the Associated Students President.

Section V - Accountability

A. Records on trips, visits, etc., by individuals using Student Representation Fee monies will be kept by the Director of Student Activities. These will include, at a minimum, letters to officials, expenditures of funds and a copy of the report on the results of the meetings/conferences.

SRJC Student Representation fee breakdown



The Student Representation Fee money is designed to be expended for the support of governmental affairs representatives who may be stating their positions and viewpoints before offices and agencies of the government as outlined in the Education Code 76060.5.

The 7% expenditure is automatic according to state law AB2576.

This guideline is merely to give the Santa Rosa Junior College Associated Students an institutionalized format of how we may spend the Rep Fee funds if and when we choose to do so. We need not necessarily spend the exact percentage shown. However, the percentage does reflect the ceiling, or maximum, we spend in any given area.

AB2576

The Student Representation Fee

Education Code section 76060.5: If a student body association has been established at a community college, the governing body of the association may order that an election be held for the purpose of establishing a student representation fee of one dollar (\$1) per semester. The election shall be held in compliance with requirements of the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges and shall be open to all regularly enrolled students of the community college. The affirmative vote of two-thirds of the students voting in the election shall be sufficient to establish the fee. However, the election shall not be sufficient to establish the fee unless the number of students who vote in the election equals or exceeds the average number of students who voted in the previous three student body association elections.

The student representation fee authorized by this section shall be collected by the officials of the community college, together with all other fees, at the time of registration or before registration and shall be deposited in a separate fund established for the student representation fees. The money collected pursuant to this section shall be expended to provide support of governmental affairs representatives who may be stating their positions and viewpoints before city, county, and district governments, and before offices and agencies of the state government. The chief fiscal officer of the community college shall have custody of the money collected pursuant to this section and the money shall be disbursed for the purposes described above upon the order of the governing body of the student association. The district may retain a portion of the fees collected and deposited pursuant to this section that is equal to the actual cost of administering these fees up to, but not more than, 7 percent.

The student representation fee authorized by the section may be terminated by a majority vote of the students voting in an election held for that purpose. The election shall be called and held in compliance with regulations of the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges and shall be open to all regularly enrolled students of the community college.

A student may, for religious, political, financial, or moral reasons, refuse to pay the student representation fee established under this section. The refusal shall be submitted in writing to the college officials at the time the student pays other fees to the college officials. The refusal shall be submitted on the same form that is used for the collection of the fees as provided by the college, which, as determined by the college, shall be nearly as practical in the same form as a model form prescribed by regulations of the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges.

§ 76060.5 Election for Purpose of establishing Student Representation Fee

If a student body association has been established as authorized by Section 76060, the governing body of the association may order that an election be held for the purpose of establishing a student representation fee of one dollar (\$1) per semester. The election shall be held in compliance with regulations of the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges and shall be open to all regularly enrolled students of the community college. The affirmative vote of two-thirds of the students voting in the election shall be sufficient to establish the fee. However, the election shall not be sufficient to establish the fee unless the number of students who vote in the election equals or exceeds the average of the number of students who voted in the previous three student body association elections.

The student representation fee authorized by this section shall be collected by the officials of the community college, together with all other fees, at the time of registration or before registration and shall be deposited in a separate fiduciary fund established per the California Community Colleges Budget and Accounting Manual for student representation fees. The money collected pursuant to this section shall be expended to provide for the support of governmental affairs representatives who may be stating their positions and viewpoints before city, county and district governments, and before offices and agencies of the state government. The chief fiscal officer of the community college shall have custody of the money collected pursuant to this section and the money shall be disbursed for the purposes described above upon the order of the governing body of the student body association. The district may retain a portion of the fees collected and deposited pursuant to this section that is equal to the actual cost of administering these fees up to, but not more than, 7 percent.

The student representation fee authorized by this section may be terminated by a majority vote of the students voting in an election held for that purpose. The election shall be called and held in compliance with regulations of the Board of Governors of California Community Colleges and shall be open to all regularly enrolled students of the community college.

A student may for religious, political, financial, or moral reasons, refuse to pay the student representation fee established under this section. the refusal shall be submitted on the same form that is used for collection of fees as provided by the college, which, as determined by the college, shall be nearly as practical in the same form as a model form prescribed by regulations of the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges.

(NOTE: Duplicate wording describing the student representation fee also appears under California Education Code § 72253.3)

California Administrative Code

ARTICLE 1 - STUDENT REPRESENTATION FEE

§ 54801. Calling of Election

The governing body of each student body association authorized by Education Code Section 76060 shall establish procedures for the purpose of collecting a student representation fee, and call an election for such purpose. The election shall, at a minimum, meet the following criteria:

(a) The student body association on each campus shall maintain in its office written information regarding election procedures. Such information shall be made available to the public upon request.

(b) Adequate notice of the election shall be given by the student body association. Adequate notice is deemed to be at least ten school days prior to the election date.

(c) Each election shall be held on a day which counts toward the 175 day requirement (Education Code Section 84370) as defined in Section 58120 of this part. In instances where an election is conducted for more than one day, those days shall be consecutive and shall be limited to a maximum of five days.

§ 54803. Termination of Fee

(a) Any student representation fee that has been instituted pursuant to the procedures enumerated in Section 54801 may be terminated by a majority of the students voting in an election called in one of the following two manners:

(1) By placing the issue on the ballot for the next regular associated student body election. The issue shall be placed on the ballot upon receipt of a petition indicating an interest in the termination of the representation fee signed by a majority of the number of students who voted in the election establishing the fee.

(2) Pursuant to procedures preestablished by the student body association for calling such an election. Such procedures shall be available for public inspection during regular business hours.

(b) The election shall be conducted in accordance with the procedures established pursuant to Section 54801.

§ 54805. Collection of the Fee

District governing boards shall include in the materials given to each student at registration, information pertaining to the representation fee. The form used by a college for the purpose of collecting the fee shall contain at a minimum, the following:

(a) a statement indicating that the money collected pursuant to this article shall be expended to provide support for students or representatives who may be stating their positions and viewpoints before city, county, and district government, and before offices and agencies of the state and federal government;

(b) the amount of the fee;

(c) a statement informing the students of their right to refuse to pay the fee for religious, political, moral or financial reasons.

dissemination and collection of legislative information.

§ 54807. Expenditure of the Fee

The student body association of the community college shall possess the sole power to disburse the money collected pursuant to Education Code Section 76060.5. The chief fiscal officer of the community college shall not have the authority to interpret the legality of expenditures approved by the student body association and will release the monies collected by the fee upon the order of the student body association. The Student Representation Fee shall be expended to provide for, but not limited to, the following support services:

(a) Logistical Support

Support which enables student body associations or their approved representatives to attend meetings and conferences where policies that affect students will be discussed. Student Representation Fee shall be expended to cover travel expenses, transportation, registration fees, lodging, and meals for, but not limited to, the following associations/meetings:

- (1) CalSACC/CSBG meetings
- (2) CCCSAA/CCLC/Chancellor's Office meetings
- (3) USSA/ASA meetings
- (4) Meeting's of other state and federal governing agencies (CPEC, CCCBOG, Legislative Committees etc.)

(b) Informational support

Informational support services which either train student body associations to better represent their constituents, enable them do develop more accurate positions on proposed legislative or policy changes, or disseminate information. Accepted uses are, but not limited to, the following:

- (1) Legislative tracking databases
- (2) Surveys of the college student body to develop positions on legislation.
- (3) Dissemination of information to student bodies via newspaper advertisements, fliers, television, etc.
- (4) Lobbying orientations/training sessions
- (5) Dues for student and academic associations
- (6) Other informational services deemed necessary and proper by the student body association.

(c) Technical Support

Technical support which either enables students to more effectively communicate with other student associations, governmental agencies, or their constituencies or provides equipment which facilitates dissemination and collection of information. Accepted uses are, but not limited to, the following:

Whereas: The Board Of Governors' recommends that "As a symbol of institutional identity and as a means of fostering student participation and communication, the role of the student trustee on the district governing board should be strengthened by granting to him or her the rights and privileges accorded by law, such as the right to make and second motions and the right to receive compensation up to the prescribed limit (Education Code, Section 72023.7 and 72425). The student trustee should also be given the right to have his or her advisory opinion on motions before the board reflected in the minutes.

Whereas: 26 of the 71 Community College Districts currently recognize this recommendation by affording the student trustee an advisory vote.

Whereas: The Associated Students of Santa Rosa Junior College supports an advisory vote for the Student Trustee.

Therefore: Be it resolved that the Sonoma County Board of Trustees adopt the policy change affording the student trustee an advisory vote.

WHEREAS, The members of Student Government Assembly, understand the absolute authority the Board of Trustees maintains regarding the privilege of naming a District building in recognition of the merits of an individual's contribution to the establishment of our college,

WHEREAS, The members of Student Government Assembly, at the Fall 1993 Leadership Retreat, initiated the following goal: "To research the process of naming District buildings with the intention of requesting a building be named after Genevieve Glasier Mott."

WHEREAS, The justification for this request is that Genevieve Glasier Mott was clearly a significant part in the founding and maintaining of this college in its earliest years.

Genevieve Glasier Mott	1894-1979
SRJC English Professor	1918-1956
Dean of Women (1st)	1921-1929

WHEREAS, Miss. Mott was noted for " A maintained positive spirit which held things together in the toughest of times" Floyd P. Bailey. He also noted that "Her fortitude and ability to persist in spite of all obstacles an absolute refusal to be discouraged in the face of hopelessness"

WHEREAS, During World War II, Miss. Mott kept correspondence with hundreds of soldiers from SRJC.

Miss. Mott was honored by the students of SRJC in 1926 by dedicating "Patrin" to her. This was the only dedication of a yearbook to any member of the SRJC community.

WHEREAS, The above historical information was composed using the following:

- SRJC 70TH Anniversary Commemorative Video
- Floyd P. Bailey historical memoirs
- 1926 "Patrin" SRJC yearbook
- SRJC Library Archives

WHEREAS, The primary purpose of this proposal is to have a building within the SRJC campus named after a woman, and this also reflects the chancellors office and our college district commitment to addressing gender equity.

CALIFORNIA INDIAN DELEGATION TO DELIVER INDIAN TO INDIAN AID TO MAYAN PEOPLE IN CHIAPAS



A delegation of California Indians will be going to meet with the Mayan people of Chiapas, to offer prayers and material aid consisting of computers, medical supplies and other forms of humanitarian aid. The caravan will depart from the Coyote Valley Indian Reservation in Mendocino County, California in late March, 1994.

The delegation will include Pomo elder Delma Eyle of the Coyote Valley Indian Reservation; Norma Knight, a Maidu-Pomo elder from Round Valley Indian Reservation; Priscilla Hunter, tribal administrator from Coyote Valley, Commissioner of the Native American Heritage Commission and Board member of the International Indian Treaty Council; and Howaste Weighill, of the Coastal Band of the Chumash nation and student organizer at San Francisco State University. The delegation will also include Polly Montoya-Girvin and Carolyn Fershtman, international human rights attorneys, who will collect testimony from Mayan people concerning human rights abuses and their struggle to maintain their land base and culture in Chiapas.

We will be collecting computers, typewriters, medical supplies, and blankets, which we will transport overland from northern California. We will collect financial donations to purchase food in Mexico, which we will deliver directly to Mayan villages and refugee camps. We will purchase the food in Mexico to minimize transportation costs and to support the Mexican village economy seriously threatened by the recent passage of the North American Free Trade Agreement.

We will be donating the truck used in the caravan and the computer equipment to the recently formed State

Council of Indigenous and Campesino Organizations, a coalition of over 280 grassroots organizations in Chiapas.

"We are going to deliver aid Indian nation to Indian nation." says Priscilla Hunter. Delma Eyle says, *"This place (Chiapas) is where we are supposed to be. The ancestor spirits of this continent have been calling us to help the people suffering in Chiapas, Mexico and the cries of the people of Chiapas have touched us. We are already there in our spirits and our hearts."*

"The Mayan people of Chiapas and my people here in the US are in the same struggle for defining our sovereignty rights. Their future as well as ours depends on our two peoples' strength that can ensure a future for our children," says Eyle. Norma Knight, Maidu-Pomo elder, says *"I am going in a spiritual way, with my rosary and my medicine bag to meet with Indian elders there to pray for an end to the suffering."*

OUTLINE FOR STUDENT BODY ELECTION MOTIVATION

- I. Last year less than 1% of the student body voted for present officers and senators
 - A. Everyone should exercise their *right* to vote.
 - B. Most people are more concerned with their *privilege* to drive
 - C. Students should get in the practice of voting while in school
 1. This carries over to life off campus
 2. In the last presidential election less than half the eligible voters exercised their right
 3. This means less than a majority is running a country that practices a rule by majority vote.

 - A. Originally, community colleges were immune to tuition costs—that is thing of the past... Reality is that education will never be free

 - C. Two years ago fees were only \$6/unit—with \$60 fee cap
 - D. Last year fees went to \$13/unit—with no cap—more than 100% increase
 - E. Now the governor is proposing another raise to \$20/unit next year—with no cap—another increase of more than 50%
 - F. The governor's intention is have students paying at least 1/3 of the true cost of a community college education—this would be in excess of \$30/unit
 - G. Enrollment is down for regularly enrolled non-BA students
 1. Enrollment of students with degrees dropped 50% in one year
 2. Fees for this group jumped from \$6/unit to \$50/unit in that period
 - H. When enrollment drops in these economic times, the effect is twofold
 1. Less enrollment=less revenue
 2. Less revenue=less education
 - I. The fee we are proposing is a \$1 mandatory fee of all students
 1. This money will be earmarked for use to lobby on behalf of all SRJC students and all community college students in the state
 2. This money can only be used by students for student issues

 - c. Students at SRJC haven't had the funds to lobby because AS membership has been voluntary, therefore, not enough extra money to lobby

 4. Junior college are not allowed to have mandatory student activity fees because enrollment was meant to be free—we are right back where we started

Standards for Probation/Dismissal

Academic Probation

A student who has attempted (CR grades not counted) at least 12 semester units as shown by the official academic record shall be placed on academic probation if the student has earned a cumulative GPA between 1.00 and 1.99 in all units which were graded.

Progress Probation

A student who has enrolled in a total of at least 12 semester units as shown by the official academic record shall be placed on progress probation when the percentage of all units in which a student has enrolled and for which entries of "W", "I" and "NC" are recorded reaches or exceeds fifty percent (50%).

Removal from Probation

A student on academic probation for a grade point deficiency shall be removed from probation when the student's cumulative GPA is 2.00 or higher.

A student on progress probation because of an excess of units for which entries of "W", "I" and "NC" are recorded shall be removed from probation when the percentage of units in this category drops below fifty percent (50%) of all units in which a student has enrolled.

Standards for Dismissal

For purposes of this section, semesters shall be considered consecutive on the basis of the student's enrollment pattern rather than the calendar pattern. For example, the semesters of a student enrolled fall, not spring, but again fall are considered to be consecutive.

A student who earns a GPA of less than 1.00 for nine (9) or more units attempted during any given semester is subject to dismissal.

A student who is on academic probation shall be subject to dismissal if the student earned a cumulative GPA of 1.99 or below in all units attempted in each of three consecutive semesters which were graded on the basis of the grading scale.

A student who has been placed on progress probation shall be subject to dismissal if the percentage of units in which the student has been enrolled for which entries of "W", "I" and "NC" are recorded in at least three consecutive semesters reaches or exceeds fifty percent (50%).

Qualification for Re-Admission

A dismissed student may re-apply on probation:

1. After completing five or more units (excluding Credit/No Credit) with a 2.00 ("C") or better GPA in summer session or another accredited college or from an accredited correspondence college.
2. After an absence of one or more semesters; or
3. After successful completion of Guidance 56, "Taking Charge of Your Learning".

Re-Admission on Probation Following Dismissal

Each semester a student re-admitted after academic dismissal must improve the cumulative GPA in order to continue while on probation but is subject to dismissal again after three consecutive semesters of a cumulative GPA of 1.99 or below.

A student re-admitted after progress dismissal may not earn any grades of "W", "I" and/or "NC" in the first semester back in order to continue.

Under special circumstances and upon establishing a contract with a College counselor, a dismissed student may petition to the Admissions Office to continue without taking a leave of absence.



Qualification for Re-Admission following Academic/Progress Dismissal

A dismissed student may be re-admitted on Probation 1 after fulfilling one of the following conditions;

1. Successful completion (grade of "C"/"CR" or better) of Guidance 56 (Taking Charge of Your Learning); **OR**
2. An absence of one or more semesters (Fall or Spring only); **OR**
3. Successful completion of at least one three unit course (letter grade only) with a 2.00 ("C") or better GPA in summer session; **OR**
4. Successful completion of at least one three unit course (letter grade only) with a 2.00 ("C") or better GPA in summer session at another accredited college. Students will be responsible for providing an official transcript to Santa Rosa Junior College's Admissions and Records Office.

The re-admitted student is then subject to the normal probation/dismissal standards.

Re-admission By Petition

Students who do not meet one of the Qualification for Re-Admission following Academic/Progress Dismissal conditions may petition to the Admissions and Records Office. The criteria for approval of the petition is:

1. Verifiable special circumstances, and
2. Establishing an approved semester plan with a College Counselor.

The student re-admitted by petition will continue on dismissal status for their re-admitted semester of enrollment.



Educational Technology Master Plan

Introduction

The Sonoma County Junior College District is confronted with a combination of factors that directly effect our ability to provide high quality instruction and services to our students. These factors for change are driven by external and internal forces that are reflective of our society at large. These factors can be summarized as follows:

- Changing needs, learning styles, and characteristics of our students
- Rapid changes in required employment skills
- Student enrollments and demand for our services
- Broad geographic service area with multiple sites
- Continued budgetary uncertainty and facility constraints

It is the view of the Educational Technology Committee (ETC) that educational technology, in a variety of forms, provides the District with a realistic option for the delivery of high quality instructional programs and services.

Background

In Spring of 1991, the ETC was charged by the Educational Policies Committee to "explore and develop the use of new technology for teaching and serving students". This general statement was taken as a directive to initiate the planning process with regard to educational technology. The Committee meets monthly, has conducted campus forums, developed and routed a technology "White Paper" and compiled an inventory of applications. All of this activity has been directed towards the development of a master plan for educational technology for the District.

At the heart of the master plan is the recognition that technology should enhance and facilitate student and staff involvement with the instructional programs and services. Given this general context, the master plan must address the following:

Promote equity of access to educational technology for staff and students. Access to information resources, core technologies, and appropriate support are essential for success.

Provide access to resources unrestricted by time and physical location


Identify District services, resources, and needs that can be distributed and accessed through technology.

Develop campus infrastructure with regard to networks, facilities, and technical requirements.

Provide financial and human resources to implement various components of the plan in a coherent and sustained manner.

Emphasize community partnerships with other segments of education and industry to ensure coordination.

Provide the structure for the ongoing coordination, evaluation and assessment of each recommendation of the plan.



These components are recognized as being essential to the success of the educational master plan. To address these issues in a concrete fashion, the master plan will contain seven specific recommendations and implementation actions to ensure the integration of educational technology at the District level.

Conclusion

The Educational Technology Committee believes that the coordinated use of educational technology will enhance student learning, contribute to the intellectual growth and productivity of our faculty, and will allow the District to effectively use its informational and human resources.

Educational technology that faculty would have access to might include a computer, videodisc player, VCR, CD ROM player, modem, camcorder, and large television. Educational resources will include access to Library databases, Internet, e.mail, voice mail, and other network services. Although specific equipment and resources have been identified, departments and individual faculty will assist in determining the appropriate choices.

As new or upgraded technologies appear, the list of appropriate educational technology may change. Full implementation will be phased in over a period of years to ensure proper coordination and review.





Minutes Of Legislative Advocacy Task Force Meeting of April 21

The SRJC Legislative Advocacy Task Force met yesterday to discuss plans for this year's advocacy efforts. The following recommendations resulted from that discussion:

A letter writing campaign focusing primarily on property tax shortfall and student fees would be initiated by Task Force representatives of each of the constituent groups as soon as possible with sample letter(s) included.

Members within each of the constituent groups would be asked to return signed/completed letters to the Task Force representative and advised that mailing of the letters/cards would take place shortly after the May revise. (By starting the campaign early and collecting the letters, it will be possible to identify the effectiveness of the campaign and to make additional appeals for letters should the early yield appear negligible.)

Unless otherwise advised, each constituent group would be responsible for the manner in which postage is handled.

It was agreed that the Task Force would not organize a "Campus Lobby Day;" however, the Associated Students' Legislative Committee may want to sponsor a campus rally. Deborah Sweitzer offered to provide updated information to assist the committee in that effort. Students also indicated their intent to send group to the CAL SAC Region 3 meeting in San Francisco on May 14. Per discussion with Dr. Agrella, he will continue to make weekly contact with our local legislators on issues affecting SRJC.

Members of the committee were reminded of the Monday, May 9 Community College Lobby Day in Sacramento, and Maria Bushey, Deborah Sweitzer, Bonnie Pearson and Scott Fuller indicated their interest in participating in that effort again this year. Maria Gaitan will make arrangements for an SRJC vehicle. Meetings of the Legislative Advocacy Task Force will be held each Friday at noon until the end of the semester.

Educational Technology Master Plan

Executive Summary

Introduction

The Sonoma County Junior College District is confronted with a combination of factors that directly effect our ability to provide high quality instruction and services to our students. These factors for change are driven by external and internal forces that are reflective of our society at large. These factors can be summarized as follows:

- Changing needs, learning styles, and characteristics of our students
- Rapid changes in required employment skills
- Student enrollments and demand for our services
- Broad geographic service area with multiple sites
- Continued budgetary uncertainty and facility constraints

It is the view of the Educational Technology Committee (ETC) that educational technology, in a variety of forms, provides the District with a realistic option for the delivery of high quality instructional programs and services.

Background

In Spring of 1991, the ETC was charged by the Educational Policies Committee to "explore and develop the use of new technology for teaching and serving students". This general statement was taken as a directive to initiate the planning process with regard to educational technology. The Committee meets monthly, has conducted campus forums, developed and routed a technology "White Paper" and compiled an inventory of applications. All of this activity has been directed towards the development of a master plan for educational technology for the District.

At the heart of the master plan is the recognition that technology should enhance and facilitate student and staff involvement with the instructional programs and services. Given this general context, the master plan must address the following:

Promote equity of access to educational technology for staff and students. Access to information resources, core technologies, and appropriate support are essential for success.

Provide access to resources unrestricted by time and physical location


Identify District services, resources, and needs that can be distributed and accessed through technology.

Develop campus infrastructure with regard to networks, facilities, and technical requirements.

Provide financial and human resources to implement various components of the plan in a coherent and sustained manner.

Emphasize community partnerships with other segments of education and industry to ensure coordination.

Provide the structure for the ongoing coordination, evaluation and assessment of each recommendation of the plan.



These components are recognized as being essential to the success of the educational master plan. To address these issues in a concrete fashion, the master plan will contain seven specific recommendations and implementation actions to ensure the integration of educational technology at the District level.

Conclusion

The Educational Technology Committee believes that the coordinated use of educational technology will enhance student learning, contribute to the intellectual growth and productivity of our faculty, and will allow the District to effectively use its informational and human resources.

Educational technology that faculty would have access to might include a computer, videodisc player, VCR, CD ROM player, modem, camcorder, and large television. Educational resources will include access to Library databases, Internet, e.mail, voice mail, and other network services. Although specific equipment and resources have been identified, departments and individual faculty will assist in determining the appropriate choices.

As new or upgraded technologies appear, the list of appropriate educational technology may change. Full implementation will be phased in over a period of years to ensure proper coordination and review.

WHEREAS The purpose of the Day of Non-Violence is to undertake a unified community effort to reduce violence through promoting community awareness of the sources of violence in every day life and education in ways to reduce their effects and minimize the occurrence of violence; and

WHEREAS Santa Rosa Junior College is a vital, integral and influential institution in Sonoma County.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Santa Rosa Junior College Academic Senate that May 20, 1994, be declared a campus wide Day of Non-Violence and encourages all departments, clubs and groups on campus to participate by recognizing the day with appropriate activities.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Academic Senate encourages the Santa Rosa Junior College District Board of Trustees to pass a similar resolution.

Re: 1994-95 Budget: "Chicano/a Awareness"

This is a proposal that the ASB set funding aside for Chicano/a Awareness events under the ASB budget. Recognized as best club for Fall and Spring of 93, M.E.Ch.A. has provides important information to the Chicano/Latino students as well as services in the community.

In the past 22 years there has always been money in the ASB Budget for Chicano Awareness activities. For the past 2 years it has been taken off because no one had asked for it. The reasons no one had asked for this money is because they did not know it was there or even available. I am asking for the funding to be put back into Chicano/a Awareness because it serves as very important way to show that the ASB supports these events and it is not only placed in the hands of the M.E.Ch.A. club to raise money for all these events that end up costing quite a bit of money.

ASB funding would be used for Cinco de Mayo, 16 de Septiembre and Dia de Los Muertos dance. (The total cost of this years Cinco de Mayo is \$850, of which we are receiving \$300 from ASB.) We are also asking the Inter-Cultural Committee for \$250, which will cover the cost of music.

M.E.Ch.A. has CO-sponsored many events including the 1993-94 field trip to San Juan Bautista performance of *El Teatro Campesino* and the Puente Banquet that is held at the end of the year. The field trip was attended by Puente, ESL, EOPS, M.E.Ch.A. and other SRJC students. (The total trip cost was \$1008, of which M.E.Ch.A. contributed \$75 and will be asked for \$200 in the 1994-95 year.) As you see the M.E.Ch.A. club has enough money going out into other projects and should not be held completely responsible for educating the students and community and this is why I bring to you this proposal.

We are requesting to have funds to be set aside for Chicano/a Awareness in the 1994-95 ASB budget. The funding allows for an increase in Chicano/a Awareness activities that can be provided to the student population as well as the community, and recognizes the ASB support for such events that serve underrepresented students. The total request is for \$750 which will provide \$250 for Cinco de Mayo, \$250 for 16 de Sept. and \$250 for Dia de Los Muertos.

The following represents a brief update of facilities projects and their status:

1. Learning Resource Center --- The initial space planning has begun. The Learning Resource Center Space Planning Specialist (Linda Demmers) was on-campus the past two days doing a preliminary assessment of space needs and meeting with various faculty and staff. She will return in early May.

The architectural responses to the Request for Proposals have been received from the seven finalists. Staff is doing a preliminary evaluation concurrent to Board Facilities Review. It is hoped that architectural services may be engaged during May in order to meet the February 1, 1995 plan submittal deadline to the State.

2. Refectory Building --- Reconstruction of the old Refectory restaurant has commenced. The anticipated construction completion date is August 15th. This facility, when complete, will serve as the home to the Campus Police and Foundation as well as provide a large meeting room.
3. Criminal Justice Training Center --- Nothing new to report on this project. The College is awaiting release of drawing money for the on/off site development portions of this project. We anticipate a July, 1998 occupancy of this site on Skylane Road (Just south of Shiloh) near the airport. This project, as well as the Petaluma Library books and barrier removal projects, depends substantially on a positive vote for Proposition 13 in the June election.
4. Petaluma Center --- This project is on-line for a October 1st construction completion date. The site development work will be completed by the end of this summer. Major concern is getting the instructional equipment budget (\$972,000) completed, reviewed and approved by the State in order to meet the January, 1995 opening date.
5. Kent Hall Remodel --- Bids have been accepted and awarded on this

project provides a cosmetic rehabilitation and creates some non-accessible dorm rooms.

6. Health Sciences Facility --- Planning for this facility is contingent upon the completion of a possible sale of the Walter Eagan Center and the decision as to where to locate the new facility.
7. Baker Hall Backfill --- Academic Affairs has recommended that the space vacated by Campus Police be backfilled by Life Sciences for a lecture room and faculty offices. Jay and Curt are working on the scope of this proposal.



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INTRODUCTION

CD-ROM, or Compact Disc Read- Only Memory, is an emerging new technology that enables millions of bytes of data to be stored on a CD-Disc. CD-ROM provides numerous benefits compared with other forms of information storage and retrieval. Perhaps most significant is cost: Massive databases incorporating powerful search and retrieval software can be replicated and distributed for a fraction of the cost of other types of storage media; making CD-ROM a very cost effective method of distributing large amounts of information. (Sherman xxi)

The primary benefit of CD-ROMs is their storage capacity; each disk holds up to 650 megabytes of data. This is equivalent to 680 million characters, or roughly 380,000 pages of text.

The purpose of this document is to provide an information and resource guide. I will describe how you can develop a CD-ROM product. This guide is intended to take you through an overview of the CD-ROM publishing process. The electronic format of this document, on SOLO, will be updated on a monthly basis.

AUTHORING AND DEVELOPING A CD-ROM PRODUCT

Planning

It is worthwhile to do some serious upfront planning with a CD-ROM publishing project. Allocating time and money in the beginning of a project for planning is always helpful and can save thousands of dollars over the course of a CD-ROM project. The following guidelines are provided as a stimulus list to assist in the upfront planning stages of a CD-ROM project or to act as signposts along the way to finishing a project. These guideposts are just that, only guidelines. Once you have a good understanding of the basic issues, you'll be able to take that knowledge and apply it appropriately to your own CD-ROM project.

Overview

Following are steps to convert an existing product to CD-ROM:

1. Choose CD-ROM authoring software
2. Choose mastering hardware and software (Optional)
3. Design product
4. Convert printed documentation text to electronic text with markup as needed for chosen authoring system
5. Scan images in documentation
6. Design CD-ROM artwork and create film positives
7. Index electronic version of document
8. Test with retrieval software, making desired changes
9. Write and print CD-ROM user manual
10. Master software and documentation and simulate performance
11. Produce writable "One-Off" CD-Rs for final testing

12. Subcontract mastering and replication of CD-ROMs
13. Receive CD-ROM replicates and begin distribution
(Guzzetti 2)

STANDARD CD-ROM FILE FORMATS

*ISO-9660

CD-ROM text and images may be in any file format recognized by the application retrieval software. ISO-9660 is a widely used file format for CD-ROM. The ISO-9660 standard defines a directory structure which has been accepted by the International Standards Organization. This standard, supported by Microsoft in the MS\DOS Extensions, allows ISO-9660 formatted CD-ROMs to be read like a DOS write protected hard disk. Formatting a CD-ROM to this standard will allow CD-ROM interchange on any platform that supports the ISO-9660 standard.

*Apple HFS (Hierarchical File Systems)

This format is unique to Apple Macintosh computer systems. A disk using this format will look and behave like a Macintosh hard drive (other than being read only and slower). The disadvantage of this format is that the disks are readable only by Macintosh computer systems. A CD-ROM using the HFS format can contain all the features of the Macintosh interface:

- Full 31 character file names and custom icons,
- Aliasing using System 7.x,
- Comments and labels attached to files,
- No limit on depth of folders.

*Hybrid Formats (Cross Platform)

-Dual Partition

This consists of creating both an ISO-9660 and a HFS disk image, merging them into a disk that looks like an HFS disk on the Mac and a DOS disk on DOS machines.

(Disk Manufacturing 3)

DATA CONVERSION

Data conversion is the first step toward publishing on CD-ROM. Although it is tempting to use existing electronic files, this doesn't always turn out to be the best solution. Some text files contain embedded typesetting codes that are difficult to remove. Other text files don't reflect final changes made after "blue-line" proofs where a quick cut and a paste often seems to be a faster solution than going back to the original source file. In many cases, the text files are created by many authors. There is no single, consistent, electronic file. The cost and time to write custom programs to conform the text files can be expensive (See Adobe Acrobat)

Another option is to use OCR (Optical Character Recognition). The feasibility of using OCR for data conversions depends primarily on the suitability of the source materials and the amount of reliability needed. The particular type of page type font changes, inclusion of tabular materials, and number of different type sizes can all "fool" the OCR software and

can potentially lead to many errors. Typically, OCR, with corrections, provides between 95%-99% accuracy. This sounds acceptable until you consider what this means per page. A typical page has about 2,000 characters. This means 20 errors per page. At the 95% level of accuracy, there would be an average of 100 errors per page.

Another option is to keyboard all the text. A high accuracy level of 99.975% is achieved through double keying. Even at that highly accurate rate there can be 2.5 errors for 10,000 characters, or about one error every two pages. Compare this to the 100 errors per page that OCR often yields and it is an easy choice to keyboard the text. (Guzzetti 3)

Many CD producers convert to (SGML) Standard Generalized Mark-Up Language at the time of keyboarding the text. With development support from the American Association of Publishers, SGML is a language for marking text for a variety of purposes, including typesetting and CD disk publishing. A well designed SGML scheme would enable the publisher to mark text just once for multiple uses. Since typesetting requires more codes than disk publishing, the procedure of moving SGML-marked text to disk usually involves suppressing or modifying some of the codes. SGML significantly increases the cost of conversion (doubling to tripling the cost depending on the complexity of the markup) and is frequently not the best choice for a CD publisher's goal.

Each CD-ROM project will inevitably have differences. The requirements for data conversion and preparation for one project will often be different from another. (Guzzetti 4)

FULL-TEXT INDEXED RETRIEVAL SOFTWARE

Full-text software generally consists of two portions. The first the user invokes is the inverter, which creates the index: then a retrieval engine is used to search for data.

The Index

To find information in a document we could use a program that starts at the beginning of the document and searches through the document, looking for the words of interest. This approach is easy to implement and fast for small documents, but for very large documents or databases of hundreds of documents, it is cumbersome. What is needed is the equivalent of a card catalog that can quickly indicate the location of desired information. This information is contained in the index and not all indexes contain the same information. One might indicate the equivalent of a Dewey Decimal System number, while another might indicate a bookshelf number. (Sherman 303-307)

The Retrieval Engine

Once the index has been created, the user can invoke the retrieval engine to locate information. Retrieval engines allow the user to access the document in several ways. Most are designed to allow access utilizing the following features: The user can look up words in the index or a table of contents search, keyword search, phrase search, hypertext search and boolean search.

(Sherman 303-307)

Public Domain Software

Full-text software and reader licenses (royalties) are expensive, (\$3000-\$10,000) and can be cost prohibitive for the aspiring electronic publisher. Several programs are available from U.S. government agencies for nominal fees. However, they do not offer many of the fulltext features, but they serve the purposes of the low budget start-up operation.

The SETS designer kit was developed by the National Center for Health Statistics. SETS provides a cost-effective way to publish a CD-ROM product. SETS is available for \$55 from:

CD-R ONE OFF DESKTOP PRODUCTION

Desktop CD-Recordable technology is bringing electronic publishing to the masses. But don't be fooled by the overselling of CD-R and all the "roll your own" articles and advertising. CD-ROM production is a major publishing effort. It is not a one person effort or an overnight project. A CD-R recorder, simply put, is a tool that expands the CD producers testing options by allowing the producer to view and test the CD product in an ISO-9660 format prior to sending the finished product to a replication plant. CD-R disks should not be confused with CD Glass Masters. The mastering process is still required for mass replication. (Hudson 66)

Functionally, CD-R and CD-ROM disks are identical. Slip a CD-R disk into a CD-ROM drive and the drive will treat it like a CD-ROM. The cost of CD-R publishing overlaps with the cost of traditional replication at somewhere between 40 and 100 copies of a single pre-mastered disk. CD-R is economical for distributing data to a limited number of users. Applications include distribution of corporate databases to branch offices, limited runs of a multimedia or information product for test marketing and a less widely used but up-and-coming application of CD-R is archiving.

Only 7,500 CD-R drives were sold in the United States in 1993, according to Freeman Associates (Santa Barbara, CA.) and the infancy of the market shows. Painful installations, wide variations in interface design, and moderately buggy software are

just a few of the problems that are cited in recent reviews of CD-R hardware by Byte and PC Magazines.

Falling prices, combined with the present bugs in CD-R. Make a wait and see attitude, a prudent choice for 1994.

REPLICATION GUIDE

*Data Formats

There are two methods of sending data to a replication plant. The first is to send data as a CD-image ready for mastering. This would normally be an image file on CD-R (also referred to as CD-WO one-offs).

*Non-Image Format

If you are unable to create a CD-image, replication plants will accept your non-image format materials. These materials can be anything from back-ups on a hard drive to compressed files on floppies. These non-image materials require formatting and media conversion to put them into the correct CD-image and input media format. Replication plants perform this service based on an hourly charge. (DMI)
