CSA — COLLEGE STUDENT ASSEMBLY — *The main legislative body of the Associated Students composed of all Associated Students elected and appointed officers.*



I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order by President Ralph Leef at 3:12 p.m.

II. Flag Salute

III. Roll Call

Absentees included: Tim Pownall, Bob van Asdlan, and Tom Decker.

IV. Approval of Agenda

The agenda was approved as written.

V. Approval of Minutes

The minutes were approved as written.

VI. Reports

Executive Vice President--Alan Handelin reported that he is in favor of changing the CSA-approved \$1200 scholarship to a Floyd P. Bailey Scholarship Commission, with 5 students, 2 administrators and 3 faculty members, and will bring it up.

Vice President--Rich Brantingham said that there is already a Floyd P. Bailey Memorial Scholarship. He also stated that he enjoyed the challenge of this semester's CSA.

Finance Commissioner--Steve Shepard explained the Diana Activities reports. The card file for students has been bought; it and its indexes cost roughly \$10 and will be available next semester.

Parliamentarian--Rich Samrinen congratulated next semester's officers and stated that he has enjoyed serving CSA and Executive Cabinet as Parliamentarian.

Sophomore Representative--Howard Galmer reported on the trampoline situation and stated that one is older and with less bounce, and suggested waiting before further action.

Elections Commissioner--Kathy Chandler stated that her report on the state conference is available.

Publicity Commissioner--Toby Cain reported that the Sonoma State College "Intercom" will be sent weekly to the publicity Comm.

Head Song Leader--Diane Dennes said that not many CSA members have been supporting their teams and asked that more spirit could be shown, specifically at the game with Contra Costa Saturday.

Activities Advisor--Mr. Canevari asked CSA members to turn in binders as soon as they can; he thanked CSA members for their efforts this semester.

VII. Old Business

A. From Floor--Mr. Canevari reported that neither the band or light company have as yet signed contracts for the January 10 dance. Mike Fama moved and was seconded by Pat Young, to cancel the dance. This motion failed. Howard Calmer, seconded by Sandee Hay, moved for CSA to have extra promotion for this dance. Suggestions were made and discussed. Dick Harkness moved, seconded by Howard Calmer, to amend the motion to add, and have surprise go-go dancers. It was moved and seconded to vote immediately; this passed. The amendment passed 14-6. It was moved and seconded to vote immediately on the main motion; this passed. The motion failed 8-12. Mike Carden moved to offer a doorprize and was seconded by Mike Fama. Steve Shepardy seconded by Rich Brantingham, objected to consideration; this was upheld. Mike Fama then moved that every CSA member individually get out and try to promote spirit for the dance. This was seconded by Sandee Hay and passed 13-7.

Joe Bennett moved, seconded by Conny Jones, to award the Best Club Trophy at the dance. A motion to vote immediately failed. After discussion, another motion to vote immediately passed. The motion failed. Mike Carden, seconded by Mike Fama, moved to have CSA form a committee consisting of the Dance and Publicity Commissioners and others, to bring up new ways of promoting spirit for this dance. The motion failed.

A motion to move to the next agenda item was seconded and passed.

VIII. New Business

A. CSA Banquet--The banquet will be held next Thursday at 7 p.m. at the Black Forest Inn. Alice Fish took the names of those coming and their guests, if any. Mike Fama moved, seconded by Steve Shepardy, to let ties and sports coats be acceptable dress. Dick Harkness, seconded by Howard Calmer, moved to amend this to let CSA jackets be optional. A motion to vote immediately passed. Another motion to vote immediately passed, and the main motion passed.

B. \$1200 Scholarship--Alan Handelin explained his idea of a commission, and it was discussed. Rich Brantingham moved, seconded by Mike Carden, to put the \$1200, if available, in the Floyd F. Bailey Memorial Scholarship Foundation, for this year. An objection to consideration was made and failed. A motion to vote immediately failed. After further discussion, another motion to vote immediately passed. The motion then failed.

C. Quarter System--Alan Handelin, seconded by Mike Fama, moved to a letter to Dr. Newman stating that CSA is in favor of the quarter system. An objection to consideration failed. Mike Carden moved, seconded by Alan Handelin, to postpone this indefinitely until next semester and to take a straw vote. The motion passed: the straw vote was 13-3-3.

There were no announcements at this time.

X. Adjournment

After a motion made by Mike Fama and seconded by Kathy Sullivan, the last CSA meeting for the Fall Semester, 1968, was adjourned by President Ralph Leef at 4:20 p.m.

Dennis asked that all blazers be worn at CSA meetings and all student Government sponsored functions.



There was no new business from the floor.



SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE
TRAFFIC AND PARKING REGULATIONS

SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE
TRAFFIC AND PARKING REGULATIONS

The Law Enforcement Department of the Santa Rosa Junior College is authorized by the College Administration to enforce parking and traffic regulations adopted by the Administration upon the review and recommendation of the Traffic Committee; to issue citations for parking and traffic violations; to maintain records of all police matters; to investigate traffic accidents and file reports with the College Dean of Business Services of any accident involving College property; and to cooperate with the College Administration in developing ways and means to improve traffic conditions on campus.

Authority to regulate traffic and parking on the Santa Rosa Junior College campus rests with the governing board of the Sonoma County Junior College District under the provisions of Section 21113 of the California Vehicle Code.

Section 21113 of the California Vehicle Code authorizes a public institution to make any special conditions and regulations necessary to control parking and traffic on the grounds.

Public Grounds

21113. (a) No person shall drive any vehicle or animal, nor shall any person stop, park, or leave standing any vehicle or animal, whether attended or unattended, upon the driveways, paths, or the grounds of any public school, state university, state college, state, county, hospital district, or municipal institution or building, or any educational institution exempted in whole or in part from taxation, except with the permission of, and upon and subject to such conditions and regulations as may be imposed by the governing board or office of the public school, state university, state college, state, county, hospital district, or municipal institution or building, or educational institution.

(b) Every governing board or officer shall erect or place appropriate signs giving notice of any special conditions or regulations that are imposed under this section and every board or officer shall also prepare and keep available at the principal administrative office of the board or officer, for examination by all interested persons, a written statement of all such special conditions and regulations adopted under this section.

(c) When any governing board or officer permits public traffic upon the driveways, paths, or grounds under their control then, in the absence of any special condition or regulations applicable to the traffic, all the provisions of this code relating to traffic upon the highways shall be applicable to the traffic upon the driveways, paths, or grounds.

Special Conditions of Traffic Control

100. Definitions of Words and Phrases. The words and phrases used in this statute shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section.

(1) Staff Parking Facility. Any lot, space, or area within the campus of the College designated by the administration for parking vehicles by members of the staff, faculty, physically handicapped students, and elected student officers of Santa Rosa Junior College and so designated by yellow parking lines or markings.

(2) Student Parking Facility. Any lot, space, or area within the campus of the Santa Rosa Junior College that has been designated by the administration for parking and so designated by white parking lines or markings.

(3) Visitor Parking Facility. Any space or area within the campus of the Santa Rosa Junior College that has been designated by the administration for parking and is so designated by green parking lines or markings.

(4) Kent Hall Parking Facility. Parking is available for residents of Kent Hall in the immediate vicinity thereof. These reserved spaces are yellow in color and are labeled "Kent Hall."

(5) Park. To stand or leave standing any vehicle, whether occupied or not, otherwise than for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading of passengers.

(6) Visitor. A visitor is any person not enrolled as a student at the Santa Rosa Junior College or not employed by the Santa Rosa Junior College, who has legitimate business on campus.

(7) Motor Vehicle. Any motor-driven device in, upon, or by which any person or property may be transported upon a street or highway.

101. Traffic Signs. All regulatory traffic signs on the campus legally posted must be obeyed (stop signs, speed limit signs, parking signs, and other traffic signs).

102. Closing of Roads. Roads and parking areas on the campus are not public thoroughfares and may be closed or restricted at any time for the convenience of the College.

103. Right of Way. Pedestrians shall have the right of way over vehicles at all times.

104. Speed Limits. The maximum speed limit on campus of any vehicle shall be 15 miles per hour.

105. Acceleration. No person shall accelerate a motor vehicle on campus in excess of the acceleration needed for normal operation of said motor vehicle. Rear wheel frictional marks, excessive dust, or a loud noise from the tires shall be *prima facie* evidence of unlawful acceleration.

106. Exhaust Noise. No person shall accelerate his vehicle exhaust system to the degree that it will create a disturbance or cause a loud noise on campus.

107. Use of Campus Facilities. Use of parking facilities and campus roadways may be limited to those times when College activities are in progress.

108. Driving and Parking Vehicles. Driving and parking of vehicles is restricted to the paved parking lots and roadways only, unless otherwise provided for. All vehicles must park in a space provided for parking.

109. Motorcycle Parking. Motor bikes and scooters must be parked in the area provided for such vehicles just west of Doyle Center.

110. Visitor Parking. No person other than a visitor shall use the Visitor Parking facility.

111. Student Parking. All students, except as otherwise provided, shall park in a Student Parking facility.

112. Staff Parking. No person shall stop, park, or let stand any vehicle in a staff parking facility unless such vehicle is registered and has attached to it the proper parking permit for that parking space.

113. Saving Clause. Nothing herein shall be construed as exempting any person from operating a vehicle on campus in a manner prescribed by the Vehicle Code of California or the ordinances of the city of Santa Rosa.

114. Requests for Identification. Law Enforcement personnel are authorized to request satisfactory identification from persons operating motor vehicles on the campus, and no person shall refuse such reasonable request.

115. Cooperation with Campus Law Enforcement Officers. No person shall willfully refuse to comply with any lawful order of any Law Enforcement officer when such authorized persons are directing traffic or engaged in other activities concerning the enforcement of these regulations.

116. Special Vehicles Excepted. Exception to these regulations are made to special vehicles:

(a) Authorized emergency vehicles are accorded all the exemptions as enumerated in the California Vehicle Code (Section 165).

(b) School-owned service vehicles are subject to exemptions from regulations having to do with driving and parking in restricted areas.

117. Written Notices. In the case of a violation of the provisions of any of the sections of this statute with the exception of Sections 104, 105, and 106, it shall be the duty of the Law Enforcement personnel to issue, in writing, on an appropriate Santa Rosa Junior College form, a citation, which shall be attached to the vehicle. In the case of a violation of Section 104, 105, or 106, the Law Enforcement personnel shall submit a written report of the incident to the Dean of Students.

118. Registration of Vehicles. Any student, staff member, or faculty member, who at any time for any reason operates a motor vehicle on campus, must have, prior to parking, a valid parking permit displayed in a 7-inch square of the inside lower right-hand corner of the windshield. Any vehicle not having a windshield shall display a valid parking permit within close view upon the vehicle.

119. Student Registration. Students will make application for and receive their College parking permit at the time of registration for the new school year. New students entering College in the Spring Semester will receive their parking

permit at the time of registration. Duplicate stickers may be obtained from the Law Enforcement Office, Room 221, Baker Hall.

120. Issuing Parking Permits. Faculty, staff, and handicapped students will receive their parking permit from the office of the Dean of Business Services. Elected student officers will receive their parking permit from the Adviser of Student Activities.

121. Effective Period. Faculty, staff, and student vehicle registration will be effective for the college year.

122. Vehicle Registration. Vehicle registration stickers are non-transferable. A person may request a change in vehicle registration classification by making application at the Law Enforcement office. New stickers received at the time of registration should be placed on the vehicle, as explained in Section 117, and the old one removed.

123. Misrepresentation. Any person who at any time materially falsifies or makes false representation concerning vehicle registration or who fails to register his vehicle will be subject to review by the Office of the Dean of Students.

124. Holding-up of Grades. Diplomas, certificates, transcripts, and registration materials will not be issued to a student until all traffic violations to his record have been settled.

125. Registration Responsibility. The owner of the vehicle or the person to whom the College Vehicle Registration sticker has been issued shall be held responsible for all traffic tickets given to a particular vehicle regardless of who is driving or who has parked the vehicle.

126. Traffic Fines. Fines for parking violations are payable at the Law Enforcement Office, Room 221, Baker Hall. Fines will be levied at the rate of \$1.00 each for the first three tickets, \$2.00 each for the fourth and fifth tickets, and \$5.00 each for every ticket after the fifth ticket.

A student acquiring an excess of five tickets will be subject to dismissal from college.

The motions passed.

Chris Bowman declined from his recent appointment as a member of the Parking Committee. Mr. Canevari said he felt we should have a member from CSA on this committee.

Karen Sabelman then volunteered to be the permanent representative to the Board of Trustees.

B. From the Floor--There was no old business from the floor.

VII. New Business

A. Recruiting Travelling Funds--Ruth Olivar from the Mexican-American Club reported that they wish to have further candidates for the position of full or part-time instructor for the Readiness Program. She requested a supplement to their funds to finance a trip to the Bay Area and Fresno for this purpose. It was moved and seconded that \$15 be allocated from Miscellaneous funds for travelling expenses. The motion passed unanimously.

It was moved and seconded that the Executive Cabinet send a letter to the Oak Leaf stating appreciation for the coverage but also disapproval of Ralph Leaf's inaccurate and inadequate statements. The motion passed.

Mr. Canevari reported it was requested that at the CSA meeting an appointee be selected for the Best Club Trophy Committee.

VIII. Announcements

ICC's representative to CSA is Brad Knickerbocker.



Meeting #2
February 17, 1969

I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 3:10 by President Dennis VanderWerff.

II. Flag Salute

The flag salute was led by Executive Vice-President Steve Sheppard.

III. Roll Call

Bob Marmor, Carlene Lanus, and Sandee Hay were absent.

IV. Approval of the Agenda

The agenda was approved as written.

V. Approval of the Minutes

The minutes were corrected to read, "The minutes were then approved as read." The minutes were approved as corrected.

VI. Reports

President--Dennis VanderWerff introduced Dr. Newman, who then spoke to the College Student Assembly. Dr. Newman said that CSA is the organized expression, the voice of the students at the J.C. He emphasized the importance of being on committees and being chairmen. He then suggested a variety of projects which should be brought into discussion. For instance, the Administration has been studying means of financing a new bookstore. Dr. Newman also wanted to see further consideration on the name of this institution. He suggested that CSA come to its own conclusion and that the Academic Senate consider it. Another matter of importance is the means by which the students are chosen for the various committee assignments. He felt that perhaps the appointments to committees should not be the responsibility of one person. Furthermore, the Administration will consider CSA's decisions on the traffic problem, and, if they agree, they will support it. Dr. Newman offered to speak with CSA in the future.

Dennis requested that those who have not yet done so are to submit to him a schedule of their classes and office hours.

A letter from the secretary of the Academic Senate was then read which stated that the February 19 meeting will concern pressing problems, and, therefore, Dennis will not address them at that time. Further details are forthcoming.

It was then announced that on the first week of each semester, the English Department will hold elections for four student representatives. These students will attend the English Dept. meetings and have full voting privileges.

Executive Vice President--Steve Sheppard asked for responses in regards to the letter written to the Traffic and Planning Commission.

Vice President--Richard Brantingham reminded that Club Day will be on February 26. On March 1st he wants to take seven persons to Solano for the CCICCA Conference.

Finance Commissioner--Bob Marmor reported that a substantial loss was sustained at the Coop dance Friday night, partially due to the late arrival of the band. Fifteen dollars has been taken out of Miscellaneous Funds and given to Ruth Olivar to cover expenses she will incur on her upcoming trip for the Mexican-American Club.

Sophomore Representatives--Fran Blaylock reported that she attended the Open Forum Committee meeting.

Joanne Noble reported that many students want more dances. Furthermore, it has been suggested that there be dances at noon.

Karen Sabelman stated that band members thanked everyone who listened to them play the new SRJC song and also thanked Mr. Canevari for offering to write the words for it.

AWS Representative--Connie Chudwick reported that she and Mrs. Pollard will be seeing if the Villa Chante Claire is available for the Spring Formal.

Dance Commissioner--Gary Sloan said that the Dance Committee is almost formed. Joanne Noble's comments will be considered at the next Dance Committee meeting.

I.G.C. Representative--Brad Knickerbocker stated that his position was not stated in the routing committee section.

Hyde Park/Open Forum--Don Lindberg reported that two students from San Francisco State College will speak on Thursday about the condition of the college. In addition, speakers from Third World and AFT are also being sought. Furthermore, an ex-SRJC ASB president attending SF State might speak on the effect of the close-down on those students who had taken no active part in the demonstrations.

Oak Leaf Representative--Linda Marden reported that the Oak Leaf had received the letter from CSA, and it will be printed in this week's issue.

Student Activities Advisor--Mr. Canevari reported that the proposed new fight song for SRJC is very good. He then said that anyone who is interested in helping him write the lyrics is welcome to. Further he suggested that it might be appropriate to do something official to accept the music. If possible, the band may even play the new song at a future CSA meeting.

Mr. Canevari then reported that there will be fewer Coop dances in the spring, because there are no more football games, which draw crowds to the dances. Also, there are more activities in the spring, and the scheduling of Coop dances becomes a problem. It was suggested that Coop dance publicity reach Sonoma State, and that the admittance of students should be policed better.

VII. Old Business

A. Traffic Problem Committee Report--Carl Rockey reported that the Traffic Problem Committee had met, and that the result of its conclusions are in the form of a resolution to the Traffic and Planning Commission. It requested that the streets be opened to through traffic and that a study be made on the situation. During this period students would be reminded to be respectful to the privacy of the residents. It was moved and seconded that the resolution be presented to the Traffic and Planning Commission. Motion Passed.

It was then stated that all those who wish may attend the meeting that night at 7:30.

Mr. Canevari suggested that written copies of the resolution be given to everyone.

B. Name of the College--It was suggested that this be referred to a committee. The purpose would be to conduct a scientific survey of the situation. Then, CSA could form a resolution based on the research that has been done, requesting that either the name be changed or not. At this point, CSA is only concerned with what the student body wants. It was moved and seconded that this matter be referred to a committee, which is to investigate and report on the matter within three weeks. The motion passed.

Appointed to the committee were: Kathy Chandler, chairman; Charles Porter, Jeff Hess, Fran Blaylock, John Ballotti, Joanne Noble, Dick Harkness, Paul Weyhe, Larry Gibson, and Brad Knickerbocker.

C. Parking Committee Member--Mr. Canevari suggested that a member from CSA be on the Parking Committee. Elected was Don Lindberg.

D. From the Floor--There was no Old Business from the floor.

VIII. New Business

A. Best Club Trophy Award Judging Committee Member--Rich Brantingham reported that I.G.C. has a Best Club Trophy Award, and that four people will choose which is the best club on campus. This committee includes Dr. Dougan, Mr. Canevari, a member of I.C.C., and a member of CSA. Karen Sabelman was elected as CSA representative.

B. Descriptions of Admin. Staff Areas of Concern--It was suggested that CSA ask that the Administrative staff supply a description

of their jobs, office hours, and office locations. These would then be submitted to the Bear Facts on a twice-weekly and rotating basis. It was moved and seconded that a resolution to this effect be approved and forwarded to Dr. Newman. The motion passed.

C. From the Floor--There was no business from the floor.

IX. Announcements

Mr. Canevari requested that all CSA members planning on attending the Traffic and Planning Commission meeting read all of the available material on the problem. Secondly, any CSA member in his Poli. Sci. 50 class may attend the meeting and do a critique for extra credit.

Carl Rockey asked that anyone who wished to address the Traffic and Planning Commission meeting would talk to him before the meeting.

Diane Dennes announced that there will be a game Saturday night at Dianza and a Marin game on March 1.

Kathy Chandler announced that the "Name of the College" Committee will meet on Thursday at 12:30 in the Student Activities Office.

X. Adjournment--After a motion and second, the meeting adjourned at 4:31.

C.S.A. Tackles First Problems

The College Student Assembly (CSA) met for the first time on Monday, February 10, with President Dennis Vander Werff presiding and the following items were discussed and voted on by the student legislative body:

1—The CSA voted overwhelmingly not to lend the name of the student organization to the Evelyn Wood Reading Dynamics Co. after asking CSA's support for an on-campus class.

2—President Vander Werff made his first report to the 27-member voting body. He pointed out that his administration would be a "working body not a ceremonial body" and that "officers not performing their duties would be removed to inspire other officers and the student body."

3—Resignations were tendered by Tim Pownell (Vice President), Commissioner Mike Carden and Recording Secretary-elect Alice Fish.

4—Vander Werff explained that the Area 7 Conference will be held at the College of the Redwoods in Eureka in March, but that only 10 students would be able to attend this year due to transportation and boarding costs.

5—The President announced that the college Academic Senate has asked him to present a State of the Student message in the near future. He has accepted.

6—The Executive Vice President, Steve Sheppard, said in his report to the body that the credit-non-credit system and study on the possibility of an ethnic studies department would be made this semester. Mr. Canevari, Activities Ad-

visor, summarized the administration's point of view on the quarter system this semester, then quickly asked for a motion to postpone any action on a quarter system. The motion was made and passed unanimously (without any debate).


Under new business, Karen Sableman and Carl Rocky were elected to serve as representatives-at-large on the Executive Cabinet, Jim Reed was elected to serve on the Board of Reviews, and Chris Bowman and Larry Sullivan were elected to the Traffic Committee.

Carl Rocky then introduced a motion to study the traffic around Illinois Avenue and to set up a committee to suggest possible solutions for working out the problems. A committee was chosen by the chairman and will report their findings on February 24.

Action by the body on whether the name of the college should be changed was postponed to the next meeting because of the late hour.

Before the matter was postponed, Vander Werff explained to the body that College President, Dr. Randolph Newman, invited the Executive Cabinet to dine with him in late January when the matter of changing the name of the college was brought up. The OAK LEAF will keep readers posted on any action by CSA in dealing with a motion concerning changing the name of the institution from Santa Rosa Junior College.

Following the two-hour meeting, Vander Werff said he was "very pleased" with the first meeting but that he was "disappointed in those people who ran for office and were elected knowing they would have to resign."



Residents Protest

Long enough or not, residents protested the diversion yesterday as causing problems. Howard M. Lord, 1808 Albany, said residents are unable to sleep due to speeding cars, traffic has increased many times and litter is endless. Students park all day without fear of parking tickets.

Mr. Lord spoke loudly and urged immediate commission help and relief. He said the residents want a quiet street. He suggested closing the college parking lot access on Elliott in favor of a direct access to Armory dr. This has been proposed by the city.

The night meeting in February will discuss the situation further with perhaps a third try at pleasing everybody — something the city realizes is next to impossible.

Mr. Lord, though, is one of many wanting a solution. He presented an 85-name petition seeking relief in the area.

SRJC Lot Traffic Protested

Residents north of Santa Rosa Junior College are unhappy, thus far, with city efforts to ease traffic flow in the area.

The cause is a new college parking lot that dumps hundreds of cars each day onto Elliott ave. Many of the cars go north one way or another and this causes congestion, speeding and other problems.

After a hearing that wasn't scheduled, yesterday's Traffic and Parking Commission meeting resulted in a night session being ordered for Feb. 17 for further discussion.

First, the city blocked Nordyke ave. at Elliott to prevent traffic, mostly students, from moving north and troubling residents. The result was a happy Nordyke area for the most part, but complaints from nearby streets which caught the traffic increase.

Next, the commission approved a traffic diversion on Albany that is supposed to result in reducing student northbound traffic on that street. Cars are supposed to go east or west on Elliott to Mendocino ave. or Armory dr. The diversion is a week old, not long enough for a true test.

Codding Comments On SRJC Lot Traffic

Santa Rosa Councilman Hugh railroad right-of-way between B. Codding, as president of Codding Enterprises and a councilman, has joined the growing list of proponents of better parking lot access for Santa Rosa Junior College.

Mr. Codding wrote a letter Tuesday with copies sent to the college, City Planning Commission and others stating his concern for the access that now utilizes Elliott ave. on the north west edge of the campus.

His letter grew from attendance at Monday's Traffic and Parking Commission meeting where residents objected to city attempts to find a solution by temporary traffic changes in the residential area north of the campus.

Mr. Codding is the author of a proposal that access could be improved by using the former

the college and Santa Rosa High School.

The right-of-way would provide east-west traffic movement for both educational units between Mendocino ave. and Ar- mory dr. Mr. Codding called for a study of the access question by the Planning Commission with a recommendation to the City Council.

"I also feel that the junior college should be put on notice that the City Planning Commission would like to have their future intentions and development plans officially submitted to the city for recommendations. I feel this is of the utmost im- portance..."

The letter was sent to the commission initially. Mr. Codding also suggests a westward extension of Pacific ave. to con-

nect with the railroad right-of-way under consideration for purchase by the college.

Past meetings have included the fact that the college does not have to seek city approval of its internal plans. However, easements are required for access to and from parking lots.

Codding Ired By SRJC Traffic

The problems with traffic in and out of Santa Rosa Junior College continue to be a topic of discussion by the City Council, Traffic and Parking Commission and others.

In an action Tuesday, the council authorized City Engineer Robert Van Guelpen and Planning Director Kenneth Blackman to meet with SRJC officials in an attempt to review the college's traffic and parking plans.

Councilman Hugh B. Codding said the city should put the college on notice that if there isn't instant co-operation the city will consider other steps. His comment referred to a reported stand by the college that its plans do not need city approval.

Mr. Codding said the engineers could withhold easement permission and other steps can be taken without co-operation.

Mr. Codding renewed the issue of the parking situation around the campus based on his mention of using the old railroad right of way between the college and Santa Rosa High as alternative access. He proposed connecting Pacific ave. through to Armory dr. over the right of way.

The traffic and parking group reviewed the proposal, but learned recently that the railroad placed such a high price on the Mendocino ave. and Armory frontages that the college backed off. However, the college is negotiating for the right of way interior, away from the frontages.

Councilman Codding sees the right of way as a way of relieving the congested traffic flow in and out of the college parking areas on Elliott ave. and into a highly residential area involving Albany dr., Illinois and other streets.

"I think the Elliott ave. access should be closed," Mr. Codding added, showing his seriousness for co-operative discussions by the college.

The traffic and parking commission is recommending against using the right of way based on an engineering recommendation. Vice Mayor Jack Ryersen said the recommendation should be received before the commission goes further.

However, he and the other council members favored the city department heads and their assistants meeting with college officials with a report to be returned.

Meeting #3
February 24, 1969

I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 3:11 by President Dennis VanderWerff.

II. Flag Salute

The flag salute was led by Vice President Rich Brantingham.

III. Roll Call

Diane Graveman, Paul Weyhe, and Mike Fama were absent. Carl Rockey, Kathy Chandler, and Bob Marmor were excused.

IV. Approval of Agenda

The agenda was approved as written.

V. Approval of the Minutes

The minutes were approved as written.

VI. Reports

President--Dennis VanderWerff reported that a resolution was sent to Dr. Newman concerning the publishing of Administrative staff information in the Bear Facts on a rotating basis. The areas of concern of only one staff member would be published at any one time. These will then be submitted to future editions of the student handbook.

Dennis then read his letter to Mr. Roderich Bryan, Chairman of the Traffic and Parking Commission, in which he announced the appointment of Carl Rockey and Don Lindberg to the sub-committee concerning the traffic problem. Dennis also assured Mr. Bryan that he would have the full cooperation of the students at SRJC.

Dennis announced that there will be a colloquium on the meaning of academic freedom that is being presented by the Fiftieth Anniversary Committee. Written questions from the audience will be given to the moderator, who will then direct them to the four speakers. Conny Jones and Joanne Noble will prepare a form on which these questions will be submitted. Dennis hopes that CSA members will support this presentation. Further, students will be needed to bring the questions to the moderator. This could be done on the part of CSA members or one of the clubs. Dennis asked that everyone think about questions for this program.

Executive Vice President--Steve Sheppard reported that he had attended the Traffic Problem Committee meeting and said that SRJC was well represented by the members from CSA. He congratulated Carl Rockey and Don Lindberg for their excellent presentation.

Steve then announced that he attended the Curriculum Instruction Committee meeting concerning the credit-no credit system, which may be initiated next fall or spring. This would apply to no more than 12 of the 60 units at SRJC. Its purpose is to allow students to attend classes without necessarily having to take credit and obtaining grades for it. CSA voted that the students should be able to decide if a course will be for credit or not within nine weeks after the course has begun.

Vice President--Rich Brantingham announced that he has appointed Joanne Noble, Craig Thurmond, Tom Rodella, and Chris Zeek to serve with him on the Constitution Committee. He also reported that Club Day may be held on Friday, depending upon the weather.

Assistant Finance Commissioner--John Ballotti reported that there was a total loss of \$128 at the last Coop dance. A complete ASB finance report will be ready by next meeting.

AWS Representative--Connie Chudwick reported that she and Mrs. Pollard went to the Villa Chante Claire and found that it would not be available on the night of the Spring Formal. However, it will be available for next year. She then announced that the Spring Formal will be held on May 17 at the Saturday Afternoon Clubhouse.

Dance Commissioner--Gary Sloan announced that there will be a Dance Committee meeting at 2:30 in Conference room 2.

Hyde Park/Open Forum Commissioner--Don Lindberg reported that Carl Rockey presented the resolution from CSA to the Traffic and Planning Commission, and he in turn voiced some possible solutions. The overall acceptance of the students was very favorable at the meeting with little or no exception. The committee has made a resolution to set up a sub-committee which will then deal with the problem.

Rallies Commissioner--Sandee Hay then stated that the Rally Committee hopes to have a rally on Friday, unless Club Day is held at that time.

Student Activities Advisor--Mr. Canevari announced that there were still sweatshirts available to all those who deserve them. He also said that he was proud of the students who attended the Traffic and Planning Commission Meeting, and hopes that a solution can be agreed upon.

He then suggested that CSA members prepare questions concerning Academic Freedom, which can be directed to the colloquium.

Mr. Canevari then reported that a group of students in a Social Science 160 section will conduct polls for anyone who wants to find student opinions on various issues, which might include the bookstore, dances, and so on. Any interested students are to see Mr. Canevari.

VII. Old Business

A. Parking Regulations--Dennis reported that Mr. Anderson, Chairman of the Law Enforcement Department, has offered to speak with CSA about

the Parking Regulations pamphlet if any explanations are necessary. Mr. Canevari asked that all questions be presented to him by Friday so that arrangements can be made.

B. From the Floor--There was no old business from the floor.

VIII. New Business

A. Woman of the Month--Dennis said that a memo from Mrs. Pollard requested that representatives from CSA attend the meeting on February 26 at 3:15 to select the Woman of the Month. Charles Porter, Fran Blaylock, and Gary Sloan volunteered.

B. Area 7 Conference--Dennis announced that the conference is to be held on March 21 and 22 at the College of the Redwoods. So far, nine members of the Executive Cabinet are planning to attend. Elected from CSA to attend the conference were Jeff Hess, Fran Blaylock, Don Lindberg, and Joanne Noble.

C. SRJC Golden Jubilee March--A recording of the new SRJC fight song was then played. After several favorable comments, it was moved and seconded that CSA commend Mr. Petersen for his fine job. The motion passed.

Mr. Canevari commented that this march is in tribute to the fiftieth anniversary of SRJC.

D. From the Floor--Jeff Hess suggested that something be done about the flags, which are torn and battered. It was then moved and seconded that a letter be written to Dr. Newman, requesting that new flags be obtained for the school. The motion passed.

Rich Brantingham reported that both he and Bob Marmor have heard numerous complaints concerning the SRJC bookstore. Dennis said that a study has been under way for some time by Mr. Maggiora. However, it has been held up because a financing company was interested in offering a package deal on a new bookstore. Dr. Newman has said that the study results will be available to CSA on the 10th of March and is anxious for something to be done about this situation. Most of the complaints concerned the bookstore personnel. It was moved and seconded that CSA request the Doyle Student Center Commission to re-investigate the bookstore with regards to personality conflicts, and how they conduct the business with regards to the students. The motion passed.

IX. Announcements

Dennis announced that Mike Fama, Paul Weyhe, Charles Porter, and Sandee Hay had not yet submitted their class schedules to him.

X. Adjournment

After a motion and seconds, the meeting adjourned at 4:25.



No Solution Yet To Traffic Problem at SRJC

The traffic situation involving Santa Rosa Junior College and the northern residential area above Elliott ave. is not an open and shut case.

Santa Rosa's Traffic and Parking Commission found that last night as did college officials, students and area residents.

Congestion, speeding and danger apparently can't be halted by closing all streets or shutting traffic out of certain areas. There is a solution, but it lies hidden—for now—among a variety of suggestions aired last night.

The commission felt it didn't have enough information and justification to take one approach to solve area problems. The 50 representatives of the college, student body and homes felt something definite should be achieved right away. However, they weren't in agreement on any answer.

After much discussion which included a few heated exchanges, the commission authorized chairman to appoint a committee to meet with representatives of the council, college and student body to bring all as together for joint exploration.

Valter Brelje, a commission proposed the committee and indicated traffic access for the college, a third access for a college parking lot and the possible extension of Armory dr. College ave. should be studied.

Chairman Roderich Bryan appointed Mr. Brelje and Commissioner Edward LaFrance as the commission's representatives on the total committee.

As it is now, the area north of Elliott ave. has Nordyke ave. closed at Elliott and traffic on Illinois is diverted at Sucher st. a diagonal barrier. Both obstructions are temporary, based on a permanent solution to bring harmony between the residential area and college.

Speeding Complaints

During the discussion, residents complained of speeding and reckless driving. Installation of dips and four-corner stop signs were suggested. Others feared for safety of children. Some couldn't sleep due to the noise even after 11 p.m.

As one resident asked to close Albany dr. or Illinois ave., or both, another would demand the reopening of Nordyke.

What's being attempted is to keep traffic to and from the college from using Illinois, Albany and Nordyke. Instead, the city effort with the temporary obstructions is an attempt to get traffic to use Elliot ave. through to Armory dr., primarily, and to Mendocino ave.

A three-way traffic signal being installed at Mendocino and Elliot is seen as a help for the traffic problem. Santa Rosa Junior College is remaining rather quiet during discussions of the traffic flow caused by students. A co-operative attitude has been expressed.

Many students were in the audience wanting to help. A resolution signed by Dennis L. VanderWerff, student president,

promised that students would observe traffic laws and would spread the word to others.

The proposal made more often than any other was to remove the Nordyke barricade at Elliott while the city, college and students looked for a permanent solution. That one removal was seen as the solution last night.

Residents present were irritated that about 26 Nordyke ave. residents petitioned the commission and won closure of the street. Other petitions, they said, have been ignored.

Assistant City Engineer Broy Rihla said one solution would be an improved offramp from College ave. for better access. He said many students of the college coming from the south travel all the way to the Steele lane offramp because it's easier to get to the campus. Punching Armory dr. through to College could change that, he said.

As the discussion swirled around in circles, residents and commissioners proceeded to tell each other they were passing the buck by trying to pin the problem on one group or the other when the traffic situation is a community problem.

As the commission moved to the next item after appointment of the committee members, the junior college students and student officers were commended for attending the meeting and speaking out. They were told their actions were appreciated.

Other action:

—Agreed to removing most of the parking on both sides of Albany dr. between Elliott ave. and Victor st.

—Recommended the traffic engineer consult with the state concerning design of traffic signals at Hoen ave. and Farmers lane for consideration of state financial participation. In addition, the city will have to consider widening on Hoen at the intersection.

—Asked for more information before commenting on a proposed channelization that would run from the intersection of Mendocino ave. and Chanate-Administration Center dr. south to the existing concrete channel north of Steele lane.

The city and county are cooperating on installing traffic signals at the entrance to the Administration Center. Heavy loads of county employe traffic

demand a stacking lane on Mendocino for a left turn into the center from the south.

A recommendation will await a look at the 1969-70 priority list of street projects and a financial picture. The long channel may be constructed from funds raised by an assessment district.

Charles Porter was absent. Kathy Chandler, Gary Sloan, and Sandee Hay were excused.

IV. Approval of Agenda

The agenda was approved as written.

V. Approval of the Minutes

The minutes were approved as written.

VI. Reports

President--Dennis VanderWerff read a resolution to the Doyle Student Center Commission requesting a re-investigation of student attitudes towards the bookstore with regard to employee personalities and helpfulness, as well as location and condition of the bookstore.

He then read a letter to Dr. Newman requesting the acquisition of new flags for the campus. Those flags presently being flown in front of Analy Hall are in very poor condition. The purchasing of new flags would be appropriate to the fiftieth anniversary of SRJC.

A letter to Mr. John Peterson was then read, commending him and the college band for making the SRJC Golden Jubilee March such a success.

Dennis then announced that all delegates to the Area 7 Conference have been chosen. In addition to the President's Workshop, there will be Curriculum, Current Problems, Student Values, and Campus Communications Workshops.

Dennis then reported that the Executive Cabinet has agreed on the following delegates to attend the State Conference, April 24-26: Dennis VanderWerff, Steve Sheppard, Rich Brantingham, Kathy Chandler, and Bob Marmor.

Dennis said that a representative from CSA will be needed to attend Rotary luncheons at noon on the 12th and 19th of March. Sharon Fowler was appointed to attend.

Dennis then reported that the committee concerned with ACT testing has agreed to allow students to evaluate the test. Connie Chudwick, John Ballotti, Carl Rockey, Carlene Lanus, Karen Sabelman, Chris Zeek, Don Lindberg, Diane Graveman, Kathi Humes, and Jeff Hess were appointed to meet with Mrs. Pollard to discuss this matter.

Dennis then stated that he assumed there were no questions regarding the Traffic and Parking Regulations pamphlet and will inform Mr. Anderson of this.

Vice President--Rich Brantingham reported that, due to a recent article in the Oak Leaf concerning the book store, he has received additional support from students for a re-investigation.

Rich stated that he was proud of the people who attended the recent CCICCA conference. CSA members then joined Rich in commending Chris Zeek for acting as chairman of a workshop at the conference. One of the main issues discussed was inter-club counsels.

On March 7th and 8th the Debate Team, Speech 7 class, will be hosting a debate but is in need of a group to sponsor one of the three events. Rich said that CSA might consider doing this.

Sophomore Rep.--Fran Blaylock reported that she attended the Woman-of-the-Month meeting along with Gary Sloan. Vickie Taylor was chosen. Fran then announced that an Open Forum presentation on March 12th and 19th will include AFT and CAE speakers.

Sophomore Rep.--Carl Rockey reported that Mr. Codding will chair the sub-committee on the traffic problem.

Sophomore Rep.--Karen Sabelman gave a report on the Rotary Club luncheon she attended. Foreign exchange students from the American Field Service spoke at the luncheon.

Athletics Commissioner--Jeff Hess announced that there will be a relay track meet on Saturday, March 8.

Hyde Park/Open Forum Commissioner--Don Lindberg reported that Mid-Day Series presentations are scheduled for Wednesdays. Since Mondays and Fridays many students are involved in other activities, Open Forum presentations are held on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

Mid-Day Series Rep.--Dick Harkness announced that the George Duke Trio will perform on Wednesday, March 5, in the Auditorium at noon, and that one student from CSA will be needed to eat lunch with this group after their performance. Jeff Hess volunteered.

Dick then reported that he has been confronted by several people who would like to have a flea market at SRJC on the lawn area. This would not be held by a club but would be done on an individual basis. Students could bring any unwanted articles and sell them at their own price.

Oak Leaf Rep.--Linda Marden reported that the maintenance department has built boxes which will hold copies of the Oak Leaf on nearly every building on the campus. In addition, copies are distributed in the Coop and are available in the Oak Leaf office.

Head Song Leader--Diane Dennes announced that SRJC lost the game against Marin by only one point. She also reported that the new vice president of the College of Marin is organizing an exchange lance between SRJC and the Marin college.

Student Activities Advisor--Mr. Canevari had nothing to say.

VII. Old Business

A. Committee on Name of College

John Ballotti reported that the committee has met twice and that Kathy Chandler has sent a letter to Dr. Sidney W. Grossman, Chancellor of the California Community Colleges, asking his opinion of the name of Santa Rosa Junior College. A letter will also be sent to Max Rafferty, State Superintendent of Schools. The committee is planning on having Barry Wadman conduct a poll in which students can express their opinions. A list of possible names will be presented to each student from which he may select one, and a write-in space will be provided also.

B. College Night

Dennis reported that College Night is scheduled for April 18, during which students from high schools are invited to visit SRJC and attend a program which introduces them to college life.

It was moved and seconded that Mrs. Pollard speak with CSA about College Night. The motion was defeated.

It was then moved that CSA form a committee to meet with Mrs. Pollard to help organize College Night. The motion was seconded and passed.

It was then moved that CSA send a written statement giving its support of College Night to Mrs. Pollard. The motion was seconded and passed.

C. From the Floor--There was no old business from the floor.

VIII. New Business

A. Blood Drive

Steve Sheppard reported that the Vets Club has asked that CSA give its support to the annual blood drive. It was moved and seconded that CSA go on record as being in favor of and co-sponsoring the Vets Club Blood Drive. The motion passed unanimously.

B. Change to ICC Code

Rich Brantingham reported that the ICC has passed the motion to amend the ICC code. Copies of the proposed amendment were available to all CSA members. It was moved and seconded that CSA approve the ICC Constitution change. The motion passed.

C. Rep Tables in Coop

Carl Rockey reported on this idea from the Idea Corner. He suggested that tables be set up in the Coop at specific times where freshmen and sophomore representatives would be available to the students. They could be approached for explanations, gripes, or opinions. It was moved and seconded that a Rep's table be set up in the Coop.

It was then moved and seconded to amend the motion such that a Rep table would be set up in the Coop on Mondays from 9:00 to 3:00 for the representatives to sit at on a rotating basis. The amendment to the motion passed. The main motion then passed.

D. From the Floor

Bob Marmor suggested that a glass case for the purpose of displaying activities, art work, department material, tour displays, and so on, be installed in the Coop.

It was moved that the CSA recommend to the Doyle Student Center Commission that they investigate the possibility of getting a glass case to be installed in the Coop for the purpose of displays. The motion was seconded and passed.

It was then moved that CSA go on record as supporting and initiating a flea market so that students could sell their belongings. It was moved and seconded to postpone this motion until next meeting. The motion passed. The item will appear on next week's agenda.

Bob Marmor said that he has been approached by students desiring that legal advise be made available to SRJC students to offer help such as draft counselling.

It was moved and seconded that a committee be established to investigate the possibility of obtaining a lawyer next year to counsel students. The motion passed.

The committee will consist of Bob Marmor, chairman; Steve Sheppard, Paul Weyhe, Connie Chudwick, Larry Gibson, Brad Knickerbocker, Carlene Lanus, Diane Dennis, and Fran Blaylock.

It was then moved and seconded that CSA take \$40 from Misc. Funds to sponsor the debate event of the Debate Tournament to be held March 7 and 8. The money would purchase three plaques, all of which would have CSA's name on it. The motion passed. Dennis will make the presentation of the awards.

IX. Announcements

Karen Sabelman and Larry Gibson announced that they will attend the Board of Trustees meeting tonight. They will give a report later.

X. Adjournment--After a motion and seconds, the meeting adjourned at 4:41.

I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 12:15 by President Dennis VanderWerff.

II. Roll Call

Meeting #5

I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 3:10 by President Dennis VanderWerff.

II. Flag Salute

The flag salute was led by Sophomore Representative Karen Sabelman.

III. Roll Call

Charles Porter, Dick Harkness, and Mike Fama were absent. Fran Blaylock was excused.

IV. Approval of Agenda

The agenda was approved as written.

V. Approval of the Minutes

The minutes were approved as written.

VI. Reports

President--Dennis VanderWerff read a letter from Dr. Newman in which he informed Dennis that the Superintendent of buildings and grounds has been instructed to arrange for the replacement of the flags on the campus with new ones. Dr. Newman also stated that "The interest of the College Student Assembly in all matters pertaining to the condition and operation of the campus is welcomed, and comments, suggestions, and recommendations are invited as in the existing instance."

Dennis then read the following resolution:

"WHEREAS: On Tuesday evening, March 11, 1969, the Academic Senate is sponsoring the presentation of a colloquium on Higher Education in Burbank Auditorium, and

WHEREAS: Dr. Glenn Dumke is scheduled to appear as a participant in that colloquium, and

WHEREAS: Certain on-campus and off-campus groups have indicated their position in opposition to Dr. Dumke, and

WHEREAS: The College Student Assembly believes in the right of free speech for everyone,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That the college Student Assembly go on record as reaffirming its belief in the rights of peaceful demonstration and dissent by any individual or group; but that it also reaffirms the right of the college to invite Dr. Dumke to speak; that it reaffirms Dr. Dumke's right to appear and to speak without interruption; and that it reaffirms the right of any individual to attend the presentation without fear of being intimidated."

It was moved and seconded that this resolution be approved. The motion passed unanimously.

Executive Vice President--Steve Shepard announced that he had attended the Curriculum Instruction Committee meeting. The members agreed that students should be allowed to decide if a class would be for credit or not within nine weeks after the class begins. This will probably be initiated next semester.

Vice President--Richard Brantingham, on behalf of the Debate Tournament, thanked CSA for sponsoring the debate events in the tournament. He said that Ruth Olivar and Bonnie Coates from SRJC won trophies in the oratory portion of the tournament.

Also, Rich was at the Doyle Student Center Commission meeting last Wednesday, and a resolution was considered about a book store reinvestigation. A sub-committee was organized concerning this problem. Rich Brantingham, Carl Rockey, Mr. Anderson, and Dr. Dougan will serve on this committee.

Corresponding Secretary--Kathy Chandler announced that she has received the minutes from Ohlone and Diablo Valley Colleges.

Kathy also attended the meeting concerned with the convocation. The theme is "Educational Opportunities for Underdeveloped People," and is tentatively scheduled for March 21 and 22.

Concerning the college name, Kathy has sent letters to the presidents of the junior colleges to find out if their college names have been changed and, if so, what they have been changed to. The survey that Barry Wadman is planning will probably be started in two weeks.

Finance Commissioner--Bob Marmor explained the February Budget. He also announced that the committee concerned with obtaining a lawyer would meet after the CSA meeting.

Sophomore Rep--Karen Sabelman reported that she attended the Rotary Luncheon. The speaker was Dr. Brown, AFT representative from Sonoma State, who spoke of the situation at San Francisco State and other colleges.

She also attended the Board of Trustees meeting. Teachers' salaries were discussed, and several teachers were approved for next semester.

Freshman Rep--Kathi Humes reported that she went to the College Night Committee meeting recently. One of the ideas presented was that students from CSA could go back to the high schools and promote College Night. Several members of CSA were interested.

AWS Rep--Connie Chudwick reported that the AWS fashion show is scheduled for April 19, and that Joseph Magnin has offered some clothing for it. She announced that AWS would like to set up fruit stands and sell fruit Monday through Friday, March 24-28. It was moved and seconded that CSA approve the AWS money-making request. The motion passed.

Athletics Commissioner--Jeff Hess reported that the George Duke Trio recently performed here, and the program was very successful.

Dance Commissioner--Gary Sloan said that he went to Sonoma State College and notified the students there about the Coop dance. He also thanked all those who helped him make the poster.

It was moved and seconded that CSA go on record as letting Sonoma State students into this Coop dance, March 14, on a trial basis, paying the same price as SRJC card holders. The motion passed.

Elections Commissioner--Larry Gibson suggested that Kent Hall and SBC donate money to help buy the punch for College Night.

ICC Rep--Brad Knickerbocker reported that ICC gave Rich Brantingham a standing ovation for his work at the CCICCA conference. He also said that the Young Democrats go on record as opposing the proposed demonstration. The club elected Kathi Humes as their candidate for Bear Fair queen.

Student Activities Advisor--Mr. Canevari announced that the girls' CSA blazers, with the exception of size 16, are available now.

VII. Old Business

A. Flea Mart--It was moved and seconded to postpone Item A under Old Business indefinitely. The motion passed.

B. From the Floor--There was no old business from the floor.

VIII. New Business

A. Ushers and Pages--Mr. Canevari said that ushers and pages are needed for the colloquium to be held Tuesday night. The Executive Cabinet passed the motion that Executive Cabinet and CSA members act as pages and ushers. Steve Sheppard, Kathy Chandler, Kathy Smith, Dennis VanderWerff, Don Lindberg, Sandee Hay, Chris Zeek, Joanne Noble, and Diane Graveman will do this.

B. Bulletin Board--Bob Marmor proposed that a bulletin board be put up in the Coop with a section for student government announcements, other announcements, and student use. It was moved and seconded that CSA take \$65 out of the juke box budget to be used for a bulletin board in the coop. The motion passed. The members from CSA who are in the Doyle Student Center Commission approved of Bob's obtaining the bulletin board without having the issue go through the commission.

It was moved that a committee be set up to see if an amendment is necessary to the Publicity Code. The motion died for the lack of a second. The publicity committee will meet by next Monday and review the Code to determine if an amendment is in order.

C. From the Floor--Carl announced that a Rep's table will be set up in the Coop as soon as possible.

Bob Marmor said that First Leaves requests financial aid and has asked for \$200. It was moved that \$200 be taken out of Student Cards for the use of the First Leaves. The motion was seconded and passed.

This semester, 400 copies will be produced and will be available to students for free. Finances for scholarships were also discussed.

Gary Sloan reported that several students feel there are too many JC police at the dances. Mr. Canevari then explained why it was necessary.

IX. Announcements--There were none.

X. Adjournment--The meeting was adjourned at 4:23.

The meeting was called to order at 12:13 by President Dennis VanderWerff.

V. Reports

President--Dennis VanderWerff reported he was given the minutes from the March 5 Academic Senate meeting. The faculty has passed a resolution stating that they feel Homecoming is a public relations function of the school and, therefore, the Administrative staff, Associated Students, and Alumni Association should participate in organizing the event, and that the faculty should be guests.

Vice President--Rich Brantingham attended the Board of Trustees meeting.

It was passed there that club sponsorship of assembly programs be under the direction of three faculty members and three ICC members. This will be effective immediately. Rich also reported that Dr. Newman invited the College Student Assembly to bring any issues or reports to the Board of Trustees.

Corresponding Secretary--Kathy Chandler received a letter from the president of Fullerton Junior College, who wrote that there are no plans on changing the college's name. This letter will be read at the CSA meeting.

Sophomore Representative--Karen Sabelman reported that she went to the Board of Trustees meeting Monday night and has the agenda if anyone wants to see it. Federal aid, Artrium, and college districts were discussed at that meeting.

VI. Old Business

A. Colloquium--Action/Reaction--Dennis stated that he felt the Associated Students were treated poorly throughout this issue, since no one asked what the Associated Students were doing about it. In the press, the Sonoma State College Student Body President's views were presented, but the student body president of SRJC was not mentioned. Dennis said that it should be made quite clear that there are channels for

finding out what is going on; and there are more people at SRJC than Current Affairs students. Not one word was said about the resolution passed by CSA members concerning the colloquium.

It was moved that, together with Dennis VanderWerff, Steve Sheppard, Kathy Smith, and Rich Brantingham, an opinion of the statements of the colloquium be given to the public relations office and the Press Democrat for publication.

It was then moved and seconded to amend the motion to include all members of the Executive Cabinet. The amendment to the motion passed.

The main motion was seconded and passed as amended.

It was then moved and seconded to postpone the rest of the items on the agenda until next week. The motion passed.

IX. Adjournment

After a motion and seconds, the meeting adjourned at 1:00.



Meeting #6

I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 3:11 by President Dennis VanderWerff.

II. Flag Salute

The flag salute was led by Parliamentarian Chris Zeek.

III. Roll Call

Gary Sloan, Paul Weyhe, Sandee Hay, and Mike Fama were absent.
Carl Rockey was excused.

IV. Approval of Agenda

The Agenda was approved as written.

V. Approval of the Minutes

The minutes were corrected to read, "The Young Republicans go on record as opposing the proposed demonstration," instead of the Young Democrats. The minutes were then approved as corrected.

VI. Reports

President--Dennis VanderWerff announced that there will be a meeting of all area 7 delegates immediately following the CSA meeting.

Executive Vice President--Steve Sheppard reported that he has been attending the Curriculum and Instruction Committee meetings and the Ethnic Studies Committee meetings.

Recording Secretary--Kathy Smith announced that copies of CSA minutes are available for those who have been absent.

Corresponding Secretary--Kathy Chandler has written to several colleges, asking if they plan to change their college name. Fullerton Junior College does not plan to in order to avoid pretending to be a four-year college. She has also received a letter from Dr. Brossman; however, no suggestions were made.

Finance Commissioner--Bob Marmor reported that there was a profit of \$217.26 on the last Coop Dance. Gary Sloan, Dance Commissioner, was commended for doing such a fine job.

It was moved that CSA allow the Finance Commissioner and Student Activities Advisor to use their discretion in allowing the Athletic Department to go over their budget on individual items as long as their total expenses stay within the budget. The motion was seconded and passed.

Sophomore Representative--Karen Sabelman reported on the Board of Trustees meeting. The Sonoma Testing Corporation has reported that the foundation tests on Geary and Pioneer Halls were completed. Although the foundations are adequate, the buildings will probably be remodeled. Further tests will soon be made.

Also at the Board of Trustees meeting the reasons for the cancellation of the Colloquium were given. It was announced that a new rock collection is on display in the SRJC museum. The JC conference on the educationally disadvantaged will be discussed on March 21 and 22.

For instance, a beard-growing contest would be a good idea. Another suggestion was that the library stay open later on nights and perhaps be open on weekends.

Freshman Representative--Kathi Humes met with Mrs. Pollard concerning College Night. The high schools would like SRJC students to address the high school students, informing them about the College Night activities. Kathi announced that there will be a meeting Friday at 3:00 for all interested students. This will be moved to an agenda item next week.

AWS Representative--Connie Chudwick said that last week AWS had received permission to set up a fruit stand but found out that not much of a profit could be made. It was moved and seconded that AWS be allowed to sponsor a cake sale. The motion passed.

ICC Representative--Brad KnickerBocker announced that there is a new club on campus, the AeroCubs, with a membership of 65.

Hyde Park/Open Forum Commissioner--Don Lindberg reported that the sub-committee on the traffic problem had met but could come up with no solutions that would result in the removal of the barriers. Don and Carl Hockey are considering starting injunctive proceedings against the city, since the barriers were put up without public notice.

Mid-Day Series Representative--Dick Harkness announced the Mid-Week Movie. Also, he said that the change in the dance policy which allowed Sonoma State students to pay the same price for admission as SRJC students worked out well and should be adopted in the future.

Student Activities Advisor--Mr. Canevari said that both the Publicity and Dance Commissioners worked very hard on the last Coop dance. Although the attendance was not larger, a profit was made from the increase in admittance price.

He then announced that attendance in CSA is becoming a problem. When a person has missed three CSA meetings, the Recording Secretary will move that he be dismissed permanently from the Assembly. At that

point, the person may plead his case and, if CSA so desires, they may vote the motion down. If he is absent when the motion is made, he may plead his case at the following meeting.

VII. Old Business

A. Colloquium--It was moved and seconded that the College Student Assembly of SRJC endorse any action on the part of the Academic Senate which would bring about a new colloquium, giving equal representation of all views. The motion passed.

Subject: INVESTIGATION OF WAYS AND MEANS OF FINANCING THE CONSTRUCTION OF
A NEW BOOKSTORE

Before identifying ways and means of financing the construction of a new bookstore, the following guidelines have been established:

1. The only income producing source available to finance such a project rests with the revenue generated by the bookstore.
2. Estimated potential revenue to be generated by the bookstore in the years ahead.
3. The effect the revenue already pledged to meet the obligation resulting from the construction of the Doyle Center (1964-65) will have upon the ability of the bookstore to support the construction of a new bookstore.
4. Projected unpledged bookstore revenue, 1970-71, and thereafter.
5. Identification of sources of financing available to construct a new bookstore.
6. The estimated cost of redeeming \$200,000.00 in revenue bonds plus interest over a period of 15 to 20 years.
7. Conclusions.

#

1. INCOME PRODUCING SOURCE: All costs related to the construction of a new bookstore must be supported from uncommitted bookstore revenue.

2. PROJECTED BOOKSTORE REVENUE: The bookstore has been an operation which has generated annual profits in varying amounts over the years. For example, during the past four years the following profits have been applied toward the redemption schedule of authorized Santa Rosa Junior College Revenue Bonds of 1963, plus the repayment of appropriate interest earned on outstanding bonds at the rate of 3-1/2%, as well as accumulating the stipulated level of reserves (Interest and Redemption Fund, \$44,900.00; Repair and Replacement Reserve Account, \$16,000.00; and Repairs Reserve Account, \$2,500.00).

(a) The first year "net Revenue Method" used to determine income to be made available for the purpose of redeeming issued Revenue Bonds, etc. The "Net Revenue Method" was introduced because it recognizes that a gradual growth in inventory is essential to meet student needs within an expanding campus population.

3. CURRENTLY PLEDGED BOOKSTORE REVENUE: As a result of approval and action of the Associated Students and the Board of Trustees, revenue bonds were sold. These revenue bonds were sold, pursuant to the Junior College Revenue Act of 1961, to provide the major source of funds to (1) expand the Doyle Student Center, and (2) construct the student dormitory (Kent Hall).

The Board of Trustees authorized the sale of \$450,000.00 worth of revenue bonds. These bonds were purchased by a Federal Agency (Housing and Home Finance Agency). Redemption of these bonds began on October 1, 1966, with final redemption scheduled to take place on October 1, 2003. These bonds bear an annual interest rate of 3-1/2% on the outstanding bonds.

The sources of income for repayment of the bonds and interest are the bookstore and Kent Hall. The cafeteria is operated as a non-profit enterprise. The repayment shares are 49.74787% for Kent Hall and 50.25213% for the bookstore as established by the construction cost ratios of the projects for which the bonds were issued. Although income has been and will be in excess of the amount required for bond and interest payments, the excess income has been used to establish required reserves amounting to \$63,400, which should be reached during the 1969-70 year.

The analysis which follows identifies by years the amount of the annual principal and interest payments^(a) to be met from the revenue generated from the operation of Kent Hall and the bookstore. Income from the bookstore in excess of the indicated obligation may be used for other purposes beginning 1970-71.

PROJECTED UNPLEDGED BOOKSTORE REVENUE, 1970-71, AND THEREAFTER: Based upon the profit generating experience of the bookstore over the past several years, coupled with the projected growth in student population in the immediate years ahead, it seems reasonable to assume that bookstore income beyond the level already pledged toward committed revenue bond payments could be in excess of \$15,000.00 a year beginning with the 1970-71 school year. For example, the level of bookstore income could be influenced by not only the number of students enrolled but also the pricing structure policy of the future; i.e., mark-up on merchandise sold.

5. IDENTIFICATION OF SOURCES OF FINANCING: There are several basic sources of financing available to provide the funds required to construct a new bookstore.

A. Revenue Bonds

(1) Federal Application: The district would seek approval of an application for Federal funding (Government Loan) through the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

As a result of a recent telephone conversation with a representative of the San Francisco office of the Department of Housing and Urban Development, it has been determined that an application requesting funding for the construction of a bookstore alone stands little or no chance of being approved. On the other hand, Federal funds permitting available applications which normally receive consideration for approval are those proposing to construct Student Union Facilities (office space, lounge areas, newspaper publication facilities, etc.) and Student Housing.

It was stated during our telephone conversation that "bond counsels have looked with displeasure upon bookstore applications per se." This may be the result of legal interpretations placed upon the authorization contained in Education Code Section 25545.01, which states, "...the Governing Board may issue revenue bonds to construct such projects as dormitories, student unions, or activity facilities."

(2) Local Initiative: The Board of Trustees, after approving the bookstore project would authorize the issuance of revenue bonds not to exceed a stipulated amount necessary to cover the estimated cost of constructing and furnishing the proposed project.

The projected unpledged bookstore income would be earmarked to provide the revenue necessary to (1) redeem the maturing new issue of revenue bonds, (2) meet interest payments generated by such outstanding bonds, and (3) accumulate prescribed reserves; i.e., Bond Redemption and Replacement of Equipment.

B. District Reserve Funds

If district funds were available, the district could either build a bookstore or loan the funds to the Associated Students for that purpose. District funds are not presently available or in prospect, so this is not a likely source of financing.

C. Foundation - Corporation

The Board of Trustees may establish a Foundation to handle any or all non-district funds.

The Foundation would make application and seek the status of a non-profit organization.

The Foundation would become incorporated and organized pursuant to the General Non-profit Corporation Law of the State of California. The Corporation would not be organized or operated for "pecuniary gain or profit."

The Board of Directors of the Foundation would operate the foundation independent of the district operation within the framework of the by-laws.

The Articles of Incorporation of the Foundation, in part, would set forth the general purpose and powers of the foundation; for example, ¹the Foundation may:

- a. Purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, use, sell, exchange, assign, convey, lease, or otherwise dispose of and mortgage or otherwise hypothecate or encumber real and personal property.
- b. Borrow money, incur indebtedness, and to secure the repayment of the same by mortgage, pledge, deed of trust, or other hypothecation or property, both real and personal.
- c. Own, manage, finance and/or operate a student bookstore, student dormitories, student food services facilities and/or any type of facility, enterprise, or building used by the students attending the Santa Rosa Junior College (which is operated by said Junior College District).

D. Lease Purchase Arrangement

The firm of Kirchner, Moore & Company, of Ventura, California, (Municipal Tax Exempt Bonds), have taken the position that "apparently any type of building can be leased" by a school district.

The terms of the lease or agreement cannot exceed 40 years.

¹Articles of Incorporation of College of the Redwoods Foundation, filed with Secretary of State, July 8, 1968.

The Board of Trustees may let, at a minimum rental of \$1.00 a year, to any person, firm, or corporation any real property owned by the district upon which a building or buildings may be constructed for school district use.

The lease agreement must be put out to bid.

As of the last session of the Legislature, Education Code Section 15707 was amended to read: "The governing board of a school district shall call and hold an election, pursuant to Section 15708 or 15709, before or after entering a lease or agreement, as the case may be, except that if the lease or agreement does not effect an increase in the applicable maximum tax rate of a junior college district, the election requirements of this section shall not apply.

A representative of Kirchner, Moore & Company has said to his knowledge this method of financing has not been used by a junior college district; however, he did state the company's attorney saw no reason why this method should not be pursued. This certainly would be done to determine if the procedure is applicable to the construction of a bookstore.

E. Practical Sources of Revenue

Of the ones identified in this section, "A through D," there are three sources worthy of consideration after the specifics for the proposed bookstore have been developed.

1. The first avenue available is the sale of revenue bonds by the Board of Trustees.
2. Another source of available financing is through the authority vested with a Foundation. The Foundation would seek out the best financial arrangement which could be developed after contacting the various lending institutions.
3. A third alternative is utilizing the Lease Purchase provisions available to the school district.

7. CONCLUSIONS:

1. After 1970-71, there should be an excess of bookstore-generated income beyond the existing revenue bond commitment so that the construction of a bookstore could be contemplated.
2. There are several sources of financing which are available. The source of financing, which is most advantageous, can best be determined after specifics on the bookstore have been developed.

SRJC Students Get Discounts

A program of discounts for Santa Rosa Junior College student body card holders has been adopted by a number of Santa Rosa businesses as the result of a proposal to them by the Associated Students at the college.

To date, more than a dozen businesses, ranging from restaurants to sports good stores, have agreed to give a discount upon presentation of a current student body card from the school. In most instances, the discount is 10 to 15 per cent.

The program was instituted by the student organization shortly after the first of the year. In return for the discounts, a program of complimentary advertising in the daily college bulletin has been established. This bulletin, *The Bear Facts*, is distributed free on campus each morning and carries notices of events and activities. It is available to all of the some 3400 day-time students at the college.

I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 3:14 by President Dennis VanderWerff.

II. Flag Salute

The flag salute was led by Freshman Representative Diane Graveman.

III. Roll Call

Charles Porter was absent. Jeff Hess, Dick Harkness, and Mike Fama were excused.

IV. Approval of Agenda

The agenda was approved as written.

V. Approval of the Minutes

The minutes were approved as written.

VI. Reports

President--Dennis VanderWerff asked for two volunteers to attend the Woman of the Month meeting next Wednesday. Fran Blaylock and Brad Knickerbocker volunteered.

Dennis then announced that on Wednesday at 3:20 in the Faculty Lounge, he will be speaking to the Faculty Senate. The meeting is open to anyone, and interested students are welcome to attend.

Speaking for the entire SRJC delegation to the Area 7 Conference, Dennis said that everyone had a very good time. Although there were several disappointments at the conference, the delegation got along beautifully.

Dennis then announced that Kathi Humes will be the representative to the Rotary luncheons for the next two weeks.

Executive Vice President--Steve Sheppard reported on the last Curriculum and Instruction Committee meeting. Four new courses were passed; Philosophy 10, Psychology 160, Softball as a P.E. activity, and Social Science 10 (which was not officially accepted but should be next week). The rest of the meeting concerned credit/no-credit courses. This plan is being submitted to the departments for their recommendations and comments.

Steve also commented on the Area 7 Conference. Although he was disappointed with the workshops, he said that the Conference was quite an experience. Reflecting back on it, he was glad that the SRJC delegates kept their position and let their objections be noted.

Vice President--Rich Brantingham reported on the Area 7 Conference. His main impression was that the conference was quite an educational experience which clearly emphasized the changes going on today.

Recording Secretary--Kathy Smith commented on the Area 7 Conference, agreeing that it was a very good experience. She has copies of the resolutions from the Conference available to anyone who wishes to see them.

Corresponding Secretary--Kathy Chandler reported that she has written to eight colleges which are older than SRJC, asking if they had ever been called Junior Colleges. Chaffey College has written back saying that it has never gone by that name. Citrus College has also replied, stating that the word "Junior" was dropped from the name of the college in 1959. The name-of-the-college poll should be in the Press Democrat tonight.

Concerning the Area 7 Conference, Kathy stated that she was displeased with the Student Values Workshop and then told what went on at that meeting.

Finance Commissioner--Bob Marmor reported on the Area 7 Conference also. He said that SRJC delegates dressed conservatively, looked conservative, and so were treated accordingly. He thought that the delegation acted quite commendably, and good legislation went through.

He then introduced Craig Davis, a SRJC student, who addressed the Assembly. Craig said that the College Student Assembly was not representing the students adequately and was not active enough in student affairs. Further, he said that the actions taken by CSA are not known by the greater number of students on campus. He was then told that minutes of the meetings are posted, and that the representatives from CSA are available to speak with anyone in the Coop on Mondays. Also, the Oak Leaf publishes the events taking place at the CSA meetings. Bob Marmor asked that all CSA members consider making a greater effort to represent more students on campus.

Asst. Finance Commissioner--John Ballotti reported on the Campus Problems Workshop at the Area 7 Conference. He felt that there were only two resolutions brought up at the workshop that were directly related to junior colleges, both of which were presented by Bob Marmor. He further stated that the delegates handled themselves as adult individuals.

Sophomore Rep--Fran Blaylock reported that she participated in the Campus Communications Workshop at Area 7. A resolution concerning Hyde Park was presented by SRJC. Fran said that she learned a lot at the conference.

Sophomore Rep--Joanne Noble said that she also attended the Area 7 Conference and was in the Student Values Workshop. Her impression was that several resolutions were quickly passed without much consideration about their content.

Concerning the Fiftieth Anniversary Committee, Joanne announced that they will be sponsoring a panel instead of a colloquium on May 14. Mr. Sherak will probably lead the panel. Three teachers and one student will be speaking on Academic Freedom. The plans of this program will be presented to the students in advance so that changes may be made if the students so desire.

Sophomore Rep---Karen Sabelman said that two people spoke with her at the Rep table in the Coop. One was a very enthusiastic soldier on leave who had attended SRJC a few years ago. He plans to return in the near future. One student suggested that bare feet be allowed on campus.

At the Area 7 Conference, Karen was on the Curriculum Workshop. She felt that resolutions were being passed too quickly. Some of the legislation concerned art exchange between the colleges, counsellors on campus from racial minorities, the favoring of the College Readiness Program, and the abolishment of mandatory physical education attendance.

Freshman Rep---Diane Graveman, who was on the Current Problems Workshop, thought more emphasis was placed on the quantity than quality of the resolutions.

Freshman Rep---Sharon Fowler attended the Rotary Luncheon where speakers from Great Britain made a presentation.

Athletics Commissioner---Jeff Hess, who also went to the Area 7 Conference, said that he enjoyed the trip.

ICC Rep---Brad Knickerbocker went to Area 7 and thought that the general attitude was that everyone was out to have a good time.

Hyde Park/Open Forum Commissioner---Don Lindberg reported that he has met with the county counsel last week regarding the desirability of taking legal action against the city in order that the barriers be removed. This will be discussed further next meeting.

Publicity Commissioner---Steve Cabot went to the conference last weekend concerning the disadvantaged students, and reported that it was very successful. Everyone was interested in the subject at hand. Workshop chairmen were elected, and the topics for the upcoming convocation were discussed.

Head Song Leader---Diane Dennes announced that there will be a track meet here on Friday and a Baseball game Saturday.

Student Activities Advisor---Mr. Canevari said that he was pleased with the representatives that went to the Eureka conference. Among other things, he said that a resolution was passed which permitted the right of peaceful dissent, and yet the SRJC delegation was shouted at when it refused to approve a resolution containing several bills until the delegation had read what these bills stood for. He said that there were some attempts of intimidation. During the conference, a few spoke on the insignificance

of the type of clothing one wears; however, several people criticized the SRJC delegation on their semi-formal attire. He said that this was an educational experience.

Mr. Canevari announced that anyone who has attended the last 7 CSA meetings may purchase a CSA pin in the Student Activities Office for \$1.50.

VII. Old Business

A. Art Purchase Awards--It was moved that the College Student Assembly allocate \$350 from Student Cards to be used in support of the student art awards purchase program. The motion was seconded and passed.

IX. Adjournment

Because of a College Night Committee meeting with Mrs. Pollard, it was moved and seconded that the meeting be adjourned. The meeting adjourned at 4:19.

A free dinner will be given to all contestants on May 20, the night that the winner will be announced. It was moved and seconded to end discussion. The motion passed.

It was moved and seconded that CSA sponsor "Operation: Slippery Thought" and add \$10 "to the pot" as a runner-up prize and enough funds to purchase tapes to record the speeches when they are made. The motion passed unanimously.

VII. Old Business

- A. Graduation Speakers--The Executive Cabinet was approached recently by Mr. Canevari to help make a decision as to what students would be given the honor of being graduation speakers. They nominated Steve Sheppard and Joanne Matuna. Mr. Canevari then read the list of the top ten academic students eligible for graduation this semester, which included Steve and Joanne. It was moved and seconded that CSA accept Steve Sheppard and Joanne Matuna to speak at the graduation ceremony. The motion passed. Steve Sheppard abstained.
- B. Library Committee--A survey has been taken in the library concerning the number of people who use the facilities. Due to the results, Dick Harkness reported, it does not seem encouraging that the library hours be extended. It will be open the weekend prior to finals. Dennis requested the Library Committee to meet and send a report to next CSA's meeting.
- C. Letter to the Academic Senate--Rich Brantingham reported on the Academic Senate's resolution which stated that the faculty would not participate actively in the Homecoming events. Two weeks ago, the Executive Cabinet decided to take action concerning this decision. Rich and Kathy Chandler were to draft a letter to send to the Academic Senate which expresses disapproval of the Senate's resolution. In the last Executive Cabinet meeting, the letter was read and approved by the members, who then agreed to forward it to CSA.

Dennis then read the letter to CSA members. It was moved and seconded that this letter be accepted and sent to the Academic Senate. The motion passed.

D. From the Floor--It was moved and seconded to postpone the traffic problem discussion definitely until next week. The motion passed.

VIII. New Business

A. Student Representative on Department Committees--It was moved and seconded that this item be postponed until next week at which time Jeff Hess will have his information gathered and Steve Sheppard has obtained information from the Curriculum and Instruction Committee.

B. P. E. Pass/Fail Proposal--Mark Schrader, an SRJC student, presented a proposal for a pass/fail system in the physical education department. It was moved and seconded that:

WHEREAS: Gym courses are a state requirement and
WHEREAS: The gym courses are primarily $\frac{1}{2}$ unit credits and
WHEREAS: The grades for gym courses are not important to most peoples grades; except for those who are majoring in that field;
THEREFORE BE IT RECOMMENDED: That the gym course be on a pass/fail system for grading, except for those who are majoring in the field.
THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RECOMMENDED: That this recommendation be sent to all Physical Education instructors, the Academic Senate, the Curriculum and Instruction Committee, and the Administration for action. The motion passed unanimously.

C. From the Floor--Joanne Noble said that additional funds are needed before the Forensics Team can participate in any more events. Mr. Canevari said that anyone can come to CSA with a request for money at any time.

IX. Announcements--This weekend and next weekend the One-Acts will be performed in Room 10 of Pioneer Hall. Students' admission price is 75¢.

X. Adjournment

After a motion and seconds, the meeting was adjourned at 5:05.

I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 12:16 by President Dennis VanderWerff.

II. Roll Call

Karen Sabelman and Diane Graveman were excused. All other members were present.

III. Approval of Agenda

The Agenda was approved as written.

IV. Approval of Minutes

The Minutes were approved as written.

V. Reports

President--Dennis VanderWerff requested that members take particular care to shorten their reports in CSA meetings. He will ask that the other CSA members do the same. Only one report will be necessary for committee meetings.

Vice President--Rich Brantingham reported that the letter has been written to Mr. Cooper with regards to the book store and has been given to him.

It was moved and seconded that the Executive Cabinet accept Rich Brantingham to serve on the Doyle Student Center Commission in the place of Steve Sheppard because of Steve's other commitments. The motion passed.

Student Activities Advisor--Mr. Canevari announced that the Academic Senate has invited CSA to send a representative to their meeting. Kathy Chandler will attend.

VI. Old Business

A. From the Floor--Dennis asked if the Executive Cabinet members, along with students from CSA, would be interested in a luncheon meeting with Dr. Newman. Mr. Canevari suggested that a couple of these be scheduled. The members responded favorably to the luncheon idea, which will probably be held on a Monday or Wednesday at noon.

Rich Brantingham suggested that a list of the officers and their office hours be posted on the front windows or on the bulletin board. Kathy Smith volunteered to type up this list.

Dennis announced that Carl Rockey has officially resigned from his position as Sophomore Representative. A new Representative will be appointed as soon as possible.

VII. New Business

A. Student Government Questionnaire--Concerning the upcoming state conference, a questionnaire has been received from the Associated Students of El Camino College, which is to be answered on the basis of the SRJC delegates' decisions.

The delegates approved: of continuing CJCSCA as is; and that a request be made for money to be contributed for the establishment of a section in the school libraries for radical periodicals.

The delegates disapproved: of splitting the votes within a delegation when the members disagree; of ejecting non-credential student government delegates from the conference; and of issuing immediate actions to identify, expose, and urge expulsion of those students who are found to be advocates of student violence.

The other questions were considered to be non-applicable to the purpose of the conference.

B. Student Directory--Mr. Canevari reported that he has been in contact with a publishing house which specializes in publishing student directories. This company will supply 2,000 copies of a student directory free of charge. In return, a contract would be signed by SRJC to supply them with IBM cards of the students' names, addresses, and phone numbers, which could be used in their selling program. The company will sell local and national advertising in this directory. Because Circle K has traditionally made student directories in the past, Mr. Canevari will talk with the members about releasing this activity to the Associated Students of the college. If Circle K approves, then this item will be brought to next Executive Cabinet meeting for its approval.

C. From the Floor--It was moved and seconded that Executive Cabinet send a letter to all faculty members asking for their cooperation and permission in conducting an objective-type faculty evaluation poll to be distributed to faculty and students, with a further request that they submit to the Executive Cabinet objective questions they would like to have on the evaluation poll. The motion passed.

Merritt College has conducted a similar poll and will be asked for their evaluation as an example. Their response to our poll will also be requested. Rich Brantingham will write the letter to be sent to the faculty.

It was moved and seconded that the Executive Cabinet give Dennis and Rich the prerogative of approving the letters written to the faculty concerning the teacher evaluation poll. The motion passed.

VIII. Announcements

There were no announcements.

IX. Adjournment

After a motion and seconds, the meeting adjourned at 1:04.

Meeting #9

I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to Order at 3:15 by President Dennis VanderWerff.

II. Flag Salute

The flag salute was led by Athletics Commissioner, Jeff Hess.

III. Roll Call

Mike Fama was absent. Joanne Noble, Gary Sloan, and Sandee Hay were excused.

Dennis announced that Charles Porter, Assemblies Commissioner, had accrued three unexcused absences. Charles reported that he was absent because of official business with the community and administrators. It was moved and seconded that CSA reinstate Charles Porter. The motion passed.

IV. Approval of Agenda

The agenda was approved as written.

V. Approval of Minutes

The minutes of April 7, 1969, were corrected to read under the ICC Representative's report, "Americans in Action" instead of "Young Men in Action." The minutes were then approved as corrected.

VI. Reports

President--Dennis VanderWerff requested that the reports in CSA meetings be made as brief as possible.

Executive Vice President--Steve Sheppard reported that the Curriculum and Instruction Committee meeting this Wednesday will be the most important one by far. The Ethnic Program will be presented to the committee. Steve then read the list of ethnic courses which will be available. If approved, these courses will be open to everybody.

Recording Secretary--Kathy Smith announced that the Executive Cabinet minutes were not yet ready but will be placed in the CSA members' mailboxes when they are.

Finance Commissioner--Bob Marmor reported that a profit of \$1.02 was made on the last Coop dance.

Assistant Finance Commissioner--John Ballotti, who recently visited Montgomery High School concerning College Night, said it was suggested to him that SRJC students speak to the seniors in a girl-boy combination and perhaps to a larger group than individual classes.

Sophomore Representative---Karen Sabelman visited Santa Rosa High School and said that the students seemed very enthusiastic about College Night.

She also reported that the Rep table was up all day. There were some constructive suggestions, such as having language labs during noon.

On behalf of the SRJC Band, she thanked all of those who listened to the band's performance on Friday at noon. Mr. Canevari and Dennis were made honorary members of the band.

Freshman Representative---Carlene Lanus reported that she visited Sonoma High School to promote College Night. Buses will be provided for the Sonoma students to attend this event.

AWS Representative---Connie Chudwick announced that the annual fashion show will be held on Saturday, April 19, from 2:00 to 4:00 in the Doyle Student Center. All women students are welcome to come. She also announced that the annual awards banquet will be held April 30 at the Black Forest Inn.

Athletics Commissioner---Jeff Hess reported that on Friday, the P. E. Department passed a resolution favoring a pass/fail system.

He visited Willits and Fort Bragg High Schools and reported that these schools may send a bus to SRJC on College Night.

ICC Representative---Brad Knickerbocker announced that the Vets Club will be having their annual blood drive this Wednesday, and he urged everyone to donate blood. He also reported that ICC has approved to endorse women visitation hours in Kent Hall.

Mid-Day Series Rep---Dick Harkness announced that the Mid-Day Series Committee will have one of its last meetings tomorrow at noon in the faculty lounge.

Publicity Commissioner---Steve Cabot said that a special faculty meeting was held last Friday concerning the convocation. It will be held sometime in May.

Student Activities---Mr. Canevari announced that there is a sign being made for the Rep table. Also, two additional card tables are being ordered. He then urged the CSA members to participate in the blood drive. A letter was then read concerning college night, sent by Petaluma High School, which thanked for the arranging of students going to the high school.

VII. Old Business

A. Library Committee---Dick Harkness reported that the Library Committee had met and decided that the extension of the library hours should be declined because of the lack of use of the library. He suggested that the library hours be announced in the Bear Facts. The library will be open on the weekends prior to finals.

B. Traffic Problem--Don Lindberg asked if efforts should be continued to bring down the barriers on Nodyke and Illinois Streets. It was moved and seconded that a straw vote be taken in the assembly. The motion passed. Twenty-one members voted to continue our action to see that the barriers be taken down, no one opposed, and one abstained.

Don then asked if the assembly wanted the Board of Trustees to take injunctive actions for the removal of the barriers. It was moved and seconded that the College Student Assembly go on record as favoring negotiations with the people that are opposed to having the barriers taken down and, if this does not work out, then taking injunctive action.

It was moved and seconded that the motion be amended so that negotiations are made with the 80 people who are in favor of taking the barriers down. The motion passed. The main motion then passed.

C. Student Representatives on Department Committees--Jeff Hess reported having talked with Mr. Emblen, who is department chairman for the English Department Committee. Concerning student representation, he said that it is working out exceptionally well, and he strongly recommended that we go on record as favoring all departments having the same kind of representation on the department committees.

It was moved that CSA go on record as favoring the establishment of student representatives to attend the meetings of all the departments at SRJC, with full member privileges, and that this recommendation be sent to all the departments and the Board of Trustees. The motion passed.

D. College Night--Mr. Canevari said that there have been enough volunteers who signed up to work College Night, and asked that those who signed up as being "unsure" would contact him as soon as possible. He then said that the people who will be conducting tours are to show up at the Doyle Student Center at 6:00 on Friday. Kathy Chandler and Kathy Smith will be in the Coop with instructions. Those people who signed up to be guides are to report to the Coop at 6:30. This information will be announced in the Bare Facts later in the week.

E. From the Floor--It was moved that CSA request the Doyle Student Center Commission to do all it can to see that students provide all labor in the cafeteria and the bookstore except for those few jobs that students could not possibly fill.

It was then moved to strike the words "do all it can" and instead use "encourage." The amendment was defeated. The main motion then passed.

VIII. New Business

A. Forensics Team--Mr. Perella spoke to the assembly concerning the Forensics team. He said that the team is planning a trip to Susanville a week from Friday for a one-day tournament. He further said that if the Associated Students desire to contribute approximately \$25-\$30

towards this tournament, it would be deeply appreciated. It was moved and seconded that CSA take \$30 out of Student Cards and give it to the Forensics Team to travel to Susanville.

This motion will be postponed until next week.

B. Executive Cabinet Luncheon--Dennis reported that he has scheduled an informal luncheon with Dr. Newman, the Executive Cabinet, and five CSA members on Friday at noon in Conference Room 2. There will also be another luncheon of this nature later on in the semester. Steve Cabot, Fran Blaylock, Brad Knickerbocker, Connie Chudwick, and Larry Gibson will attend the luncheon along with the Exec. Cab. members and Dr. Newman.

C. Business Department Typing Service--Mr. Canevari reported that this item has come from the Idea Corner, and thought it worthy of action. This would be organized by the Business Department and would make typists available to the students.

It was moved that CSA recommend to the Business Department that a typing service be organized whereby typists would be available to the students at a reasonable rate. The motion was seconded and passed.

B. From the Floor--Rich Brantingham announced that last week the possibility of a teacher evaluation poll was considered. A rough draft letter has been written asking the faculty for their suggestions and for having a teacher evaluation poll.



I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 12:16 by President Dennis VanderWerff.

II. Roll Call

Steve Sheppard was excused. All other members were present.

III. Approval of Agenda

The agenda was approved as written.

IV. Approval of Minutes

The minutes were approved as written.

V. Reports

President--Dennis VanderWerff read a letter from Richard Serpe which concerned the state conference. There has been some controversy about a walk-out on the state conference; however, only one of the Area conferences ended in a walk-out, because of the lack of a quorum. The committee concerned with the problems of the conference has decided that any groups wishing to speak to the delegates at the conference will have the right to do so.

Dennis has also received a letter from Modesto Junior College, which says that the college has reliable information that the conference will be cancelled before it begins, or else a walk-out will be staged.

He then announced that there will be a Doyle Student Center Commission meeting this afternoon. Kathi Humes cannot attend and so Kathy Chandler will go in her place.

Carl Rockey has resigned, and Dennis has asked Mark Schrader to take Carl's place. It was moved and seconded to approve Mark Schrader as Sophomore Representative. The motion passed.

Vice President--Richard Brantingham stated that ICC has agreed to assume the responsibility in acquiring women's visitation hours in Kent Hall. However, a resolution recently passed by the Kent Hall Association presented an attitude which may result in Kent Hall residents getting less than what they already had.

Sophomore Representative--Karen Sabelman stated that she attended the Board of Trustees meeting on Monday night. She will make a report on the meeting in CSA.

Student Activities Advisor--Mr. Canevari announced that the committee on the Convocation is meeting for lunch tomorrow to talk about the possibilities of the Convocation. Steve Cabot has been asked to go to this meeting. Kathy Chandler will also attend.

He then announced that the packets of material for the State Conference have arrived and will be distributed at the meeting of the delegates which will be held soon.

VI. Old Business

A. From the Floor--There was no old business from the floor.

VII. New Business

A. From the Floor--Mr. Canevari said that last fall the first annual all-star high school football game was held on Bailey Field for the benefit of the United Cerebral Palsy Fund. The college had no dealing with this event, except for the donation of the football field. However, a check had been drawn to the Associated Students for the rental of the concession area for the amount of \$103.55. It is up to the Associated Students to decide whether this money will go to us or the Cerebral Palsy Fund.

It was moved and seconded that the Executive Cabinet take \$103.55 from the Concessions Budget and donate it to the United Cerebral Palay Fund. The motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Canevari then spoke of the bookstore and student activities facilities. With the increased size of the college, it is apparent that the bookstore is not large enough to serve adequately the enrollment of students. Furthermore, the student activities facilities are currently performing a maximum amount of work. Presently, the district is conducting a study of possible means of financing a new bookstore. The bookstore revenue would be used as a basis for any remodeling of the bookstore or student activities facilities. It was suggested that we propose an agreement with the District, a memo of understanding, that we would commit part or all of the \$14,000 frozen reserve fund toward the initial steps of constructing new facilities. A motion to commit this reserve fund for the use of constructing a new bookstore and student activities facilities will be written up and brought to the Executive Cabinet in the near future.

As mentioned in a previous meeting, the Associated Students have the opportunity of receiving 2,000 student directories which would be printed at no cost to us. Because Circle K traditionally handles this project by selling advertising in the directory and then selling the directories to the students, Mr. Canevari met with the Circle K board members to ask if they would release this project to the Associated Students. However, the Circle K board members decided to acquire the directories in this new manner and then sell them to the students for 10¢ a copy. Several Executive Cabinet members thought it would be wrong for the club to collect money on the free directories. It was suggested that the Associated Students acquire the directories and Circle K distribute them to the students as a service project. Mr. Canevari will speak to the club on Monday and suggest this to the members.

VIII. Announcements

Today is the Vet's Club Blood Drive, and everyone is urged to participate.

IX. Adjournment

After a motion and second, the meeting adjourned at 1:00.

Any Suggestions For New Name for SRJC?

The College Student Assembly at Santa Rosa Junior College is studying the possibility of a name change for the school.

The group feels, that if such a change were to be made, this is the appropriate time during the school's 50th anniversary as a junior college.

Three reasons have prompted the idea of a name change. The system of two-year colleges are now known as "community" colleges, rather than "junior" colleges. Another prompting factor is the changing roll of the two-year schools; at one time they served primarily as a stepping stone for students on their way to higher education. Today the two-year colleges provide numerous occupational programs which train persons to go out into skilled fields in their community.

The third reason is that there are only seven schools in California, out of more than 60 in the state, which still retain the

word, "junior" in their name.

A survey is being conducted by the CSA on the campus to get opinions of students and faculty on the name change. The student group feels that it would like to get a larger sampling of public opinion.

The above coupon, which the public is invited to fill out and mail back to the Associated Students lists several name changes that have been suggested, as well as a space for other possibilities.

The CSA will pass findings to the Board of Trustees.

Meeting #10

I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 3:11 by President Dennis VanderWerff.

II. Flag Salute

The flag salute was led by ICC Representative, Brad Knickerbocker.

III. Roll Call

Gary Sloan was absent. Carlene Lanus, Diane Graveman, Charles Porter, Jeff Hess, and Dick Harkness were excused.

IV. Approval of Agenda

The agenda was approved as written.

V. Approval of Minutes

VI. Reports

President--Dennis VanderWerff thanked all of the members who participated in College Night and said that the program went perfectly. He then gave special thanks to Kathi Humes for her organization of the high school visitations.

Vice President--Richard Brantingham reported that the Doyle Student Center Commission met on Wednesday and discussed part of Mr. Cooper's reply concerning the book store questionnaire. Anyone interested in learning more about the discussion is welcome to talk with Rich. The latter portion of the reply will be discussed at the next meeting.

Rich then announced that he, along with members of the Administration, will be talking to the Kent Hall residents tonight about women's visitation hours.

Corresponding Secretary--Kathy Chandler announced that the minutes from Contra Costa, College of the Redwoods, and Solano have been received. She then read a letter from Solano which thanked her for sending the CSA minutes.

A college name survey will be held this Wednesday from 10:00 to 11:00 in about 14 classes, consisting of approximately 350 students.

Finance Commissioner--Bob Marmor corrected the last report on the Coop dance profit, stating that \$100 was made on the dance instead of \$102.

Asst. Finance Commissioner--John Ballotti reported that on College Night, he led tours around the campus. The parents who visited SRJC seemed very interested.

Sophomore Representative--Fran Blaylock reported that she received several suggestions at the Rep Table. One suggestion was that the Book Store be open before 8:00 a.m. for students who have early morning classes.

Sophomore Representative--Karen Sabelman also talked with students at the Rep Table. One student showed disapproval of the broad wording in the Student Code. She also attended the Board of Trustees meeting and has the minutes for anyone wishing to see them. At this meeting, it was announced that Geary and Pioneer Halls will not be used after June 15. A new policy statement has been made which concerns the distribution of information on campus. All literature must be identified with some club or individual when it is distributed.

Freshman Representative--Kathy Humes attended Rotary luncheon and listened to a lecture about a new center which will teach occupational skills to people who are not qualified for jobs. She then thanked everyone who went to College Night and visited the high schools.

AWS Representative--Connie Chudwick announced that the AWS fashion show was a success. She also said that College Night went really well.

Elections Commissioner--Larry Gibson said that he will help Steve Cabot with the upcoming Convocation. He announced that he will meet with Rich and Administrators at the Kent Hall meeting tonight.

ICC Representative--Brad Knickerbocker also worked at College Night. He apologized for not attending the luncheon on Friday with Dr. Newman and the members from CSA.

Oak Leaf Representative--Linda Marden announced that at next week's meeting she will bring up the topic of additional funds for the Oak Leaf. Presently, Linda reported, there are not enough Oak Leafs for the students who want them.

Publicity Commissioner--Steve Cabot went to the Convocation meeting with Larry Gibson and Kathy Chandler. The convocation will be held some time in May. Guests are also invited.

SUBJECTS OF RESOLUTIONS PASSED AT CJCSGA SPRING CONFERENCE

1. implement social science classes related to minority groups, and taught by minority teachers.
2. better communications with Junior Colleges and State Colleges in order to:
 - a) establish a curriculum acceptable at both levels of education
 - b) active recruitment of transfer students from lower to upper division institutions
3. voluntary art exchange program between Junior Colleges.
4. send two representatives from each area to meet with the new Board of Governors of The California Community Colleges in order to draft a new Education Code pertaining to Junior Colleges.
5. CJCSGA accept responsibility for getting legislation to require the State of Calif. to provide medical services and facilities for community colleges comparable to those provided for Calif. universities and/or state colleges, or access to the same for community college students - we will get help in forming the legislation from the Board of Directors of CJCA.
6. CJCSGA request our Executive Secretary to send a monthly agenda and report to all member CJCSGA colleges.
7. we pressure the Executive Secretary to pursue passage of appropriate legislation to increase state appropriations such that student wages paid under the work study program can be raised to Federal Minimum Wage level.
8. faculty, students, and administrators of all Community Colleges work together to recruit and aid economically, and tutorially a significant number of disadvantaged students in an attempt to equalize the educational levels of disadvantaged students in Calif.
9. when and if the State College System converts to the quarter system, the Junior College system should also convert.
10. send to all Calif. Colleges and the State Legislature a recommendation for installation of a statewide unification of a numerical coding system of courses to allow for the transfer of completed Community College units in a field of study to State Colleges or Universities.
11. recommend the Calif. State Educational Code be amended to allow colleges to hold classes on Sat. that are not offered during its Mon. thru Fri. schedule.
12. lower the voting age to 18.

13. communication center to relay information pertinent to student activities and problems to each member college, and it will be constructed so that each separate college secure funds for the operation of communication center to supply needed materials for publication and distribution.
14. that 6 units of ethnic studies, on an elective basis, be completed by all the students beginning the fall of 1970 on all campuses where programs are offered.
15. direct voting privileges and membership for a student elected by the student body, on Board of Trustees, in each Community College District.
16. colleges re-evaluate their budgets in regard to the allotment of funds to athletics and the priorities there and re-channeling of priorities to academics be made.
17. draft counseling services established on college campuses.
18. groups and individuals hold non-violent demonstrations or acts of protest which are outlined as legal by Calif. State Legislature and by the Federal Judiciary.

V. Reports

President--Dennis VanderWerff has received about four letters from Mrs. Pollard thanking for the fine job done on College Night. These will be xeroxed.

A letter from Mr. Sherak in response to the resolution passed in the Academic Senate was then read. He invited two representatives from CSA to serve on an Ad-hoc Campus Structure Study Committee to define the power structure and delineation of authority on campus. The meeting will be held at noon on Thursday, May 1, in Conference Room 2.

Dennis then reported that he has 26 petitions in his office for the initiative measure in lowering the voting age to 18. He has written a letter to the Citizens Committee for Lowering the Voting Age, asking who their officers and Board of Directors are. After receiving a reply these will be passed out by persons over 21 years of age.

An article from the April 19 Chronicle concerning filling the Bay was brought to the attention of the members. Dennis said that there has been a request for a response to this issue, to be mailed to the state senators. It was moved and seconded that a letter be written to the six senators expressing our opposition to Bay-Fill. The motion passed unanimously. Dennis will be writing this letter soon.

Vice President--Rich Brantingham announced that he and a few others are writing letters to the members of the Board of Trustees with regards to Kent Hall residents' requests for women's visitation hours. This will be taken up at the next meeting.

Letters have been given to faculty members about whether or not they are in favor of having a teacher evaluation poll.

Student Activities Advisor--Mr. Canevari had no report.

VI. Old Business

A. From the Floor--Concerning the student directories, Mr. Canevari stated that he believes Circle K will relinquish the publishing responsibilities of the Thetan. The Circle K members would like very much to be involved in the distribution of the directories as a service project. There will be no expense to the college or the Associated Students. The college will be signing the contract for this project.

It was moved and seconded that Executive Cabinet approve of this method of obtaining student directories. The motion passed. This will have to be cleared first with the County Council.

The survey on the name of the college is about finished, and a complete report will be ready for CSA mondy so that further action can be taken. It will be sent to the Board of Trustees meeting. Dennis will be writing this report based upon the information received concerning the name change. From the results of the polls taken on campus and in the Press Democrat, the "No Change" vote is leading. The opinions of some of the Executive Cabinet members were then presented.

VII. New Business--From the Floor

Assembly Bill #917 was then explained and discussed. This bill deals with mandatory student bodys and is being presented to the state legislature. Since the wording of the bill is unclear to the Executive Cabinet members, a letter will be written to the initiator of this bill, asking for a clearer explanation. After a reply has been received, the members will decide whether to support it or not. Dennis will write this letter. As it now stands, the student body cards are mandatory at SRJC.

VIII. Announcements

Bob Marmor announced that there will be a Coop dance on May 9 from 9:00 to 1:00, being sponsored by BSU, MASC, and YD. "It should be a whole new dimension in entertainment!!" --Marmor.



Any Suggestions For New Name for SRJC?

The College Student Assembly at Santa Rosa Junior College is studying the possibility of a name change for the school.

The group feels, that if such a change were to be made, this is the appropriate time during the school's 50th anniversary as a junior college.

Three reasons have prompted the idea of a name change. The system of two-year colleges are now known as "community" colleges, rather than "junior" colleges. Another prompting factor is the changing roll of the two-year schools; at one time they served primarily as a stepping stone for students on their way to higher education. Today the two-year colleges provide numerous occupational programs which train persons to go out into skilled fields in their community.

The third reason is that there are only seven schools in California, out of more than 60 in the state, which still retain the

word, "junior" in their name. A survey is being conducted by the CSA on the campus to get opinions of students and faculty on the name change. The student group feels that it would like to get a larger sampling of public opinion.


The above coupon, which the public is invited to fill out and mail back to the Associated Students lists several name changes that have been suggested, as well as a space for other possibilities.

I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 3:15 by President Dennis VanderWerff.

II. Flag Salute

The flag salute was led by Head Yell Leader, Mike Fama.

III. Roll Call

Jeff Hess and Gary Sloan were absent. Joanne Noble, Sharon Fowler, Carlene Lanus, and Don Lindberg were excused.

IV. Approval of Agenda

The agenda was approved as written.

V. Approval of the Minutes

The minutes were approved as written.

VI. Reports

President--Dennis VanderWerff announced that he has 26 petitions from the committee to lower the voting age that he is planning to circulate as soon as he finds out who has drawn up this petition. The idea behind it is to lower the voting age to 18. This measure is simply to get this item on the ballot. If the committee presents the names of the people who have drawn up this petition, then it will be passed out to the adult members of the community who are registered voters. Dennis said that he will be needing a group of students who will go to the County Clerk's office and verify the precinct numbers.

Executive Vice President--Steve Sheppard said that at the Curriculum and Instruction Committee meeting some of the ethnic studies classes and others were discussed. Twenty-two new classes were considered and will be voted on at next Wednesday's meeting. All interested students can go to this meeting.

Vice President--Richard Brantingham said that he had explained the teacher evaluation poll and that letters were sent out to all faculty members. So far, all replies are affirmative, and work will be started on this poll shortly.

Concerning Kent Hall, Rich announced that he and Mr. Smythe are working on the residents' request for women's visitation rights. A letter to this effect will be sent to the Board of Trustees meeting, encouraging that this issue be considered.

The Doyle Student Center Commission will meet this Wednesday again to discuss the latter portion of Mr. Cooper's reply to the bookstore questionnaire.

Corresponding Secretary--Kathy Chandler announced that she has received the minutes from Solano College. Concerning the name of the college survey, she reported that 14 teachers were given the survey sheets, but only half returned them to her. The results are as follows:

Sophomore Representative--Fran Blaylock reported that she attended to Woman-of-the-Month meeting. Yvonne LaClaire was selected for April, Linda Postal for May, and Ruth Olivari for June.

At the Rep table, Fran received several complaints about the bookstore.

Sophomore Representative--Karen Sabelman said that there is still no sign for the Rep table, and a new card table is needed. Some complaints concerned the false publicity for Dr. William Nighswonger's lecture on Friday, which didn't pertain to its title. She also received a three-page report from a student who made several comments and suggestions, such as blue-collar work should be taught in classes. Anyone wanting to read these comments may obtain the report from Karen.

Freshmen Representative--Kathi Humes attended Rotary luncheon, where a speaker lectured on the Educational Opportunities Act and how well it is doing in Santa Rosa.

AWS Representative--Connie Chudwick announced that the spring retreat for high school seniors will be held on May 10 at Morton's. Four speakers from the faculty will also attend. The purpose of the retreat is to get prospective women students interested in AWS and other clubs on campus. Anyone interested in helping is to see Connie.

The Spring Formal will be a tournabout dance entitled "Love is Blue." It will be held May 17 from 9:00 to 12:00 at the Saturday Afternoon Clubhouse. The bids are set at \$4.00 a couple.

Elections Commissioner--Larry Gibson said that Mr. Power is putting the Kent Hall request on the next Board of Trustees' agenda.

ICC Representative--Brad Knickerbocker also attended the Woman-of-the-Month meeting. He reported that ICC is considering having a banquet.

Oak Leaf Representative--Concerning the shortage of Oak Leaflets, Linda Marden has talked with Mr. Canevari about additional funds. The Oak Leaf staff will talk to the district about more funds for additional copies.

Student Activities Advisor--Mr. Canevari announced that on Wednesday the petitions for Associated Students Officers will be available, and he encouraged the CSA members to find freshmen who would be interested in running for office next fall.

He then said that there is a petition going around concerning the Friday noon concerts on the outdoor stage. Apparently, a rock band has not gotten to play there and wants the opportunity. The general idea behind these concerts is that on Fridays, when there are no other activities scheduled, bands are hired to play music on the outdoor stage. Before a group is given permission to play, Mr. Canevari tries to get the approval of Charles Porter, Assemblies Commissioner. Open Forum and Mid-Day Series events have priority over the bands. There are no more available Fridays for this sort of entertainment. Bands have been playing on a first come, first serve basis.

John Ballotti volunteered to attend the Rotary Luncheon next Wednesday.

VII. Old Business

A. CJCSGA Delegates' Report--Concerning the recent state conference, Bob Marmor reported that there were several small groups within it and were conflicting with each other. The chairman, however, was very good. Bob considered it a learning experience, although he was unsure of how much the delegates actually accomplished.

It was moved and seconded to suspend the rules of the day. The motion passed. Charles Porter, along with other students, has met with several administrators inquiring why there was no student representation when the Student Code was formed. He was asked to come to the CSA meeting and get consent that a hold be put on the Code before the final approval until some student representations revise and then approve of it.

It was moved and seconded that CSA go on record as appointing a committee to work with the deans in revising the Student Conduct Code that is now before the Board of Trustees. The motion passed.

Charles stated that the Code of Conduct is not spelled out very well in the Student Handbook. The Student Affairs Committee discussed this problem, but was unable to come up with a solution. Dennis said that three students will serve as representatives in forming the revised Code of Conduct. Before serving on this committee, interested students must speak with Dennis.

Continuing the discussion about the conference, Kathy Chandler thought it was very good. Contrary to the last State Conference, the delegates were studying the Association as it is now and considering ways that it could be a more effective body. In her workshop, they talked about the role that the advisors play in setting up the conference.

Rich Brantingham stated that the conference was considerably unlike the last one he attended. He considered the conference interesting

to the point that he could find out the ideas of people throughout the state. He said that it is valueable to talk to individual members from other Junior Colleges. He was pleased to see that there was little disorder in the workshop he attended, which was concerned with campus communication.

Steve Sheppard suggested that in the future, the SRJC delegates should decide what they want to accomplish before going to the conference. He said that if the delegates wanted to hear others' ideas and get greater communications between the colleges, then it was a worthwhile trip. Not much was done in the workshop he attended.

Dennis VanderWerff said that he has been considering for some time the worth of the CJCSCA. His opinion is that this Association is only a major source of frustration and serves no benefit to the college. As a whole, he believes that SRJC is one of the most superior of the Junior Colleges in the state of California. He said that this college does not have the problems that many of the others face. As an alternative to CJCSCA, Dennis thought that it would be better advised to spend the \$700 on some sort of a retreat or convocation of this sort that would involve SRJC only. Its purpose would be to better Santa Rosa Junior College. He further stated that the Association itself is not equiped to handle the demands that the students today are placing on it. These demands concerned mostly the social and cultural problems which require direct and profound pressure on the state legislature.

B. From the Floor--There was no old business from the floor.

VIII. New Business

A. Bookstore Study Resolution--The College Student Assembly passed a motion asking that the president instruct the Dean of Business Services to carry on investigating the possibility of constructing a new bookstore. Mr. Majora came up with a complete investigation, and there are several possiblities for the financing of a bookstore. All of the financing for a projcct of this kind rests on the profit-making potention of the bookstore. Shortly the bookstore profits will be through paying off a loan which was used in the construction of the majority of the cafeteria, Student Activities Office, faculty lounge, and the guarantee of financing Kent Hall. Additional income will then be free for another project. The first step of constructing a new bookstore would be to hire an architect to draw up the proposed plans and present an estimated cost. Someone would have to initiate the project before this can be done. The Associated Students have a citizen reserve fund of \$14,000. It was suggested that the \$14,000 be committed in a joint action with the district in hiring an architect, toward building a new bookstore, and building or remodeling enlarged Student Activities facilities.

It was moved and seconded that CSA, in joint action with the Board of Trustees, commit the use of the Reserve fund of the Associated Students to the hiring of an architect to develop plans for a new or enlarged bookstore ~~_____~~ facilities, and enlarged Student

Activities facilities. If, during the development of the project it is deemed impossible to include the enlarged Student Activities facilities, the Associated Students would expect that any funds used out of the Reserve fund would be re-imbursed out of the Bookstore revenues. The motion passed.

B. From the Floor--On Friday, Shlomo Carlebach, a Hassidic soul-master entertained students on the front lawn of the college. The college is paying \$168 to him and the Associated Students are being asked to add to this \$150.

It was moved and seconded that CSA allocate \$150 from the Assemblies Budget to Shlomo Carlebach. **ED.**

After much discussion, it was moved and seconded to vote immediately, the motion passed. The main motion then passed.

IX. Announcements

Diane Dennes announced that there will be a track meet here this weekend.

Kathy Chandler announced that the Drama Department production, "Little Mary Sunshine", will start this week.

X. Adjournment

After a motion and seconds, the meeting adjourned at 4:25.

No. 917

Introduced by Assemblyman Vasconcellos

March 12, 1969

REFERRED TO COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

An act to add Section 25426 to the Education Code, relating to junior colleges.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 25426 is added to the Education Code,
2 to read:

3 25426. (a) The governing board may fix a maximum mem-
4 bership fee for a student body association of any junior col-
5 lege which shall be required of all regular students attending
6 such college. The ruling body of the student association shall
7 establish the membership fee within such maximum. For the
8 purposes of this section, a regular student shall be any student
9 taking nine or more semester units or 14 or more quar-
10 ter units at any junior college. Any student taking less than

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 917, as introduced, Vasconcellos (Ed.). Junior college student organizations.

Adds Sec. 25426, Ed.C.

Authorizes the governing board of a junior college to fix a maximum membership fee within which the ruling body of the student association shall establish the actual membership fee for all regular students. Provides that the maximum nonregular student membership fee shall be not more than $\frac{1}{2}$ the regular student fee.

Provides for a referendum, on petition by 10 percent of enrolled students, on such membership fees.

Makes payment of membership fees a prerequisite to enrollment unless the governing board permits installment payments or waives the payments where such fees would prevent persons from attending junior college.

Provides for the deposit of such fees in the general fund of the student body association.

Vote—Majority; Appropriation—No; Sen. Fin.—No; W. & M.—No.



4 (b) Notwithstanding any provisions of law to the contrary,

VI. Reports

President--Dennis VanderWerff announced that the CSA banquet will be held May 28 at 7:00 at the Los Robles Lodge. All members are invited to attend. The guest price is \$3.75.

AWS Rep--Connie Chudwick announced that Yvonne LaClaire was selected as Woman of the Year. At the Rep table, she received complaints about the Coop's service. There were also several criticisms about the bookstore. One girl wanted a unit of credit for the Women's Athletic Team.

Athletics Commissioner--Jeff Hess sat at the Rep table and received a complaint about the difficulty in getting grades when a course is taken for the second time.

Elections Commissioner--Larry Gibson announced that Dr. Dougan was able to get the Kent Hall issue on the agenda of the May 12 Board of Trustees meeting.

Dear Mr. Emblen:

In your letter of November 21, 1967, written on behalf of the Sub-committee, Doyle Center Commission, you have asked a series of questions seeking information concerning ownership of the Doyle Center including buildings, equipment, inventory, and profits derived from operation of the facilities. To put the matter in proper perspective, the members of the Commission should be aware of the provisions of the Education Code which state in part.....

"Any group of students may organize a student body association within the public schools with the approval and subject to the control and regulation of the governing board of the school district."

And.....

"The funds of any student body organization established in the public schools.....shall be expended subject to such procedure as may be established by the student body organization subject to the approval of an employee or official of the school district designated by the governing board."

With these provisions in mind of the Education Code which place final responsibility with the Board, I am glad to provide specific responses to your questions.

1. "To what extent does the student body (CSA)"own" the college bookstore and other facilities of the Doyle Center?

Ownership of the buildings, equipment, and inventory is vested in the Board.

2. To what extent does the student body (CSA)"own" the profits accruing from the operation of the bookstore, cafeteria, and Bear's Lair?

The profits belong to the college and their use is subject to final approval by the Board. The Board may delegate or share its decision responsibility if it chooses.

It has been and continues to be Board policy that the cafeteria, including the Bear's Den, be a non-profit operation, and that the bookstore be a profit-making operation with the profits reserved, accumulated, and expended for projects financed additionally with other funds of the college. The projects have focused primarily on providing or improving student center facilities, although in one instance profits were used to finance one-fifth the cost of a facility (bleachers) which supports income production for the Associated Students.

3. To what extent would the student body (CSA) sustain any losses resulting from the operation of Doyle Center facilities and the bookstore?

The CSA would not sustain any losses resulting from the operation of the Doyle Center.

4. What individuals and/or agencies determine the disposition of profits realized from operation of the bookstore and other Doyle Center facilities?

The Board of Trustees determines disposition of the profits. Suggestions, comments, or recommendations from any interested source are welcome.

5. To what source on campus would one turn for a description of how the profits of the bookstore and other Doyle Center facilities have been used over, say, the last five years?

Since 1947 when I arrived on the junior college scene the profits deriving from operation of the bookstore have been expended as follows:

1953 - \$35,000 toward Doyle Center - cost: \$156,000.
1958 - \$16,000 toward East bleachers - cost \$82,000.
1962 or so - \$7,600 tables and chairs for Doyle Center.
1965 - 100,000 toward Doyle Center expansion - cost \$298,000.


These are primary figures as I recall them, and I provide them now rather than delay for a more exact search of the records.

Since 1964 the revenue from the Doyle Center is pledged for payment of principal and interest due on the revenue bonds issued to expand and rehabilitate Doyle Center, to build Kent Hall, and to build the required depreciation and principal and interest payment reserves. In approximately two to three years from now those reserves will be at the required level. Profits in excess of required payments may then again be set aside in a reserve with use subject to final determination by the Board of Trustees. It should be noted, the bookstore does not support Kent Hall; income from the dormitory finances repayment of interest and principal on that portion of the revenue bonds used for its construction.

I certainly welcome the interest and activity of the Doyle Center Commission in this area of our operation. I think the history and status of the institution speaks for itself as far as wise management and cooperative and efficient investment of funds is concerned. Improvements can always be made, policies re-examined, practices altered as logic, circumstances, or conviction dictates. You can be sure any recommendations the Doyle Center Commission may wish to make will receive the most careful attention. You should also recognize the Board of Trustees may delegate, retain, or reclaim responsibility as it sees fit, but it nonetheless must assume final responsibility for whatever happens.

I shall be glad to give you whatever additional assistance or information you may need.





AWS Rep--Connie Chudwick said that the Spring Formal was a big success. AWS has nothing else planned for this semester. At the Rep Table, Connie received suggestions for a subscription to Sports Illustrated in the library.

Athletics Commissioner--Jeff Hess sat at the Rep table where it was suggested to him that the faculty parking be moved out to Elliot Avenue.

ICC Rep--Brad Knickerbocker announced that Bear Fair will be held on Friday.

Publicity Commissioner--Steve Cabot announced that all campaign posters must be taken down within 24 hours after the elections. Concerning the convocation, Steve said that classes will be dismissed at 9:30 on Thursday and all students are to go to the football field.

Dr. C. Mack Hall and Juan Martinez will be the guest speakers. At 1:00 the students will reorganize into small workshops to discuss racism.

The main motion then failed, 5-17-0.

It was moved and seconded that CSA approve the following resolution:
WHEREAS the bookstore manager is employed to provide a student service.
WHEREAS the College Student Assembly, in light of the many complaints about the bookstore manager, believes that the bookstore has not provided adequately and satisfactorily such a student service.
THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the College Student Assembly recommend to the administration that Mr. Cooper be replaced as manager of the bookstore.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a committee of three CSA members and three

non-CSA members be formed to work with the administration in the selection of a new bookstore manager.

It was moved and seconded to vote immediately. The motion passed. The main motion then passed, 17-4-1.

Bill #917 was then brought up. It was moved to postpone the item of Assembly Bill #917 indefinitely. The motion was seconded and passed.

VIII. New Business

A. First Leaves Request--It was moved and seconded that CSA allocate \$150 from Student Cards to be matched by \$150 from the District with the stipulation that half of these copies will be passed out in the Student Activities Office. The motion passed.

IX. Announcements

Everyone was reminded to vote on Wednesday. Also, the Convocation will be held this Thursday.

X. Adjournment

After a motion and seconds, the meeting adjourned at 4:39.

I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 3:17 by President Dennis VanderWerff.

II. Flag Salute

The flag salute was led by Parliamentarian, Chris Zeek.

III. Roll Call

IV. Approval of Agenda

The agenda was approved as written.

V. Approval of Minutes

The minutes were approved as written.

VI. Reports

Executive Vice President--Steve Sheppard reported on the last Curriculum and Instruction Committee meeting. Courses approved were Dental Assisting, Real Estate, and Community Development programs. Several courses were introduced and will be voted upon by balloting: Education 50, Mexican Folk Dance, Spanish 39, and Spanish 2C. Concerning Credit/No Credit, the policy statement was passed and will go into effect starting this summer.

Sophomore Rep--Karen Sabelman announced that the Rep table was not up today, due to the elections.

ICC Rep--Brad Knickerbocker reported that ICC passed a motion which supported the bookstore resolution passed in CSA. This will be discussed further in tomorrow's ICC meeting.

Publicity Commissioner--Steve Cabot announced that all posters are to be taken down as soon as possible.

Student Activities Advisor--Mr. Canevari and the other CSA members joined in a round of applause for Dennis for his outstanding job.

It was moved and seconded that CSA invalidate the last run-off election on the grounds that Mr. Burnside's posters were not approved.

After much discussion, it was moved and seconded to vote immediately. The motion passed. The main motion then passed.

It was then moved and seconded that CSA go on record as stating that only students presenting student body cards be allowed to vote in this run-off election.

It was moved and seconded to vote immediately. The motion passed. The main motion then passed.

VII. Old Business

A. Bookstore--A letter from Dr. Newman regarding the bookstore resolution passed in CSA was then read. Dr. Newman stated that he would not accept the recommendation that Mr. Cooper be replaced as manager of the bookstore. However, an assistant bookstore manager is proposed who will be responsible for organizing and conducting the sales operation of the store.

It was then moved and seconded that a letter be written to Dr. Newman, advising him of receipt of his letter dated May 23 and informing him of CSA's concurrence with the actions proposed in the letter. The motion passed unanimously.

B. CSA Banquet--The newly-elected officers will be invited to the banquet. Those who want to bring guests are to pay \$3.75.

C. Curriculum Committee Response to Pass/Fail Recommendation--In response to the Physical Education Department Pass/Fail proposal approved by CSA, a letter has been received. Mr. Tauzer has written to CSA that a similar grading system, Credit/No Credit, has been approved by the Doyle Student Center Commission, and is available to all departments. The P. E. Department, however, chose not to participate in this system.

D. From the Floor--The Committee to Obtain a Lawyer met and decided that it would be impractical to continue the matter further.

It was moved and seconded that CSA adopt the following statement on the restrictions on the use of the bulletin board in the Coop:

1. Notices must be placed on a 3" X 5" card.
2. No notices of books for sale or books wanted may be posted as space will not permit, and a card file exists for this purpose.
3. Activities of special interest may be posted by students on a larger card, but these must be approved by the Student Activities Office in the same manner as is all other publicity.
4. Notices must be dated and may remain posted for two weeks.
5. The Publicity Commissioner shall check the board twice each week and remove notices over two weeks old.
6. The Publicity Commissioner must bring to the attention of the Student Activities Advisor any notices he thinks might be exceeding the bounds of the law. Their joint decision shall determine whether these notices may remain posted. Students may appeal this decision to the College Student Assembly.

The motion passed.

It was moved and seconded that CSA adopt the following guidelines for the allocation of the \$1200 program of Grants and Aid: First, that two \$400 grants will be administered by the Financial Aids Office to underprivileged students; and secondly, that a \$400 book fund and grant will go to the Dean's Loan and Grant Fund. The motion passed.

VIII. New Business

A. Patrin--It was moved and seconded that the SRJC Patrin be discontinued.

The motion passed.

B. From the Floor--A standing ovation and applause was then given to Mr. Canevari in appreciation for his work this past semester.


