



Nielsen panel calls for more state authority

Community colleges will lose much of their independence if Sacramento lawmakers adopt sweeping recommendations of a state task force commissioned to study the 106-campus system.

The task force, set up by Sen. Jim Nielsen, R-Rohnert Park, wants to give the colleges' statewide board of governors far-reaching authority to determine campus policies, allocate funds and select college presidents.

stronger central authority will help community colleges compete for funding at the state level. The 1 million-student system is chronically underfunded compared to the state university and University of California systems, according to the panel.



SUBJECT: LOCAL AND STATE UPDATE

The news locally and at the State level is positive, especially when one considers the dramatic cuts the Governor made in the budget sent him by the Legislature, the loss of \$1.1 billion of state revenue for budget purposes (to be returned to the taxpayers) and the demands on public funds by agencies other than education.

At Santa Rosa Junior College 1986-87 was one of our best ever years: our program quality was uniformly excellent, departments, programs and individuals won many national and state awards (to be detailed in the Annual Report), our reputation for excellence is generally recognized locally and throughout California, and our enrollment (which makes much of this possible) was outstanding (as illustrated by the five-year ADA summary on the back of this page) -- overall we grew 911 ADA (544 in credit and 367 in non-credit).

This quality and productivity should combine to make 1987-88 even better, with the help of budget resources provided by the Governor and Legislature. For your information, I have included a brief summary of the Governor's allocations and deletions.

Budget details include:

1. 3.4% (\$66.4 million) general apportionment full-year COLA and equalization;
2. 3.4% (\$1.8 million) for EOPS and DSPS full-year COLA;
3. 2.1% (\$26.1 million) growth funding for population change;
4. \$19.0 million to fund 1987-88 district base revenue for unfunded 1986-87 ADA growth;
5. \$11.0 million for funding ADA above cap in Basic Skills courses;
6. \$10.0 million for funding ADA above cap generated by GAIN students;
7. \$21 million for matriculation for purchase of necessary EDP equipment and systems and for half-year costs for student services;

8. \$12.5 million for full-year Board Financial Aid Program (BFAP) for students who cannot pay fee to comport with the extension of current enrollment fee;
9. \$52 million for instructional equipment replacement and library materials (3/1 match);]
10. \$15.0 million for Deferred Maintenance (1/1 match);
11. \$5.0 million for hazardous substances containment or removal;
12. \$1.1 million for learning disabled student assessment and academic support;
13. \$2.9 million base reduction for PERS 1987-88 rate reduction; and,
14. No stability funding for 1986-87 ADA decline.

This budget could be the turning point in getting sufficient funding for California's community colleges. It represents a real step forward by Governor Deukmejian. I hope all who read this will take time to write him a letter thanking him for the support.

Santa Rosa Junior College is in excellent position to start another year: we have quality, an image of excellence, growing enrollment, more than adequate resources, and above all an outstanding staff.

I thank you for the results which are shown in the 1986-87 column of the Summary Report, which puts us in such an excellent position to benefit from the 1987-88 budget signed by the Governor.

We can all look forward to making 1987-88 another outstanding year for the students we serve.

BASIC ASSUMPTIONS FOR WHY LEADERSHIP RETREATS ARE VITAL!

1. Student governments have an inherent responsibility for training and developing students and staff.
2. Training in student government setting is conducted for a group which is primarily task-oriented, i.e., there are certain action expectations and definite goals to be accomplished. (For example, the union Program Council has a definable task of coordinating programs for a specific population.)
3. Leadership Retreats create "teamwork" that will help the organization reach its overall goal.
4. Student leaders receiving training in student government have "in-turn" responsibility for the functioning of another group, i.e., a Program Council with chairpersons responsible for the functioning of other groups, such as their respective committees.
5. Participation in some form of training is an expectation for the individuals who become a part of the organization.
6. Training is closely linked to the values of the institution, the organization and the individuals involved.

Overall Goal of a Leadership Retreat: To enable participants to develop maximum competence in order to achieve the goals of the organization most effectively.

Specific Goals or Objectives:

- I. To understand and be committed to the philosophy and goals of the organization and its various components.
 - A. Acquire a historical perspective of the organization.
 - B. Focus on the organization goals and how individuals can work together for a common cause.
 - C. Examine and strive to understand the relationship of the organization to its broader environment, the University.

The most spectacular masterpiece to emerge from the Latin American cinema to date, *Lucia* is a grandiose mix of audacity, romanticism, experimentalism, and epic historical vision whose equivalent can perhaps be found only in deliriously ambitious, one-of-a-kind projects like Griffith's *Intolerance*, Bertolucci's *1900*, and Coppola's *Godfather II*. *Lucia* is structured in three parts, each centering on a woman in a different era of modern Cuban history: an aristocratic spinster involved in a passionate romance with a treacherous stranger during the Spanish occupation in 1895; a bourgeois girl who leaves her family to take up with an anti-Machado terrorist during the uprisings of 1933; and a strong-willed young peasant woman locked up by her foolish husband in the post-Revolutionary Cuba of the 1960's. Extending the film's epic scope across style as well as subject, Solas shifts visual and dramatic tones with prodigious virtuosity, ranging from the stark romanticism of the first episode to the grey-toned irony of the second to the sunny and robust comedy of the third. *Lucia* is stuffed with powerful images and tour-de-force scenes: a Goyaesque vision of the horrors of war; the phantasmagoric charge of machete-wielding guerrilla horsemen through a misty wood; a melancholy off-season holiday in a deserted Keys resort; a gangster-style shootout between terrorists and police in a Havana theatre.



SRJC makes plans for building

Trustees OK bids for new Barnett Hall

Santa Rosa Junior College's open space, landscaped with stately oaks and many brick buildings, is going to gain another three-story classroom and office structure adjacent to the building it eventually will replace.


The Barnett Hall Addition, an appropriate if not temporary structure, has been assigned to SRJC's new building in an estimated \$4.4 million construction project designed by the Santa Rosa firm of Palmer & Palmer Architects.

Plans call for business administration classes and offices to occupy the first floor, the business office technology department to occupy the second floor and the health occupations department to occupy the third floor.

Two elevators and two stair towers will provide access.

SRJC's Board of Trustees reviewed designs and specifications a second time before approving plans and authorizing a call for bids. The board delayed plan approval at the Sept. 14 meeting for another report on the proposed brick veneer treatment for the exterior.

The board first stumbled on the question whether a brick veneer, a major exterior treatment, would hold or drop off as has happened at buildings with similar

treatments on the campus and elsewhere in Santa Rosa. The veneer on the addition is to be grouted, but trustees still wanted to be sure individual brick pieces would hold.

Architect Michael Palmer moderated a slide show during a special Board of Trustees meeting picturing other buildings using brick veneer in Santa Rosa. The board approved the plans and authorized seeking bids.

The campus itself has had a

mixed success with brick veneer. However, as with other buildings in the city, most problems have occurred where grout was not used between the facia material.

The building will rise next to the existing Barnett Hall. The old Barnett is expected to be demolished, possibly providing space for a future building.

Palmer said the building will take 14 to 16 months to complete.

In another action at the special meeting, trustees awarded the con-

tract and should be ready for occupancy in August 1989. Construction could start in April.

contract for the second phase of parking and access improvements to Piombo Const. for \$279,549. The project, including 125 additional student parking spaces, involves construction of a two-lane access road from Haehl Pavilion to Armory Drive with a link to college parking off Armory Drive. Work will start as soon as possible and should be completed by Dec. 31.

SR ponders parking permits

Santa Rosa council members said Tuesday they may issue parking permits to those who live near downtown and Santa Rosa Junior College.

City staff urged the council to give one permit to each "legal residence" in the Burbank Gardens and Cherry Street neighborhoods. The city would charge a permit fee of \$5 a year. Motorists without permits would be limited to two-hour parking.

The council took no formal action but agreed to hold a public

hearing on the matter.

City officials said more and more cars are being parked in the residential neighborhoods. Residents, particularly in the downtown neighborhoods, are being ticketed for parking in front of their own homes for more than two hours.

Councilman Schuyler Jeffries said downtown employees have no business parking in the Burbank Gardens neighborhood and the city should "get every extraneous car out of there."

Jeffries said the city may need to use a slightly different strategy in the Cherry Street neighborhood

north of downtown because of the number of businesses moving into the area. That strategy might include the residential permits, he said.

Some residents may balk at being limited to parking one car on the street all day. Catherine Bodine, a Burbank Gardens leader and a supporter of the permit system, said she has neighbors who park three cars on the street.

A Junior College representative said limiting parking near the school would "be catastrophic to the J.C."

Curt Groniga, dean of Administrative Services, said many students park on the streets and that the college lacks an alternative.

Mayor Nanci Burton, a Junior College neighborhood resident, said she wants the council to consider her area for permits.

Staff members said the permit program would cost about \$52,000 to implement and \$37,000 a year to maintain. The cost should be paid by extra traffic tickets and the permit fees.

Thank you for having Schlossman coin typewriter equipment in your library. Many people who do not have a typewriter and perhaps cannot afford to buy one are able to spend a few quarters to get their typing job done. We feel that this is a very useful service to the public and we are proud that we can be of help to so many people.

Lately some of our operating costs have risen. Ribbons and parts have gone up in price and our liability insurance is expensive. We have thought long and hard about how we can maintain our expenses and still provide good service to our participating libraries.

Court Limits 2-Year College's Book Sales to Works with Academic Ties

SAN RAFAEL, CAL.

A court here ruled last week that the state's 106 community colleges do not have the right to sell any books except textbooks, reference works, and books that are specifically recommended by faculty members for courses. For now, the decision applies only to bookstores in one county.

In the decision, Marin County Superior Court Judge Richard H. Breiner said he would issue a permanent injunction against the sale of any other books by two bookstores operated by Marin Community College. Judge Breiner ruled that the California Education Code does not grant community colleges the authority to sell books that are not directly related to coursework.

The parties in the case had 10 days to file new evidence before the judge would issue the final injunction; as of last week, none had done so and they all expected the injunction to be issued.

The code, which does not apply to California's public four-year colleges

and universities, says community colleges may sell textbooks or books used to supplement course materials but makes no mention of other books. Had the Legislature wanted community colleges to sell other books, the judge said, it would have specifically granted the colleges that authority.

2 Local Stores Filed Suit

The ruling was handed down in a lawsuit filed by two local bookstores, whose owners said the community-college stores were hurting their business and violating the state code. The lawsuit has been closely watched by college-bookstore operators around the country, and by persons involved in a dispute between small businesses and higher education over the role of the business operations at colleges and universities.

Judge Breiner has jurisdiction only in Marin County. Further appeals in the case—which are expected—will be heard in state courts with broader authority, and their rulings could eventually apply to the entire state.

Myrna R. Miller, president of the college, called the decision “a serious blow to the educational process.”

“A bookstore is one of the most important resources for a college,” Ms. Miller added. “One of the things people should learn in college is to buy books and to build a library.”

Ms. Miller said her college's Board of Trustees had not yet met to decide if it would appeal the ruling. However, Barnes and Noble Bookstores, the company that manages the bookstores and was one of the defendants in the case, has already decided to appeal.

“This is ludicrous. We may not be able to sell Shakespeare or Dostoyevsky if they are not specifically

assigned,” said Alan Kahn, chief executive officer of the College Division of Barnes and Noble, which currently operates about 160 college bookstores.

'Shortsighted' Motives

Ms. Miller said the lawsuit had been filed because the local bookstores objected to the college's agreement with Barnes and Noble. She called the motivation “short-sighted,” saying that the arrangement with the national company did not change the nature of the stores and that the injunction would apply to the college regardless of whether an outside company operated the stores.

Margaret C. Fawcett, a lawyer for the bookstores that filed the lawsuit,

said their motivation was not the agreement with Barnes and Noble but, rather, the intention of the college to “offer a full-service bookstore.”

She said most community colleges limit their bookstores to textbooks, as California law requires.

Garis F. Distelhorst, executive director of the National Association of College Stores, said most community-college bookstores in California and elsewhere sell non-textbooks as well as textbooks. He said he was very concerned about the ruling in Marin.

“It's very dangerous, not just to stores, but to students, to have restrictions on the type of book a college can sell,” he said. “Institutions of higher education have a right, and I would say a responsibility, to sell literature to students.”

RELEASE OF INFORMATION

REGULATIONS/PROCEDURES

SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE

I. STUDENT REQUESTING INFORMATION ABOUT HIMSELF

- A. YOU MUST SEE SOME TYPE OF APPROPRIATE I.D. (California I.D. card, California Drivers License, Santa Rosa Junior College I.D. card) Section 4-2.8 Page 4 SRJC Manual.

If a student indicates that they do not have their identification with them, explain to the student that the rule is for their protection and benefit alone. It is in accordance with Federal, State and SRJC policy. Ask the student to come back when they have their identification if they need more information than may be released in II below.

- B. All information in a student file is available to a student who has properly identified himself. An Admissions and Records staff member or an information area student clerk should assist the student with the review of the permanent record. The student will be allowed to review the information contained in the file after it has been placed within the glass viewing counter in the Admissions and Records office.
- C. Student information clerks should request one of the classified staff members to assist the student when information requiring assessment or conclusions is requested.

II. SOMEONE REQUESTING INFORMATION ABOUT ANOTHER STUDENT OR A STUDENT REQUESTING INFORMATION ABOUT HIMSELF BUT HAS NO I.D.

- A. Look up student on CRT or on current alpha listing to ascertain if the release of information is approved. If the student has indicated that the College may release directory information, you may give out THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION ONLY:

1. ADDRESS AND PHONE NUMBER
2. CLASS SCHEDULE
3. TOTAL UNITS IN WHICH THE STUDENT IS ENROLLED (NO SCHOLASTIC INFORMATION)

NOTE: IF YOU GIVE OUT A CRT PRINTOUT, BE SURE TO CUT OFF THE SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER AND THE STUDENT'S GPA FIRST.

- B. IF THE STUDENT HAS INDICATED THAT DIRECTORY INFORMATION IS NOT TO BE DISCLOSED, inform the inquiring party that you are sorry but you do not have ANY information for the party they are seeking. NO EXCEPTIONS.

3. Individuals requesting information in person should also present written waivers signed by the former student. CHECK THE DATE TO SEE IF THE WAIVER IS CURRENT.

VI. JUDICIAL ORDERS

A. Subpoena - The District may comply with a subpoena duces tecum for student records if the following conditions are met:

1. The date for producing the records must be at least 15 days from the date the subpoena was issued.
2. The subpoena must be accompanied by one of the following:
 - a. A copy of a proof of service showing that, at least 10 days prior to the date for production of the documents by the District (15 days if service by mail), the student's parent or guardian was served with a copy of the subpoena duces tecum, together with the affidavit supporting the issuance of the subpoena and a notice explaining the rights of the student with regard to the subpoena; or
 - b. A written authorization to release the records signed by the student (if over 18), the student's parent or guardian, or the student's attorney.
3. Request a classified member of the Admissions and Records staff to handle this procedure.
4. Staff should accept service of documents and request a check for the services we will provide.
5. The documents should be immediately forwarded to the vault desk clerk.

B. Search Warrant

1. ATI clerks should request that their supervisor handle this procedure. The supervisors will check for the following:
 - a. The search warrant must be presented within ten (10) days of the date it was issued.
 - b. The person serving the search warrant must offer an affidavit of service. He/she must show identification and must be 18 years of age or over.
 - c. The property to be searched must be described in the warrant.

III. INSTRUCTOR/COLLEGE EMPLOYEE REQUESTING INFORMATION

- A. A College staff member has a demonstrated need to know if, and only if, the knowledge acquired by examining the student records will assist the staff member in teaching, advising, and/or counseling the student on academic affairs.
1. ASK THE INSTRUCTOR/COLLEGE EMPLOYEE TO IDENTIFY HIM/HERSELF.
 2. Ask the instructor/college employee how the information requested will be used.
 3. If the request is being made by telephone, ask for the extension number. VERIFY THE EXTENSION NUMBER before returning the call to provide the information.

IV. IN CASE OF A PROVEN EMERGENCY

- A. Have the individual speak with an Admissions and Records office classified staff member or an administrator WHO THEN MUST:
1. Ascertain if a health or safety emergency actually exists;
 2. Determine if the information is needed to meet the emergency;
 3. Determine if the party requesting the information is in a position to deal with the emergency;
 4. Determine the extent to which time is of the essence.
 5. If it is adjudged to be necessary,
 - a. Contact campus police to find the student and give him/her the message,
 - b. OR phone the student from another room and ask if they wish to speak to the individual,
 - c. OR send an employee to the student's classroom and ask if they wish to meet with the individual.

V. PERSONS REQUESTING INFORMATION ABOUT FORMER STUDENTS

- A. The current law addresses former students in the same language as currently enrolled students. Due to the difficulty in verifying the request for non-disclosure of directory information, observe the following:
1. Inform those making telephone inquiries that student information is not available by telephone.
 2. Request the calling party to submit a written waiver from the former student authorizing release of the specific information by Santa Rosa Junior College to a specific individual or company.

- d. Copies of the materials must be provided. If the originals are demanded, we must comply and make copies to be retained in our files that are certified by the Dean of Admissions and Records.
- e. Get a receipt for all materials released.

VII. FEDERAL/STATE AGENCIES REQUESTING INFORMATION ABOUT STUDENTS

A. In all of the following cases, have an Admissions and Records office classified staff member handle the requests (NOTE: WRITTEN PERMISSION IS NOT REQUIRED):

- 1. School in which student seeks enrollment or is concurrently enrolled.
- 2. Comptroller General of U.S., Director of National Institute of Education, Assistant Secretary of Education, State Educational Authorities, etc., as needed for audit purposes.
- 3. Financial Aids (Requires Director of Financial Aid approval). Federal/State agencies requesting information about students:

- a. Comptroller General of the U.S.
- b. Inspector General's Office
- c. Director of National Institute of Education
- d. Secretary or Assistant Secretary of Education
- e. Department of Education, Regional Office
- f. General Accounting Office
- g. U.S. Department of Immigration and Nationalization
- h. Social Security
- i. Federal Bureau of Investigation
- j. Veteran's Administration
- k. California Department of Social Service (AFDC, food stamps)
- l. California Department of Employment Development
- m. Accrediting organizations
- n. If requests for Financial Aid information are received from the agencies mentioned above, the following conditions apply:

- 1. Federal agencies may review information only for students who received federal aid from Pell, SEOG, GSL, CWS, NDSL, SLS, PLUS/CLAS, Veterans Chapters 30, 31, 32, 34, 35, or 106.
- 2. State agencies may review information only for state aid recipients.
- 3. In both cases, the information reviewed is limited to that necessary to determine:
 - a) eligibility
 - b) the amount of aid awarded
 - c) conditions of aid

- d) terms of aid
- e) accuracy of required reports

4. Students who are applicants for aid may review their files except for parental financial documents. Parents' documents can be released only with the written consent of the parents.

5. Parents may review the financial aid file of dependent students if the dependency status can be documented.

4. State and local authorities regarding required reports.

5. Accrediting organizations.

6. Parents of dependent children with verification of dependency status (152 of Internal Revenue Code).

7. Immigration and Naturalization.

B. Social Security, Welfare, State Department of Employment Development, food stamps, etc.

1. The Social Security form submitted by the student will constitute a written request to provide the needed information.

2. All other agencies should submit a written waiver signed and with a current date provided the agency by the student.

AS A RULE OF THUMB, IT IS ALWAYS BEST TO REFUSE RATHER THAN RELEASE INFORMATION FOR WHICH YOU HAVE A REASONABLE DOUBT. THE LAW PROVIDES FOR THE SUBPOENA IN CASES WHERE IT IS ESSENTIAL TO RETRIEVE INFORMATION WITHOUT CONSENT OF THE STUDENT.

STUDENT DIRECTORY, INFORMATION AVAILABILITY

Directory information may be made available to newspaper, magazine, radio, or television media and prospective employers for the purpose of reporting a student's participation in officially recognized college activities and sports or the student's receipt of college degrees and awards. Directory information may include the student's name, address, telephone listing, date and place of birth, major field of study, class schedule, dates of attendance, weight and height of members of athletic teams, and the most recent previous educational institution attended by the student. The names and addresses of students may be provided to public or private schools or colleges for purposes directly related to the academic or professional goals of the institution.

A student who does not wish that any or all of the information be made available without prior consent must indicate such on their admission application or file a petition in the Admissions and Records Office at the time of enrollment or before the beginning of classes, requesting that this information be withheld.

Under the provisions of the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act, students are guaranteed the right to view their academic records maintained at Santa Rosa Junior College, may challenge any inaccuracy or inappropriate materials contained therein and limit access to any but those authorized persons or agencies covered under the law. Details of the Act are contained in the College catalog. Contact the Assistant Dean of Admissions and Records if you desire more specific information.



STAFF PARKING REGULATIONS

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Board of Trustees of the Sonoma County Junior College District has authorized parking fees for Santa Rosa Junior College. In accordance with California Vehicle Code Sections 21113A and California Education Code Section 72247, the following regulations will be enforced on campus.

RESERVED PARKING PERMITS/FEES

- Parking shall be by permit only (part-time staff are eligible for Reserved Parking in the Quinn Lot).
- A valid Staff Reserved Parking Permit may be purchased from the Accounting Office in Bailey Hall.
- One transferable permit and one gate access card will be issued upon payment of the annual parking fee.
- Gate access cards may be issued to departments (based on special needs) for parking in loading zones up to a maximum of 30 minutes.
- Pro-rated refunds will be made only when the parking permit and gate access card are returned to Accounting.
- The parking permit is a license to park one vehicle.
- Parking regulations will be enforced between 7 am and 11 pm on all days school is in session.
- Staff with a reserved parking permit may park in Student Parking after 12 noon.
- An Evening Staff Parking Permit (for parking in a reserved lot after 3 pm) may be purchased in the Campus Police Office.
- Visitor Parking Permits are available to guests of the campus from the Campus Police Office.

DISPLAY OF PERMITS

Staff Reserved Parking Permits must be affixed to a plastic hanger (available in the Accounting Office) and displayed from the rear view mirror or the left corner of the rear window of the vehicle.

*
Staff with a Reserved Parking Permit may receive a Motorcycle Permit free of charge. Failure to affix and display parking permit as indicated may result in issuance of a citation.

REPLACEMENT OF PERMITS

If a permit or gate access card is lost or stolen, you must file a Parking Permit Loss Report at the Campus Police Office.

A fee of \$10 will be charged for the replacement of a Staff Reserved Parking Permit and \$20 for a gate access card.

INVALID PERMIT

- A permit is invalid when - the time or date has expired.
- any portion is not clearly visible.
 - it is not completely legible.
 - it has been cancelled or reported lost or stolen.

PARKING REGULATIONS

- A valid parking permit must be displayed on any vehicle parked on campus.
- All vehicles shall be parked clearly within the designated lines.
- Any vehicle parked in Disabled Parking must display a valid Disabled permit or placard as well as a Staff or Student Permit.
- No vehicle shall be parked overnight on campus without permission from the Campus Police Office.
- Motorcycles shall park only in designated locations or a citation will be issued.
- All traffic and road signs must be obeyed.
- The maximum speed limit on campus is ten (10) miles per hour.

ENFORCEMENT OF TRAFFIC AND PARKING REGULATIONS

Violations of any regulation set forth may result in a citation being issued. Anyone using or obtaining a permit illegally will be subject to loss of parking privileges and disciplinary action.

Anyone parking on campus must display an appropriate permit (e.g.,

Disabled, Visitor, Staff Reserved, Student) or they will be cited.

The College reserves the right to remove vehicles from campus for which the registered owner will be responsible for costs as follows:

- abandoned vehicles.
- vehicles parking in such a manner as to constitute a serious hazard.
- vehicles which impede the operation of emergency equipment.
- vehicles which park illegally on a recurring basis.

CITATIONS

Citations are issued for the following violations:

- parking without a valid District permit.
- parking outside a marked stall.
- parking in a restricted area.
- parking in a red zone or fire hydrant zone.
- parking in a loading zone longer than 30 minutes.
- parking in posted Disabled space without a valid Disabled Permit.

FINES

Parking fines are set by the Board of Trustees and may be paid in the Accounting Office. Willful failure to pay fines will result in loss of parking privileges and disciplinary action.

SPECIAL COLLEGE EVENTS

For special College events, parking fees may be set aside for patrons of the event. However, parking will still be subject to all other parking regulations.

Parking purchase awaits city approval

SRJC bid on a piece of property at 1830 Mendocino Ave. and 1817 Slater St. for the possible use of additional parking, pending city approval.

Curt Groninga, dean of administrative services, said that SRJC has an option to buy 1 1/3 acres of property from Gehrke Land Inc. for a projected purchase price of \$275,000. The property would hold approximately 150-170 extra parking spaces, but Groninga said "We now need to get approval from the city of Santa Rosa to use it as a parking lot."

Groninga expects this decision to take a couple of months, and said "I'm hoping to meet with the city sometime in the next week or ten days."

He explained that he will hire a parking consultant to study the parking problem, and is currently receiving proposals from them. "I'd think we'd have a decision by December about a parking consultant," he predicted.

The funding for the property would come from the student and staff parking fees, Groninga said.

The idea of buying the property and transforming it into a parking lot originated from Pres. Roy Mikalson, who explained that "We have to use everything possible to alleviate the parking problem. Whether we go to one or two levels [on the new parking lot], it would give us 150-300 spaces at a somewhat reasonable price."

Mikalson said one parking spot rotates about three times each day in the school parking lots.

Mikalson is aware of residents' concerns over having a parking lot built in their neighborhood, but said "I don't see it as causing any great traffic problems. We plan to do everything we can to keep it attractive."

He also said that it would be patrolled by campus police during school hours and

locked up after 10:30 p.m. during the week.

"It's [the property] being used as accommodations for a lot of things right now. People without places to stay are living there," he continued.

Wilbert Gehrke, who is handling the property, said "We do have an offer and acceptance [from SRJC] and it is in escrow, pending city approval."

Gehrke is in favor of transforming the property into a parking lot because of SRJC

security required there. "It would clean up an eyesore area as far as transients sleeping there and junk dropped there. The security would make it beneficial to residential areas," he said.

"It [the parking lot] is much needed and will hopefully alleviate cars parking in residential areas," continued Gehrke.

He explained that the purchase of the property to use as a parking lot would have to meet residential and city approval.

The Global Studies Group would like to propose a sister university resolution with the National University of El Salvador, which will be presented to C.S.A. in the near future. (Sample copies of the resolution are contained in this info. packet included to educate the reader on the history of the U.E.S.)

The A.S.B. of Fall 1986, passed a resolution that supported the U.E.S.: "Remain open and accessible", and "funded as mandated by the constitution of El Salvador". The A.S.B. also agreed to explore further ways of assisting the school in its fight for peace and freedom of education; (see resolution).

Last January, Denise Bein visited the University of El Salvador. She talked to students and people of the community and learned that the school has been recurrently bombed and terrorized by the military. The classrooms were in ruins, and the teaching supplies were at a minimum. Classes were being held under the trees despite these conditions and the earthquake damage. 35,000 students still attend, and have asked that colleges and universities in other countries provide support for their educational community. The school is traditionally a center of progressive thought and lively debate, and is therefore a threat to the country's dictatorship.

The Global Studies Group would like to implement a sister university project at S.R.J.C. (which many schools across the nation are already participating in).

Please read the information included carefully so that you may make an educated vote next week.

The S.R.J.C. needs to take a stand on peace, justice, and academic freedom which will be consistent with its academic excellence. Supporting the sister university resolution would be a step towards this goal.

- RESOLVED: That the Student Body urges the government of El Salvador to restore funding as mandated by the constitution of El Salvador to the National University of El Salvador; and further be it
- RESOLVED: That the Student Body of Santa Rosa Junior College will explore further ways of assisting the National University of El Salvador in its fight for peace and freedom of education.

The University of El Salvador

Introduction

The University of El Salvador (UES) has played a vital role in Salvadoran society for over 100 years. Traditionally a center of progressive thought and lively debate, it has been subjected to intermittent repression for nearly as long.

Its policy of socially-relevant education has led to an emphasis on training doctors, agronomists, and engineers who will stay in El Salvador and serve the needs of the country. The University has been at the forefront of the growing mass movement demanding an end to the economic crisis of the country and a political resolution of the civil war.

Founded in 1841 as a church-related institution, UES became autonomous in 1886. As is true throughout Latin America, the University is funded by the state, but run independently. This concept of university autonomy, dating back to the turn of the century, has been critical to the survival of universities which have found themselves in an adversarial relationship with a repressive government. In practice, the concept means that the university administration has the freedom to determine curricula, appoint faculty, manage the budget, select students, and control the physical environment of the university.

In the case of the UES, this autonomy has been violated on many occasions. The most serious attack occurred in 1980 during a rising national protest against the repressive civilian-military junta (of which Duarte was a member).

The Military Occupation

At 10 o'clock on the morning of June 29, 1980 over 300 members of the Salvadoran Armed Forces stormed the University of El Salvador campus. Armed with bazookas, machine guns, and hand grenades, the military killed 60 students and faculty, while 40 others disappeared. On October 29, the Rector of the University, Felix Antonio Ulloa, was assassinated. This attack began an occupation which lasted four years and kept the University of El Salvador closed until May 1984.

The destruction was devastating. Buildings stand half-finished and partially destroyed. Bullet holes riddle many walls. Grass and brush mark the spot where the student-run health clinic once stood. Books and equipment were either removed and sold or destroyed. Only 20 microscopes are left of the 500 once serving the science departments and medical school. The most conservative estimates place the cost of reconstruction at 25 to 40 million dollars.

The Re-opening of the University

Throughout the period of closure, the students, faculty, and administration tried valiantly to keep the University alive. Holding classes in private homes and rented space, they educated thousands of students, and kept alive the hopes of the entire University community. Nevertheless, with no funding and few materials, instruction was severely limited.

Finally, on May 22, 1984 domestic and international pressure forced the re-opening of the University. Now 35,000 students attend classes, some in buildings without walls, in rooms without desks, and with few textbooks. The Duarte government, in defiance of its own Constitution, provides only enough funding to pay salaries.

There is no money for administering the programs, providing resources, or even paying the electric bills. There are no funds to reconstruct or re-stock the libraries, labs and classrooms. Students must now pay "voluntary fees" to keep the University functioning, limiting access to the poor.

Despite these hardships, the University is continuing to take its traditional place at the forefront of the popular movement. Its demands for full-funding, for a solution to the country's economic crisis, and for a political resolution to the civil war have subjected the University to continued repression.

Army helicopters fly overhead daily. Students entering and leaving campus are often harrassed, and sometimes arrested or disappeared by security forces. Eleven University people, most members of AGEUS, the University students' organization, were openly threatened with assassination by a death squad in a letter published by a daily San Salvador paper this past July.


Why Support UES?

One reason to support UES is socio-economic. It is by far the best-developed, broadest-based, and most socially responsive institution in El Salvador. Courses of instruction fill major social needs, from engineering to health care to agronomy. In terms of student access to higher education, the University provides an invaluable resource to the nation. Its tradition of social consciousness and its guiding principles of teaching and research linked to public service are essential to the reconstruction of El Salvador.

The second and perhaps more important reason to support UES is political. Like many Universities in Latin America, the UES is a fountainhead of social analysis and criticism. It is a center for dialogue about such issues as human rights, health care distribution, and liberation theology.

It is one of the major public institutions in El Salvador today calling for a negotiated settlement. And the student organization AGEUS and the unions on campus have been at the forefront of the mass movement, demanding drastic social and economic changes, as well as a political resolution of the civil war. It has refused offers of considerable financial assistance from AID in an effort to preserve its autonomy.

Several organizations and CISPES committees have already begun projects to support the University. The United States Student Association has passed a resolution of support for the UES and is providing microscopes; the Latin America Solidarity Committee of Fresno has gathered together and sent the equipment for a print shop at the University, and is continuing to collect supplies and money for another shipment; and San Francisco State University has become a sister school of the UES.



"Now, it completes the circle that began right here at this same podium," said Jacob Bighorn, the former Chemawa teacher who owned the feather and who presented it to Onizuka in 1984.

The eagle feather is one of the ultimate symbols of spiritual power in the traditional Indian world, Bighorn said.

The feather he gave Onizuka in 1984 had been his own and had been revered by members of his family, Bighorn said, adding that it could serve to inspire future Chemawa students.

"Hopefully, it will now act to draw more and more Indian kids into the field of science," he said.

Members of the Chemawa commencement class appeared in graduation gowns during a baccalaure-

ate ceremony attended by about 200 guests Thursday night. The event was followed by a dance and midnight breakfast. Commencement is scheduled for 10 a.m. Friday.

Hill described Onizuka as "a warrior for peace," and a traditional man who was a devout Buddhist. Because of his heritage, Onizuka was able to understand and respect the meaning the feather had for the Chemawa community, he said.

"Today, each of you has earned his own eagle

feather in a symbolic way in the field of education," Hill told the students. "You are warriors for education."

Chemawa, operated by the U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs, was founded in 1880 and is the oldest off-reservation Indian boarding school in the country, said Debbie A. LaCroix, director of spiritual and cultural activities. With a capacity of 440, its students come from tribes throughout the Northwest, including Alaska.

'Sister university' ties with El Salvador urged

Portland State University students hope to provide materials and political aid to students from El Salvador through a "sister university" relationship, members of a student group said in a news conference Thursday.

Bob Gross, a member of the university's Central America Study and Action group that is promoting the relationship, said that CASA hoped to make Oregonians aware of U.S. policy that supported the El Salvadoran government. "Hopefully, we can get the policy changed," Gross said.

More than 1,800 students signed a petition in April seeking to establish a "sister university" relationship with the students and staff of the University of El Salvador, said Steve Conover, a 1984 PSU graduate who also spoke at

the news conference. During an election last month, students voted by a 2-to-1 ratio to approve the relationship, he said.

Sister university relationships with the University of El Salvador already have been established at Oregon State University, the University of Oregon, Western Washington State University and San Francisco State University, Conover said, but PSU's relationship was the first completely student-sponsored action.

Gross sent a letter on behalf of CASA to Jose Napoleon Duarte, president of El Salvador, this week, informing him of the relationship. Gross said that PSU students were concerned about the "terrible and increasing gap between Salvador's small group of wealthy and the great majority of the poor."

"Students here are shocked by the reality of El Salvador: Half the children die before age five of malnutrition-related diseases; more and more land is being appropriated by powerful interests to grow cash crop commodities while the poor starve for want of rice and beans; and the increase of landlessness by more than 400 percent in the last twenty years," Gross said in the letter, which was on PSU stationery.

Gross said in the letter that the relationship was established to ensure that debate could occur at the University of El Salvador. PSU students would contact U.S. and Salvadoran officials to intervene when notified of human rights abuses, he promised.

PSU President Joseph Blumel said he did not know anything about the "sister university" relationship with El Salvador. Although the university has

several other "sister" agreements with universities in Japan, China, Yugoslavia and Italy, they were negotiated between the PSU administration and administrators from the other universities, he said.

The University of El Salvador, which has 35,000 students, was shut down by the military in 1980 during a conflict in which 60 professors and students were killed. Classes were conducted in students' and professors' homes until international pressure forced Duarte to reopen the university in June 1984, Conover said.

Two Salvadoran students visited Portland last November, seeking aid from local students. Bob Rini, a member of U.S. Citizens for Friendship and Peace in El Salvador, who also attended the news conference, said the university was in shambles.

Penitentiary superintendent takes Arizona job

Oregon State Penitentiary Superintendent J.C. Keeney said Thursday he would retire Aug. 1 to take a job in Arizona because Oregon's criminal justice system is "near collapse and nobody's doing anything about it."

"I've been here 26 years, and I've looked around, and things aren't going to get any better in this state," Keeney told United Press International.

Keeney, 51, became superintendent of the penitentiary

eight to 10 years, and it gets tiresome after a while," Keeney said. "I guess I'm burned out."

Keeney said he went looking for a new job and decided to take the position of operations officer at the central office of the Arizona Corrections Division. He will be responsible for security at three state prisons and three others now under construction.

"Oregon's going in trouble for a long time," Keeney said. "I'm tired of working at an institution

Keeney said his replacement had not been chosen but that he had submitted a confidential recommendation and expected a new superintendent to be named soon. "I'll be working most of the summer and hopefully will be able to work with my replacement," he said.

Testimony of Jose Rodolfo Rosales to be introduced to the Senate Foreign Relations
 Committee Hearings and the House Foreign Affairs Committee Hearings
 on the Counter-Terrorism Aid for Central America

1. I, Jose Rodolfo Rosales, native of El Salvador, Central America, 28 years of age, am a fourth year medical student at the Faculty of Medicine at the University of El Salvador, San Salvador.
2. I am the Vice-President of the General Association of Salvadoran University Students (AGEUS). I am presently in the United States on a west coast tour of universities and colleges. I have visited 40 campuses to establish ties and support between these U.S. institutions and the National University of El Salvador.
3. On July 12, 1985, the Secret-Anti-Communist Army (ESA), published a death list including the names of eleven (11) university students, staff and workers, threatening them as follows:
 "All of these traitors of the people have been condemned to death and we give them until Saturday the 20th of this month to be forewarned that from that day on our beloved military squads will put the execution orders into effect."
4. On July 20, 1985, the Christian-Democratic Party of President Jose Napoleon Duarte published a statement justifying the communique published by the death squad.
5. I was one of the students named in the death list.
6. On July 28, 1985, an attempt was made on my life but I was protected by a group of North American students and professors who were visiting the university at that time.
7. On or about August 7, 1985, a second attempt on my life was carried out. I narrowly escaped from being shot while I was walking in downtown San Salvador. However, a woman standing close by was injured.
8. Eight (8) out of the eleven (11) individuals threatened have already left the country.
9. On July 24, 1985, one of the other 2 students who stayed in El Salvador, Antonio Quezada, was shot at.
10. On August 5, 1985, another attempt on Mr. Quezada's life was carried out.
11. These life-threatening acts are not isolated cases facing the university community. During the last eleven (11) months, 55 students have been killed by the Salvadoran armed forces and the death squads; 9 students have "disappeared" by the government forces and 24 have been incarcerated. Thirteen (13) of the latter have been released after intensive international pressure.
12. On June 20, 1985, the General Secretary of the University, Ana Gloria de Montoya; the President of the Engineering and Architecture Department, Ing. Manuel Canas Lazo; University worker, Salvador Ubau, President of AGEUS, Antonio Quezada and myself met with Ricardo J. Lopez, Ministry of the Treasury, to discuss the financial situation facing the university including the lack of funds to pay the salaries of the administration, the faculty and the workers. Mr. Lopez at that time stated that President Duarte's financial priorities were the needs of the war and not higher education.
13. Mr. Lopez's statement is disheartening, particularly when a significant portion of the university campus and the equipment were totally destroyed during the June 25, 1980 military occupation of the University which lasted until May, 1985.
14. Threats continue to be carried out daily by the state security forces. These state security forces appear on campus uninvited, driving vehicles with blacked-out windows and with shotguns visible. They stop students and ask them about other students whose names appear on lists they carry with them.
15. At this time, I would like to request that the Congress not approve the Counter-Terrorism Bill since the aid will only enhance the ability of the state security forces and the death squads to repress the civilian population in general and the University population in particular.





Sonoma County schools chief dies

Dick Bacon, Sonoma County's schools superintendent for less than a year, collapsed and died after suffering a massive heart attack in a Thursday morning meeting with his three closest

colleagues.

He was 51.

Walter Eagan, Bacon's predecessor, agreed to serve as interim superintendent until the county Board of Education can find a permanent replacement. Eagan accepted the appointment during the board's monthly meeting Thursday afternoon.

Flowers at Bacon's seat marked his absence. His shocked colleagues postponed the rest of their meeting until a special session at 3 p.m. Wednesday.

Robert Geurts, one of two deputy superintendents named by Bacon, was meeting with Bacon when he was stricken at about 9:20 a.m. at the County Administration Center. He had just snuffed out a cigarette when he was seized by the heart attack, Geurts said.

"The paramedics were absolutely outstanding," Geurts said. "They arrived quickly and began stabilizing Dick, getting better life signs. But he continued to have whatever was happening and couldn't get out of it."

Bacon was rushed to Community Hospital, where he died. His wife, Dorene, was with him at the time.

Geurts confirmed that Bacon, a smoker who planned to quit, was taking medication for high blood pressure. He said a hospital spokesman attributed Bacon's death to a massive heart attack.

Geurts eulogized Bacon as "a man of his beliefs and convictions. He was not a man of pomp and circumstance. He was very straight forward."

Bacon's campaign slogan was "Striving for Excellence," and Geurts said the motto carried over after he took office last January.

"It was his motto for all of us," Geurts said. "He wanted nothing less than excellence."

Flags at the county government center were lowered to half staff as much of the education business came to a halt. Employees grieved openly and students learned of Bacon's death over school public address systems.

Don "Jerry" Johnson, who shares deputy county superintendent responsibilities, and Robert Henry, the schools' chief legal adviser, also were with Bacon in his regular Thursday morning "cabinet meeting."

Henry said Bacon was well liked: "He had a sincere concern for the well being of those who worked for him. To have established so much and then lost it so suddenly and completely really creates an emotional time here."

Bacon, recognized as an expert on school finance, was described by Eagan "not only as a very close, personal friend, but a professional colleague and sound adviser. He was totally dedicated to providing the best possible education for children. He'll be missed."

Bacon joined Eagan's staff as

assistant superintendent in 1972 while serving as Mark West District superintendent. He was named chief deputy in 1974. Bacon, who defeated two challengers to win outright in the June 1986 primary, was sworn in last January as Eagan retired.

Once in office, Bacon began various reorganization efforts to give the schools office a new direction, recognizing the county Board of Education's desire to strengthen curriculum, office operations and to upgrade support to school districts.

"There's no question, Dick's got to be regarded as a superior superintendent," said senior county board trustee B.G. "Buz" Scheuer of Santa Rosa. "I've met a lot of other county superintendents and Dick certainly was Walt's (Eagan) most worthy successor."

Santa Rosa Superintendent John Landis, who supported former Analy superintendent John McGrew in his campaign against Bacon, said Bacon was doing an excellent job. "We were very pleased with his leadership. He was working hard to correct the concerns of superintendents in the field about the county schools office."

"It may be impossible to replace Bacon, the man. I just don't know who's around to do that," Landis said.

Bacon was criticized during the campaign for lacking significant administrative experience in secondary education. One of his first moves as superintendent was to hire Geurts, who has a doctorate in education and was superintendent of Sonoma Valley Unified School District.

Bacon was born in Van Nuys. Before taking over as Mark West superintendent, Bacon was a school administrator in Orange County. He was either a school principal, district officer or superintendent for more than 26 years.

He was a Rotarian, a member of the boards of the Sonoma County Symphony and Boy Scouts.

In addition to his wife, he leaves his father, the Rev. Charles Bacon, of Cardiff; his children, Gayle Whitacre of Rohnert Park, Susan Bacon of Santa Rosa, Mark Bacon of Lakeport, Kristi Weber of Pleasant Hill, Nancy Chisom of Santa Rosa, Greg Weber of Chico and David Weber of Davis; his brothers, Raymond and Robert Bacon; his sisters, Evelyn Melavic and Elizabeth Brainard; and six grandchildren.

No services are planned. Contributions are preferred to favorite charities.



STOP THE GREAT BUS ROBBERY



Laidlaw Transit, Inc., a \$1.7 billion Canadian multinational corporation, runs Sonoma County Transit for a profit, a profit they will go to any length to protect. Sonoma County Transit drivers and mechanics feel the pain of Laidlaw's exploitation every day.

Laidlaw employees make substantially less than any comparable public transit workers in the area, have no sick leave, marginal health benefits, no retirement. Laidlaw employees want nothing other than simple economic justice -- a fair wage and benefit package for a fair day's work. Laidlaw is interested only in profit.

County transit workers have been trying in earnest for the last six months to reach agreement with Laidlaw on a new, fair contract. Laidlaw, on the other hand, has been unyielding in their drive to profit from Sonoma County tax dollars, no matter the price the workers, and the system, will pay.

Numbered among Laidlaw's bargaining tactics are frequent long delays between negotiating sessions, the use of armed guards to scare workers into accepting a bad offer, attempts at internal division between workers, routine harassment, disparate treatment of activist employees, and threats of physical violence.

Sonoma County residents are paying Laidlaw handsomely to run Sonoma County Transit. But Laidlaw is doing little other than running workers into the ground. Every year well over one-half the employees are forced to leave their jobs, overworked and unable to maintain a decent standard of living for their families. Meanwhile, Laidlaw continues to take local tax dollars out of our community permanently, in the form of profits, tax dollars that could be reinvested locally by the workers if they were fairly compensated.

Sonoma County seemingly has no control over its own public transit system. Stability, safety and reliability are taking a back seat to profits. Local workers, who care about their jobs and their community, are suffering at the hands of Laidlaw; our transit system is suffering at the hands of Laidlaw, yet we have no local control. Laidlaw is not a part of our community.

For the past three months, Laidlaw's County transit employees have been working without a contract. They have not enjoyed any wage or benefit improvements,

"Laidlaw Transit, Inc.", una corporación multinacional canadiense de 1.7 billones, maneja los autobuses de el Condado de Sonoma (Sonoma County Transit) por grandes ganancias, ganancias que protegen a todo costo. Los choferes y los mecánicos de Sonoma County Transit sienten el dolor de la explotación por parte de Laidlaw diariamente.

Los trabajadores de Laidlaw ganan substancialmente menos que otros trabajadores del transporte público en esta area, no tienen protección cuando se enferman, beneficios de salud marginales, no tienen jubilación. Los trabajadores de Laidlaw no quieren otra cosa que una justicia económica. Un salario decente y prestaciones por parte de la compañía. Laidlaw esta sólo interesada en la plusvalia.

Los trabajadores del transporte del Condado han estado tratando por los últimos seis meses de obtener un acuerdo con Laidlaw por un nuevo contrato de trabajo. Laidlaw por otro lado, ha estado aprovechandose de su situación hasta lo máximo. Su único interés es sacar Ganancias de los impuestos de el Condado de Sonoma, sin importarle los trabajadores, al final quien paga por esto es el sistema de transporte.

Las numerosas tácticas de convenio por parte de Laidlaw son frecuentemente paralizados. El uso de guardias armados para intimidar a los trabajadores y así aceptar un contrato pobre. Los atentados de divisiones internas entre los trabajadores, hostigamiento constante, el tratamiento disparejo de activistas, y las amenazas de violencia física son provocados entre las sesiones de negociaciones.

Los residentes de el Condado de Sonoma le estan pagado muy bien a Laidlaw por manejar el Sonoma County Transit. No obstante Laidlaw esta forzando a los trabajadores a una situación pauperrima. Cada año más de la mitad de los trabajadores son forzados a salirse del trabajo, superexplotados y con problemas de mantener una vida de acuerdo con el costo de la vida. Mientras tanto Laidlaw continua cobrando sus ganancias provenientes de los impuestos locales, ganancias que son removidas de nuestra comunidad permanentemente, estos impuestos se podrian reinvertir en el salario de los trabajadores de una manera más justa.

Parece ser que el Condado de Sonoma no tiene ningún control sobre su mismo sistema de transporte público. La estabilidad, seguridad y autodependencia estan en último lugar cuando se trata de plusvalia. Los trabajadores locales que se preocupan por sus trabajos y la comunidad estan sufriendo en las manos de Laidlaw; nuestro sistema de transporte esta sufriendo en las manos de Laidlaw, aun así, no tenemos un control local. Laidlaw no es parte de nuestra comunidad.

Los trabajadores de Laidlaw han estado trabajando sin contrato colectivo por los últimos tres meses. No han recibido ningún beneficio ni aumento salarial, por el contrario. Sus condiciones de trabajo se han ido deteriorando. En realidad, nuevos trabajadores han sido contratados con un salario mucho más bajo que el antiguo contrato. Aun así, las autoridades públicas de el Condado de Sonoma han incrementado el precio del contrato con Laidlaw. En otras palabras, un incremento en plusvalias provenientes de los impuestos sacados de nuestra comunidad.

Nosotros no estamos de acuerdo con contratos llevados a cabo con compañía como Laidlaw con una póliza pública. No estamos de acuerdo en que los residentes de el Condado de Sonoma aprueben el abuso de los impuestos y la gente. Hasta ahora los trabajadores han estado luchando solos, una lucha que no es sólo para su protección, pero para el futuro de el transporte público y otros servicios públicos en nuestra comunidad. Ahora es tiempo de los residentes de esta condado para unirse a esta lucha.






I realize that I have already been to two of the NACA conferences, the Programming West and the Regional. However, I feel that they have put me in a more advanced range for learning what the National has to offer.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT RESOLUTION CONCERNING SONOMA COUNTY TRANSIT DRIVERS


WHEREAS, the Sonoma County transit system provides an essential means of transportation for SRJC students; and

WHEREAS, an effective mass transit system is a valuable resource to the citizens of Sonoma County in addressing the County's present and future transportation problems; and

WHEREAS, the current labor strife at Sonoma County Transit is indicative of deficiencies in the operation of the system and undermines stability, safety, and reliability;

Now, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the SRJC Student Government expresses its concern over the failure of the current system operator to reach a fair agreement with the drivers and mechanics of Sonoma County Transit, and urges all appropriate government agencies and other concerned community groups to take action to eliminate inequities in the treatment of the system's employees and to ensure a stable, safe, and reliable mass transit system in Sonoma County.

STOP THE GREAT BUS ROBBERY



Laidlaw Transit, Inc., a \$1.7 billion Canadian multinational corporation, runs Sonoma County Transit for a profit, a profit they will go to any length to protect. Sonoma County Transit drivers and mechanics feel the pain of Laidlaw's exploitation every day.

Laidlaw employees make substantially less than any comparable public transit workers in the area, have no sick leave, marginal health benefits, no retirement. Laidlaw employees want nothing other than simple economic justice -- a fair wage and benefit package for a fair day's work. Laidlaw is interested only in profit.

County transit workers have been trying in earnest for the last six months to reach agreement with Laidlaw on a new, fair contract. Laidlaw, on the other hand, has been unyielding in their drive to profit from Sonoma County tax dollars, no matter the price the workers, and the system, will pay.

Numbered among Laidlaw's bargaining tactics are frequent long delays between negotiating sessions, the use of armed guards to scare workers into accepting bad offer, attempts at internal division between workers, routine harassment, disparate treatment of activist employees, and threats of physical violence.

Sonoma County residents are paying Laidlaw handsomely to run Sonoma County Transit. But Laidlaw is doing little other than running workers into the ground. Every year well over one-half the employees are forced to leave their jobs, overworked and unable to maintain a decent standard of living for their families. Meanwhile, Laidlaw continues to take local tax dollars out of our community permanently, in the form of profits, tax dollars that could be reinvested locally by the workers if they were fairly compensated.

Sonoma County seemingly has no control over its own public transit system. Stability, safety and reliability are taking a back seat to profits. Local workers, who care about their jobs and their community, are suffering at the hands of Laidlaw; our transit system is suffering at the hands of Laidlaw, yet we have no local control. Laidlaw is not a part of our community.

Over the next three months, Laidlaw's County transit employees have been work-

a el transporte de Sonoma tienen que mandar un fuerte mensaje a los trabajadores y sus gerentes. Tienen que negociar honestamente con los trabajadores y paro a sus negociaciones en nuestra comunidad. Los residentes del Condado de Sonoma tienen que mandar un mensaje claro y colectivo a los políticos locales. No es esta la manera de manejar el sistema de transporte.

ALTO AL GRAN ROBO POR PARTE DE LA COMPANIA DE AUTOBUSES

"Laidlaw Transit, Inc.", una corporación multinacional canadiense de 1.7 billones, maneja los autobuses de el Condado de Sonoma (Sonoma County Transit) por grandes ganancias, ganancias que protegen a todo costo. Los choferes y los mecánicos de Sonoma County Transit sienten el dolor de la explotación por parte de Laidlaw diariamente.

Los trabajadores de Laidlaw ganan substancialmente menos que otros trabajadores del transporte público en esta area, no tienen protección cuando se enferman, beneficios de salud marginales, no tienen jubilación. Los trabajadores de Laidlaw no quieren otra cosa que una justicia económica. Un salario decente y prestaciones por parte de la compañía. Laidlaw esta sólo interesada en la plusvalia.

Los trabajadores del transporte del Condado han estado tratando por los últimos seis meses de obtener un acuerdo con Laidlaw por un nuevo contrato de trabajo. Laidlaw por otro lado, ha estado aprovechandose de su situación hasta lo máximo. Su único interés es sacar Ganancias de los impuestos de el Condado de Sonoma, sin importarle los trabajadores, al final quien paga por esto es el sistema de transporte.

Las numerosas tácticas de convenio por parte de Laidlaw son frecuentemente paralizados. El uso de guardias armados para intimidar a los trabajadores y así aceptar un contrato pobre. Los atentados de divisiones internas entre los trabajadores, hostigamiento constante, el tratamiento disparate de activistas, y las amenazas de violencia física son provocados entre las sesiones de negociaciones.

Los residentes de el Condado de Sonoma le estan pagado muy bien a Laidlaw por manejar el Sonoma County Transit. No obstante Laidlaw esta forzando a los trabajadores a una situación pauperrima. Cada año más de la mitad de los trabajadores son forzados a salirse del trabajo, superexplotados y con problemas de mantener una vida de acuerdo con el costo de la vida. Mientras tanto Laidlaw continua cobrando sus ganancias provenientes de los impuestos locales, ganancias que son removidas de nuestra comunidad permanentemente, estos impuestos se podrian reinvertir en el salario de los trabajadores de una manera más justa.

Parece ser que el Condado de Sonoma no tiene ningún control sobre su mismo sistema de transporte público. La estabilidad, seguridad y autodependencia estan en último lugar cuando se trata de plusvalia. Los trabajadores locales que se preocupan por sus trabajos y la comunidad estan sufriendo en las manos de Laidlaw; nuestro sistema de transporte esta sufriendo en las manos de Laidlaw, aun así, no tenemos un control local. Laidlaw no es parte de nuestra comunidad.

Los trabajadores de Laidlaw han estado trabajando sin contrato colectivo por los últimos tres meses. No han recibido ningún beneficio ni aumento salarial, por el contrario. Sus condiciones de trabajo se han ido deteriorando. En realidad, nuevos trabajadores han sido contratados con un salario mucho más bajo que el antiguo contrato. Aun así, las autoridades públicas de el Condado de Sonoma han incrementado el precio del contrato con Laidlaw. En otras palabras, un incremento en plusvalias provenientes de los impuestos sacados de nuestra comunidad.

Nosotros no estamos de acuerdo con contratos llevados a cabo con compañías como Laidlaw con una póliza pública. No estamos de acuerdo en que los residentes de el Condado de Sonoma aprueben el abuso de los impuestos y la gente. Hasta ahora los trabajadores han estado luchando solos, una lucha que no es sólo para su protección, pero para el futuro de el transporte público y otros servicios públicos en nuestra comunidad. Ahora es tiempo de los residentes de esta condado para unirse a esta lucha.

TO THE SONOMA COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:

The privatization of the Sonoma County Transit system has undermined the quality of mass transit in our community, and has resulted in abuses to the employees, our fellow citizens, who are crucial to the safe and reliable delivery of services.

We therefore petition the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors, whose responsibility it is to oversee Sonoma County Transit, to take all steps necessary to achieve labor peace, work force stability, and a safe and civil working environment for these members of our community.

We further urge the Board to explore alternatives to the current method of operating county transit, as the result has been labor strife, compromised quality, and a loss of revenues for Sonoma County.

SRT White Sale Means "Drama for Less"



SRJC Foster Parent Coordinator Lobbies for Adoptees in Sacramento

Vicki Vidak, coordinator of Santa Rosa Junior College's Foster Parent Training Program, has been named to serve on the Adoption Committee of the Children's Research Institute of California.

The Institute functions as the think tank branch of the California's Children's Lobby which is located in Sacramento.

"The goal of the committee is to recommend ways to increase adoptions of special needs children in California," Vidak explained. "There has been a 22.5% increase in the number of kids entering foster care since 1981 and it appears that as many as 75% of them are not able to achieve perma-

nent stability with their birth parents."

The majority of children in foster care and in need of adoption are classified as "special needs" by virtue of their age, race or disabling condition, Vidak said.

"The committee will evaluate current adoption processes and practices and identify barriers," she said. "A model adoption plan for the state will be developed and recommendations will be made for legislative changes."

Vidak, a resident of Santa Rosa for 15 years, is also co-founder of Partners for Adoption and is a graduate of the Leadership Santa Rosa program, developed by Santa Rosa's Chamber of Commerce.



Gene Malvino, business management and international business instructor, participated in a June, 1987 faculty development program in international business at the Lyon Graduate School of Business in France. Although widely acknowledged in Europe as one of Sweden's most important living poets, Aspenstrom is not well-known in the U.S. Emblen's volume is the first substantial selection of Aspenstrom's poetry to be published in English. Emblen studied the Swedish language and literature during a sabbatical leave in Lund, Sweden, in 1972-73, and has worked on the Aspenstrom poems as they appeared in new volumes through the intervening years.

Applicant Pool May Speed Part-Time Hiring

Applicant pools of qualified, part-time instructors for the Vocational Studies and Business Office Technology Departments are now being formed by the college's Personnel Office.

To join an applicant pool, an individual must complete an employment application and submit three letters of reference and transcripts. Applicants will be screened and qualified applicants will be interviewed by members of the departments. Those applicants who are recommended for hire will join the applicant pool. Part-time instructors for Vocational Studies and Business Office Technology positions will be selected from the applicant pools.

"Those people in the applicant pool will have completed almost all of the necessary paperwork," explained Marie Thompson from Personnel.

Those who do not already have a credential will have their applications

reviewed to determine whether or not they would qualify for a credential, but will not have to spend the money to apply for a credential until they are actually hired, she said.

An instructor's application will remain in the applicant pool indefinitely, Thompson said, and may be updated by the applicant regularly.

The applicant pools should make it easier for departments to hire part-time

instructors, particularly in situations where there isn't much advance warning, such as when a new section is added to handle additional students, Thompson said.







COMPLETED BOARD


